The Children's March in Birmingham in 1963 brought about the Civil Rights Act of 1964. After "Bloody Sunday" and the Voting Rights March from Selma to Montgomery we got the Voting Rights Act of 1965.

On this tour you will not only walk in the footsteps of those courageous people who were part of the Movement, but you will also meet some of them and hear their stories first hand.

This tour will be led by Frank & Rosalie Turner who have led university student tours to Alabama for the past 7 years. Rosalie Turner is an author whose award-winning book MARCH WITH ME tells the story of Birmingham's Children's March.
