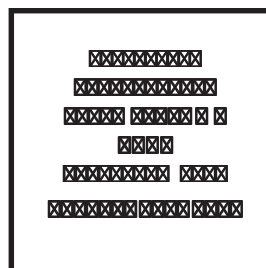

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FALL MEETING OF HISTORICAL SOCIETY - September 22

Francis Asbury and Circuit Riders traveled the area of southeastern Virginia and northeastern North Carolina from 1802 to 1812. It is thought that a society was formed in Murfreesboro during this time. Francis Asbury preached in Murfreesboro from 1803 through 1807. "In 1805 Asbury wrote that he "had a meeting at the house of the widow Meredith," probably of the Methodist society in Murfreesboro, the forerunner of the current congregation. Rev. Samuel Wells, a circuit rider, is credited with founding the first Methodist Church in Murfreesboro in 1806."

Three church buildings have housed this congregation over its long history. The congregation celebrated the Bicentennial Anniversary of its founding on Sunday, October 24th 2004 with Bishop Alfred Wesley Gwinn presiding over the service.

The NC Conference UM Historical Society will meet at the Murfreesboro United Methodist Church at 9:30 AM for fellowship and the business meeting will begin at 10:00 AM. Lunch will be at the

Jefcoat Museum of Americana west of the church on High Street. The spring meeting of the North Carolina Conference Historical Society met on Saturday, April 14, 2007, at Jenkins Memorial United Methodist Church in Raleigh, North Carolina. Present: John Mitchell, Rev. W. Arthur Warren, Jr., Beverley S. Pierpoint, Snodie B. Wilson, Nancy Grady Wilson, Rebecca F. Warren, Vivian Mitchell, Jane Greeson, Mildred S. Swain, Ruth G. Copley, Rev. Tony Collier, Laura Bailey, Lynn James, Frank Young, George Thomas, Mary Paul Thomas, Marie Ramsey, and John and Christine Funderburk.

Rev. W. Arthur Warren, Jr, Vice President, welcomed us, especially Frank Young from the Western North Carolina Conference. Rev. Para Drake, President, is on the way back from an Elizabeth City District mission trip to Mississippi helping with the recovery from Hurricane Katrina. Rev. Gray Southern welcomed the NCCHS to St. James UMC. Para got married December 31. The meeting was opened with a prayer. Rev. Linda Harris, pastor of Jenkins Memorial, was not able to be with us. Arthur thanked the congregation for hosing us. Arthur gave a devotional based on Revelation 1 :4-8. The minutes of the October 7, 2006 meeting were approved. John Mitchell gave the Treasurer's Report. We have \$2,248.82 in the BB&T checking account and a \$1,000 certificate of deposit with the United Methodist DevelopmentFund.

Arthur invited everyone to stay for the NC Conference Commission on Archives & History meeting which will be held after the lunch that Jenkins Memorial UMC will serve us after adjournment of the NCCCHS meeting. The location of the next meeting will be discussed. Arthur has invited [the group] to come to his church, Murfreesboro UMC, in Murfreesboro for the fall meeting. We might have one meeting Friday evening and the other meeting Saturday morning. For staying overnight there is a bed & breakfast in Murfreesboro and the Ahoskie Inn is 12 miles away in

Ahoskie. There is plenty to see in Murfreesboro, home of Chowan University and the Brady Jefcoat Museum. Arthur is talking to the Murfreesboro Historical Society.

The Historical Society of the United Methodist Church and the Southeast Jurisdiction Historical are holding a joint meeting at the National4-H Youth Center in Chevy Chase, MD, July 20-22,2007. The HSUMC holding a convocation to celebrate the tercentenary of the birth of Charles Wesley in 1707. See gcah.org for information on the UMC Archives at Drew University, the Commission on Archives & History, and the Historical Society of the United Methodist Church. Membership information for membership in the North Carolina Conference Historical Society, the SEJ Historical Society, the Historical Society of the United Methodist Church, and the World Methodist Historical Society was available at the meeting.

Lynn James and George Thomas presented the program on the history of Jenkins Memorial UMC. The church began in 1878 in the Riddle home as Brooklyn Methodist Episcopal Church South and later met at Clay St. and Orphanage Dr. In 1906 Annual Conference approved a conference-wide offering to build a new building at the current location at the corner of Boylan Ave. and Devereaux St. The church was renamed for Rev. Jenkins, founder of the Methodist Orphanage. The current brick building was built after the frame church burned in 1914. The church was the home church for the children of the Methodist Orphanage, which was founded in 1898 and started taking children in 1901. The children were required to attend chapel and services. For many years the church and the orphanage were inseparable. The children were required to attend chapel and services. At the back of the church are stained glass windows. The large window is the

Cole Window, named for J. H. Cole, second superintendent of the orphanage. There are three windows under it called the Children's Windows, paid for by orphanage girls, orphanage boys, and children of the Glenwood neighborhood. They cost \$25 each. New windows replace amber glass in the side windows. Reportedly they originally had stained glass that was taken out to be repaired or restored and were never found again. Jenkins Memorial is the third oldest United Methodist church in Raleigh and the fourth oldest in the Raleigh District.

We were invited to share memories we have about the Methodist Orphanage. Vivian Mitchell : When Leon Larkin was the superintendent in the 1950s, he realized that there were the same number of children in the Methodist Orphanage as there were pastors in the North Carolina Conference. He wrote a letter to each pastor and gave him the name of a child. That pastor was supposed to correspond with that child. My husband, Rev. Maness Mitchell, and I had a girl in her early teens that was a problem child. Rather than send her home to her family during one of the summer vacations, she came and stayed with us. She called us Mom and Dad. We heard from her a few times over the years until her death. John Mitchell: Rev Mitchell's first job in the church as a boy during the late 1920s was going around collecting Octagon Soap coupons to help support the Methodist Orphanage. Ruth Copley: One of the pastors at Duke's Chapel UMC later served at the orphanage. Arthur adjourned the meeting with a prayer and the blessing for lunch.

THE REVEREND JAMES REID

Reverend James Reid was born April 5, 1795 in Caswell County, North Carolina. He was the eldest son of seven children born to Bluford and wife Nancy Nowels Reid. The family lived in what is known as the Red House area near Milton, N.C. His father was by trade a wheelwright and a farmer.

Religion was an important part of the family's life as with most people in those days and especially in the rural areas. Bluford Reid must have been very active in the church and highly respected in the local community, for we find his name, as a trustee, on the earliest known deed of New Hope Methodist Church. The church was the oldest in the County and a part of what was referred to at that time as the Methodist Episcopal Church which was in its infancy having only been founded in 1784. This became



the foundation of James life. In 1815 James made the decision that not only changed the course of his life, but also one of his sons, and a grandson. James began training to become a minister of the Methodist Episcopal Church. He began with the Virginia Conference which oversaw much of NC at that time and was placed "On Trial" as an itinerate minister working under Reverend Thacker Muire. In 1818 he was ordained a Deacon and in 1820 became an Elder of the church.

In 1821, he returned to his native state and from that time forward served the religious needs of the people of North Carolina being assigned close to his home in what was then referred to as the Guilford circuit

In 1822 he married Martha Edwards (1804-1855), a daughter of Reverend George Edwards and wife Catherine Simmons Edwards, of Rockingham Co. It was the custom of the church at that time to assign married ministers to established churches or stations as they were called, but James fought to change that policy and was able to continue working as an itinerate minister, being one of the few ministers so allowed.

In 1823 he was assigned to the Franklin circuit, which included Louisburg, which eventually become his permanent home. Nine children were born of this marriage, his second child, Numa Fletcher Reid (1825-1873) followed in his father's footsteps and became a renowned Methodist minister in his own right and was the minister of Louisburg Methodist Church from 1852-1853. Frank L. Reid (1851-1894), Numa's son, was the minister of Louisburg Methodist Church from 1873-1876 and in 1877 became the President of Louisburg Female College. James served the church for fifty-seven years and during that time he traversed much of the state and was widely known. He worked circuits for 26 years, was Presiding Elder for 17 years, Agent for Greensboro Female College for 4 years, in charge of the Raleigh African Mission for 5 years and Agent for the Sunday Schools for the Conference 5 years.

Over those years he became affectionately known as "Father Reid", "Uncle Reid" or "Uncle Jimmy" depending on location it seems In 1837, education became another part of his calling. He was a member of the committee that petitioned the State Legislature to form Greensboro Female College. Today, that institution is known simply as Greensboro College. He was a leading member of the Board of Trustees of that institution from

when it was formed until his death. Later his son, Numa F. Reid, AM, D.D. would also serve as a Trustee, and in 1893, Numa's son, Frank L. Reid, A.M., D.D. became the sixth President of Greensboro College from 1893-1894.

When Louisburg Female College opened its doors on August 5, 1857, Reverend James Reid was there as the first President of the Board of Directors. Two other colleges, Trinity College, today's Duke University and Randolph Macon College in Virginia also benefited from Reverend Reid's guidance. On May 14, 1857 James married Nancy Ann B. Perry who had formally been married to John Kelly.

A daughter of John and Elizabeth Perry she came from one of the oldest families in Franklin Co. dating back to the earliest colonial period. She had four brothers and three sisters. Her brothers were George, Burwell, Thomas and James and her sisters were Mourning, Temperance and Martha. The marriage was performed by R. J. Carson; William H. Pleasants was the bondsman.

Mr. Pleasants would later become the mayor of Louisburg by the end of the Civil War. They were married for over 15 years and had one child Lucy who only shows on the 1860 census.

Reverend Reid was persuaded in April 1872, at the age of 77, to have his name placed on the Republican ballot for the state office of Superintendent of Public Instruction of North Carolina. This would place him in charge of the entire state educational system. So well known and liked throughout the state was he that he won the election without any campaigning or having given a speech. Regretfully, he died November 8, 1872 in Greensboro before he could assume office.

A funeral service was conducted in Greensboro, NC, on Sunday November 10, 1872. Afterwards his body was returned to Louisburg where on Monday a final church service was conducted before a large assembly of persons regardless of religious belief or political affiliation, who afterwards escorted Reverend James Reid to his final resting place beside his first wife and two of their sons.

Obituaries, articles actually, are to be found in several newspapers of the day, testimony itself as to how well known and respected this gentleman was.

In those days, newspapers didn't run obituaries as standard practice; they were used as filler, only when extra space was available. The ones concerning Reverend Reid are usually found on the front page.

Note: Robert Reid has been researching the life of James Reid. The exact location of the burial place of the Reid family is unknown at the present time. It appears that it would likely have been somewhere in the Louisburg area. Church and city inquires have not been successful.

There was no response from our readers, but shouldn't the official name of the church in 1950 have been The Methodist Church?)



CELEBRATING THE CHARLES WESLEY TRICENTENARY

The SEJ Historical Society meeting for this year was held in conjunction with The United Methodist Church - Sixth Historical Convocation, Celebrating The Charles Wesley Tercentenary, at the National 4 – H Youth Conference Center in Chevy Chase, Maryland, Friday, July 20 – Sunday, July 22, 2007. The sponsoring groups were: General Commission on Archives and History, The Historical Society of The United Methodist Church, The Charles Wesley Society, The SEJ Historical Society, World Methodist Council and Wesley Theological Seminary. There were four in attendance from the North Carolina Conference- Vivian Mitchell, John Mitchell, Becky Warren and Arthur Warren.

The SEJ Historical Society Steering Committee began at 8:30 AM on Friday with the abbreviated Business Session of the Society, following at 9:30 AM being led by our President, Mrs. Thelma Crowder. We shared the business of the Society and discussed our future meetings. The next meeting will be hosted at Tennessee Wesleyan College, Athens, TN, July 8-11, 2008. The 2009 meeting is planned for Lake Junaluska to celebrate the 10th Anniversary of the First Historical Convocation, Celebrating Our Heritage – Caring for Our History, held at Lake Junaluska Assembly, Lake Junaluska, NC, June 30 – July 3, 1989. We heard reports from Rev. Art Swartout, Interim Director, SEJ Archives and History/Heritage Center, about the Center, Newsletter and Workshops for the fall. Ms. Nell Thrift, Chair, SEJ Commission on Archives & History, reported on their work and the search for a full-time Director at the Heritage Center.

The Heritage Preservation Workshop will be held, Friday – Sunday, October 5 – 7, 2007 at The Southeastern Jurisdiction Conference and Retreat Center, Lake Junaluska, NC, which is designed for Local Church Historians and History Committees and Annual Conference History Personnel. We adjourned our meeting for lunch and the beginning of the Convocation at 1:30 PM.

The Convocation was presided over by Dr. Lawrence Hull Stookey, with welcome from The Rev. Dr. Robert J. Williams, General Secretary Commission on Archives and History and greetings from Dr. David McAllister-Wilson, Wesley Theological Seminary. The opening address was "Charles Wesley, Faith in Action" by Dr. Charles Mcquiban, Principal of Sarum College, Salisbury,

England. Dr. Karen Westerfield Tucker, Professor of Liturgy, Boston University, presented "Show Us Thy Salvation": Charles Wesley And The Liturgical Year. Following dinner, we boarded buses for the trip to Asbury UMC in Washington, DC, founded in 1836. "A Festival of Music:" Charles Wesley at 300, sung by the Friends of Charles Wesley Choir with Eileen Guenther, Lecturer in Church Music at Wesley Theological Seminary and the Minister of Music and Liturgy at Foundry UMC, conductor, was presented at the church.

Saturday morning following a wonderful breakfast at the 4- H Center, we had the option of a bus tour of local historic sites or Interest Group Lectures at the 4H Center.

Dr. Tucker presented "The Eucharistic Theology of the Wesleys: HYMNS ON THE LORD'S SUPPER". Dr. J. Gordon Melton, research specialist with the Department of Religious Studies at the University of California, Santa Barbara, presented "African-American Methodist History". Dr. S T Kimbrough, Jr., founding president of the Charles Wesley Society, and Dr. Carlton Young, editor of the United Methodist Hymnal, presented "Hymns of Charles Wesley: Traditional and Contemporary". The afternoon session was presided over by Dr. George Freeman. The address: "Negotiating Denominational Identity: African Methodism And Wesleyan Identity" was presented by Dr. Dennis C. Dickerson, James M. Lawson, Jr. Professor of History, Vanderbilt University, Nashville, TN. The last afternoon address, "The Revd. Charles Wesley: Viewed from the Perspective of the Early Methodist Sources" was given by Dr. Thomas R. Albin, Dean of the Upper Room Chapel, Nashville, TN.

The evening program "Music of the Heart", Celebrating the 300th Anniversary of Charles Wesley's Birth, was shared by Dr. S T Kimbrough, Jr. baritone and Ms. Mary K. Jackson, pianist and sister of Dr. Kimbrough. At the beginning of our gathering Dr. Paul Chilcote made the presentation of a Distinguished Service Award to the recipient, Dr S T Kimbrough, Jr. for his faithful work with our Wesleyan Heritage. Sunday morning the Historical Society of The United Methodist Church had its annual meeting. After adjournment we heard from Mary K. Ricks, Washington, DC, Historian and founder of Tour DC, (www.tourdc.com), speak about her book

titled, "Escape On The Pearl, The Heroic Bid for Freedom on the Underground Railroad". We then listened to a presentation by the 2007 "Saddlebag" award recipient, Dr. John R. Tyson, Professor of History, Houghton College, New York. The winning entry is titled "In the Midst of Early Methodism: Lady Huntingdon and Her Correspondence", published by Scarecrow Press.

We made our way across the street from the 4H Center for the morning worship service at Chevy Chase UMC. Dr. Paul W. Chilcote, Visiting Professor of Evangelism, Duke Divinity School and President of the Charles Wesley Society, gave the sermon, "A Message, a Meal, a Mission" with Scripture from Acts 2: 37-47. We enjoyed singing a celebration of Charles Wesley Hymns during the service: "O For a Thousand Tongues to Sing", "Come, Thou Long-Expected Jesus", "Hark! The Herald Angels Sing", "Come, O Thou Traveler Unknown", "See How Great a Flame Aspires" and "O For a Thousand Tongues to Sing". The Charles Wesley Society celebrated the 300th anniversary of Charles Wesley's birth with a reprint of the first edition of Hymns and Sacred Poems (1739), available at our meeting. Edited by S T Kimbrough, Jr. with an Introduction and Notes by Paul W. Chilcote, it may be ordered by fax from 732-295-5568 or by email from stk812@aol.com.

Charles Wesley, born December 18, 1707, served the Lord faithfully having learned to trust in the grace of God alone for his salvation on May 21, 1738, three days before his brother John. Charles married Sarah Gwynne on April 8, 1749 and died on March 29, 1788 to enter the church triumphant at the age of 80. We were truly blessed to learn more about this faithful servant of God, The Rev. Charles Wesley and to visit again with friends from around the Southeastern United States and to make new friends in the Northeast and around the world.
