GEOCACHING FOR NCCUMC ARCHIVES AND HISTORY

First UMC of Fuquay-Varina will be exploring its long history in the Upper Cape Fear Valley of North Carolina using a high-tech treasure hunt called geocaching. Geocaching is an outdoor recreational activity in which participants use a Global Positioning System (GPS) receiver or other mobile devices - as well as other navigational techniques - to hide and seek containers called "geocaches" or "caches", anywhere in the world. In a day of strength, we will come to learn about the struggles of early Methodists, celebrating the courage, devotion, and warmth of heart that characterized congregants, lay leaders and ministers of North Carolina's Upper Cape Fear River Valley. https://www.geocaching.com/play

A rather loosely defined area, the Upper Cape Fear Valley begins in Fayetteville – 90 feet above sea level - and tracks northwesterly to the junction of the Deep and the Haw Rivers – 160 feet above sea level - where, as my grandmother used to say, sometimes everything got wet. Originally organized (1778) as the New Hope Circuit, twenty-five churches and meeting houses were recorded as places of worship for the people called Methodists. When Francis Asbury made his first visit to North Carolina, July 15, 1780, he preached at B. Hartfield's, north of what is now Duncan, then moved on to Chatham County. The earliest reference to a specific church was recorded in Asbury's Journal, January 19. 1790, when he kept an appointment at Merritt's Chapel on the New Hope Creek in Chatham County.

Formed in 1793, the Haw River Circuit had, by 1797, completely replaced the New Hope Circuit. This new circuit probably already included Memphis Church, located just a mile across the Cape Fear River from Chatham County and about three miles from Corinth, today's home of Buckhorn UMC. The Buckhorn Circuit was set up in 1838 and continued until 1924. While it is not known how many churches were included on the original Buckhorn Circuit, we know of at least Memphis Church in what was then Moore County, the original Buckhorn location in Chatham County, and Cokesbury Church in what was then Cumberland County. By 1855, the Buckhorn Circuit had over 1500 members and two appointed ministers. The next milestone came in 1857 when these three churches were added to seven others to make up the new Buckhorn Circuit. "Visiting these churches today one can still feel the impression of antiquity, see evidence of age upon tombstones, and experience the phenomenon of standing still amid a modern moving age. Something of the past still linger s within and about these historic building and grounds that cannot be surrendered even to progress." (Grill, p 39.)
