HISTORY OF ASBURY METHODIST CHURCH

Asbury Methodist Church started back in 1893 when the Erwin Mills were being built. Mr. B. N. Duke saw the need for a church in this area, and asked the Rev. Reuben Hibberd, a florist and lay preacher, to start a Sunday School. This Sunday School was held in a grandstand where part of the Duke Woman's Campus is now located. In the summer of 1894, Rev. Hibberd held a revival in this grandstand and a church congregation was organized with 44 members. This congregation was called the West Durham Methodist Church.

In December 1896, Mr. B. N. Duke donated to this new congregation a lot on the corner of Main and Ninth Sts. A chapel and parsonage were also donated. When the congregation had outgrown this building in the 1920's and for the third time needed more space, they decided to build a new church building and to move their location to the corner of Markham Ave. and Sixth St. (later changed to Clarendon St.) where the Church now stands.

In 1926, the new church building was completed and the congregation moved. It was not until 1944, however, that the congregation voted to change the name of the Church to Asbury Methodist Church. In this building the sanctuare has been redecorated twice, and in 1947 the white frame house beside the Church was purchased for more Sunday School rooms and office space.

In 1954, it was necessary to acquire more space for classrooms, so a campaign for building money was begun. The present educational building was begun in April 1936, under the leadership of the Rev. W. B. Petteway, and was occupied in January 1957. The old building was renovated and redecorated at this time.

Asbury's congregation now numbers 1187 members and the total property is valued in excess of \$450,000.00

During 1962-63 the entire Church plant was air conditioned, the organ was expanded to about four times its previous capacity, and a new parsonage at 2011 W. Club Blvd., was purchased.

The high water mark of last Conference year was having Bishop Garber dedicate our new educational building, the new ranks of pipes on the organ and the air conditioning on April 4, 1965. An attractive storage building was erected behind the parsonage last summer, and another piece of property on Clarendon St. for parking has been acquired, bringing the total to five lots. Our Board of Trustees with keen foresight have planned ahead for acquisition of still more property for parking space. In modern church building programs, parking facilities are a must, so our congregation must be alert to this need and back up our Trustees in this respect. The Senior High MYF has, with the help of some of the adult classes, furnished a most attractive lounge adjacent to their classroom on the ground floor, and the Marvin Reep Class painted their classroom and the nursery.
