OPEN DOORS Past, Present and Future

To the church, Black's Chapel, in Godwin write: "Behold, I have set before thee an open door, and no man can shut it: for thou hast a little strength, and hast kept my word, and hast not denied my name. Behold I come quickly: hold that fast which thou hast, that no man take thy crown. Him that overcometh will I make a pillar in the temple of my God. Let the listener hear what the Spirit says to the Churches." (From Rev. 3:7-13)

"God moves in a mysterious way
His wonders to perform;
He plants His footsteps in the sea,

It would seem that when Providence was ready for Methodist Church doors to be opened here, Mr. Wiley Trice Rhodes, a resident of Orange County, moved into this community. This was in or around the year 1865. His inspiration inspired others to join together in an effort to establish a Methodist Church here.

In his history, Methodism in the Upper Cape Fear Valley, the Rev. C. Franklin Grill recorded the following: "Another church just seven miles south of Dunn, near Godwin, was named Black's Chapel after the beloved Rev. W. S. Black, presiding elder of the Wilmington District from 1874 to 1877. Founded in 1876, it was the first Methodist Church in northeastern Cumberland County and was organized and started in what later became a schoolhouse located a few hundred feet from the present structure. Mr. Wiley Rhodes and Mr. William Culbreth were leaders in the community and saw to it that a suitable church building was soon erected."

When it was first built and the carpenters had finished their work, they locked the doors of the church because there was not sufficient funds to pay the balance due. This prohibited worship in the new building --- thus a church with closed doors!

We have been told by a granddaughter of William Culbreth that her grandfather raised funds in the community to pay the indebtedness. The next Sunday moring Mr. Culbreth went to the church, unlocked and opened the doors and rang the bell, announcing that the church was open for worship. The people began to gather for the first service and ever since then the doors of Black's Chapel have been OPEN DOORS!

Mr. Grill continues: "The church first operated as a part of the Sampson Circuit and later was transferred to the Dunn Circuit. In 1922 it went on the Erwin Circuit for a few years, then went back with Dunn until 1952 with 93 members it became a part of the Wesley Circuit in the Raleigh District. Today (1966) Black's Chapel has 88 members and is a part of the Wesley-Black's Charge in the Goldsboro District."

Today, (1976), with 87 members, Black's Chapel is still a part of the Wesley-Black's Charge now in the Fayetteville District.

The schoolhouse in which the church was started became known as Black's Chapel School. Later a two-teacher school was opened in Godwin.

At the time of the founding of this church, the people of the community were served by Rhodes Post Office. This area later became known as Holland's Lake, now Rhodes Pond. The Godwin Post Office, which was opened at a later date, now serves the community.

In 1914 a belfry was erected. A new pulpit and altar were built by an outstanding layman of the church, Mr. A. B. Yarbrough, who was Sunday School Superintendent for 20 years.

Under the leadership of the Rev. Forrest D. Hedden and his wife, members were inspired to construct three classrooms back of the present pulpit, the building was renovated inside and out, and the pews now in use were installed. The year was 1948.

Divine Street Church (founded in Dunn in 1887) is to be remembered for its gifts of kindergarten furniture and a communion set. The communion set has now been replaced.

Our Methodist Women deserve much credit for their contributions toward the furnishings and upkeep of the church through the years. They also paid a proportionate part in the building of the parsonage located near Wesley's Chapel. The parsonage was erected in 1954.

The painting above the communion table was done by Mr. Zeno Spence, Jr., a grandson of William and Nancy Culbreth, and given to the church by the Culbreth heirs.

Mrs. Clyde Culbreth McLellan was church pianist for some 50 years. In 1960 her family presented a pulpit <u>Bible</u> in her memory.

The latest memorials dedicated were the ten stained glass windows and the transom over the front door; the sanctuary lighting fixtures, and a lectern.


