The Way We Were . . .

The History of Brooksdale

On May 5, 1889, J. G. Monk deeded an acre of land to a new Methodist church. The first trustees were: W. H. Russell, A. M. Stanfield, George Stephens, Simpson Adcock, and George Daniel.

By May 18, 1889, the church was organized with twenty members and assumed the name Brookland. By November of that year, the membership totaled thirty, most of whom transferred from other Methodist churches. Rev. J. E. Underwood was the first pastor.

In the early 1890's, several of the people living in the community of Brooksdale became interested in organizing a church for the area which would be more centrally located. Most of these were already members of churches on the Mount Tirzah Circuit of Person County, but distances were great and during the winter's bad weather, roads were often impassable. As a result, many churches did not have services during the winter months.

In December 1891, Rev. D. L. Earnhardt was appointed to the Mt. Tirzah Circuit as pastor for most of the people living in this area. Under his leadership, work was begun toward the organization of a new church, and on April 23, 1893, Brooksdale Methodist Episcopal Church, South, became a reality with a membership of 16 persons who were charter members by certificate from other churches of the Circuit. The first church building was erected on a one-acre lot on the Roxboro-Mt. Tirzah Road, across the road from what is now the Roxboro cemetery, Burchwood. This lot was deeded to the Trustees of Brooksdale Church October 27, 1894, by John T. Brooks and wife Eleanor. The Trustees at this time were: George W. Wrenn, Stephen H. Garrett, M. H. Garrett, Charles B. Brooks, and John T. Brooks.

In December 1893, Rev. N. E. Coltrane was appointed to the Mt. Tirzah Circuit, and in January 27, 1894, the first Quarterly Conference was held at Brooksdale Church with Dr. E. A. Yates, Presiding Elder, in the chair.

During 1894, the Mt. Tirzah Circuit was unable to complete the balance due on a parsonage which had been built, so it was decided to sell the building to get enough money to pay the builder. This was a source of great embarrassment to the entire Circuit of seven or eight churches. By the first Quarterly Conference in January, a new Parsonage Committee was appointed to decide on a location and plans for a new building. These were presented to the Circuit at this time. They were accepted, and Charles B. Brooks and Stephen H. Garrett were directed on January 18, 1896, to have the parsonage built and the well dug.

In February, 1896, Charles B. Brooks and wife, Emma, gave to the Circuit a lot on which a new parsonage was to be built. Trustees who received this deed were: C. B. Brooks, W. T. Noell, and G. W. Moore. It was reported to the Quarterly Conference in June, 1896, that the new parsonage was completed at a total cost of \$992.43, which amount included the six-room house, fencing around the same, painting, a new well, and the necessary outbuildings. Of this amount, \$423.05 had been paid, leaving a balance of \$569.38 still due. Many years later, this same parsonage became the Parsonage for the newly created Brooksdale Charge of five churches.

Another year we are going to co-operate with our pastor in getting out his directory giving the assessment of each member, and also giving the amount paid by each member during the year 1914 --Stewards.



The Brooksdale Circuit was formed at the Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South held in Greenville, N. C., December, 1917, with Rev. J. A. Russell appointed as pastor. Churches included in this new Circuit were Brooksdale, Brookland, Allensville, Trinity, and Webb's Chapel. At this time, a committee was appointed to determine the amount of money the new Charge would pay the Mt. Tirzah Circuit for its interest in the Parsonage.

Even though the World War I years had been hard, Brooksdale had experienced a steady growth, and under the leadership of Rev. J. A. Russell, plans were being made to erect a new church. The old one-room church had served its people well, but the congregation had outgrown its quarters. By October 1920, plans were complete and work was soon to begin on the new building. In April, 1921, work had begun and its completion was scheduled for September, 1921. Much of the necessary materials and labor was donated by the members of the church. The church was a modern brick structure. The success of this undertaking was due to the whole-hearted cooperation of all the members of the church, and other friends. Dedication services were held on October 30, 1927, with Rev. W. L. Loy as Pastor.

On Sunday, January 12, 1936, then pastor R. E. Pittman had prepared his sermon, and was in the process of getting ready for church when he was stricken by acute angina and passed away.

Dedication of the organ, which was presented to the church through the efforts of the women of the church led by Mrs. Claude Barrett, took place on October 28, 1947. This instrument was dedicated in honor and memory of the young men and women of the church who served our country in World War II. They are named below:

Staff Sergeant Clyde G. Whitt was a gunner on a B-24 in the 579th Squadron, 392nd Bomb Group, of the U. S. Army Air Corps. He was killed June 23, 1944, while on a mission over France, and is buried in Burchwood Cemetery. Private First Class William Andrew "Billy" Jordan was a member of the 7th Army involved in the Battle of the Bulge. In a battle near Alsace, France, he and a friend were hit by sniper fire and both lost their lives, January 13, 1945. Billy is also buried in Burchwood Cemetery in the Jordan plot. James Satterfield, also in the U. S. Army, died in Italy in 1944.

In October, 1954, additional land was purchased from Talmadge and Hazel Russell. This was to later become the site for what we now call the Educational Building, which includes a fellowship hall. Much of the planning for this building was done by Rev. Key Taylor in collaboration with Mr. David S. Brooks, Sr. Groundbreaking services were held on April 17, 1960. The dedication of this building was held on December 5, 1965, with Bishop Paul N. Garber, District Superintendent O. L. Hathaway, Rev. Key Taylor, and the pastor Rev. Robert L. Ossman leading the service.

A deed dated June 9, 1966, conveyed land to the church for a new parsonage on the Allensville road by W. Jasper Whitfield and wife, Eliza Hicks Whitfield. This is now the site of a modern and comfortable home for the pastors of the charge.

Additional adjoining land was deeded to the church April 20, 1974, by F. Jack McKee and wife, Dorothy C. McKee, Wallace Lee Clayton, and Elsy C. Crabtree and her husband, Simon C. Crabtree.

In 1976, the sanctuary and fellowship hall were air-conditioned, making church functions and worship more pleasant and bearable.

An attempt was made by Brooksdale to become a station pastorate in 1986 but costs to carry it out were prohibitive and in 1988 the process was abandoned.

A Conference/Music Room was added in early 1988 to provide a place for small gatherings that would not require heating or cooling a space as large as the fellowship hall or sanctuary for a few people, and for choir rehearsals and preparation. Storage for choir music was also provided in the room.

1991 brought a paved driveway for the sanctuary and educational building, as a result of a gift by Mrs. Forrest (Lora) Grasty and Mrs. Bernice Parham, sisters of Mrs. Clara Satterfield. This gift was in memory of Clara, who, along with her husband, Jack, were very generous and faithful to the church throughout their lives. The driveway was dedicated to the Glory of God by the Reverend Mary Alene (M. A.) Clive, February 9, 1992.

Later, a similar program was instituted by the District, titled "Lay Person of the Year" and the first person to receive this award was John Wesley Jones for the year 1991.

As this church has developed through the years, each step has been a distinct reflection of the dedication, concern, and love that each generation has been able to carry on as set forth by its founding fathers and dedicated pastors. This church, in itself, is a living memorial and testimony of the love of God as a fundamental principle in the religious life of the entire community. From the influence of this church, Methodism in North Carolina and other parts of the world has been

enriched through the work of some of our own: Rev. Frank Whitt, Rev. Dr. Wallace Kirby, Wallace Zimmerman, Annafield Walker, Rev. David Langston, and Sandra Whitt.

Frank served with distinction for many years with the United Methodist Church, working in all 50 states, preaching in 126 churches, and raising over \$30 million for churches, before retiring October 1, 1992. Wallace Kirby served for 40 years in the ministry, starting at Fremont near Goldsboro. He later served Edenton Street UMC in Raleigh, and for six years as Durham District Superintendent. He was a member of the Brooksdale Boy Scouts and Methodist Youth Fellowship. Sandra, during 1992, signed up to serve with Mercy Ships to minister to people's basic needs around the world.

There are many other lay people here, and in other states and cities who have shared their faith. When we look back into the past and survey the world about us, we can surely say: "God has truly blessed us with this heritage. It cannot be purchased with the coin of the realm; it is obtained through the grace of God, and the fellowship of those who have shared these experiences".

So today, for God's church we may well wish: "May you continue in this role of ministry for the future generations, and may they always be aware that this church home will always reach out to them wherever they may be." This is truly a proud and honorable heritage. May we always strive to be worthy of it.

The History of the United Methodist Women

(The following history was gleaned from the script of a play, titled "Yesterday, Today, and Forever" presented by the United Methodist Women in the late 1960's.)

Brooksdale Missionary Society was organized in 1912 by Mrs. T.H. Street, district secretary.

Mrs. S. F. Nicks, was a great help when her husband, Rev. Nicks served the charge. Mrs. G. M. Fox was always ready to do her part.

The World Outlook had programs, the Bible study, and meditation to be used for programs. There was also the news of the bulletins, and a leaflet. These messages were given at each meeting. There wasn't a large number of women in attendance, 7 to 12, but at almost every meeting there were several visitors.

Several groups were sponsored by the Society. There were the little ones called the "Bright Jewels" under the leadership of Mrs. D. S. Brooks, Supt. of Children; a young people's group led by Supt. of Youth Work; and the Missionary Society itself. Many times during the year the "Bright Jewels" would have the program with their little pieces and songs. Many of their pro-

grams opened the Sunday School on Sunday morning. The young people met with the women sometimes or a combined meeting would be held after Sunday School.

Every November, Week of Prayer was observed. There were three meetings, usually, with each group having the program. One in 1934 had a violin and piano selection, "Sweet Hour of Prayer", by Evangeline Fox and Hall Brooks.

There were also Zone meetings like sub-district meetings are held now. At some of these there would be Bible Study and Mission Studies--the meeting occurring in the morning and the study after lunch. There was also Fellowship Day with several churches meeting together for lunch and fellowship--such as Warren's Grove, Concord, Oak Grove, and Brooksdale. The ladies would visit many societies of other churches during their meetings. Once they went to Allensville in July and it was so hot they just did not have a program.

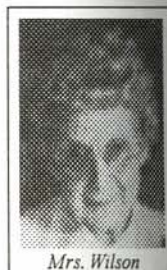
In September, 1932, Mrs. Nicks, with the help of others, organized the Missionary Society at East Roxboro and Jalong (named for J. A. Long, which later became known as Longhurst). She also sold Irish potatoes at \$1.00 a bushel to help meet the conference expenses in 1931. There were dues, Harvest days, hat sales, (each one sold one and bought one for \$.25) and suppers to raise money for conference expenses. One supper for Kiwanis in September, 1935, cleared \$12.30 and one in 1940 cleared \$9.22. Brillo and Skido were sold. In January for two years, the ladies were given Holiday plates and all during the year, they would place money in them for each Holiday. As for expenses, they had to give \$1.00 to wash five quilts for the parsonage in April, 1929. They bought new curtains, shades, and material to cover the living room suite for the parsonage, and curtains for a kitchen window for \$15.00.

In 1931, they bought two sheets for the Methodist Orphanage. In 1933 each member gave \$.50 to Mrs. Freeman, a missionary, and in 1934 each member gave \$.05 for a negro girl to help her go to Payne College to be a missionary to her race.

In 1931, Mrs. W. C. (Sallie Loy) Lawson was made an honorary member. On March, 1938, Mrs. Maxie Fox was given a life membership, and certificate. The meeting was moved from Thursday afternoon to Wednesday night to be held immediately after prayer service. This started the night meetings. In March 1937, Mrs. Brooks Carver and Miss Foy Lawson joined as new members. In January, 1938, Mrs. Claude Barrett joined, and in October, 1938, Mrs. J. F. Wilson joined. They are the charter members

A special date was August 5, 1940. The minutes read:

"Last meeting under the old order was held at the Church with 7 members present. Mrs. J. I. Brooks was in charge of the program. Miss Foy Lawson read an inspiring poem. Mrs. W. C. Lawson read scriptures and gave the meditation lesson from World Outlook. The leaflet was given by Mrs. Claude Barrett. "Bless be the tie that binds." was sung. The president announced that a called meeting would be held to organize the society under the United Church

before the next meeting. The New Year of the United Societies will begin in September. Miss Foy Lawson dismissed the society with prayer and thus ends the work of the Missionary Society of Brooksdale Methodist Church, South. We look forward to even bigger and better work under the United Churches of Methodism.

Millie Johnson joined the young circle in March, 1950, and it was decided to have a contest between the older circle and the younger circle to see which circle could get the most new members. Mrs. Claude Barrett was voted in as President of the Society, and it was decided to send a shower of cards to Mrs. Maness, Rev. E. C. Maness’ wife, who had been sick. In the next meeting the following new members joined: Betty Garrett, Maxine Humphries, Peggy Hester, Nancy Langston, Hazel Russell, and Geraldine Terry.

In November, 1950, the young circle helped with a pounding and an informal get-together for the new pastor, Rev. Traynham, and his family. Mr. Traynham’s initials are “D.D.T.” and he made quite a joke about it that night.

The Society also helped with a banquet for the MYF which was held in the old basement of the Church. They had a great interest in the MYF, and in February, 1950, they gave \$30.00 to help finance a trip for Margaret Green and Kathryn Traynham to the National Youth Fellowship in Florida.

The members of one Circle made cookies to send to F. O. Whitt, Jr., Roy Jordan, Carlton Painter, Sidney O’Briant, and Jimmy Moore, who were in service. That Circle had a lot of fun the night they met and packed the cookies to be mailed. There was never any word of them making any of the boys sick, but every kind of cookie in the book was in the package.

The March, 1951, meeting was held in the home of Hazel Russell with Imogene Wilson in charge of the program. New officers for the coming year were elected as follows: Hilda Green, President; Imogene Wilson, Vice-Pres.; Peggy Hester, Rec. Sec.; Annie Sue Kostecki, Sec. & Treas.; Maxine Humphries, Spiritual Life Leader; Geraldine Terry, Social Relations; Hazel

Russell, Betty Garrett, Pauline Parham and Millie Johnson, Program Committee.

In the early part of 1952, the women lost two of their very active members, Maxine Humphries and Sue Kostecki, both of whom moved to other towns. The new officers elected for the coming year were: Geraldine Terry, Pres.; Helen Whitt, V-Pres.; Nellie Cobb, Rec. Sec.; Betty Garrett, Local Treas.; Peggy Hester, Spiritual Life Leader; and Hilda Green, Social Relations.

In the past, the women have also bought a coffee maker for the church; given \$10.00 on furniture for our Parsonage; made a quilt to sell; gave \$6.00 to help send a girl to Louisburg College; had a tacky party; had holiday plates; hat sales, and many other projects--all of which were very beneficial financially, and a lot of fun, too.

In May, 1953, they realized that they needed the wisdom, and knowledge of the older women of the Church, and it was decided that they would no longer have a "Young" and "Old" Circle, but that all names would be put together and drawn for the three circles. They were very happy that the two circles had grown to the point that they needed three circles.

The three Circle Leaders chosen to begin office in June, 1953, were Mrs. Landon Whitt, Mrs. Bill Green, and Mrs. Brooks Carver.

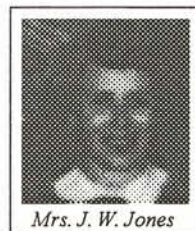
(The minutes are lost from 1940 to 1945.)

One member was lost in this time --Mrs. Mary Lee (P. T.) Whitt, Sr. in 1944. Beginning in 1940 the literature was changed and at that time they had program books. The World Outlook and Methodist Woman were magazines that tell of the work. The year, 1945, they sent the pocket size Upper Room to the boys and girls in service. This was also done in 1954. In September they discussed consolidating with the Ladies Class and the first combined meeting was in October, 1945. A year later the Ladies Class reorganized and met on Thursday night. They cooked a stew for the husbands at Mrs. J. I. Brooks' in August. In November the Shield family lost their home by fire so they gave \$5.00 from the treasury and a donation of \$20.00. Then in February, they showered them with gifts. The Men's Class joined with them in January, 1946, and entertained the president, Mrs. P. T. Whitt, Sr. and her husband at a supper at Hotel Roxboro. They had just recently married. They also gave a gift of silver.

In 1946, they gave Mrs. Carver a life membership pin and certificate. In 1947, Mrs. Claude

Barrett suggested an organ for the Church and the Society gave \$50.00 on the fund. This was the start of the church having the organ today. They gave \$50.00 to the building fund in September, 1949. At Christmas Mrs. O. J. Jordan gave each member an apron as she did for many Christmases.

To start the year, 1950, the women bought new song books for the church. In May, they had a meeting to train officers at Mrs. Barrett's. In September they celebrated the 10th anniversary of the W.S.C.S. of this Church.



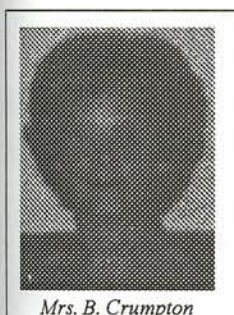

At Christmas, they each bought a gift to take to the County Home. This continued for many years. In May, 1952, each brought a cake of soap or some item to send to Korea. Then in 1954 they received a letter from Miss Ester Larch asking for feed bags. The last of the year they received a letter thanking them and they told how much they enjoyed sewing them. In 1953 they received a letter from Mrs. Horce asking for soap coupons for the orphanage. There are two women who were remembered at this time: The adopted mother, Mrs. Mallie Whitt, who was ill and to whom they each gave a gift several times and Mrs. D. S. Brooks, whose death on August 31, 1952 saddened them.

During this time the women had many ways of making money. At the end of 1950, the Holiday plates were collected and these contained \$15.40. They sold brooms, skirt and pant hangers, had hat sales in April, 1952, and a Joseph coat of many colors was passed around to the members. They put a patch on the coat to cover the money they gave. In June the patches were removed and they had \$25.30. They planned a Harvest sale for Fall. In May of 1954, they gave \$100.00 to the building fund from local funds.

From 1950-1955 was a period they did many things for others. In March they received a letter from Mrs. Choen asking each member to give \$1.00 on the retirement home. They gave \$42.00 on this fund. They served refreshments to Bible School each year and two nights during Youth Week. In 1955 they gave Mrs. Marvin Clayton a life membership pin and certificate. At the meeting in December Mrs. Wragg read a letter from Methodist Orphanage thanking the Society for the quilt they had sent the Orphanage.

The World Outlook was sent to the hospital for two years from the Society. Two Care packages were sent. They sent used clothing to the Cherokee Indian Mission in November 1957, a MYFer to camp in 1958, and Mrs. Wragg sent 15 lbs. of hosiery to Japan for the Society. They gave \$5.00 to Brooks-Howard Home in Asheville for retired ministers, \$5.00 for Crusade Scholarship. They paid for plates, 8 tables and 8 chairs which cost \$153.18, besides giving \$1200.00 on the building fund (\$200 in October, 1955, \$500 in December, 1955, and \$500 in 1958.). They also gave 20 pens to the MYF members. They did these by making several stews each year, suppers, rummage sale, and cake and pie sale. Many of the members remember the Hot Dogs they sold at Central School.

In December, 1955, one of the members, Mrs. Charlie Francis, died. It was in April, 1958, that they decided to have two circles instead of three.

This was the period the church moved into the new building. In January, 1960, they collected old Christmas cards and sent them to the retarded class at Bushy Fork School. In November of that year they received a letter from the Pembroke area about their needs and they sent \$5.00.

In November they received a letter from Mrs. Chandler concerning clothing for Indian children. They brought the clothes on Sunday and sent them. They visited the Maple Heights Rest Home in September and gave a program. At Christmas time, each member gave a dollar gift for those in the rest home to make their Christmas a little happier.

In February, 1964, the Prayer Group was organized and met with Mrs. Karen Harris. In May, 1964, Mrs. O. J. Jordan was honored by being presented a life membership pin and certificate. One of the meetings was given by Mrs. Page Brooks who told of her daughter, Ann Page's work in Japan as a missionary. At another meeting they had a Japanese couple as the speakers telling of mission work in Japan. At another meeting in 1964 a District officer, Mrs. C. D. Scott from Durham, spoke to the group.

In September, 1964, Youth Activity Week was held at Brooksdale for all sub-district MYFs. This was the first time all churches had youth activity week together. All the shut-ins have been remembered with visits, gifts, and flowers.

Also in 1964, another of the members, Mrs. Ruby Whitfield, passed away. What they did with the money that had been made by suppers and more suppers, stews and more stews, cake and pie sales, rummage sales, sales of a cook book, and by the gifts each Christmas being for building funds, for the five years prior to 1964 was as follows:

They purchased silverware, plates, cups, glasses, carts, screen door and another stove for the kitchen, 100 chairs for use in the education building, paid \$50.00 on piano, gave \$500.00 on building fund, increased the pledge from \$200 to \$250, gave \$30 to help MYFers on trips and camps. They also gave \$523.32 on the improvement of the parsonage besides buying a new bedroom suite. From May, 1954, to August, 1962, the W.S.C.S. gave \$2100 for building fund. The dates that stand out during this time are moving into the new building in 1961, the first sub-district Youth Activity Week held here in 1964, and the dedication of the building in 1965.

A service pin and certificate were presented to Mrs. Hall Brooks by the Brooks family for the service she had given the church and community and the devotion to the family, since she had been at Brooksdale. It was presented by Mrs. Bob Ossman. Corsages were presented to the charter members and were pinned on by Mrs. Hall Brooks and Mrs. Glen Titus. The service was closed by the singing of "Blest Be the Tie" and the benediction was given by the pastor, Rev. Bob Ossman.

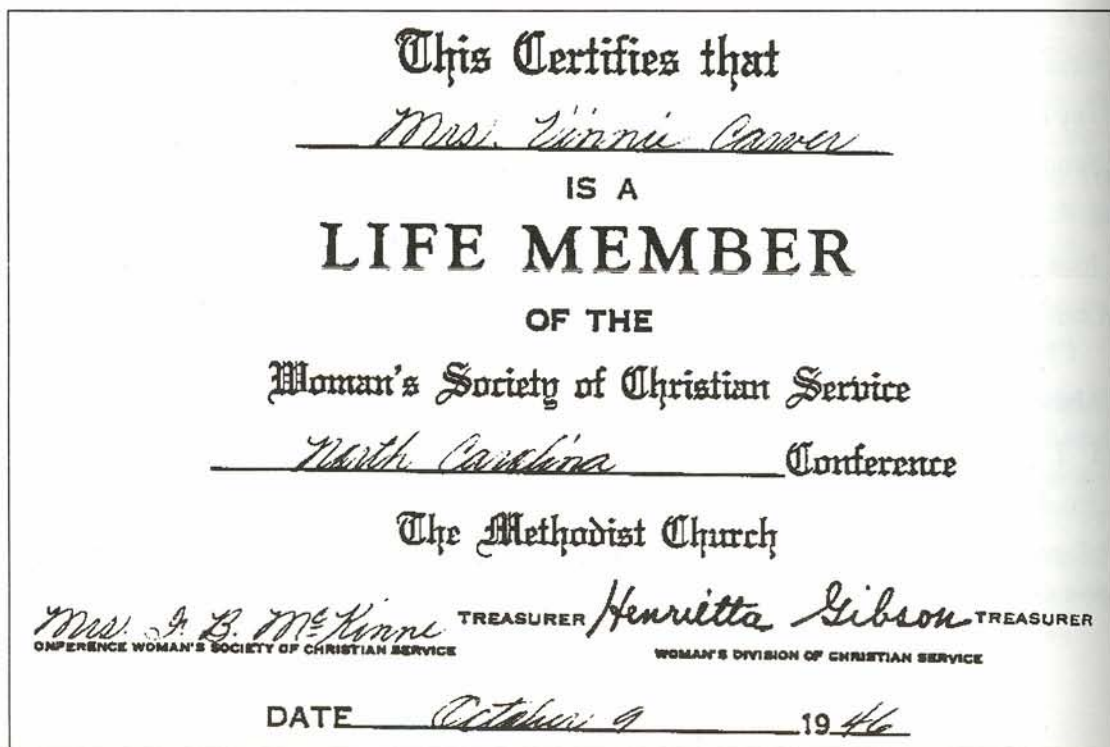
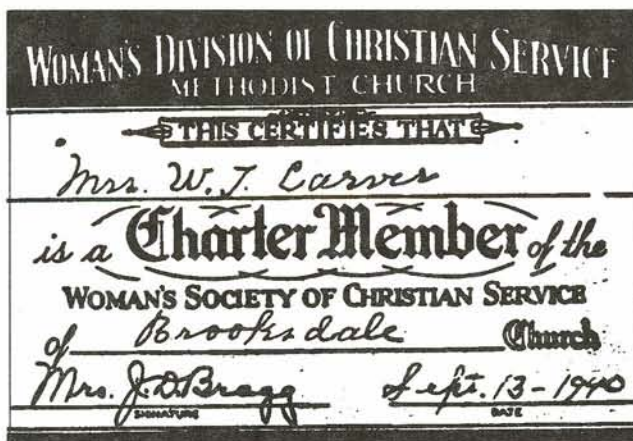

The Record . . .

Excerpts from Conferences, Board, Minutes

1894

There are six appointments and I find two Sunday Schools in active operation, that is at Mt. Tirzah and Brooksdale.

I reached the work with my family the third of January. I went to Webb's Chapel and Allensville on the first Sabbath but it was a very rainy day and no congregation met me. - *Rev. N. E. Coltrane, January 27, 1894*

. . . The church which succeeds in teaching the greatest number of children the truths of the gospel will win the greatest number to Christ and thus enlarge its own borders and become the most mighty power in the bond of God for spreading the Gospel.

. . . Now I have seven regular appointments. I preach once a month at each of these on Sunday and once a month on Saturday at some of them. - *N. E. Coltrane, April 21, 1894*

. . . After all that is being done in the (Sabbath) Schools it is a fact that a large part of the membership on the circuit never attend and a goodly number of young people and children are not under the influence of Sabbath School instruction. I have been looking into this matter and trying to stir up some interest in this great work, and get those who are indifferent to attend.

- *N. E. Coltrane, July 7, 1894*

. . . Moved by J. G. Shotwell that a committee of three be appointed by the Quarterly Conference to raise the money due R. A. Moore (balance on the parsonage) by sale or mortgage on the property and pay same. *The Committee: E. B. Reade, S. H. Garrett, J. G. Shotwell. - July 7, 1894*

. . . The churches served by the Pastor are all framed buildings, some of them are neat and comfortable. Mt. Tirzah and Allensville are painted. Mt. Zion, Brooksdale, Brookland, and Webb's Chapel are new buildings, and if painted and a little better furnished would be a credit to the membership. Trinity is an old building badly constructed and should be replaced by a new and larger one. All of them are supplied with stoves and can be made comfortable.

Among the membership of over four hundred there are many good earnest Christians who go to church to worship God and whose daily walk is such as to show to the world that they have been with Jesus. They try to keep their church vows and meet their obligations. They are the real

salt of the earth. There others who are not of as high type of Christians as these they are seemingly ignorant of their church vows and many of the requirements of true discipleship. Our people need to read Methodist literature and to study the Bible as to its teachings concerning missions. This Circuit has been unfortunate as to its parsonage and is now without one. The present great need of this Charge is a comfortable home for the Pastor and his family properly located. A committee was appointed at the last Quarterly Conference to act in this matter and if they succeed in securing a suitable house for the preacher they will lift the Ct. to a position hither to unoccupied by it. - *N. E. Coltrane, January 28, 1895*

... Upon the whole I think the spiritual condition of the church has been improved. But after there are a goodly number of the members that are living on a plane too low and seem to be ignorant of or dead to the claims of the church. Hence the vital interest of the church suffer seriously. We need such a revival of religion all over the circuit as would cause each member to acknowledge his allegiance to Got and the Church and so quicken the conscience as to put him into sympathy with the great missionary movement of this day. While the work moves slowly we trust it is moving towards this state. - *N. E. Coltrane, November 2, 1895*

... C. B. Brooks of Parsonage Building committee reports that the committee had decided on the place and the size and style of the house and have decided to go to work on the building. - *Quarterly Conference minutes, January 4, 1896*

... I think the spiritual state of the church is comparatively good. On coming to the circuit I was received with brotherly kindness and I feel that I am laboring with a large company of genuine and heroic Christians, but at the same time I fear the larger half of our peoples are of a less zealous and spiritual sort. Yet my brief observation bids me on to a hopeful expectation. - *Rev. W. B. Moore, March 21, 1896*

... The Parsonage Building committee beg leave to make their final report of the finished work to this Quarterly Conference, showing the present legal, financial and other conditions of the property.

1st. The shape of the legal documents by which the trustees hold the property is such that it is next to the impossible that the Church should lose anything it has contributed to it. These papers are here for inspection by the Conference.

2nd. The total cost of the Parsonage including 1-1/2 acres of land attached, the fencing, the painting, and all necessary outbuildings is \$992.43 of this amount \$432.05 has been paid, leaving a balance of \$569.38 yet to be paid.

3rd. As to the property itself we think it is worth more than it cost. No pains were spared in order to construct it on the most economical principles consistent with the purpose for which it

was built. The material, the workmanship and the structure of the house are all good and the cost was reduced to the minimum. It is neat comfortable, and desirable home for our preacher. We therefore ask the church to take hold of this enterprise without fear or hesitancy and pay off the remaining debt within the time specified by the contract. If every man will do his duty and we believe it is now our opportunity to meet this obligation like men of faith, so that we may lift from us the embarrassment of former years in regard to a Parsonage, and at the same time raise our circuit to a higher standard.

. . . Committee Report on financial condition of the Parsonage. The Parsonage Committee beg leave to report as follows: Since the last report to the Conference, \$80.97 have been raised from the churches of the charge and applied to Parsonage debt, Balance due \$440.17. Total amount paid up to date \$588.17.

The committee feels assured that the remainder of this debt will be paid by the close of the Conference year or satisfactorily secured so that no cause of the church will be hindered or embarrassed. - *Quarterly Conference minutes, March 6, 1897*

. . . There are seven Sunday Schools. They are all thinly attended. The church manifests no special interest in this work. The schools are self-sustaining, well furnished with literature, but not sufficiently equipped with consecrated, efficient teachers.

I have supplied many parents with catechisms for small children, and have met and talked with many children. - *Rev. R. H. Broom, October 7, 1898*

. . . The outlook of this Charge is encouraging and promises growth, service, and sacrifice for the Master. We have had fairly good congregations, perhaps above the average, and thoughtful attention to the preaching of the Word. The work as a whole has been well organized and wisely managed. We think there is room for improvement by the acquaintances and observations which we have made. - *Rev. M. D. Giles, February 16, 1901*

(No Quarterly Conference record exists for the period November 2, 1901 through February 23, 1918)

... C. B. Brooks and G. W. Moore were appointed to select a man to act with them in determining the amount that this charge is to pay Mt. Tirzah Circuit for their interest in the Parsonage. - *Quarterly Conference minutes, February 23, 1918*

... We have some as good spiritually minded people on this charge as are to be found anywhere and who are always ready to do their part in anything that you call upon them to do. We are sorry that all our people are not of this type. We have some who become lost in the movements of other things and seem to forget the cause of the Master. We have been praying through the entire year for a spiritual awakening among our people and we feel that in the lives of some this is true.

We have been handicapped in our S. S. work during the past quarter due to the fact that churches have been closed. - *Rev. J. A. Russell, November 5, 1918*

1920

... Very little progress has been made this quarter because of inclement weather and in view of the fact that our churches have been closed for one full month. We are happy to report that we have not lost any of our people during the epidemic which has visited our community. - *J. A. Russell, March 21, 1920*

(Editor's Note: One of the worst global epidemics of influenza occurred in 1918 - 1919, just after World War I. About 20 million persons died in this epidemic - more than lost their lives during the war.)

... We now have two Woman's Missionary Societies, one at this church (Allensville) just organized in July. The one at Brooksdale has done a fine year's work. - *J. A. Russell, October 28, 1920*

... We are now building our new church at Brooksdale and have the promise that it will be completed by mid-summer. The spirit of cooperation on the part of our people has been fine and they seem to get joy out of the service. - *J. A. Russell, April 21, 1921*

... Believing that the Sunday School affords one of the greatest opportunities for Christian training and for Christian service, we have urged that every one make a special effort to be in Sunday School every Sunday.

Our new church at Brooksdale is now nearing completion, which we expect to open for service about the middle of September. - *J. A. Russell, July 18, 1921*

... I believe our Sunday School to be as good as the average Sunday School in the country

and while untold good is being accomplished there is a greater work to be done. We are reaching the number of people that we ought to reach and not being qualified to do the best of service, we are not doing for the people what should be done as the Sunday School grows the church will enlarge and kingdom advance. We believe there is no greater field of service than the Sunday School. Our new church at Brooksdale is largely the results of a growing Sunday School which is now the best in the history of the Church.

We have had good revivals this year and feel that the churches have been greatly blessed. We have not had our revival at Brooksdale yet but will begin on the third Sunday with the opening of the new church. - *J. A. Russell, October 8, 1921*

. . . Brooksdale Missionary Society has held ten business meetings during the year. . . . The members of the Society are doing all they can to raise the indebtedness on the new church at Brooksdale. - *Mrs. W. T. Carver, President, October 8, 1921*

. . . We have a good Woman's Missionary Society at Brooksdale - *Rev. J. C. Whedbee, March 25, 1922*

. . . The spiritual state of the Church seems to be improving. We always try to instruct the children in the doctrine of our church whenever we have the opportunity. Infants baptized: Rachel Brooks Fox, and Charles Brooks Gates - *J. C. Whedbee, November 1, 1922*

. . . Our work has been hindered a great deal during the first quarter on account of the well nigh impassable roads. Some appointments were missed and the attendance in general has been poor.

Only one S. S. survived through the winter. The school at Brooksdale has been doing good work. The school at Allensville and Brookland will start again the first Sunday in April. Some needed improvements have been made on the church at Brooksdale in the way of putting down a floor of concrete in the basement. - *Rev. B. T. Hurley, March 21, 1925*

. . . Our churches are showing more interest in the regular preaching service. The congregations are steadily growing in all the churches. We feel that the work is prospering under our ministry.

We have organized an Epworth League at Brooksdale Church, and there are about 30 members on roll. The young people take great pride in rendering a good program every Sunday evening.

There are two Sunday Schools on the work.

The grounds have been improved around Brooksdale Church. Grass sowed and flowers planted. Passion week was observed at Brooksdale Church. The pastor preached each evening to

an attentive and large congregation. - *Rev. W. L. Loy, April 10, 1926*

Action Taken By the Quarterly Conference

This certifies that the Quarterly Conference of Brooksdale Charge in the bounds of the N. C. Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, on the 6th day of December, 1926 adopted and spread upon it's minutes the following resolution:

Resolved, that the Board of Trustees (or a majority of them) of Brooksdale Church, be and they are hereby authorized and empowered to borrow money or accept a conditional donation, or both, from the Board of Church Extension of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, not exceeding the sum of Two Thousand Seven Hundred Fifty Dollars for the purpose of paying off debt and to secure the repayment of the same by mortgage upon the property held in trust by them upon such terms and conditions as may be agreed upon between said Trustees (or a majority of them) and said Board of Church Extension.

I further certify that there are Trustees of said property given under my hand, this 6th day of December, 1926.

We stand this morning with heads reverently bowed and with our hearts uplifted to the Almighty Father in praise and thanksgiving for His material blessings upon us which enables us to pay off all indebtedness of \$4600.00 on the Brooksdale Methodist Episcopal Church, South. - *W. L. Loy, July 22, 1927*

We, the Building Committee of Brooksdale Methodist Episcopal Church, South, take this opportunity of registering our sense of appreciation to the Duke Endowment Fund for Country Churches. The part which was taken by the local Board at Durham met with our approval and deserves our most sincere thanks for working so heroically and victoriously succeeding.

To the New York Commission of the Duke Endowment Fund we express our highest appreciation and thanks for hearing and granting our request. May the God of us all hover near them at all times and guide and sustain them as they disburse this trust fund for the advancement of the cause of Christ in the rural churches of North Carolina. It is our purpose to never allow the memory of that Patriot of God, who made possible this source of aid for the struggling rural

churches of North Carolina, to be erased from the tablets of our hearts.

... Brooksdale Methodist Episcopal Church was dedicated Sunday, October 30, 1927. Dr. Elbert Russell of Duke University preached an excellent sermon from this text. Dr. M. Bradshaw pronounced the sentence of Dedication. - *W. L. Loy, October 30, 1927*

... President of Epworth League, October 30, 1927: Miss Banna Garrett

... We began our work on the fourth Sunday in November and have touched with services each church on the charge except Webb's Chapel. The services at each church have been very well attended, showing that this is a church going people. I find the people hospitable, kind, generous, and good. The people seem to love, fear, and serve the Lord.

I find the Sunday School work live and active at Brooksdale, Brookland, and Allensville. The regular Christmas exercises were observed at Brooksdale and Allensville churches with appropriate program and Christmas trees.

We find a splendid and very well equipped church at Brooksdale. Brookland has a fairly good church building. The church buildings at Allensville, Trinity, and Webb's Chapel have served their day and need to be replaced with new, modern church buildings.

The parsonage is a very good building but much in need of painting and some repair. The people have already been very kind in looking after our needs. Some of the new added improvements are a new cook range, kitchen cabinets, and living room suite of furniture.

The cook room and pantry have already been over hauled with paint for the wood work, murasco for the walls.

A generous pounding has already come our way from the good people of Brooksdale Church and several substantial gifts from Brookland and Allensville churches.

There two Epworth Leagues on the charge doing active work, and two Woman's Missionary Societies that are active and doing much good for the Master's cause.

... I understand that the budget system is used for all the churches for the entire charge but

do not use the envelope system. - *Rev. S. F. Nicks, January 1, 1928*

... During the quarter our parsonage has been greatly improved in that it has been somewhat overhauled, bathroom built, painted and water works put in the house. This has all been done at an expense slightly over \$500.00. The committee used economy in every detail.

The Conference Mission and General work are receiving our attention. Two of our churches are using the general budget system. The other three are using the envelope system. - *S. F. Nicks, September 26, 1928*

1930

... As we start off the new year we are glad to report that the general state of our church is in very good condition regardless of the low prices and financial depression. Some of my members are telling me the situation is causing them to see and more keenly feel their dependence upon God. Others are determined to do even more for God's cause than they have ever done before. With these facts in view we feel that the spiritual life of our church is encouraging. - *S. F. Nicks, December 14, 1930*

... Plans are being matured to build a new church at or near the site of the old Allensville church. Rev. J. M. Ormond was with us a few Sundays ago and gave us much encouragement as to what the Duke Endowment Fund would do for us. Brother B. G. Crumpton has offered to donate all the timber for the lumber right near the site of the church. - *S. F. Nicks, May 12, 1931*

... The spiritual state of the church is giving some evidence of improvement. Our people are becoming more reconciled to the financial depression as the handy-work of God. Our financial report compares favorably with the situation. - *S. F. Nicks, May 17, 1932*

... The general state of the church on the Brooksdale Charge is very good, giving some evidence of growth. ... The finances are not equal to that of former years but our people for the most part are paying liberally, taking into consideration the failure of our banks and the low price of farming products. - *S. F. Nicks, October 22, 1932*

... The pastor's salary has been discussed by the various boards that have met. Brooksdale Church has suggested that the salary for the present year be \$1800.00 for the pastor and Brooksdale Church retain the same apportionment of \$800.00 as formerly when the salary for the pastor was \$2000.00. In this way the country churches would get the advantage of all the reduction in salary. - *S. F. Nicks, January 8, 1933*

... The general state of the church in some respects is in the best shape that it has been since I

have been on the charge. Each local church has had on a program of work in improving the church buildings and church grounds. Webb's Chapel is now painting the building and Allensville is in the midst of erecting a new church. The material used is native stone. The walls will be finished in native white flint rock. When completed it will have six modern Sunday School rooms, large auditorium with basement room for heating and lighting plant.

... There has been a program of improvement at the parsonage. The building has been underpinned, the yard graded, sown in grass. A nice wall built in front of the parsonage. - *S. F. Nicks, April 30, 1933*

(*Editor's note: S. F. Nicks was remembered as a white-haired man who drove a Model T Roadster. He could also tell "some of the worst ghost stories you ever heard". He came at a time when nobody had any money and he was paid in chickens or whatever people had.*)

... We are happy and comfortable in our new home and are situated among some of the finest people we have ever known. They have been so kind and thoughtful of us we could not help but love them. We only hope we will be able to show our appreciation for their interest in us.

... We are doing our very best to interest the indifferent and to those who do not attend church to come to the house of God for worship and we have succeeded to some degree at least.

To this end we are earnestly soliciting the hearty co-operation of every member of all the churches; for we must work, pray, give, and witness if we accomplish what God expects of us. - *Rev. R. E. Pittman, February 25, 1934*

... We have five Sunday Schools and the good they are doing is beyond computation. I am afraid we do not appreciate fully the possibilities of the Sunday School. I know I have never amounted to much in the Christian world, but I owe more to the work of the Sunday School in preparing me for the ministry than any other phase of church work and I am grateful to God for what it has done for me. If this fact could be fully understood, I am sure we would put forth greater efforts to help carry forward the great work.

The Epworth League is today one of the greatest agencies for training our young people for efficient work in the church. I believe I would have been a real preacher if I could have had these advantages our young people enjoy. I wish more of our young people would take hold of it and use its powers.

... Quite a number of our young people have been away to college and more will go this fall but I am not able just now to give their names in full. Miss Cleo Fox, Miss Hazel Brooks, Miss Ernestine Wilkerson, Miss Marjorie Stanfield, James Brooks, and Stokes Brooks. - *R. E. Pittman, June 22, 1935*

... This has been one of the happiest years of my ministry. Our children were hindered from attending our revival services by the paralysis epidemic but we had splendid attendance at every church and the spiritual condition was much improved over last year.

... Our people at Allensville have put in a heating plant and we are hoping to be able to get new seats for it this fall and in fact to complete the church. Brooksdale is looking forward to a new heating plant also as well as other improvements.

... The new road at Webb's has not yet become a reality; but we are still looking for it as well as a new road at Brookland. - *R. E. Pittman, October 13, 1935*

Resolution of Respect

We, the Stewards of Brooksdale Charge, wish to express our deep feeling of loss when our Heavenly Father called from us our beloved pastor, Rev. R. E. Pittman on January 12, 1936.

Here was a life of wonderful beauty, filled with love and service. It may be sincerely said, "To know him was to love him". He is gone from us but will never be forgotten. His good works will ever linger in the minds of his people whom he labored with so faithfully. Therefore, be it resolved:

First, that we bow in humble submission to the will of our Father who doeth all things well. The church and community has lost a valuable citizen and a beloved pastor,

Second, that we extend our deepest sympathy to the bereaved family and grieve with them in this sad hour. May the God he loved so well be ever near them.

Third, that a copy of these resolutions be sent to the family, the N. C. Christian Advocate, the county papers, and recorded on our church minutes.

... I see the need of a new church at Trinity. With the proper leadership it can be built. We expect to beautify Brooksdale Church on the inside and get new hymn books for it during the year. We expect to pay everything in full this year.

We are optimistic in the outlook of finishing the Allensville Church during the year. - *Rev. T. W. Lee, March 15, 1936*

... One hundred new hymnals have been installed in the Brooksdale Church. - *T. W. Lee, April 3, 1938*

... The Young People's Division of Brooksdale Methodist Episcopal Church, South, has its weekly meetings at 6:45 each Sunday night. The elder people have been giving us talks on different subjects. These have proved to be interesting and helpful.

We have been having our Junior Choir practice in various homes. The Junior Choir has had charge of the singing at preaching several times.

We have raised \$8.65 in the last few weeks toward paying our mission pledge. We have pledged \$15.

The Person County Union Meeting had a banquet last month at which about 75 young people were present. These meetings have proved very helpful in getting the young people together. - Rachel Fox, Secretary (*report given to Quarterly Conference, April 16, 1939*)

1940

... Brooksdale has worked out a most effective weekly financial system for the church. Three other churches: Allensville, Trinity, and Webb's have adopted, and are working on monthly systems. - Rev. Dwight A. Petty, April 7, 1940

... Our three Missionary Societies have been reorganized on the new plan into "Women's Societies of Christian Service" ... - D. A. Petty, September 6, 1940

... James Satterfield has been reported killed in action in Italy, Clyde Whitt killed in action over France. These are the first two our Charge has lost in the armed forces during this war. ... our sympathy goes out to all the relatives of the fine people who have gone to their reward. - Rev. E. C. Maness, November 5, 1944.

1950

... An electric hot water heater has been installed in the parsonage and some repair work done to the parsonage making a total of more than two hundred dollars expenditures. The parsonage family is grateful for all that has been done to make the parsonage more comfortable and convenient. - E. C. Maness, February 19, 1950.

... Brooksdale Church has done right much work on the basement in the way of repairs and finishing unfinished work and installing two rest rooms at a total cost of approximately nine hundred dollars ... - E. C. Maness, October 17, 1950.

... Rev. David D. Traynham moved into the parsonage (Tuesday) Nov. 14, 1950

... We have been handicapped at Brooksdale because of a fire that burned the choir and the pulpit on the morning of (Sunday) Nov. 26, 1950. The fire broke out about nine o'clock. The church was damaged to the amount of \$5,421.13. The amount was covered by insurance. We have received payment and are in the process of repairing the loss. During the time the church school is meeting in different homes. The people have responded to (the) situation and we are thankful for these good people that have opened their homes for the different classes to meet in.

Paul H. Wragg was sent from Brooksdale September 28, 1958, to First Methodist Church, Tavares, Florida, near Orlando.

Arrangements Revealed for Brooksdale

Plans for conducting Sunday School and church for the members of the Brooksdale Methodist Church, which was damaged heavily by fire last Sunday morning were revealed today by the Rev. D. D. Traynham, pastor and Glen N. Titus, Sunday School superintendent. Repairs on the church hope to be completed in the near future, officials say.

The following arrangements have been made and will be continued until the church is fully repaired: Preaching services will be in the Brookland Methodist Church the first Sunday night, December 3 at seven-thirty o'clock. The morning service will be December 24, at 11 o'clock.

Sunday school will be conducted in the homes of members in the community, Titus said. The men's class, L. B. McFarland, teacher, will meet in the home of P. T. Whitt, Sr. Mrs. Edith Warren's ladies' class will gather in the home of George M. Fox. The young people, Mrs. Landon Whitt, teacher, will conduct classes in the C. L. Brooks basement. The seniors, Miss Margaret Green, teacher, will meet in the Green home and Mrs. David S. Brooks' primary department will hold classes in Mrs. Brooks' home. The beginners, with Mrs. Glen Titus and Mrs. J. F. Wilson, teachers, will meet in the basement of Whitt's Service Station.

The church was damaged at an estimated \$8,000 in the blaze which originated from the hot air furnace in the basement. The fire burned through the filler beneath the rostrum and caused heavy damage to the furniture, walls, and a piano. The rugs throughout the building were damaged by water and will probably be replaced. The building was covered by insurance.

We hope that we will be able to get back in the church at an early date. The Brookland congregation has opened their doors to us and we are having our services together. - *Rev. D. D. Traynham, January 14, 1951.*



. . . Brother Paul H. Wragg concluded his work on the Charge (Sunday) September 28, being officially called on to fill a vacancy at the First Methodist Church, Tavares, Florida. A nervous breakdown by the pastor of First Methodist Church made it necessary for Bishop Branscomb to fill this appointment. Brother Wragg being a Floridian who planned to return to the Florida Conference let Bishop Branscomb to undertake to obtain him. His transfer was worked out by conferences with our District Superintendent, Dr. Barclift, and with the approval of Bishop Garber. All of us regret the developments that opened the pastorate at First Methodist in Tavares; but we can understand fully the extremely strong appeal the offer had when Brother and Sister Wragg were asked to return to their native state, Florida.

The cooperation of the Official Boards of the Charge enabled Dr. Barclift and Bishop Garber to arrange for the Rev. Key W. Taylor to take over the work January first. In the months of October, November, and December, it is my privilege to serve the Charge. - *Rev. H. E. Myers, Pastor, December, 1958*

1960

MINUTES - OFFICIAL BOARD MEETING - BROOKSDALE METHODIST CHURCH
June 25, 1961

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Ben Hester. The invocation was given by Rev. Taylor.

Members present: Rev. Taylor, Ben Hester, Charles Green, Hall Brooks, Sally Clayton, Brooks Carver, Paul Cobb, Emmett Faulk, P. T. Whitt, Sr., Burley Walker, Peggy Whitt, Hubert Stephens, Lacy Johnson, Foy Whitt, and W. H. Green.

Also present were several members of the MYF, Ernie Martin, and other members of the Church.

In the first item of business, W. H. Green suggested that in connection with the up and coming financial drive a committee be appointed to get a complete mailing list for the Church. Mr. Green suggested that Hall Brooks act as Chairman and that Foy Whitt, P. T. Whitt, Edith Warren, and David Brooks work with him on the committee. The Board approved this action and the committee was appointed.

In the next item of business Mr. Charles Green introduced a MYF delegation who had come before the Board in connection with the recreation program in the new building. He cited that he felt the building could and should be utilized for recreation and folk dancing since the MYF had brought this up many times before.

Miss Peggy Whitt and Charles Carver gave short talks citing needs for recreation and folk dancing. They pointed out that other Churches follow this program and that they felt these things should be done in a Christian atmosphere as opposed to young people having to frequent undesirable places.

A motion was made by Mr. Charles Green that we allow the MYF to have recreation and folk dancing in the building under the supervision of the Commission on Education. All activities would be chaperoned and supervised and the MYF would be responsible for cleaning the building after the affair. This motion was seconded by Hall Brooks.

Much discussion then followed on this subject. Each Official Board member, as well as all other Church members present, were asked to state their views on the matter. Fifteen (15) spoke in favor of the action and two (2) against the action. Rev. Taylor was then asked his feelings on the matter. He stated that he was not in favor of the action and would have a statement to make later on the matter.

After much more discussion, with all present stating their opinion, Chairman Hester called for a vote of the Official Board. The motion passed nine (9) to two (2).

Rev. Taylor advised the Board that, as he had indicated earlier in the meeting, he was not in favor of the action. He then advised the Board that he could not continue preaching in a church that allowed any form of dancing and suggested that the Pastoral Relations Committee contact the District Superintendent to get a replacement preacher for the church.

Rev. Taylor pointed out that he was, of course, willing to stay on a negotiated basis until such time as the replacement preacher could be obtained.

Rev. Taylor's remarks prompted further discussion on the subject.

Several members inquired of Rev. Taylor as to his reasons for taking such a position and also for his reasons for not having stated his position earlier in the meeting before the vote was taken. Rev. Taylor pointed out that he had unfortunate experiences in this area in other churches. He also stated that he did not feel that he should have stated his views before the vote was taken.

At this point, the MYF delegation made a motion to withdraw the action that they had taken on the basis they did not want to be responsible for having the preacher resign. Several other Board members also stated that even though this did not change their feeling on the matter, they would not have brought up this subject had they known Rev. Taylor's feelings. It was pointed out to Rev. Taylor by several Board members that his leadership was needed in the church and suggested that all motions be retracted.

Rev. Taylor, however, pointed out that it made no difference that the motion was made that the action be retracted - that he still would leave and that we must obtain a replacement preacher.

It was pointed out to Rev. Taylor that the Brookland Church was involved and that they would have to be advised of the action taken.

The motion was then made that the Chairman of the Board notify the Brookland Board and the District Superintendent by letter of the action.

Immediately after the meeting, however, the Chairman of the Board notified the Chairman of the Brookland Board and telephoned the District Superintendent that the Board had offered to retract the motion and had appealed to Rev. Taylor to reverse his position in the matter. The District Superintendent advised that he would take the matter up at the Annual Conference.

In the last item of business, Rev. Taylor suggested that he felt the necessary repairs should be made to the parsonage before the coming of the next preacher. The motion was made that the Parsonage Committee proceed with making the necessary repairs. This was passed by the Board.

The meeting adjourned at approximately 10:30 P. M.

... Rev. Wallace Kirby preached revival recently.

... This summer she (Brooksdale) added a new and beautiful Memorial Chapel for Baptism and private devotion, plus additional pews in the surrounding wings to properly seat our worshippers. - *Rev. R. G. Harris, September 29, 1963*

W. H. Whitt motioned, second by John Wesley Jones, to rebuild a new parsonage on the present parsonage site, across the Oxford Road from the sanctuary. Vote for, 14; against, 22.

W. H. Green motioned, seconded by Walter Chadwick that the following steps be our Plan of Action:

Step 1 - to secure an appropriate lot for relocation of a new parsonage and pay for it

Step 2 - to organize and set in operation a sound financial plan which will raise the necessary capital to build. When 1/3 of the cash is on hand, let this be the sign of beginning the new parsonage.

Vote for, 26; against, 2.

Lacy Johnson motioned, seconded by Bill Langston, to relocate the new parsonage, based on the Parsonage Study Committee's findings: To relocate the new parsonage on the Allensville Road, on the property joining Mr. Ben Hester. This lot (100 x 200 x 100) is to (be) purchased from Mr. Victor Williford for \$2,000. Vote for, 23; against, 0.

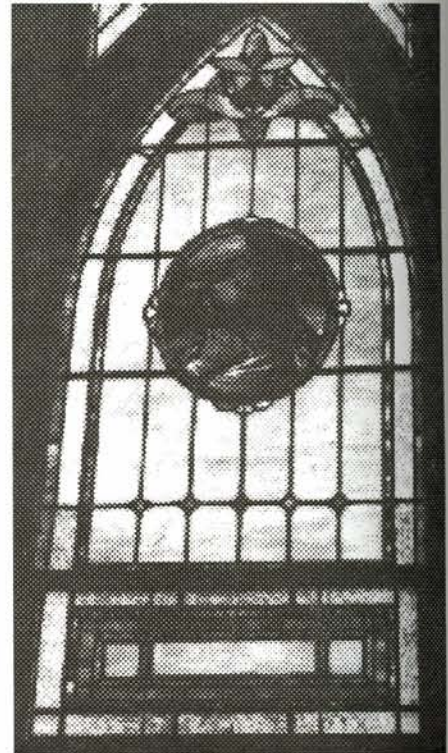

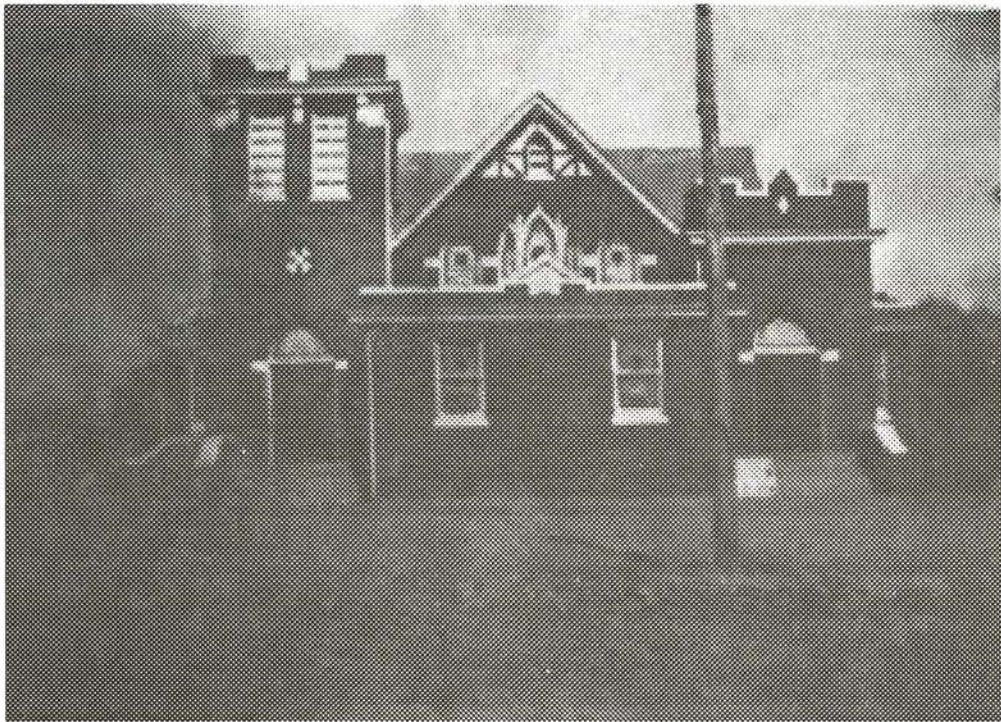

The earliest pictures of Brooksdale that could be found are these two from the 1920 period just after construction of the present building. Rev. J. A. Russell was minister at that time.

Work was done mostly by the men and women of the church. The men went to the woods to cut timber for building the structure and the women brought many of their meals to them where they worked.

The leadership of Rev. Russell was invaluable at this time of poor economic conditions just following World War I.

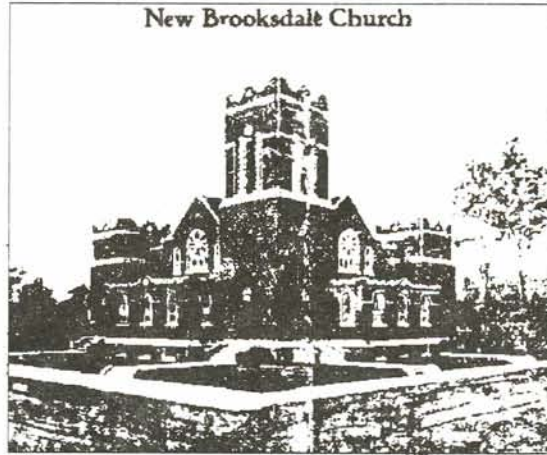

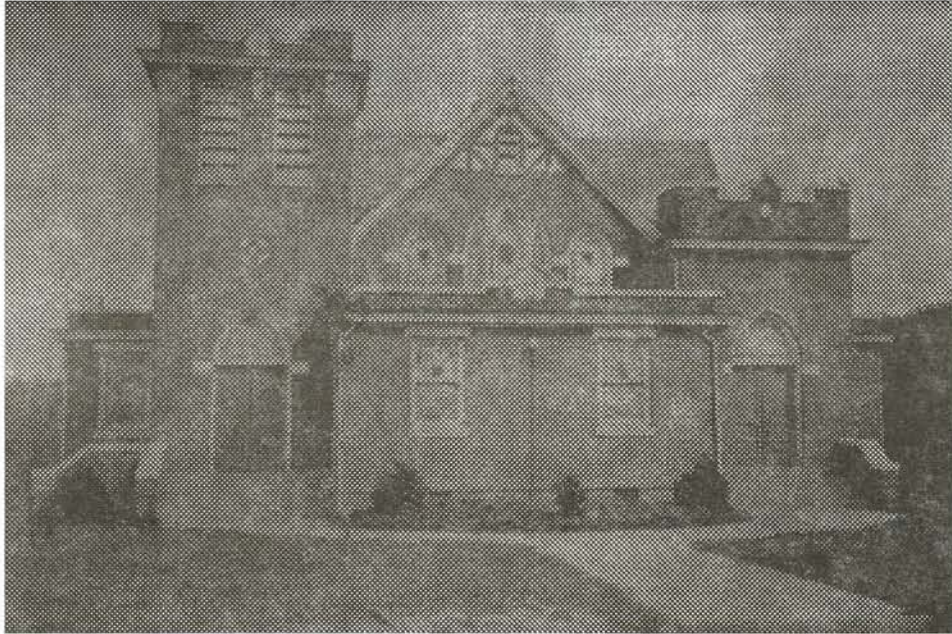

The church caught fire November 26, 1950 and severe damage was done to the pulpit area. Traces of the blackened framing can still be seen in the basement. As this picture shows, the devastation was great in the front of the sanctuary. The fire occurred just after Rev. D. D. Traynham came to serve the charge. Damage was estimated at \$5,500.



Talmadge and Hazel Russell owned this house adjoining the sanctuary lot, pictured here in 1954, and later they sold it to Brooksdale. The house was sold by the church and moved, and the lot became the site for the present Educational Building. In

the picture are Talmadge's father and mother Mr. and Mrs. Henry Russell.

AND WHEREAS, prior to such action by the Conference and at the May, 1955, Quarterly Conference of the said Brooksdale Circuit, the unanimous approval of the Brooksdale Circuit was given to the sale at public auction of certain property hereinafter described belonging to the said Brooksdale Circuit;

AND WHEREAS, the said public auction was held and the Brooksdale Methodist Church was the highest bidder for the sum of Seven

Thousand One Hundred forty Dollars;

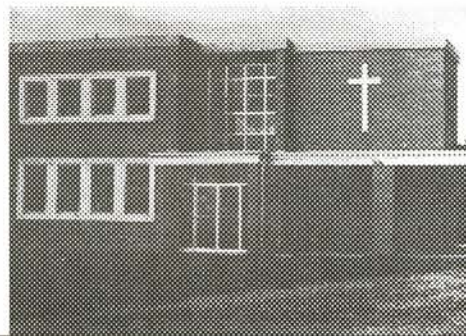

Hoping that you will have a Merry Christmas and trusting that we will hear from you soon.

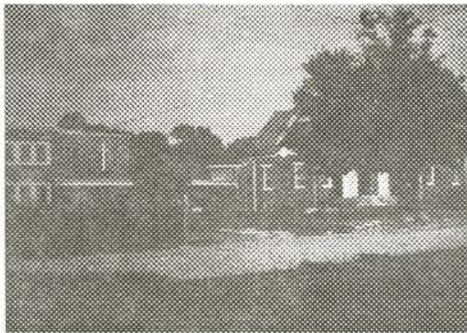

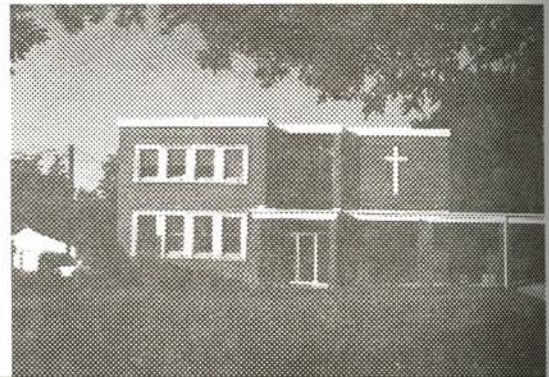

Brooksdale as she looked in 1965



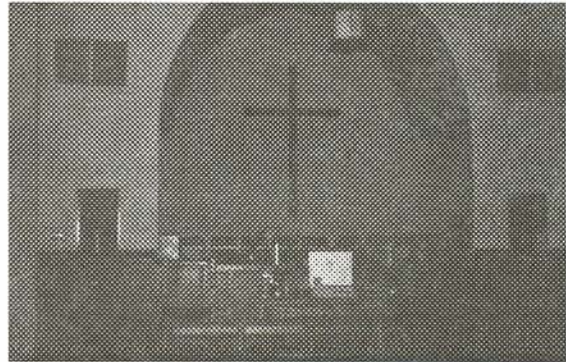

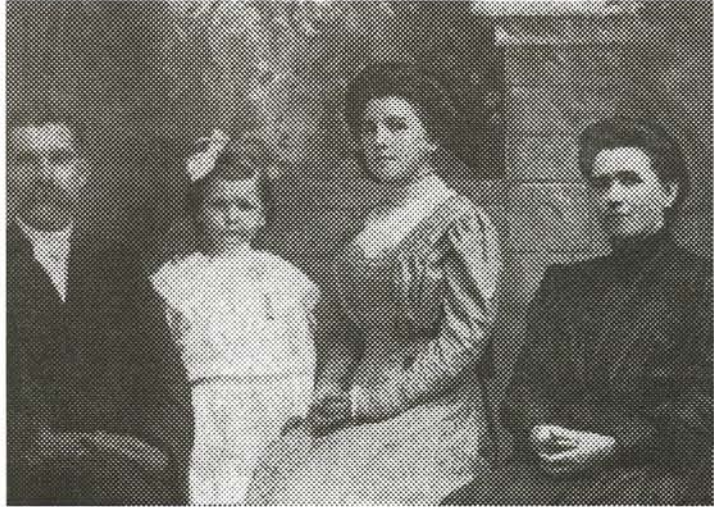


The Ministers

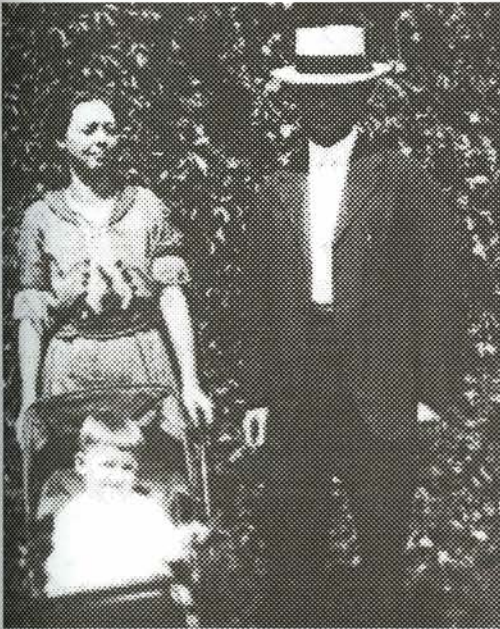
The ministers who served Brooksdale of whom pictures could be found are shown on the following pages. The early preachers must have been a dedicated and hardy lot because of the roads they had to travel, and the many churches for which they were responsible.



Rev. M. D. Giles, pictured at left, was the earliest minister to Brooksdale of whom a photo could be found. He served the Mount Tirzah Circuit, which consisted of seven or eight churches, from 1900 to 1904. From his pastor's report to Quarterly Conference, it could be assumed that he was a studious man, with a deep concern for God's work on the circuit.



Rev. J. B. Thompson served from 1905 to 1909. From left, Rev. Thompson, daughter Jessie, daughter Minnie Etta, and wife Florinda Jessie, are pictured.



Rev. J. A. Russell, pictured at left with his wife and son, served Brooksdale from 1917 to 1921. He came when the Brooksdale Circuit was formed out of the former Mt. Tirzah Circuit. He was minister to Brooksdale, Brookland, Allensville, Trinity, and Webb's Chapel churches. Under his leadership, and that of C. B. Brooks and other church members, the present Sanctuary Building was built in 1920.



Two pictures of Rev. E. C. Maness, holding Neal Titus, circa 1944, at left, and with Bill and Charles Carver, right, about 1946. Rev. Maness loved the children of the charge and delighted in talking to them.

1956 brought further changes for Brooksdale and the current Brooksdale-Brookland Charge was formed that year from the

visit members, and end up crawling around on the floor, playing with their small children. He also appears below at the groundbreaking ceremony, also in 1960, for the Educational Building. Not only did he love the children, but he was a very studious man, who, while at Brooksdale, wrote most of the manuscript for the book he later published, "Roots, Religion, and Revival", about the importance of small rural churches to Methodism. He resigned the charge in 1961 when the subject of folk dancing in the Fellowship Hall came up and a majority of the Administrative Council members were in favor of it. He stated that he could not serve a church that permitted dancing in any form.

Rev. Key Taylor served the charge from 1959 to 1961 and was instrumental in the planning and construction of the Educational Building. He is pictured at left in 1960 playing with Connie Thomas, the granddaughter of Paul and Nellie Cobb, the daughter of Barbara Cobb Thomas. Rev. Taylor, it is said, would go to



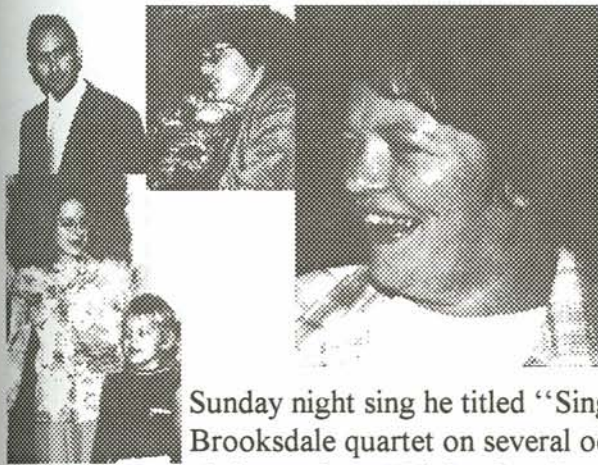

Sunday night sing he titled "Singspiration", at which he sang tenor with a Brooksdale quartet on several occasions. He also loves the youth, and was the chairman for a "Nicky Cruz" crusade for Person County. Mr. Cruz message was an appeal for Christ to young people based on his own experiences on the mean streets.

Rev. Charles E. Owens came to the charge in 1982, and served it well for six years. During the time he was at Brooksdale, he was married to the former Mrs. Peggy Rivenbark. Under his leadership, the Conference/Music Room was added behind the Sanctuary Building in 1988. Charles and Peggy are good friends with many in Brooksdale and have become in closer touch with them since his retirement in 1991. The Owens' moved to Roxboro and their home is at 831 Chub Lake Road. During Rev. Owens time at Brooksdale, an attempt to become a station pastorate was made but failed because the expense was too great.

At Brooksdale parsonage

Garden is growing when Wingo moved in

When the Rev. Brian Wingo and his family moved into the Brooksdale-Brookland United Methodist charge's parsonage in June, they found their garden already planted and growing.

Former Brookdale United Methodist Church pastor the Rev. Charles Owens invited Wingo over to the parsonage in May after Wingo learned that he would be appointed pastor of Brooksdale and Brookland United Methodist Churches.

"He had me over, and we talked and planned the garden," Wingo said.

The move, along with Owens' informal orientation to the area helped make the move smoother for Wingo, who was one of seven ministers to be appointed to serve Person County United Methodist Churches at the annual meeting of the North Carolina Conference in June.

The move to Person County was a homecoming for Wingo's wife, the former Norma Walters, who graduated from Person Senior High School and was active in Person Players. Mrs. Wingo, a student at Duke University School of Divinity, has served as a seminar worker at Altamville United Methodist Church in the past.

Wingo previously served as pastor of the Granville street, which includes Bethel UMC and Gray Rock UMC in Granville County. He served that appointment for four and one half years while he attended Duke divinity school. Wingo received a master of divinity degree from Duke in May.

He is also a graduate of Methodist College, where he received a B.A. degree in religion in 1963.

"I met Norma at Methodist College, and it was on the very first day," Wingo recalled.

After graduating from Methodist College, he served for 18 months on the staff of Camp Rockfish, a camp sponsored by the North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church and located south of Fayetteville.

The Wingos have one child, Rachel Whitney, age 20 months.

Wingo was born in Atlanta, Ga. and moved around with his family before graduating from high school in Northhampton County in 1976. He says he was active in the Methodist Church as a youth and felt he would eventually teach or preach.

He enjoys working with youth and is currently serving as District Youth Coordinator for the Durham District, a position that makes him responsible for planning district-wide youth events.

One such event he has planned is a District dance to be held at Brookdale UMC on Friday, Aug. 19, from 8:11 p.m. The dance will feature a local disc jockey and is open to all youth. Admission will be \$3 per person. Wingo said area churches who plan to bring youths should also bring a counselor to help chaperone.

He says he would like to see the Brooksdale youth become "re-activated" and would also like to establish a young adult program at the churches.

Wingo enjoys refinishing antiques and has played softball and dabbled in photography as hobbies.

He admits to being a collector of all sorts of things.

Perhaps his most impressive collection is his over 1,000 old 78 rpm records, ranging from classical to country. He also has a couple of old record players to play the recordings and lists the song "Walkin' in My Sleep" by Washboard Sam and His Washboard Band as his favorite from among his collection.

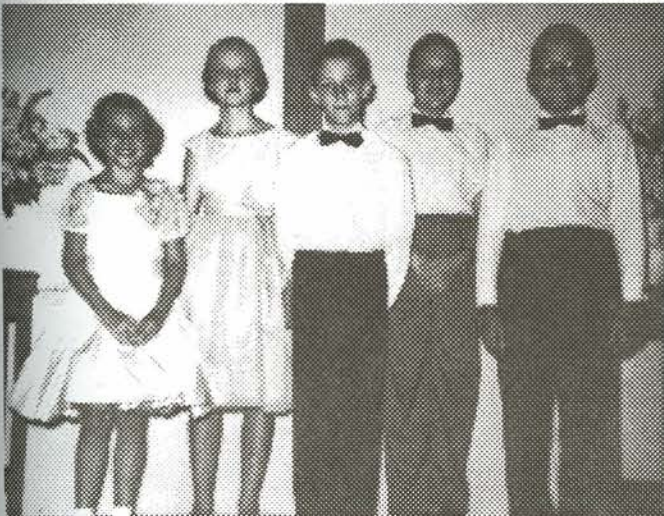

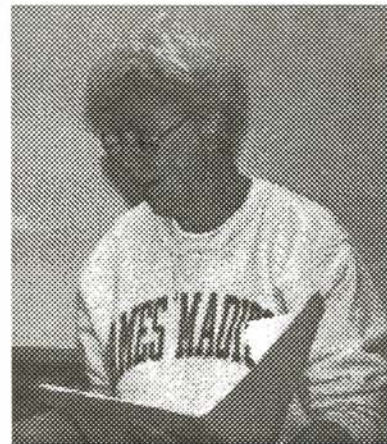

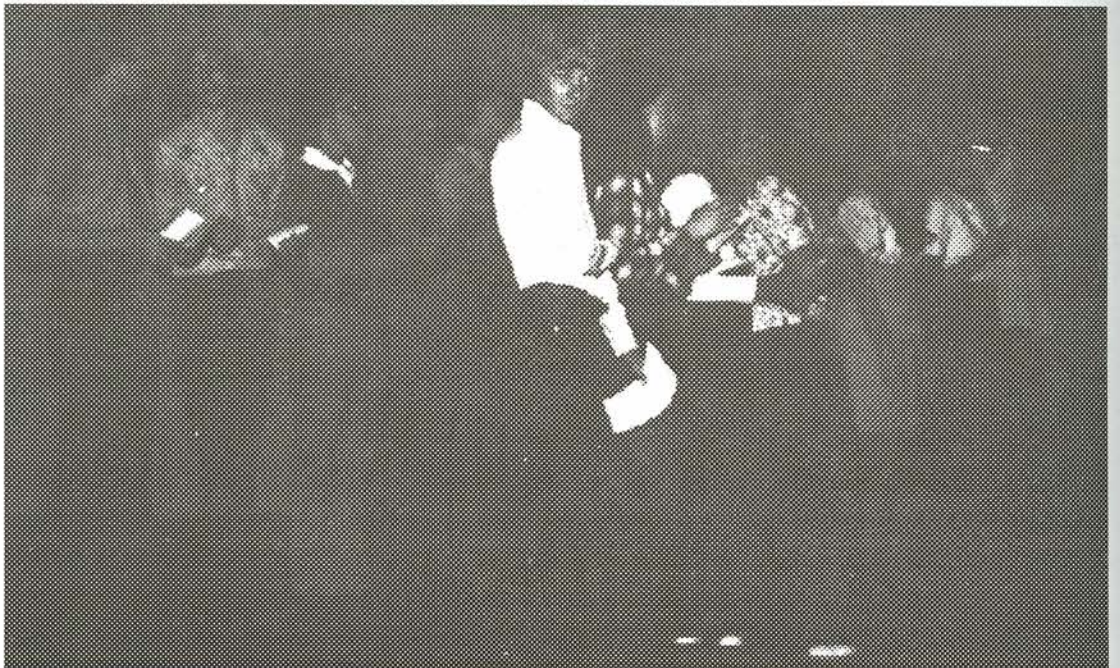

Methodist Youth Launch Campaign

An intensive campaign to complete a \$2,500 goal toward the building of a lake at Camp Chestnut Ridge in Orange County was set in motion at the quarterly meeting of the officers of the Durham District Methodist Youth Fellowship Saturday at Duke Memorial Methodist Church.

George Roycroft of Durham, district president, will write each MYF president in the 82 churches of the district, and presidents of the five subdistricts will personally contact youth-group leaders in their area in two phases of the campaign aimed at completing the project by May.

W. A. Graham of Chapel Hill, district director of youth work, and Horace Mansfield of Durham, assistant director, along with Roycroft, will visit monthly meetings of the subdistrict organizations to further promote the drive.

Over \$800 has now been raised in the drive for the \$2,500 portion of the cost of a 12-acre

lake to be built early this spring at Camp Chestnut Ridge, the Methodist Church's 400-acre camping facility located southwest of Eiland in Orange County.

Methodist Youth Fellowship members in nearby Burlington District are also conducting a \$2,500 project to assist with the building of the lake. A contractor has been engaged to prepare plans for the proposed completion of the lake by the opening of the camping season this summer.

The Durham District MYF leaders Saturday voted their support of a Tri-District Christian Vocations Conference which is to be held Friday, March 9 from 4 p.m. to 9 p.m. at the Duke Memorial Methodist Church.

Several hundred youths from the Durham, Burlington, and Raleigh districts are expected to attend the session. The leaders in the session Saturday laid plans for the distribution of posters concerning the conference in the churches of the district by the five subdistrict councils.

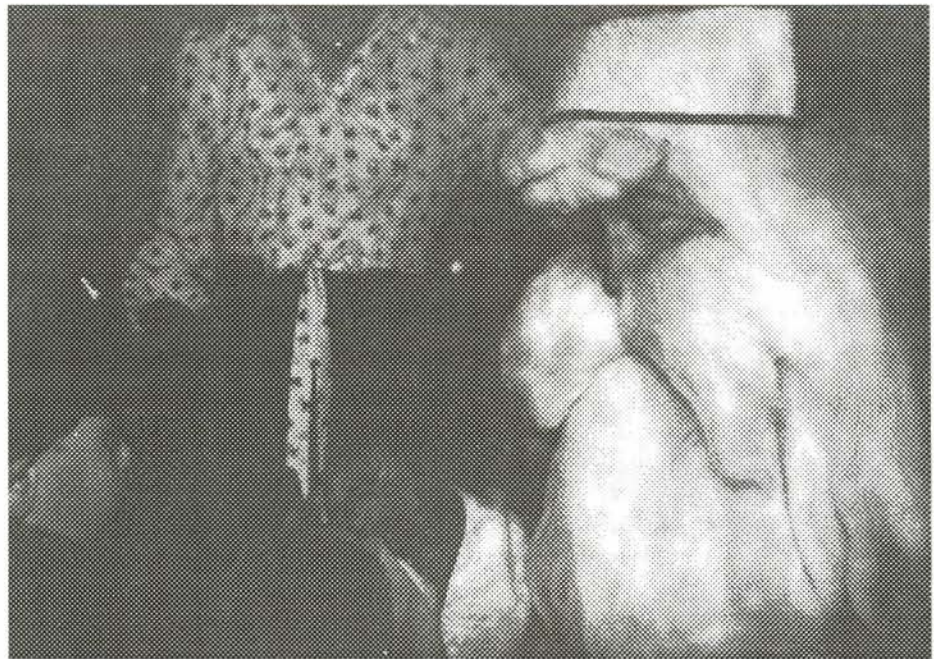

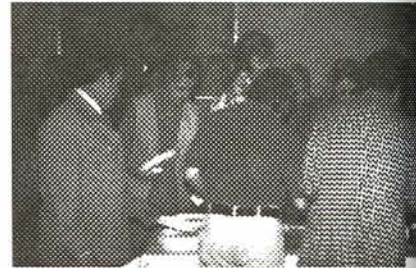

Woman to spend year aboard Mercy ship

Former Roxboro resident Sandra (Sandy) Whitt will be spending the next year aboard a ship, cruising the world with stops in ports in Denmark, Holland, Germany, Sweden, Norway, France, the Canary Islands, and West Africa. She won't be on a pleasure trip; she will be serving as a volunteer for Youth with a Mission's Mercy Ships project.

Sandy, the daughter of Landon and Lucille Whitt of 1205 Oxford Rd., flew to Aalborg, Denmark last week to begin her year's service, after resigning her job as a recruiting and staffing administrator in the human services department of Burroughs Wellcome in the Research Triangle Park.

She will work as a receptionist aboard the M/V Anastasis, a nine-story, 12,000 ton hospital ship that houses three operating rooms and carries a crew of 325 people. Her job will be greeting visitors, crew and staff, answering and directing calls, and helping with various clerical duties.

A former member of Brooksdale United Methodist Church, Sandy has been involved in two other short-term volunteer missions trips in the past. Her

mother says Sandy learned about the Mercy Ships program through friends in Raleigh and traveled to Alexandria, Va. in 1988 to visit the Anastasis and one of her sister ships, which were there as part of the Washington for Jesus celebration.

"Walking the halls of the M/V Anastasis (Greek for "Resurrection"), meeting various crew members, and hearing of God's hand reaching the lost and hurting, my heart was drawn to the ministry of Youth with a Mission's Mercy Ships. Little did

I know my heart would continue to be drawn and that, someday, I would become part of the crew," Sandy wrote in a letter telling of her plans.

A 1969 graduate of Roxboro High School, she has resided and worked in Raleigh for the past 19 years. The decision to begin the volunteer work brought "mixed emotions", she said.

"Leaving precious family and friends, a good company (Burroughs Wellcome) and position of 19 years, my home and all that is familiar to me, will not be without tears and sadness," she wrote. "Yet I am excited to see God open the door and answer a desire in my heart."

As a volunteer, Sandy will not be paid for her work. In fact, she must pay for her own room and board. To accomplish that, she has secured sponsors, both in Raleigh and Roxboro, who are supporting her financially and through prayer for the coming

year. The Mercy Ships program began in 1979 and now includes three ships, the Anastasis, whose volunteers do medical, dental, construction, agriculture, and water projects in needy areas; the M/V Good Samaritan, a 172-foot vessel that carries a task force of 60 professionals to developing nations, giving spiritual and physical assistance; and the M/V Pacific Ruby, a 140-foot vessel with a crew of 35 that travels to islands in the South Pacific, giving dental and medical care to the needy.

The Anastasis will procure goods and recruit volunteers at the European ports it visits and will spend half of the year in West Africa, where it will provide medical and other relief services.

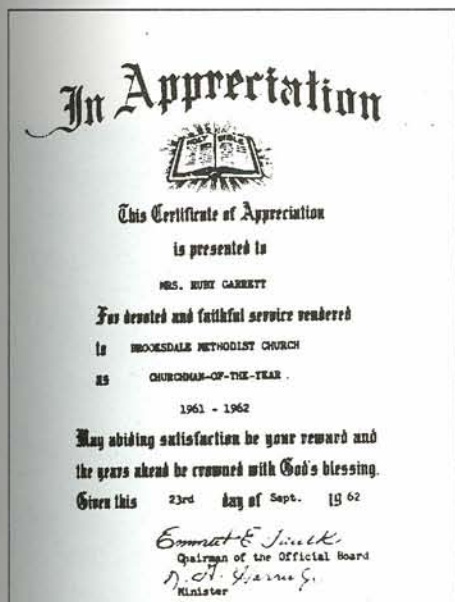

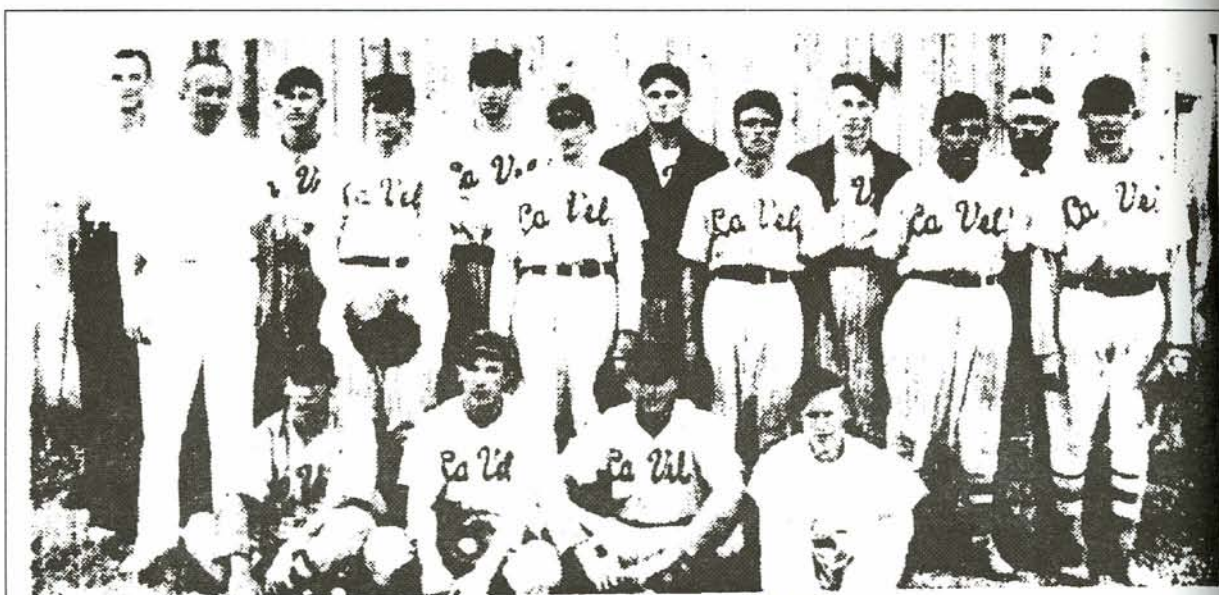

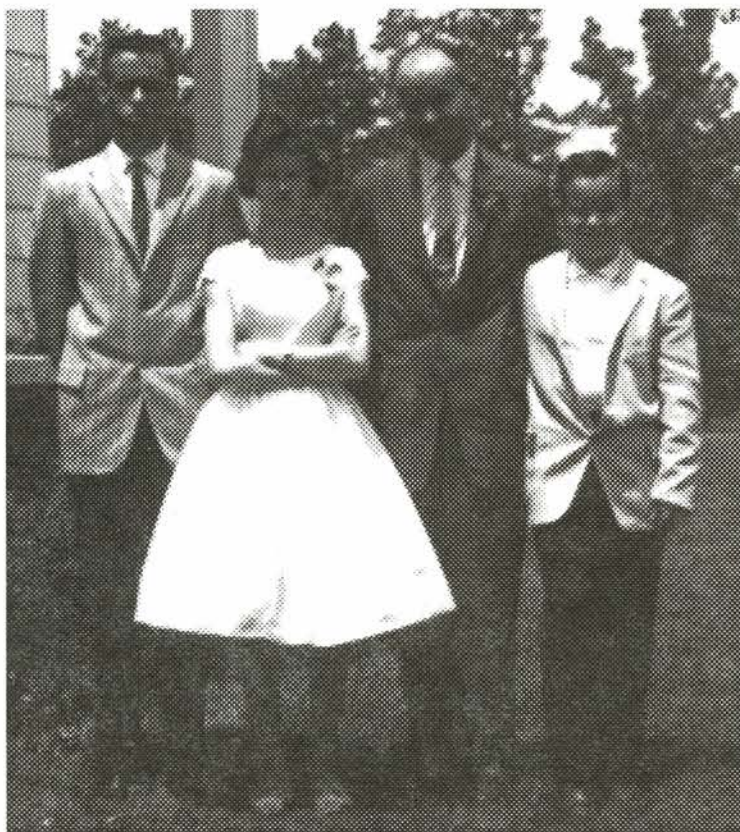

'We Didn't Expect Much'

D. S. Brooks Recalls Christmas Of Years Ago

Some Of Bang Is Gone From Christmas

ROXBORO — Youngsters get more toys at Christmas nowadays.

But they don't get big bangs out of hog bladders.

Still, according to Roxboro banker D. S. Brooks, the spirit of Christmas hasn't changed too much in the last 65 to 70 years.

Brooks, 78, recalled that when he was a youngster in Person County, "we had hog killings just before Christmas. Our fire-works were hog bladders that we fried.

"We blew them up and got out and burst them on Christmas morning."

The night before Christmas "we children, of course, went to bed early, looking and dreaming for Santa Claus on Christmas morning. That part of it is similar to the present day. Children now do the same thing. "We couldn't sleep the next

morning. . . . We'd get up 'way before day," Brooks said, "Santa Claus, of course, he'd always come."

Now, however, he leaves "considerably more" for all the good boys and girls. "We didn't get any toys," Brooks remembered, "in that day and time we hung up our stocking on the mantelpiece. We didn't fool with a box" for Santa to fill up with toys.

"If we got an apple and an orange, a few sticks of candy and some nuts, that was wonderful," he asserted. "We didn't expect much."

On Christmas day, Brooks continued, "we always had a big meal. The whole family, whenever possible, would get together on Christmas day."

The veteran banker said he thought children enjoyed Christmas a little more when he was a boy than they do now. "The children had a sense of being satisfied and thankful for what

little things they did get," he declared.

Personally, however, Brooks stressed that "I enjoy it as much now, but in a different way. I enjoyed it as a kid then, I enjoy it now in other ways. I enjoy things now I wouldn't have enjoyed when I was eight or 10 years old."

Among the things he said he enjoyed about Christmas now are "getting together" with his family and "seeing the kids enjoy themselves." He added with a twinkle that he lets his grandchildren "be Santa Claus for me" now.

"The spirit of Christmas today is the same in a way," Brooks said, "yet, in another way it's entirely different." He noted, however, that Christmas is "for us grown-ups as well" as for children.

Looking back, he said, he thought that there were as many

thoughts of Christ at Christmas then as there are now.

He added, "as you look back you naturally think you did have more snow than you do now. Winters seemed more severe than they do now."

As for the town's Christmas decorations, "Roxboro didn't have strings of lights" across Main Street. They just didn't have any decorations "when I was a kid," he said.

"I used to drive a two-horse wagon up and down Main Street in mud that deep," he said pointing to a spot halfway up his

arm. "They had stepping stones to get across the street. You'd slip off sometimes."

And at Christmas time, "the stores didn't have the rush they do now," he added.

Still, everybody enjoyed Christmas 65 to 70 years ago, Brooks said, "I don't know if we didn't enjoy it more."

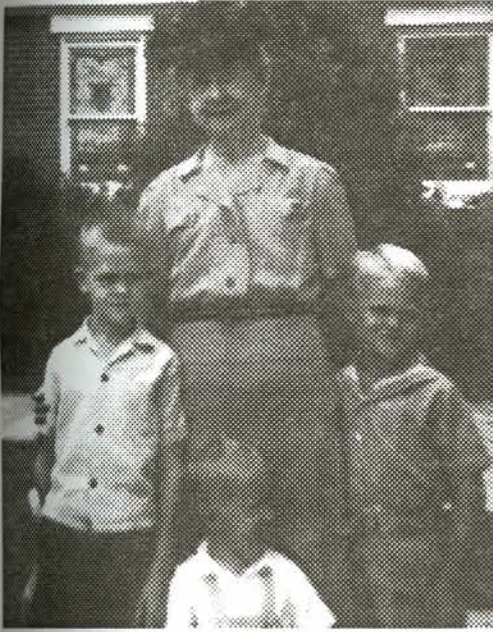

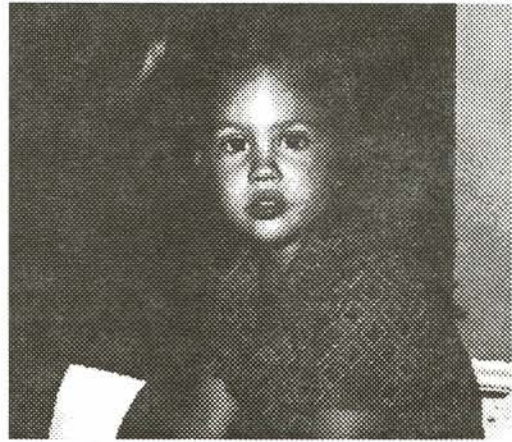

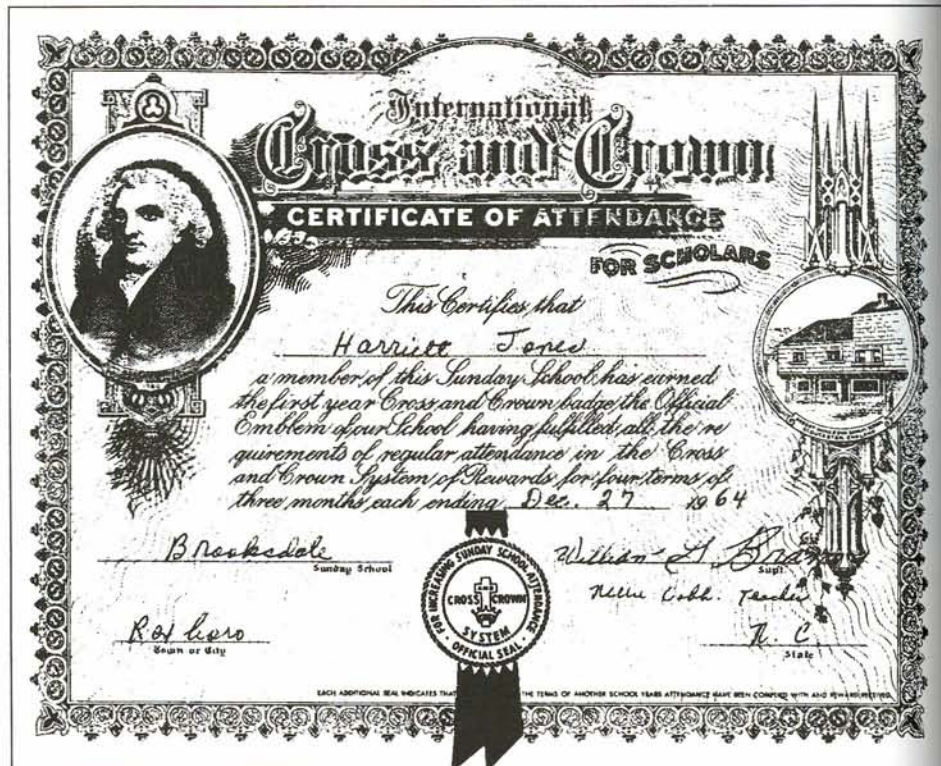

Following are two pages that detail a most generous trust fund started by C. B. Brooks that provides for an uninvadeable principal sum with income to go for various church expenses. It has since been added to by several individuals. The gift is followed by the name(s) of the giver(s):

\$2,000.00 C. B. Brooks

10 shares Morris Telephone Stock endowed under his Will

½ income each year applied to the pastor's salary

½ income each year applied to maintenance and upkeep of church buildings

\$1,000.00 G. M. Fox

5 Shares Roxboro Cotton Mills stock endowed under his Will

Income each year applied to the operating budget of the Church.

\$1,000.00 Effie B. Fox

10 Shares Morris Telephone stock given as a gift to church

½ Income each year to go to the budget

½ Income each year to go to the building fund

The above stocks were held by the Trustees until both Morris Telephone & Roxboro Cotton Mills were sold. Since all of the stocks were preferred stocks they were subject to cash sales. After the stock sales the TRUST realized \$4,000.00 which was in turn invested in U. S. Govt. Bonds. Upon the maturity of the government bonds the \$4,000.00 was invested in a Savings account.

\$3,000.00 Hall and Myra Brooks

In 1984 they made gifts totaling \$3,000.00 to go into the Trust, with income to go into the maintenance of buildings.

\$5,000.00 Brooks and Billie Carver

In 1988 they made a gift totaling \$5,000.00 to go into the Trust with income to go into the Budget.

\$5,148.00 James and Louise Brooks

In 1989 they made a gift totaling \$5,000.00 to go into the Trust with income to go into the Budget.

\$5,000.00 Glen and Cleo Titus

In 1992 they made a gift totaling \$5,000.00 to the Trust with income to go into the Budget.

\$17,852.00 Lucy H. Brooks

In 1992, a generous gift was endowed under her Will to go into the Trust with income to go to the church budget. Mrs. Brooks was described by her nephew as the most deeply religious person he had ever known. She was a Presbyterian.

God's People . . .

Brooksdale Members 1893 - 1993

All the persons whom the records show were ever members of Brooksdale are listed on the following pages. In some cases, the church roll books only show the name. Not only is God's miracle the fact that he has preserved the church for 100 years, but that the records have also been maintained in some fashion for that same period of time, also. The accuracy of the following listing is only as good as the original record, which was kept by the ministers of the church. To some of them, the membership record carried little importance, so not a great deal of time was spent keeping it current. To others, a desire to "straighten out the mess" came upon them, and they started over on a new record. Although a noble idea, this practice served to increase the "mess". Praise be to God for the majority who faithfully entered the data while it was current and thus made the list possible.

In the listing, several conventions were used as they came from the membership record books.

CT - Certificate of Transfer (usually meant the individual transferred from or to another Methodist church)

PF - Profession of Faith (the person had joined a church for the first time)

PM - the individual was on the Preparatory Roll and joined after Confirmation Class

Vows - came in from a denomination that does not send letters of transfer, therefore, the individual's original vows are accepted

OD - the individual came from some Other Denomination

Charge Conference - in the early years, Charge Conference acted on transfers to or from the church

Where the information was known, the name of the church to which or from which the individual transferred is included. In most cases, that data was not available.

After the year 1900, the year listed in the date does not include the first two digits. For example, a date of 10-September-1900 is shown as 10-Sep-00.

Many people are listed two or more times. For example, my name, Woodrow Terry Roberson is shown twice, because I first joined Brooksdale from Oteen Methodist in Asheville in 1966. In 1977, I transferred to Pine Forest Methodist, near Goldsboro, then transferred back to Brooksdale in 1981. So each time a person transferred into or out of Brooksdale is recorded.
