

PREFACE

My interest in Centenary Memorial United Methodist Church began when I married into the Carl C. Edens family in 1950. My mother-in-law and father-in-law went to school, Sunday School, and Church at Centenary. They were married there and now are buried in the cemetery next to the church. I knew the church was a special one by the pride and love that the members took in preserving their church and its history even when the church was no longer an active church but a memorial church. That change took place in 1971. At the annual homecoming in August, Carl Edens, on behalf of the Methodist Conference, presented a deed, covering the church properties, to Robert F. Stuart, Jr., chairman of the board of trustees of Centenary Memorial Association. Just talk with members such as Robert and Leon Stuart about the church and you see their eyes light up, and they are ready to tell you about their love of the church and its people.

My husband, John Clarence, and I have actively been involved in genealogy, mainly our own family histories, for about fifteen years. As we visited the State and National Archives, we saw the need to preserve documents for future generations. The Original Centenary Church Registers, The Official Membership and Church Records, and Sunday School records were left in the unheated and non air-conditioned church year after year. These are the books that date back to 1897 and are our heritage! Most people did not know about them or did not take the time to look at them. The current older generation is the last generation who actively attended Centenary Church and knew, or knew of, some of the people who helped form the church; therefore the need to preserve the history became more imperative if it's heritage was to live on. I feel a close kindred to the older people of Centenary as I learned about them through the records and pictures that were sent. I want to share with others the things I found while compiling the book.

Elaine Burns was my contact with the people of Rowland and their ancestors. She spent many hours on the telephone running down leads as to who may have a picture of certain families. She wrote letters, kept up with pictures as they came in, lined up the generations of each family and came to Laurinburg to help me as I entered the pictures and information into the computer. Robert Stuart's knowledge of family connections was invaluable as we traced the family lines. John Clarence Edens also helped trace family pedigrees, made telephone calls, and took pictures of the tombstones in the Centenary cemetery. Without the help of ELAINE BURNS, ROBERT STUART, and JOHN CLARENCE EDENS this book would not have been possible.

We tried to include all families who were mentioned in the earlier documents of the church. There are a few that we were not able to contact and regret that they are not included in the pictorial. We are grateful to all who did respond to make this book possible. We are pleased to have found 162 surname families and have included over 400 pictures of 800 individuals.

We hope you will take time to read the histories, check out the church and Sunday School rolls, marriage and baptism records to see the important part that your family played in the life of Centenary Memorial United Methodist Church.

INTRODUCTION

BY REV. LACY T. EDENS (written in 1935)

A young man who was the product of the **Centenary** community, who has been in the ministry for a brief time, said to the author on one occasion, "Somebody ought to write the history of **Centenary** Church, a great number of the young members do not know much about it and I must admit that I am one of them".

For this reason, and because this was the church where the author received spiritual nourishment in Sunday School as a boy and the church with which he united in his youth, he has undertaken this pleasant task.

The chief source materials for this brief history have been the <u>Minutes of the Annual Sessions of the</u> <u>North Carolina Conference</u>, 1882-1934, the <u>Raleigh Christian Advocate</u>, 1883-1893, 1899-1919, and the <u>North Carolina Christian Advocate</u>, 1894-1898, 1920-1934.

The author is deeply indebted to the older people of the Centenary community for information through correspondence and conversation.

In the year 2001, we, too, desire to continue recording the history of Centenary Memorial United Methodist Church. Centenary was very special to Polly Ward who spent many hours attending to the affairs of the church. In 1982 Polly and John Edens compiled a Centennial Book which included the history of Centenary Church by Lacy Edens plus the Centenary Association Minutes, 1950 – 1981. In the current book, we have included the Sunday School records, membership, marriage and baptism records plus as many pictures as possible to make this book more inclusive of the life of Centenary Church.

CHAPTER I

Centenary, and Ashpole Mission, 1882 - '85

Do you believe in missions? Whether expressed or not some may feel within themselves, "We pay our church dues and support our local church what is the use of troubling ourselves about others?" Did you ever stop to consider that what your church means to your community is perhaps due to the interest others took in establishing your local church? In December, 1884, **A. R. Raven**, Secretary of the Board of Missions of the North Carolina Conference, wrote as follows: "---There are twenty-four pastoral charges in the bounds of the North Carolina Conference known as missions, that is, societies and communities which are not able, unaided, to provide themselves with the Gospel. These have been faithfully served the past year by ministers of this Conference, assisted by funds appropriated by our Domestic Board of Missions ---" ¹ The **Ashpole Mission** was one of the twenty-four. The name of this charge was first published in the North Carolina Annual Conference Minutes of 1882 and was in the Fayetteville District. The first pastor was **W. S. Chaffin** and **L.L. Hendren** was presiding elder.

For the year, **1883**, **I. W. Avent** was sent as the pastor of the **Ashpole Mission** and **J. A. Cunninggim** was appointed presiding elder of the Fayetteville District. In the latter part of the year, the pastor wrote as follows: "I am having a good time on the **Ashpole Mission**, several converts and some additions, shall have two churches under way, and a deed to a lot on which to build another."²

For the year, **1884**, **J. A. Hornady** served as pastor of the **Ashpole Mission** and **J. A. Cunninggim** was reappointed as presiding elder of the Fayetteville District. In April, the pastor wrote as follows:

"You may say to all who are interested in home missions, that the prospects on **Ashpole Mission** are very encouraging, fair congregations at all preaching places. **Cotton Valley church** well on the way, others contemplated. The Advocate is read by a good percentage of the membership, and I am trying to get it into every family. The people, of all denominations, are very kind to me, for which I am grateful. I am praying and working for gracious revivals at all points." ³

In August he wrote of the condition of the charge as follows:

"Our third Quarterly Conference came off Saturday and Sunday at **Centenary** church (heretofore called **Cotton Valley**). **Brother Cunninggim**, our beloved Presiding Elder, was with us and preached two powerful sermons to large and intelligent congregations. We heard very many persons speak of the sermon on Sunday, as being the most instructive they had ever heard. He left on Sunday evening, we protracted the meeting five days longer. There were twenty-eight conversions, 21 accessions on profession of faith, and the church thoroughly revived. We closed yesterday, leaving seventeen penitents at the altar. Brothers Jesse Gaddy, Willie Townsend and Wesley Thompson⁴ rendered efficient service. Brother Gaddy – God bless him – was with me every day labouring incessantly for the Master. Glory to God! " ⁵

In October, 1920, after his superannuation, he wrote reminiscently from Maxton, North Carolina, as follows:

"Tuesday, September 28, I went over to **Rowland** to assist my good friend, **Rev. W. C. Merritt**, in a series of meetings in the Rowland Church. In January 1884, this writer went to the "**Cotton Valley**" appointment, four miles out from what is now **Rowland**, to preach his first sermon as Pastor of **Ashpole Mission**. At that time there was no church building and no organization at "**Cotton Valley**" but we used an unfinished dwelling belonging to a **Mr. McCormick** ⁶ for a preaching place. Immediately we went to work to build a church, which was completed before the year was half gone, and an organization was worshipping in the building, which was named **Centenary**. It is the same building used by that splendid congregation today, though some additions have been made to it. At that time there was not a single house in what is now the prosperous town of **Rowland** ----"⁷

For the year **1885**, **J. A. Hornady** returned to the **Ashpole Mission** as pastor and **S. D. Adams** became the presiding elder of the Fayetteville District. On June 10, the pastor wrote as follows: "—We hope to have the church at Centenary completed (except inside walls) by the next quarterly Conference which is to be held at that place ---"

While the **Centenary Church** was on the **Ashpole Mission** some of the children of the community wrote to the Children's Column of the Raleigh Christian Advocate. One letter dated January 1, 1884, from **Gaddysville**, N.C., read as follows: "<u>Dear Aunt Mary</u>: I send you fifteen cents for the little heathen children. I too wish to be a 'Bright Jewel'. I also send an enigma." ⁹ The following was written from the same post office and the same date: "<u>Dear</u> <u>Aunt Mary</u>:

I have been a long time waiting to write you, but had to wait until I could earn some money to send to the little heathen children. Please find enclosed thirty cents, ten myself, ten for my sister **Mamie**, and ten for my little brother **Charlie**. We earned it picking cotton, and send it to you and ask that you will please enroll our names among the '**Bright Jewels**'. We are going to try to send some more as soon as we get it." ¹⁰

What became of Ashpole Mission? J. A. Hornady explains in the North Carolina Christian Advocate of January 4, 1923 as follows:

"Thirty-nine years ago I went to **Ashpole Mission** as Pastor of that charge. I was a local preacher living in **Laurinburg** at that time, and was appointed to the mission charge by **J. A. Cunninggim**, on the very earnest request of **Dr. J. W. North**, who was one of the best friends I ever had. When I went to the charge I carried with me my wife, three children, and a horse and buggy. The year before I went to the charge it was served by **Rev. I. W. Avent**, who received from all sources less than three hundred dollars for his services as pastor. I rented a little house from **Mr. S. R. Townsend** at **Red Banks**, moved the little family with our belongings into it, and with all the energy and enthusiasm at my command I threw myself into the work I loved so well. The great Head of the Church blessed by efforts with good results, and at the fourth quarterly Conference that year I was recommended for admission on trial into the traveling connection. The Annual Conference was held that year in **Front Street Methodist Church** in the city of **Wilmington**, and was presided over by **Bishop Parker**. Sixteen young men applied for admission at the Conference, but several of them failed to pass the examination and were not received. I recall very vividly to the delight of my soul that I was one of the fortunate ones. I was returned to the **Ashpole Mission** and served it a full quadrennium, leaving it **Maxton Circuit** ----ⁿ 11</sup>

CHAPTER II

Centenary and Robeson Circuit, 1886 - 1902

At the annual session of the North Carolina Conference in **1885 Centenary Church** was transferred from the **Ashpole Mission to the Robeson Circuit**, and for the year **1886 Jonathan Sanford** was appointed pastor while **S. D. Adams** again served the Fayetteville District as presiding elder.

J. A. Hornady remained on the Ashpole Mission and wrote in January, 1886 as follows: "—Shoe Heel ¹² being now on Ashpole Mission, and the most central point in the work, we concluded to make our home here, accordingly we moved to this place on December 29th...¹³ He was present at the **dedicatory services at Centenary Church**, which occurred on May 9, 1886, and wrote in regard to the occasion as follows:

The second quarterly meeting was held at Centenary May 8,9. **Centenary is a new church** and has been on the **Ashpole Mission** since its organization up to the last Annual Conference when it was transferred to the **Robeson Circuit**. It was organized about five years ago by **Rev. W. S. Chaffin**, who it is said did the first work toward building the church with his own hands and I know it will gladden his heart, as well as the hearts of many others to know that on **May 9th a splendid church was dedicated** to Almighty God, and it is about these dedicatory services I wish to write. Sunday, May 9, dawned fair and lovely, and very early in the morning people began to pour in from every direction, and by nine o'clock I suppose there was as many people on the grounds as the church would hold, at this hour the Sunday School was convened, how it gladdened our hearts to note the improvement in **Centenary Sunday School**, the increase both in numbers and interest indicate clearly that somebody has been at work. After recitation of the lessons, **Dr. Sanford** delivered an excellent Sunday School address, then an intermission of 15 minutes was given, but very many wisely kept their seats, knowing that not more than half the people already on the grounds, could be accommodated with seats.

Just at 11 o'clock, **Rev. S.D. Adams**, Presiding Elder, arose and opened the services. The first hymn announced was the 887th. After all the preliminaries were gone through with, he announced the text, Psalm 126:3 '*The Lord hath done great things for us, whereof we are glad'*. The preacher announced in the outset, that he did not design to preach an expository or exegetical sermon but that his text was selected to use as a motto. He then proceeded to give an outline of the origin, progress and wonderful increase of the Methodist Church. When he was through, many in that vast assembly were made to feel in their hearts, truly, 'The Lord hath done great things for us whereof we are (or should be) glad'.

Next in order came the dedicatory service proper, the first lesson was read by **Dr. J. Sanford**, P.C., the second by the writer. The church was then presented for dedication, by **Rev. J. R. Gaddy**, and last the sentence of dedication was pronounced by the Presiding Elder. After these services were gone through with the sacrament of the Lord's Supper was administered to a very large number of communicants. Thus ended one of the most interesting, and we hope profitable services that it has been our pleasure to engage in.

At four o'clock in the afternoon the congregation reassembled, and heard a very impressive sermon by the Pastor, **Dr. Sanford**, his text was taken from the third chapter of St. John and part of 9th verse, 'How can these things be?' We enjoyed it very much, as did all who were there, as was evidenced by the marked attention during its delivery.

Now the services of the day were over, and after again shaking hands with as many of the kind people of Centenary as was convenient we turned our face homeward.

We love the people at Centenary, and shall go to see them when opportunity offers. ¹⁴

While residing at Leesville, where the pastor's home for the Robeson Circuit was located, the Reverend Jonathan Sanford sent a number of communications to the <u>Raleigh Christian Advocate</u> in regard to his charge for 1886. On February 10, he wrote as follows:

While writing on business, I am going to say that I have missed but one appointment on account of ice. This is something with **Ashpole** and **Hogswamp** to contend with in the recent freeze.¹⁵

As I expected, I am well pleased with my work. To many of my people I am no stranger, and in spite of the freeze, the writer had a good time in renewing friendships formed among the 'Artists of Glendale' painted faces as well as hearts. We knew them before, and there are no better or kinder people in our Conference.

In the new relation, we hope the present times may be more pleasant and profitable than the former. Many of the loved ones of seventeen years ago, we can never see again, until we cross palms in the greeting on the other shore; but we thank God, they have left the impress of their godly lives, and their children are on the same road.

We are adjusting ourselves to the work, and praying for the grandest year in the history of our church. Some things are neither pleasant nor auspicious, but on the whole, the work is in a hopeful condition, with good men and women who will stand by the preacher in his earnest endeavors for the advancement of the kingdom.

The circuit will compare favorably with other charges composed of first class people, with wonderful possibilities waiting for increased activities to call them into life.¹⁶

In March, he wrote of the first Quarterly Meeting as follows:

The first Q. Conf. for **Robeson Circuit** embraced the last Sabbath in February, official attendance on Saturday was unusually large, and without exception an intelligent and pleasant board. We had a pleasant and encouraging beginning; **Brother S. D. Adams**, our Presiding Elder, was at his post and needs no'dearly beloved' to bring him into notice. His sermon on Sunday morning to the little crowd, who were present in spite of the snow, made the pastor wish, though providentially hindered, that his people were present to learn the condition of a happy people.¹⁷

In a letter, which was written in September, he mentioned the earthquake. He stated:"

Commenced splendid meeting first Sunday in August. Good from the first and interest increasing, church wonderfully revived with an unusual number reclaimed or converted, new conversions about 75 the first 4 weeks. This, the 5th week, 31 penitents today and 8 converts. We are glad, in fine health, crops very much improved, and prospects encouraging about 9:45 last night the shock of the earth was alarming.¹⁸

In October, he wrote as follows concerning the Croatan Indians of Bethel Church: ¹⁹

This church is separate and independent of all others, a congregational M.E. church, served by the preacher in charge of the **Robeson Circuit**, in accordance with their own choice. The government and doctrines are the same as the M.E. South, except the Pastor is Bishop and Presiding Elder and has absolute control officially, as well in money matters, which is separate from his salary on the circuit. ---They have 115 communicants, and there is not a white person nor freedman among them.---They have a good church almost finished, the middle pew reserved for white people who sometimes outnumber the **Croatans**.----The protracted meeting this year was the best in the history of their church and they will, I think, pay every dollar of their assessment, besides <u>their gifts to our preacher</u>. During the revival **Rev. Henry Lowry** was present part of the time and preached finely for his age. He is 22 years old, son of **Calvin Lowry**, was educated at Greensboro, N.C., belongs to the M.E. Church and is a nephew of **Henry Berry Lowry**."

In August, 1886, J.D.C., a resident of Centenary community, wrote as follows:

--Brother Jonathan Sanford, D.D., our much beloved Pastor is winning garlands of respect from the people of Centenary, he seems to suit everyone. On Sunday the 18^{th,} he preached us a sermon on the beauties of the heavenly city.---

On the 3rd, Sunday in August he expects to commence a protracted meeting to continue one week.---

On the 27th of December 1886, **Mrs. Eliza Kilpatrick** was selected to join the band of holy angels. She was an humble follower of the meek and lowly Jesus. While in the church as a member, she did not seek notoriety farther than being a regular attendant---²⁰

For the year, **1887**, **Jonathan Sanford** was returned to **Robeson Circuit** as pastor, while **S.D. Adams** was reappointed Presiding Elder of the Fayetteville District.

For the year, **1888**, **Jonathan Sanford** was again on the **Robeson Circuit**, with **S.D. Adams** again serving as presiding elder. In September, the pastor stated the condition of the charge as follows:

We have just closed our sixth protracted meeting, and in spite of hot weather and many other hindrances, the results so far as we can judge, have been encouraging.---I am indebted to **Rev. John T. Finlayson**, of **Lumberton**, for valuable services at two churches.----At two other churches, **Rev. Jesse Gaddy**, a local preacher, worked with me. Everybody has confidence in **Uncle Jesse**. He is a devoted Christian, and comes as near doing his 'level best' in a revival as anyone I ever saw. God bless him, and his lovely Christian family. The crops are fine and we hope for some improvements financially. Three churches have bought organs this year, and a stove; other matters too small to brag on. No one has pounded or caned us, but they let us work just as hard as we please, and never bother us with compliments.

Our congregations are larger than ever before, and our Sunday Schools better.----More than 150 members added in three years, encourages us to hope that our labor has not been wholly in vain.²¹

For the years 1889 - 90 S.V. Hoyle was pastor of Robeson Circuit. The first year he was under the leadership of W.H. Bobbitt as presiding elder of the Fayetteville District, and resided at Lumberton; during his second year J.T. Gibbs was his presiding elder, and the pastor continued a resident of Lumberton. On September 3, 1890, <u>A</u> Robeson Methodist, after relating the condition of the charge, praised the Presiding Elder. He stated:

As there has been no report of this circuit in your paper for some time I take the liberty of giving you an account of what we have been doing.

In the first place toward the first of the year the pastor organized the membership of the churches into **Missionary Societies**. This we think will do a great deal of good by getting the people to read and think on the subject; our people will act if properly instructed on this matter.----

Last Saturday and Sunday was our 3rd Quarterly meeting; our new Presiding Elder was present and stayed four days preaching with great power and liberty. He won all hearts in the pulpit, in the chair, and in the social circle. The Bishop made no mistake when he appointed him to that responsible position in our church. The universal sentiment here is, that he is the right man in the right place, and through you ask **Bishop Keener** to return him to this district for another year.²²

For the years **1891-'92**, **N. M. Jurney**, who resided at Leesville, was pastor of the **Robeson Circuit**. During the first year he was under **J.T. Gibbs** as Presiding Elder of the Fayetteville District but the second year he was under Presiding Elder **M. L. Wood**, the Rockingham District having been formed and **Robeson Circuit** placed within it.

For the year, **1893**, **Jonathan Sanford**, who was formerly on the charge as pastor, served **Robeson Circuit** and resided at Ashpole (now Fairmont). **W.H. Moore** was appointed Presiding Elder of Rockingham District. In March the pastor described the condition of the charge in the following manner:

The first Quarterly Conference for **Robeson Circuit** was held at **Asbury**, embracing the 4th Sunday in February, with good attendance on Saturday, and on Sunday unusually large for **Asbury**—

Dr. W.H. Moore, the new presiding elder of Rockingham District was present in the spirit of the Master and captured our people in the chair and pulpit.---

Asbury paid its portion of the missionary debt, and we hope the other churches will do likewise.

We cannot resist the impulse to write at length of the kind expressions from the dear people to whom we have been sent to serve the second time. May God bless every word, as for substantial tokens of love in the way of nice hams, etc., kindly given, for which we thank them.

The farmers are depressed, but not cast down, and will do the best they can. We know them to be true, many of them exceptionally so, and we can trust them determined to serve them to the best of our ability, if necessary, through evil as well as good report.

With Paul's words on our banner, 'none of these things move me', we mean, by the help of God, to 'press forward' for great possible success in saving souls.²³

He was able to write in September:

We report gracious meetings on **Robeson Circuit**. At **Bethesda, Corinth, Asbury, and Olivet** fiftysix converts and many backsliders reclaimed. We began at **Centenary** with encouraging prospects but the rain and storms hindered. We hope, it possible, to try again before Conference, which with **Hopewell**, closes our protracted meetings. The outlook financially is growing brighter every day. So we have had a very pleasant year.²⁴

For the year, **1894**, **Jonathan Sanford** was returned as pastor of **Robeson Circuit**, while **J. T. Gibbs** served as presiding elder of the Rockingham District.

For the year, **1895, Erskine Pope** was the pastor on the **Robeson Circuit** and **J. T. Gibbs** was returned to the Rockingham District as presiding elder. A statement in the <u>North Carolina Christian Advocate</u> of January 30, 1895 read as follows: "**Rev. E. Pope**, of **Robeson Circuit**, has been given a warm reception by his people, and is moving off under favorable circumstances. We venture the assertion that this circuit will have a good report at the next Conference." ²⁵ The pastor wrote as follows concerning his new appointment: "Our first Quarterly Meeting was held last Saturday and Sunday. **Dr. Gibbs** was on hand and sustained his reputation for good preaching and wise management of the church work. The stewards provided liberally for our support and mad a good start in collecting it. The prospects are flattering for a good year's work.---" ²⁶

For the years, **1896-'97**, **Erskin Pope** continued as pastor of the **Robeson Circuit**, while **J. T. Gibbs** served the Rockingham District as Presiding Elder. In 1896, the residence of the pastor was changed from Ashpole (**Fairmont**) to **Leesville** but in 1897 he removed to **Ashpole**. In 1898, he completed his quadrennium under **W. H. Moore** as presiding elder of the Rockingham District. The pastor wrote as follows of his cordial reception for his fourth year:

Our reception on the **Robeson Circuit** for the fourth year has been most cordial and pleasant. The writer came to it three years ago when it was not especially sought and found it running in old ruts, salary not paid and collections far behind. But for three years the charge has paid every cent assessed for salaries, foreign and domestic missions, bishops, conference claimants, and nearly all for church extension and education. One year ago we disposed of our parsonage at **Leesville** and purchased a nice property in the village of **Ashpole**, where the parsonage is now located.

The A.C.L. is finishing a railway to this point, and of course it was exceedingly fortunate for us to get this point when we did.

Our pastorate here for three years has been by far the most pleasant of our experience. A better or more generous people cannot be found anywhere. We have a faithful board of stewards who relieve the pastor entirely of any trouble on pastor's salary.

We have lived in several counties in North Carolina and mingled with many good people but we have never lived in any county, taken all in all, that comes up to **Robeson**, nor found a people more generous and considerate than the **Robesonians**.

Messrs. Editors you must excuse such a long letter as I seldom write from any charge, but I felt a kind word was due this charge and hence I have been a little lengthy.²⁷

Z. T. Harrison was the pastor on the Robeson Circuit for 1899 and W. H. Moore was again the presiding elder of the Rockingham District. In August, a statement in the <u>Raleigh Christian Advocate</u> read as follows: "Bro.

Harrison and his people are moving for a new parsonage on the Robeson Circuit and success is assured by the close of the year."²⁸

The same pastor was returned for the second year, under the leadership of the same presiding elder, and wrote in February **1900** that the parsonage had been built, and gave the following general description of his charge:

I have entered cheerfully and hopefully upon my second year on **Robeson Circuit**. My people were indeed kind to me last year, building me a good parsonage, paying my salary, and all the collections ordered by our Conference in full. My horse died in the fall, and over fifty dollars were given by my people to help buy another, besides other substantial expressions of appreciation. All this was done in a quiet modest way, and done so cheerfully that I can trust my people to take care of me another year. And right here I want to say that I have a fine official board, and to their faithfulness is due largely our financial success. We had a good year spiritually; while only a few joined the church, yet we had some fine meetings in the church. This is a fine farming section with a good people, and both the country and people are improving every year, so some old and observing people say.

I wish to say that the pastor and many of the people are greatly interested in our new orphanage. We raised \$30 on Thanksgiving day. Paid it over to the agent at Conference.²⁹

The **Robeson Circuit** was served in **1901 by B.C. Allred** as pastor, while **W.S. Rone** was appointed presiding elder of the Rockingham District. "I have been very cordially received on **Robeson Circuit**", wrote the pastor in January 1901. "The good people of this charge have already endeared themselves to us in many ways, and we feel at home among them." ---³⁰

Under the leadership of the same presiding elder, the same pastor was returned to the charge for the second year. In January, 1902, he wrote as follows:

From Conference I went directly to **Granville County** to join my family and to spend the holidays with relatives and friends; and on the morning of the 30th of December we started for the parsonage at **Ashpole**, arriving here at 9 o'clock that night, where we found a number of dear friends in readiness for us, with a nice warm supper and enough of the necessities of life to last several weeks. Such a cordial welcome as they gave us made us feel good, and we resolved, by God's grace, to do the very best year's work that it is possible for us to do. We have been to all the appointments except Olivet, where we go this evening, and have had most encouraging welcome at all points. May God bless the dear people of this Circuit and make us a blessing to them this year. ³¹

CHAPTER III

CENTENARY, AND ROWLAND CIRCUIT, 1903 -

When **the Rowland Circuit** was formed at the annual session of the North Carolina Conference in 1902 **Centenary** was placed on it, and the first pastor to the new charge was **J. W. Bradley**, an energetic young preacher who was in his third year as an itinerant. This new circuit was a part of the Rockingham District to which **W. S. Rone** was re-appointed as presiding elder. On March 11, 1903, the pastor wrote of the new circuit as follows:

---On this circuit we have four appointments. Three houses of worship, all of which badly need repair or paint. We are trying to do both, and making some success. At **Rowland**, the center, the most important, vital portion of the circuit, we need a church house, and we need it now.

We found nineteen Methodists, counting the children, here, after Conference. A few others are being found and added to the roll – still we are weak.

Our second Quarterly meeting meets at Centenary the second Saturday and Sunday in April. ³²

Under the leadership of **John N. Cole**, a new presiding elder for the Rockingham District, the same pastor was returned to the Rowland Circuit for the year, **1904.** In February, he wrote of his work as follows: "---The foundation for our church at **Rowland** is being laid. All of our people are enthusiastic over it.

We are trying to repair our church at **Centenary** before the quarterly meeting. **Purvis Church** will be painted inside soon. **At Oak Grove** we hope to paint the church this year. So you see this '**Baby Circuit'** is anxious to grow." ³³ He wrote a few weeks later: "Our second Quarterly meeting meets with the **Centenary** Church next Saturday and Sunday, April 2,3. Let all officials come. Dinner on the grounds Saturday.---³⁴

In June, he wrote of the charge in general in which he told of the building of the vestibule to **Centenary** church. He said:

Our new church at **Rowland** is complete outside, including paint. We think it a right pretty church.

Hope to worship in it this year. We are paying as we go. The house will cost about two thousand dollars. At **Centenary** we have built a vestibule this year, and the house in now being painted. Good for that

class.

Our Children's Day exercises at each of our schools were good. The aggregate collections was \$18. **Rev. Jesse R. Gaddy**, a local Elder, died at his home, June 5, 1904. He was a good man.

The delegates from this circuit - Brothers J. R. Burns, H. M. John, W. F. Adams, and J. W.

Crawford - are urged to attend the District Conference at Gibson July 20 and 24, 1904. 35

The high esteem in which the pastor was held was expressed by a young girl of the **Centenary** community, who wrote from **Echo**, **N.C**., on April 15, 1904 to the Children's Column of the <u>Raleigh Christian Advocate</u>. In this letter she said: "Dear Advocate: I am a little girl eleven years old. Mama takes the Advocate. This is my first letter to the Advocate. I go to Sunday School every Sunday. I also go to day school. Our Pastor is **Rev. J. W. Bradley**. We all like him very much. Who was it at midnight sang praises to God in prison. Inclosed find fifteen cents for the orphans." ³⁶

Under the leadership of the same presiding elder, the same pastor served the Rowland Circuit for his third consecutive year. In January, **1905**, he wrote as follows:

When **Bishop Candler** said for me to go back to **Rowland Charge**, I was glad, because I knew, after having tried it twice, that these people knew how to care for their preacher, and take delight in doing so. The stewards advanced our salary another hundred dollars, and made the best report by far, they have ever made for the first quarter.

Our pulpits will be vacant during the month of February, while we attend the Missionary Institute at Nashville.

We feel that we need better training for this work. May the Lord grant us the best year we have had on this circuit.³⁷

In May, while writing of the work in general, he described the conditions as follows:

--The church at **Purvis** –is ready for dedication; all complete, even the carpet, with money left over. It is a real pretty church and has a splendid roll of loyal supporters. We want some of you big preachers to come and dedicate this church for us.

Our new church at **Rowland** is complete, all to oiling inside. We have been using it several weeks, and have cause to be proud and thankful for such a nice modern little house of worship – not a cent of debt against it. This is the most harmonious and plunky little class I have ever seen. We are expecting a meeting some time soon. The Lord has promised to help us.

Old Centenary church has put on a new dress. People are watching her, and she is marching valiantly in the front ranks of the circuit with the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society and Sunday School and all church work fraught with spiritual interest. Before our third Quarterly Meeting, which is to be held there, it is our aim to do still more work on the interior of the church – repairing and painting. Of course we can do it; can't we members?

---Oak Grove ---has one of the best Sunday Schools in the District, and an overflowing house at every preaching service at this little country church---³⁸

In the latter part of May, he wrote as follows concerning the damage to the new church at **Rowland** by a wind storm: "That pretty new church at **Rowland** we told the Advocate readers about last week was almost totally wrecked by a wind storm that struck our little town on May 16th. Several buildings were injured, but our church suffered most.

It must go back right soon. Who will send us \$5? We would be grateful for even one dollar. I hope your church will not get blown down—"³⁹ But in July, the <u>Raleigh Christian Advocate</u> was able to publish the following statement: "The Methodist Church at **Rowland, Robeson County**, which was badly damaged two months ago by a severe storm, has been repaired, and the dedicatory sermon will be preached the second Sunday in August by **Rev. D. H. Tuttle.**" ⁴⁰

J. W. Bradley completed his quadrennium on the Rowland Circuit in 1906, under John N. Cole, the presiding elder of the Rockingham District.

For the years, **1907-'08**, **J. M. Ashby** was appointed pastor of the **Rowland Circuit**, and **W. H. Moore** served as presiding elder of the Rockingham District. In February, 1907, the new pastor described in the following words the condition in which he found the charge:

After four years of as much happiness and as little friction as fall to man, spent on the **Robeson Circuit**, we submitted to the inevitable, and on the afternoon of January 2nd left **Ashpole** for **Rowland** to make our home among a new people. ---

When we reached **Rowland** we found the new parsonage not ready for occupancy, so we made our home with **Bro. H.K. McCormac** till the 30th when we went into a nice bright, convenient and commodious new parsonage in the flourishing little city of **Rowland** on the main line of the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad, forty-one miles from **Fayetteville** and twelve miles from **Ashpole**. We find the **Rowland Circuit** in fine condition as a result of four years of untiring work by my predecessor, the energetic, pushing **J. W. Bradley**. The church houses are all in good repair, and the congregations built up so in that line all is pleasant and hopeful.---

Our first Quarterly Conference occasion was on the 10th and 11th. Our Presiding Elder, **Dr. W. H. Moore**, was present and gave us two fine sermons. The stewards' meeting was held in connection with the Conference. They put the salary \$50 above the past year. The reports at the Conference showed the circuit to be in fine condition. ----

In July, 1907, the Children's Column of the <u>Raleigh Christian Advocate</u> published a letter dated from **Rowland**, **N.C.**, March 25, 1907. The letter was written by one of the **Centenary** Girls and read as follows:

I will write to your paper again. I am a little girl, twelve years old. I enjoy reading the little girls' and boys' letters. I go to Sunday School every time I can. We miss **Rev. J.W. Bradley** talking to we little girls and boys after Sunday School is over. I would be so glad to see him but don't know when I ever will see him again. I have a little sister four years old. Her name is **Thelma**. She is sweet as can be. I will close by asking some of the little girls to send me the song, 'A Flower From My Angel Mother's Grave'.⁴²

In October, 1908, another one of the **Centenary** girls wrote to the Children's Column of the <u>Raleigh Christian</u> <u>Advocate</u> as follows:

I enjoy the little boys' and girls' letters very much. I am a little girl twelve years old. I live on the farm and attend private school. My teacher is **Miss Bertha Lakey** of **Dobson**, and my music teacher is **Miss Bessie Burleson**, of **Barnardsville**, N.C.

I have two sisters at G.F.C. ⁴³ and two in private school here. I have a brother in the Military School in Charleston, S.C. ⁴⁴ I haven't any pets now, as I have to practice and study after school, consequently I have no time for play. If this escapes the wastebasket I will write again. With best wishes to the Advocate and much love to the orphans. ⁴⁵

For the years, **1909-'10-'11**, **the Rowland Circuit** was served by **F.B. McCall**, under the leadership of **W. H. Moore** as presiding elder of the Rockingham District for the first two years and **A. McCullen** for the third year.

J. A. Lee served as the pastor of the Rowland Circuit during the years 1912-'13-'14-'15. During the first three years of his pastorate, A. McCullen was the presiding elder of the Rockingham District, and the last year he served under Presiding Elder J. H. Hall. In August, 1912, the pastor wrote as follows:

We are moving along quietly but successfully on the **Rowland Circuit**. Last May we had revival services in our church in Rowland. The pastor was assisted **by Rev. S.A. Cotton** of **Red Springs**. We had splendid preaching, but no special interest and no accessions. The third Sunday in July we began a meeting at **Centenary. Rev. S.T. Moyle of Fairmont** did the preaching. He gave us fine service, both in the pulpit and in after meetings. We had a genuine revival, the brethren say the best in many years. There were many professions and reclamations and the Pastor received eight members at the close of the meeting.

The fourth Sunday in July our meeting at **Purvis** began. **Rev. J. A. Daily of Hamlet**, was with us here. He rendered very fine service during the entire meeting and captured our people. We had an old fashioned revival and the people say it was the best in the history of the church. Six members were received and I think more will join later. To this date we have received on this charge this year thirty-seven members – seventeen by profession of faith and twenty by certificate, and fourteen children have been baptized.---

We have repainted and made some repairs on our church at **Rowland** at a cost of \$185. We have had interesting Children's Day services in all our three Sunday Schools in May and the collections amounted to \$19.10. Our assessment for missions was paid in full last spring and this was the first time this was ever done on this charge so early in the year.⁴⁶

In September, 1913, he wrote concerning the charge as follows:

We are moving along nicely on the Rowland Circuit. During the month of May we had splendid Children's Day services in our three Sunday Schools, with interesting exercises and overflowing congregations. The collections amounted to \$25.

In August and September we had good revival meetings at **Purvis, Centenary, and Rowland**. The Pastor was assisted in these meetings by Revs. **S. T. Moyle, E. H. Davis, and J. A. Daily** in the order named. These brethren all rendered fine service both in the pulpit and in the after meetings, as well as among the people in their homes. It is seldom that you will find more earnest, devoted men of God than

these brethren. I believe that our congregations have had much benefit from these meetings, and that our people are stronger in the Christian life. Altogether we have had nine accessions to the church.⁴⁷

In September, 1914, he summarized the work on the circuit as follows:

Dr. L.L. Nash ⁴⁸ has been with us in three good meetings on the **Rowland Circuit**, the last one having just closed. **Dr. Nash** is a safe, sound, eloquent gospel preacher, and gave fine services in all these meetings. We believe that the church was much revived, and thirteen were added to the church on profession of faith – at **Rowland** one, at **Purvis** three, and at **Centenary** nine. **Dr. Nash** endeared himself very much to our people. Our work on this circuit is in good condition. ⁴⁹

For the years, **1916-'17-'18-'19**, **A. J. Groves** served the **Rowland Circuit** as pastor. His presiding elder the first three years was **J. H. Hall** and the last year he served under the leadership of **H. M. North**. In March, 1916, he published in the <u>Raleigh Christian Advocate</u> the following announcement:

Beginning at Centenary Church on **Rowland Circuit** Saturday Afternoon, March 18th, at 3 o'clock and continuing through Sunday, 19th there will be held a Sunday School Institute, conducted by Field Secretary **M. W. Brabham**. There will be two services on Sunday, morning and afternoon, with dinner on the grounds. This institute will be held for the entire charge and we urge each Sunday School to attend. All others interested in Sunday School work are invited. ⁵⁰

In October, 1916, he described the condition of his work as follows:

We have held meetings at three of our churches – **Purvis, Centenary, and Asbury**. Have one other to hold – **Rowland**. We had no ministerial help, the preaching all being done by the pastor. **Bro. C. H. Key, of Ellerbe, N.C.**, led the singing, conducting all the song service. Those who have heard **Bro. Key** sing need not be told that this part of the service was well done.

---We began at **Purvis** the fourth Sunday. The church was very materially strengthened spiritually, with five additions on profession of faith.

We began at **Centenary** the fourth Sunday night in August, and closed the following Saturday night. Here we had a gracious revival in the church, with six additions on profession of faith.

We began at **Asbury** Monday night after the first Sunday in September and ran through the second Sunday. Here we had small congregations to begin with, but they increased until the close. Some of the older members of the church said that during the last several nights of the meeting the crowds were the largest that had attended **Asbury** in fifteen years. --- Seven members were added on profession of faith. In all so far we have received twenty-one on profession of faith. ⁵¹

In August, 1917, he praised the people of the Rowland Circuit in the following manner:

Our people are still good to us. Were I to speak of all their acts of kindness, someone would say I was exaggerating. Last year while our boy was sick at **Southern Pines**, they gave me my railroad fare going to see him, amounting to something like \$35. Besides an occasional big pounding, various ones send in things, and there are not many days but **Bro. J.W. Ward** and family send something, and sometimes as much as a wagon load of oats for "Dixie". **Brother Evander Bullock** sent in his second load of corn last week with a present of a \$5 check. **Dr. Townsend** a \$5 gold piece, and 'so on'. Some time ago these good people voted me a month's vacation with a purse amply sufficient for my expenses. And now I am here **at Junaluska** enjoying this beautiful scenery, drinking in the zone of this wonderful atmosphere and listening to the splendid sermons and addresses being delivered, which we trust will rejuvenate the physical, broaden the mental, and quicken the spiritual man, that we may go back prepared to serve a people who have given us such substantial tokens of love and appreciation. ⁵²

In March, 1918, he reported the proceedings of the first Quarterly Conference as follows:

The first Quarterly Conference for **Rowland Circuit** embraced Saturday and Sunday, the second and third of March, and was held at Rowland Church.---

On Sunday **Brother Hall** preached two good helpful sermons at **Rowland** in the morning and at **Centenary** in the afternoon, administering the sacrament of the Lord's Supper at both places. On Saturday at ten o'clock, the stewards of the charge met and organized by electing **Dr. George M. Pate**, Chairman, and **Brother Bernard A. Edens**, Secretary and Treasurer. Without a dissenting voice, they voted to increase the pastor's salary 20 percent, making it \$1200---⁵³

W. C. Merritt served as pastor of the Rowland Circuit during the years 1920-'21-'22. The first year, he was under H. M. North as presiding elder of the Rockingham District, and during his second and third appointments he served under the leadership of Presiding Elder J. H. Shore.

After serving the **Rowland Circuit** during the quadrennium, **1923-26**, at the request of the people on the charge and the friends of other denominations, **P. D. Woodall** was returned to the work for his fifth consecutive year. During his first year, he served under Presiding Elder **J. H. Shore** and the last four years he was under the leadership of **C. L. Read** as presiding elder of the Rockingham District.

For **1928**, Chas. A. Jones was the newly appointed pastor of the Rowland Circuit, and C. L. Read was returned as Presiding Elder of the Rockingham District.

During the years, **1929-'30**, **J. H. Lanning** was pastor of the **Rowland Circuit**, while **H. C. Smith** was on the Rockingham District as presiding elder. In July, 1930, the pastor described the remodeling of the circuit parsonage at **Rowland**, and the part **Centenary** took in it, as follows: "—The general remodeling of the Rowland parsonage was done by all three of the churches on the charge.—**The Society at Centenary** did up a bed-room.—"⁵⁴

For the years, **1931-'32**, **D.A. Petty** was appointed to the Rowland Circuit. The first year, he served under Presiding Elder **H.C. Smith** of the Rockingham District. This District was discontinued at the annual session of the North Carolina Conference in 1931 and **the Rowland Circuit** was placed in the Fayetteville District. The pastor served during 1932 under **J. C. Wooten** as presiding elder.

For the years, **1933-'34-'35**, **J. C. Whedbee** was appointed the pastor of the **Rowland Circuit**. During the first two years, he was under **J. C. Wooten** as presiding elder and the last year **D.E. Earnhardt** was appointed presiding elder of the Fayetteville District.

CONCLUSION

As many tributaries flow into a river – basin to form a mighty river, so flowed the life and influence of each of these humble men of God, who served as the pastor of Centenary Church, into the community life enriching and ennobling it. When W. S. Chaffin was the pastor of the Ashpole Mission and began the erection of Centenary Church, the charge, composed of a number of churches, was paying for Pastor's Salary, including the donation from the Conference Board of Missions, \$352; at present Centenary Church alone pays to the support of the ministry a yearly average of twice that amount. The total membership of Ashpole Mission was reported at 150 and at present Centenary Church alone has a membership of almost, if not that number.

In the early years of the first decade of the twentieth century, a school building was erected on the grounds near Centenary Church; these two institutions have greatly influenced the young life of the community. A number of the youths have gone to our church schools and state institutions, some of whom returned to the community to spend their lives, while many have gone elsewhere to enter upon various callings, such as the ministry, law, and business. One member of the church, now deceased, entered business as far away as Turkey in Europe.

God appeared unto Abram in Haran and said, "I will bless thee and make thy name great; and thou shalt be a blessing". Realizing the blessings which the community has received, Centenary Church should be a blessing to others.



Nancy Jane Braswell Ayers

Charter Member of the Centenary United Methodist Church. Nancy Jane Braswell (b. 3-24-1867, d. 5-29-1924) was born on the family farm just two miles from Centenary United Methodist Church. She was the daughter of Nicholas Allen Braswell (b. 7-26-1837 d. 1-27-1899) and Nancy Jane Powell (b. 1848 d. 3-24-1867). Since Nancy Jane Powell died at the birth of her daughter, her husband Allen, grandparents Carey Yelvington Powell (1823-1895) and Anna Eliza Sealy (1821-1904) named her "Nancy Jane". Nancy Jane Braswell was reared by her grandparents who took her to church at Centenary at its beginning in 1882. There are no pictures of Carey and Anna Powell who were probably charter members of the church.

Nancy Jane Braswell was the wife of Darius Brewer Ayers, Jr. (1862-1928). And they had nine children. Several of these children attended church at Centenary with their Mother. Their names were Thomas Burtram Ayers (1887-1917); Ira Winford Ayers, Sr. (1890-1954); Herbert Boyd Ayers, Sr. (1900-1959); Earnest Glenn Ayers, Sr. (1905-1974); Carl McGuire Ayers (1907-1997) Submitted by Boyd Ayers

The Burns/Page Connection

The Burns/Page Clan are descendants of Joseph R. Burns and Lou Gaddy Burns. They had three children: James Soloman (who died a few days after birth), Bettie Emma Burns (born 1881), and Jesse Worth Burns (born 1883). Bettie Emma Burns married Frank Mitchell Page. They had seven boys. Two of the boys died in infancy. On October 20, 1918 tragedy struck the Frank M. Page family. Frank died on that day of influenza. On October 21, 1918, Bettie gave birth to James Page and on October 22nd, Bettie died of influenza. The five older Page boys (Bill, Frank, Jack, Cole and Press) moved in with Jesse Worth and Alice Oliver Burns who lived about 1/4 mile from them. Worth Burns was appointed the guardian of the Page boys. The baby, James, was taken by Frank's sister, Dora Page Harrelson, and he survived until December 25, 1919. the Page boys and the Burns children (Joe, Jake, Willie, Alice, Louise, Bettie, Bob, Pete and Anne) were reared as one family in the Burns Homeplace where Ruth Burns still lives. The Crawford Family of Gaddysville and Rowland, North Carolina

John(b. c. 1705) and Jane Henderson (b. c. 1709) Crawford, the ancestors of the Crawfords of Gaddysville and Rowland, North Carolina came to Stamford, Connecticut in 1733 from County Tyrone in Northern Ireland. With them came two sons. The youngest, Archibald (b. 1733, d.1806), was born at sea on the way to America. The family moved to Pound Ridge, New York about 1743. A total of six children were born to that family. John died at Pound Ridge, November, 1773.


After the Revolutionary War most of the Crawford Family moved to farmland selected by Robert, the brother who was wounded in battle and died shortly after the Revolutionary War, near the Saratoga Springs area in upstate New York. Two of the brothers who were Loyalists for religious reasons moved to Canada. Archibald, who was a Patriot, could not serve in the army because he was born without a thumb on his right hand. He later bought a hotel in the resort of Saratoga Springs. He and his wife, Mary Benedict (b. 1740, d. 1813) are buried in Whitford cemetery.

Archibald's oldest son, Daniel (b.1764, d. 1839) married Sally Bemus (b.1768, d.1865). Her father owned a popular tavern on the Hudson in Stillwater, New York and a farm on nearby Bemus Heights where one of the battles of Saratoga was waged during the Revolutionary War. They lived in the Saratoga Springs area and are buried in Whitford Cemetery. They had 8 children. Bemus Heights has acquired historical significance as the place where the battle wa fought that resulted in the capture of General Burgoyne and his army. General Gates occupied the Bemus house, as his headquarters, until after the battle of September 19, 1777, when it was occupied by General Lincoln.

One of Daniel and Sally's children, John Bemus Crawford (b. 1797, d. 1847) was trained as a teacher. He moved to Wake Forest, North Carolina where he met and married Louisa T. Harris (b. 1800, d., 1892). They settled in Goldsboro, North Carolina. John died in 1847. Louisa died in 1892 and is buried in Goldsboro, North Carolina. They had five children.

The oldest son of John B. and Louisa Crawford was James Daniel Crawford (b. 1827, d. 1914). He was born in1827. He married Charity Ann Gaddy (b.1837, d. 1911), daughter of James Gaddy of Marion County, South Carolina, in 1857. They had two children, a son, James William and a daughter, Lucy M. The family settled at Gaddysville, North Carolina where James D. owned a store and was postmaster. He also owned several farms in the vicinity. The family attended Bethany (?) Church until they helped establish Centenary Methodist Church. James D. was a member of a South Carolina unit during the War of Northern Aggression. Both are buried at Centenary.

James William Crawford (b. 1859, d. 1936) married Mary Etta McLellan (b. 1871, d. 1916) in 1887. They lived on a farm near Rowland. They had fourteen children. Mary Etta died suddenly April 15, 1916. James married Kate Carter Mclean. There was no issue by that marriage. Kate died and was buried by her first husband in Fairmont, North Carolina. James died July 14, 1936. He and Mary Etta are buried at Centenary. The Children were William James (Jim) (b. 1888), John C. (b. 1890), Maude (b. 1891) Guy S. (b. 1894), Pope P. (b. 1896), Infant (b. 1898), Ethel (b. 1901), Theodore (Buck) (b. 1903), Henry K. (b. 1905), Jewel (b. 1907), Halene (b. 1908), Lawrence (Doc) (b. 1910), Dorothy (b. 1912) and Clarence (b. 1915) Lucy M.Crawford (b. 1867, d. 1949) married William B. Gaddy (b.1867, d. 1918). They had four children, Ralph B. (b. 1892), Ruby, James H. (b 1896) and C. Badger (b. 1901). William and Lucy are buried at Dillon, South Carolina. Submitted by: Larry Crawford




Edens Family

According to family tradition, Richard Edens migrated from Maryland and settled in Marlboro County, SC in about 1772. His only known son was Rev. Allen Edens, a local Methodist Minister in the Clio area. He operated a blacksmith shop and owned large tracts of land. One of his eight sons, Morgan, married Mary Murchison. They were the parents of Letilla M., Alexander, Franklin, Allen, and Duncan Edens. In 1866 the widow, Mary Edens, moved her family to North Carolina and bought land in the Cotton Valley Community.

Willie Mae McLean was Treasurer for the Piano Fund. In the mid 1980's, she brought her records, statements and cancelled checks, to John Clarence Edens to be preserved with the Centenary History. The Hockley Piano was purchased in September 1921 at a cost of \$485.00 from Stephens & Barnes Furniture Company of Lumberton, N.C. It took approximately 10 years to complete payment. The last cancelled check written to Stephens & Barnes Furniture Company was dated August 28, 1931.

The piano is used today for the annual homecomings.

How the Stuart Family Came To The Centenary Area

Daniel Stuart, who must have come from the Maxton area, came to the Centenary area in 1833. He purchased the John Cade home place. The farm had a pre-existing pond and grist mill, which family tradition said he wanted. I do not know if he had a wife at that time or not, but, in 1836 he married Mary McCallum, who came from the North Carolina Gaddy's Mill area. She had two children, a daughter whose name was Sarah Jane Stuart, who grew up to marry Calvin Phillips. Her son's name was Archibald Stuart. His mother, Mary McCallum died when he was an infant A great Aunt, Polly Brown came and helped Daniel rear these two children. She was known to the Stuart family as Aunt Poll.

Archibald Stuart inherited part of the Daniel Stuart farm and continued to live at the Cade home place. Archibald

married Mary Ann McLellan from the Centenary area. They had six boys and four girls. Their names are John Lellan, Peter McCallum, Daniel A., Sarah Elizabeth, Harriet Rogers, Mary Margaret, Ann Flora Stuart, Robert Franklin, Quintin Asher and Martin Luther. How the Stuart-Faulk Household Came to Be

In the early 1900's the Richard Faulk farm and the Archibald Stuart farm joined. They could see each other's house. It is no surprise that Volney J. Faulk noticed that TALL Mary Margaret Stuart. They said she was a very striking person. In June 1910, Volney J. Faulk and Mary Margaret Stuart were married.

From the marriage, they had two daughters, Beatrice and Lillian, and one son, Luther. Shortly after Luther was born, Mary Margaret died. At that time the near-by Stuart household consisted of his (Luther's) Aunt Ann Flora Stuart, his Uncle Daniel A. Stuart, and his Uncle Robert F. Stuart. None of the Stuart family members were married or had any parental obligations, so they did what families did in those days, "families took care of families". I am not sure the Faulk family members were as free to do like-wise.

In the days to come, Robert F. Stuart Sr. married one of the Centenary school teachers, Evelyn Council. They had two children, Robert F. Stuart, Jr. and Ann Council Stuart. We grew up as brothers and sisters in the household that had become the Stuart-Faulk family. We had some good times.

He was a former sheriff of Bladen County, where he lived before following the turpentine industry into this area. At his death, his widow and some family went to Georgia and Alabama. It is not known if any of his descendants are buried in the Cemetery or not, but he certainly has some living in the community. A long time ago, his **daughter**, **Julia**, married, **Duncan McLellan**, and they moved near Bethesda Church. They, too, had a daughter named **Sara Lee** who had a daughter named **Vernetta**, who married **William W. Ward**, and they have a son **Zack**. John Simpson Willis is Vernetta's great, grandfather and Zack's great, great grandfather.

The Ward, Burns, and Maness Connection



The Centenary Memorial Association will forever be indebted to the Rev. Don Lee Harris. It was he who convinced the North Carolina United Methodist Conference in 1971 to make Centenary a Memorial Church and deed the Church properties to a set of Trustees who desired to preserve Centenary Church as a place that future generations descending from former members could gather and enjoy a part of their heritage.

Also unknown to many, Don Lee Harris has deep family roots reaching into the early life of Centenary Methodist Church, Centenary Public School and the Centenary community. In January 1906, the great grandparents of Don Lee, Lewis H. and Virginia Webb and family transferred their memberships from Oak Grove Methodist Church to Centenary. The Webb's immediately became active in Centenary Church with Virginia teaching a Sunday School class, and in the absence of the minister, conducting some of the regular religious church services. Two of their daughters, Vassa and Ethel can be seen in the Centenary Public School picture taken in 1906 that is included in the Centenary Public School section of this book. Lewis and Virginia Webb's daughter, Annie, was the grandmother of Don Lee. In January 1908, this Webb family moved their church memberships to Caledonia Methodist Church near Laurinburg, NC. Although the Webbs were at Centenary Church for only two years, they blazed a good trail for Don Lee Harris who arrived there 61 years later in 1969. By John C. Edens

Centenary School

Preston Page thinks he began school there in 1922. **Worth Burns**, with whom he lived got the Robeson School Board to start a school bus from his home to Centenary and **Preston** started to school at Centenary. **Miss Ollie Mae Carr** was his first grade teacher. **Robert Stuart and Pete Burns** started to school in 1928 and Miss **Estelle DeHart** was their teacher. **Robert** thinks this was her first year – she later married **John Crawford**. **Miss Carr** married a **Floyd** from Fairmont. She died just recently.

Other teachers remembered are:

Miss Mae Dennis, Miss Ruth Johnson who married J. W. Williamson, Miss Christy or Chrissie Floyd who was principal at one time, Ashby Hammond, Mary Hammond, Martha V. McLeod, later principal, Miss Evelyn Council, who began teaching in 1919 and later married Mr. Robert Stuart, Sr. Mr. J. R. Poole was County Superintendent. Miss Alease Squires later married a Mann. Others include: Ruby Ward, Lucille Floyd, Lucy Moore, Bessie Gaddy, Mary Hugh Stewart, Harriette Bullard, Ruth McIntyre, Virginia Mae Adams, Mary Hammond, Willie Mae McLean, Miss Edgerton and Alice Robinson.

Preston remembers his classmates as **Bob Burns**, James Rogers, Evelyn Hammond, Lillian Faulk, Edith Williams – all years at Centenary.

There were four classrooms with movable walls and dividers that could be opened up for assembly or Chapel. Chapel was held each morning and the students who went on to Rowland had to stand up as there were no seats for them.

Preston remembers one April Fool Day that **Mr. Worth** came to the bus and told all the students to be sure to go to school. Seems that was a day boys played hookey. He checked later in the day and found that **Cole and Willie Burns** left school. He found them, took them to school, and gave them a whipping in front of their class.

Robert Stuart had many memories of the school one of which was that they had a portable record player. Sometimes **Maxine McDonald** would come in and play the piano – made it really "rock"

Leon and Paul Stuart added that several families who came to school: one with a pony and buggy, another with a mule and wagon. There was a stall/ shelter behind the school where the mule and pony stayed during school hours. We remember the canals – the boys' was behind the cemetery and the girls' was behind the school. Jack McCormick says he "remembers how clear the water was in the canal". Jack especially remembers the pump..... the boys would pump the water and put things like a hair pins, buttons etc. in it and tell the girls that the items came from the cemetery. **Paul Watts** adds that he remembers the powdered milk they had at school – terrible taste.

Centenary School Memories by Marie Crawford

"I had a very warm concern for Centenary Church and school on my first visit to the community.

I graduated from The University of Georgia, June, 10, 1935. I had met Lawrence Crawford by accident when he went to my home town with Halene Crawford, Aunt Blanche McLellan, Dora McCormic and Guy Crawford to visit Will McCormic. He had moved to Georgia to work as a turpentine manager. Later Guy and Lawrence went back to Georgia to persuade my sister and me to teach at Centenary. At that time you received much better pay than Georgia Teachers.

Our first year at Centenary was a busy one since we had no previous experience in the teaching profession. It was a three teacher school with about one hundred pupils. The school was beginning to close out with many children going to Rowland. It took one year and half for it to completely close.

Everyone seemed to look forward to knowing the Centenary teachers. It seemed they always found their life's partners, married and established a family and became an active part of the community.

I really learned more about Centenary school and church through conversation with my new friends and relatives. They had box suppers as fund raisers. **John Crawford's** buddies bid up a beautiful decorated box prepared by **Estelle Dehart** from South Carolina. They kept the bids going fast and furious until he paid \$40.00 which was a tremendous price. He and Stelle ate supper together from the box. Soon the wedding bells begin to ring. They married and now have children and grandchildren in the community.

Miss Harriette Bullard taught during my second year and married Hal McCormick. Mrs. Robert Stuart married and has a family in the community. Lawrence Crawford and I married and lived 64 years together. Larry Crawford is our son.

As told to me – Uncle **Joe Burns** was a very Christian person with many friends and relatives in the Centenary communities. One summer there was a terrible dry spell - the crops were dying, the animals were very thirsty. A prayer meeting was called at Centenary. Uncle Joe got on his knees and looked up and prayed for rain. A cloud came over – there was thunder and a down pour of rain.

A tender occasion for me told to me by my husband, Lawrence E. Crawford..... his mother died when he was five years of age. Mr. Crawford was worried about rearing his children alone. So, he read his Bible and prayed. Lawrence said he heard his father pray behind closed doors. Hearing his father pray stayed with him all his life and helped him to be a better Christian. Mr. Crawford saw that his children were at Centenary Church every Sunday. Respectfully, Marie Robinson Crawford

Centenary School

By Harriette Bullard McCormick June 2000

"I had finished college in June of 1936 and had applied to teach in Robeson County. To be certified in North Carolina I had to take a course in N.C. History which I found available at old Wake Forest College. So I enrolled for the six-weeks course with Dr. Scaggs as my professor. The course was delightful, and I have always been grateful that it was required. I returned to my home in Nashville, Georgia and sat around waiting. I had gone to college "on a wing and a prayer" since all we had was lost in bank closings which did not repay. My father was from Elrod, and had gone to Georgia where he engaged in the naval stores industry. He always teased my mother who was a native Nashvillian saying that he took us to N.C. one time and could no longer keep us away!

At the end of September, I received a telegram from Ben Floyd who was County School Superintendent asking if I would accept a job at Centenary School located between Rowland and Fairmont. I wired my acceptance, and with three days notice, packed my possessions and rode the Atlantic Coastline train all Saturday night. I arrived on Sunday and was taken to the home where I would board. This was Cliff McCormick's home. My roommate was an old maid Mary Stewart. We had "bowl and pitcher" facilities and an "outhouse". To add to the situation part of my luggage did not arrive. I was wearing new brown suede shoes with heels. We walked a mile to the school on Monday morning through a rutted sandy road. I was gourd green, did not know much about what I was doing and wondered what I had gotten into! All my shoes were in the lost luggage which finally arrived on Thursday. My feet felt horrible but I had made it through 4 days.

My assignment was third, fourth and half of the fifth grade to teach. My classroom was the largest room in the building which served as the gathering place for chapel, PTA, etc. There were no lights as the carbide system was out of order and was not replaced. The area had no electricity. Furniture was old, the blackboard was rough and cracked and supplies were a worn eraser and chalk. Heat came from a pot-bellied stove in each room. During the school day the pupils took turns getting in wood and kindling. This was a treat for them. Water came from a pump outside which required priming.

I never had more eager students and more respectful ones in the 42 years that I taught. The faculty when I came consisted of Mary Stewart, Marie Crawford and me. Marie was from Lenox, Georgia and was pregnant and was replaced by Ruth McIntyre. Ruth taught first and second grades and Mary Stewart taught half of the fifth grade, sixth and seventh. Our enrollment was small for maintaining a separate school. The last year that the school was operated, I had 52 students. I remember teaching the Watts family and Lee Shepherd's children. Most of the children were from tenant families. Other families sent their children to Rowland School by bus. The bus came early to leave Centenary students and late to pick them up. Most of our days began at 7:30 A.M. and ended at 5:00 or 5:30 P.M. We had chapel every morning with Bible reading which Mary Stewart did, a Bible story which I did and we all sang. (we had an old piano). When there were services at the Centenary Church, we attended funerals or whatever.

Families in the community were very hospitable to us and we ate many delicious meals with them (the **Thad McCormicks**, the **Burns**, the **Wards**, the **Millers**, the **Stewarts**, the **Ayers** and others).

It was inevitable by 1942 that the school enrollment had dropped too low to maintain it and we were transferred to the Rowland School. We had lost one teacher – **Mary Stewart** went to another county school – and **Ruth McIntyre** and I ran the show. We were heartbroken to move, but it had to be.

Lucille Floyd was added to our faculty when enrollment was high enough to need an additional teacher. She, Mary Stewart and I roomed and boarded at Floyd Currie's. In December 1940, Hal and I married, Lucille moved on and Ruth McIntyre and I went to Rowland.

The school was a landmark and I hated to see it demolished. I attended the Centenary Church and loved it. **Hal** attended too, and transferred from the country Baptist church his parents had attended at Pleasant Hill. I taught the Intermediates in Sunday School at Centenary. Our classroom was whatever car was available. They were a joy to teach. I remember **Robert Stuart, Carl Edens, Jr., Pete Burns** in the class.

The first funeral I attended was **Joe Burns'** service at the Burns' home. I helped with the singing -a quartet I think."

Centenary Memories

of Esther Hall Stone - Mrs. Carl Stone

Although I wasn't at Centenary for a long period of time, the memories I have are cherished. I finished the 8th grade there in about 1930. I especially remember Miss Martha V. McLeod. She was very kind to the students and conscious that some did not have enough to eat, brought very little for lunch. Some days she would suggest that the class make soup for the next day, asking any students who wanted to, to bring whatever they could, but not calling on a student. My mother always canned tomatoes so that's what I would bring. Others brought potatoes, carrots, turnips and Miss McLeod would bring whatever else was needed. That soup smelled so good cooking on the pot-bellied stove. We would be almost starving before it got ready for us to eat. All the students had to bring their own spoons and bowls. I could bring my biscuit also or whatever I usually brought. The boys took turns going to the woods to cut wood for the stove. They brought it to the schoolhouse and the girls helped bring it in.

There was a canal behind the school – one side was for the boys and the other for the girls and you didn't cross over. If the boys wanted to tease the girls it had to be on the road. The students were respectful to the teachers and to each other. They might get loud or noisy, but all the teacher had to do was point at the student to correct him/her. When the door was opened for us to go out for recess, I remember how **Pete Burns** would get on his hands, feet straight in the air and walk out the door, across the porch and down the steps. (This tale has been repeated by several others talking of their Centenary Days.) Others tried to do this including girls, but we never succeeded.

Mr. Robert Stuart, Sr. let the teachers drive his car that they called "Sweet Marie". Miss McLeod usually was the driver. If the car stopped or wouldn't start, the boys would all push it hard and fast (sometimes across the church yard) until she got it started, usually with students in the car. We thought Miss McLeod was an old maid but later she married a Mr. Matthews.

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH OF CENTENARY PASTORS

{Recorded in 1935 ; updated 2000 by Editor}

CHAFFIN, WASHINGTON S. Born, 1815, Stokes County, North Carolina. Joined the North Carolina Conference at Mocksville, 1840. Died and was buried at Jonesboro, North Carolina, 1895. Served Centenary, 1882.

AVENT, ISAAC W. Born, 1823, Chatham County, North Carolina. Joined the North Carolina Conference at Raleigh, 1853. Died and was buried at Chalk Level, North Carolina. Served Centenary, 1883.

HORNADY, JOHN A. Born, 1853, Randolph County, North Carolina. Joined the North Carolina Conference at Wilmington, 1884. Died and was buried at Maxton, North Carolina, 1926 Served Centenary, 1884-'85.

SANFORD, JONATHAN, Born, 1854, Richmond County, North Carolina. Joined the North Carolina Conference at Fayetteville, 1872. Died at Siler City and was buried at Lumberton, North Carolina. Served Centenary, 1886-'88; 1893-'94.

HOYLE, SAMUEL V. Born, 1836, Georgetown, District of Columbia. Joined the North Carolina Conference at Norfolk, Virginia, 1854. Died and was buried at Jonesboro, North Carolina, 1892. Served Centenary, 1889-'90.

JURNEY, N. M. was located 1900. Served Centenary, 1891-'92.

POPE, ERSKINE was located at the North Carolina Conference in Rocky Mount in 1906, at his own written request. Served Centenary, 1895-'98.

HARRISON, Z. T. Born, 1849, Rockingham, North Carolina. Joined the North Carolina Conference, 1871. Died and was buried at Rockingham, North Carolina, 1904. Served Centenary, 1899-1900.

ALLRED, BARZILLAI C. Born 1849 Randolph County, NC. Joined the North Carolina Conference 1883 in Statesville, NC. Superannuated. After retirement from Conference, he lived in Oxford, North Carolina until his death November 5, 1935. Served Centenary, 1901-'02.

BRADLEY, JAMES WILLIAM Born 1871 McDowell County, NC. Joined the North Carolina Conference 1899 at Washington, NC. After retirement from Conference, he lived in Cary and Raleigh, North Carolina until his death March 28, 1961. Buried at Montlawn Memorial Park in Raleigh, NC. Served Centenary, 1903-'06 {First year of the formation of the Rowland Circuit}.

ASHBY, J. M. Born, 1851, Patrick County, Virginia. Joined the North Carolina Conference at Statesville, 1883. Died in Elm City and was buried at Mount Airy, North Carolina, 1915. Served Centenary, 1907-'08.

McCALL, F. B. Born, 1858, Richmond County later became Scotland County, North Carolina. Joined the North Carolina Conference at Wilson, 1879. Died at Laurel Hill and was buried at Gibson, North Carolina, 1928. Served Centenary, 1909-11.

LEE, JACOB A. Born, 1856, Cleveland County, North Carolina. Joined the North Carolina Conference at Raleigh, 1882. Died at Shelby, North Carolina, 1932. Served Centenary 1912 – '15.

GROVES, ANDREW JAMES Born 1857 Duplin County, NC. Joined the North Carolina Conference 1896 in Kinston, NC . Superannuated. After retirement from Conference, he lived in Sanford, North Carolina. until his death April 19, 1942 in his eighty-fifth year. Buried in Sanford. Served Centenary, 1916-'19.

MERRITT, WILLIAM CALHOUN Born 1866 Sampson County, NC. Joined the North Carolina Conference 1893 at Wilmington, NC. After his retirement from the North Carolina Conference, he lived in Durham, North Carolina until his death June 14, 1940. He is buried in Durham. Served Centenary, 1920-'22.

WOODALL, Preston DeWitt. Born 1872 Johnston County, NC. Joined the North Carolina Conference 1899 in Washington, NC. Died in 1957, buried Oakdale Cemetery, Wilmington, NC. Served Centenary, 1923 - '27.

JONES, CHARLES. A. Born 1869 Moore County, NC. Joined the North Carolina Conference 1903 in Goldsboro, NC. Died July 20, 1952. Buried Fuquay Springs, NC. Served Centenary 1928.

LANNING, JESSE HERBERT Born 1894 at Tyro. Joined the North Carolina Conference 1917 in Asheville, NC. Died May 14, 1981 and is buried Bethel Cemetery, Linwood, NC. Served Centenary, 1929-'30.

EXPLANATIONS AND SUGGESTIONS

1. The names should be recorded in chronological order.

2. The beauty of the book will be enhanced by using a plain black ink in making all entries. Pencil marks mar the appearance of the register.

3. The law requires that the first name should be written in full. To illustrate: write James E. Brown, not J.E. Brown.

4. If a mistake should be made in an entry, it should be carefully erased.

5. Observe the following, when recording the names of members : use the third column under head of "To who Married" *only* when a woman (whose name is already on the roll) marries, then insert in this column *only* the surname of the man to whom she is married. To illustrate : the name of Mary Jones appears on the register, she marries a Mr. Johnson; simply find her name on the roll and write "Johnson" opposite her name in the column under "To whom Married." This obviates the necessity of recording her name in a new place, which would derange the chronological accuracy of the record. Under the general heading, "When and How Received," write under the proper sub.heading *only the date* of reception. Thus: 10 Jan, '90," rather than "Jan. 10,'90, or January 10, 1890. In the column, "By whom Received," write the name of the preacher who officiates at the reception, and not the name of the pastor unless he receives the member in person. Under the general heading, "When and How Removed," as in reception. Thus: "15 Nov., '90." 6. On the last double page of the book provision is made for the "Annual Summary of Members. After the name of the pastor is written, then write in the next column headed. "Conference Year Ending," *only* the date of the close of the conference year. Thus: "10 Oct., '90 Then write in figures in the proper place as indicated in the headings the whole number of conversions, receptions or removals, during the conference year. In giving the total number received and removed. In making up the net increase or decrease do not take the difference between the total number received and removed, write the preceding year and the membership of the present year. In the column headed, "Present number," write the present number of members in the Church.

Jan. 1931

Then election of officers for 1931. Place of meeting was at the home of **Mrs. J.W. Burns**. Closing with prayer by **Mrs. Burns**.

Feb. 1931

The Jan. meeting was held at the home of **Mrs. J W. Burns**. Opening Hymn 633 – "*Tell ye the Story*", followed by Lord's Prayer in unison. Roll called, six members present. Topic for Worship – "The Lordship of Christ Recognized". Scripture lesson – "The Rich Ruler", Mark 10;17-23 read by Pres. A letter from Johnathon to Zaccheus read by **Mrs. Burns**. Zaccheu's reply to Johnathon's letter given by Mrs. J.L. Stuart. A short discussion of article in voice "Hatching Happiness' on Tithening . The next place of meeting with **Mrs. C.C.** and **Miss Cora Edens**. Closed with prayer by **Mrs. Burns**. All enjoyed refreshments and hospitality of **Mrs. Burns**.

March 1931

A paper of expansion or explanation on the chap. of Proverbs was given by Mrs. Petty. Singing Hymn #411 closing with Prayer by Pastor. All enjoying the hospitality of Mrs. And Miss Stuart during the social hour in their home.

The Mar. meeting not held as it was a snowy day. Mar. 9

Worshiping Service Theme: "Finding God in Great Causes: Scripture lesson taken from Mat. 28th Chap & 10:12 and 23rd verses. Topics of study: "The McTyeire School & its work for China read by **Mrs. Stuart** and "The M.E. Church South and China's Forward Movement read **by Mrs. Ward**. Song "*O Master Let Me Walk With Thee*", Place of Oct. meeting given by **Mrs. Floyd Currie**. Closed with prayer. All greatly enjoyed the social hour and hospitality of **Mrs. Ward** and daughter.

Homecoming Minutes 1950 - 2000

1950 – A brief history of Centenary Methodist Church was read by Lacy T. Edens, historian, on Homecoming Day which was held at Centenary on Sunday, August 27, 1950. The sermon for this occasion was preached by Jack Ward Page – a native of the community and pastor of the Methodist Church at Robbins, North Carolina. His subject was "DOOMED PASTS AND LIVING FUTURES", based on Isaiah 51:1-11. He remained throughout the week and preached each night.

Since Homecoming Day, the church building at Centenary has undergone renovation on the inside, which included installation of a gas heating plant at the cost of \$1611.37 The outside of the building was painted at a cost of \$758.10 making a total of \$2,369.47.

Since last Homecoming, Centenary has received into church membership by transfer J. Mack Straughn and removed by death, Miss Cora B. Edens.

1951 – Homecoming day was observed at Centenary Methodist Church with a sermon by Madison Ward Maness – whose youth was spent in the community and is at present pastor at Mount Gilead Methodist Church. His subject was "THE SECRET OF HAPPY LIVING", based on Matthew 20:28.

In the afternoon, a history of the church was read, much informal singing was enjoyed, and **Jack Ward Page** of Robbins spoke at the memorial service in memory of Miss **Cora B. Edens**, and mention was made of other members now deceased. His remarks were based on Hebrew 12: "Wherefore, seeing we are encompassed by so great a crowd of witnesses."

1952 – Homecoming Day was observed at Centenary on October 12, 1952. Speaker for the day was a young lawyer from Fayetteville – **J. C. Ward, Jr.** He used as his subject "OUR PRECIOUS HERITAGE", based on I Peter 1:3,4,5.

The afternoon service was given over to congregational singing and business affairs. The program was concluded with a memorial service for **William Henry McLellan, Jr.** who paid the supreme sacrifice in the Korean War. The speaker for this service was Lawyer **Robert Campbell** of Rowland. **Hal D. Burns, Jr.** received infant baptism on Mother's Day.

1953 – Homecoming was observed on August 30, 1953. The sermon was preached by Leonard Theodore (Ted) Wilson of Goldsboro – son of W. C. Wilson who was a pastor on the Rowland Circuit. Sermon text was Hebrews 11:24,25. In the afternoon, an obituary on Mrs. Julia Williams Hammond was read.

1954 – Centenary Methodist Church observed its annual homecoming on August 29, 1954. **B. M. Madison** addressed the congregation and was assisted in the program by representatives of the Methodist Orphanage in Raleigh,

NC. under the direction of Mr. Hammack.. Memorials were for John W. Ward, Jr. and Miss Swanna Faulk

1955 – Homecoming Day was observed on August 28, 1955. Pastor Martin R. Chambers presided over the morning service. A Rowland Quartette composed of Warren Cook, Paul Smith, Henry McKellar, and James Johnson (Mrs. Paul {Jean Graham} Smith, accompanist) rendered several selections. Van W. Bullock, whose ancestors were residents of the community, preached a sermon on "WORLD PEACE".

A brief afternoon session presided over by J. W. Page, (Pastor of Fairmont Methodist Church in Raleigh and a native of the community) was held. History of the church was read by Lacy T. Edens. After some general remarks by the people, a committee was appointed for future considerations of homecoming. John Richard Burns received Holy Baptism during the year.

1956 – The annual homecoming of Centenary Methodist Church was held on August 26, 1956. Pastor Martin R. Chambers presided over the morning worship service. Pianist for the choir was Miss Joyce Pate. Miss Jackie Ward sang a solo, "*Eternal God, Our Father*". The Reverend W. L. Loy, minister of Macedonia Methodist Church, Raleigh, NC and former pastor at Centenary, preached on "CHOICE OF HIGHEST VALUES", based on Matthew 7:24. Mrs. Benjamin O.{Iola} Burns and Mrs. James Gaddy {Polly} Ward, Jr. were welcomed into the membership of Centenary.

At two o'clock, a memorial service was held for Mrs. Della Thompson, Mrs. Bessie B. Ward and Joseph C. Ward, Sr.

1957 – Homecoming was observed on August 25, 1957. Pastor J. H. Parrish presided over the service. Mrs. Emma Jean Hammond, accompanied by Miss Jackie Ward, presented a solo, "*The Lord Is My Light*." Robert F. Stuart, a kinsman of the speaker, introduced with appropriate remarks, the Rev. E. M. Thompson, Jr. of the Cavel Charge at Roxboro, NC.

In the afternoon, the **Rev. Lacy T. Edens** presided over a memorial service for **Robert Taylor McCormick**, **Mrs. Bertha Easterling McGirt and Jay Hammond**. Mention was made of **Mrs. Beulah McGirt Miller** who once lived in the community and was recently buried at Centenary and the recent death of **Rev. P. D. Woodall**, who served Centenary as pastor 1923-27.

Dr. Benjamin Ward of Whiteville presided over a brief business session at which time Gaddy Ward, Sr. was elected president, B.O. Burns, vice president and Mrs. Clifford Hammond, secretary, and Mr. Lacy Edens chairman of the memorial committee. Since the last homecoming, a new cover has been put on the church building and new steps have been placed at the entrance at an approximate cost of \$1400.00. James Gaddy Ward, III received infant baptism on Palm Sunday.

1958 – At the ninth annual homecoming, Pastor J. H. Parrish was in charge of the morning service and preached on "THE PRODIGAL COMES HOME" Luke 15:11-32. Miss Joyce Pate was in charge of music and accompanied Miss Jackie Ward as she sang "And God Shall Wipe Away All Tears."

After a sumptuous dinner and social gathering on the grounds, the congregation reassembled for the memorial service. Memorials were given for the following: Homer B. Ward, Mrs. Sally C. McCormic Connelley, and Jessie Worth Burns. Mention was made of the death of Donald

McLeod, who in his boyhood attended Sunday School at this church.

Music for the afternoon service was led by the **Rev.** Kenneth Neuenschwander of the Rowland Baptist Church. A solo "Count Your Many Blessing" was sung by Mary Annis Crawford and accompanied by Jackie Ward. Frank Page of Elm City, NC presided over the business session. Lucy Elaine Burns, Robert Worth Burns, William Wade Ward, Robbie Allen {Stuart}, Robert Franklin {Stuart} III, and Joseph Daniel Stuart were baptized during the year. Next year's homecoming chairman will be Preston McArthur, vice president, Gaddy Ward, Mrs. Clifford Hammond re-elected secretary.

1959 – The tenth annual Homecoming Day at Centenary Methodist Church was held August 23, 1959. Pastor J. H. Parrish presided and introduced the **Rev. Jack Ward** Page, native son and now pastor at Hay Street Methodist Church in Fayetteville, NC. **Rev. Page** preached on "CHRIST AND YOUR LIFE". After the benediction and blessing the congregation assembled on the church grounds for the usual feast and social hour.

Rev. Parrish led the afternoon session. A solo, "*This is a* Story of Jesus" was sung by Wesley Ward and accompanied by his sister, Jackie Ward. Frank Page conducted the business session, and Lacy T. Edens presided over the memorial service. Memorials were read for Miss Sarah Stuart and Leslie Stuart Thompson.

1960 – Homecoming Day was observed at Centenary Methodist Church on August 28, 1960. The **Rev. J. W.** Page presided at the morning worship service in the absence of **Pastor Parrish**. A former pastor of the Rowland Charge, **Rev. W. Carleton Wilson**, was our guest for the occasion. Misses **Kay Neil Hall** and **Sarah Lee Sellars** rendered special music for the service.

In the afternoon memorials were given for Mrs. Julia Thompson Miller and Mrs. Alice Oliver Burns. Ben Ward conducted the business session.

1961 – Centenary Methodist Church held its annual homecoming on August 27, 1961. The morning service was presided over by the **Pastor Frank D. Salmon**, who also preached the sermon on "THE GREATEST" based on John 3:16. **Mr. and Mrs. Salmon** rendered a duet and were accompanied by Miss Sarabeth Pate who was in charge of the music.

After a bountiful repast on the church lawn, the congregation reassembled for the memorial session. **Robert F. Stuart** presented memorials for: J. W. Bradley, pastor at Centenary 1903-1906; W. L. Loy, pastor 1945-49; and Mrs. J. H. Lanning, whose husband was pastor in 1929-30. Henry K. Crawford presided at the business session.

1962 - Homecoming Day was observed on August 26, 1962. The morning service was presided over by Pastor Frank D. Salmon. Native son Madison W. Maness led the morning prayer. The Rev. Jack W. Page, now serving as District Superintendent of the Rocky Mount District, preached an inspiring sermon on "THE INFLUENCE OF CHRIST THROUGH THE AGES" based on Matt. 8:1-14. Miss Sarabeth Pate, was in charge of the music, accompanied Earle Stubbs, who rendered a solo, "Hold Thou My Hand."

The congregation enjoyed an hour of fellowship and a bountiful repast under the shade trees on the lawn of the church. The pastor presided at the afternoon service. Lacy T. Edens, memorials chairman, presented the following memorials: Mrs. Bessie W. McCormick McArn; Mrs. Lota Lee McLean Grimsley; Mrs. Fannie Belle Taylor McCormick; William Herman Edens; Walter M. Edens, and Daniel Archibald Stuart. Henry K. Crawford presided at a brief business session when Carl C. Edens was elected chairman. The service concluded with the benediction by Lacy T. Edens. Hal D. Burns, Jr. and Robbie Allen Stuart were welcomed into the membership of Centenary.

1963 – The fourteenth annual homecoming was held on August 25, 1963. **Pastor Frank D. Salmon** led the morning service. A trio composed of the **Misses Betsy Butler, Faye Bullock, and Rachael Frazier** sang "*Sing Aloud To God*" accompanied by **John Wesley Ward, III.** A former pastor, **J. H. Parrish** preached on "THE HOMECOMING OF THE PRODIGAL SON" from the text Luke 15:18.

The usual picnic lunch was enjoyed by all.

Pastor Frank Salmon presided at the afternoon meeting with Wesley Ward at the piano. The following memorials were read: Frank Edens; Eros B. Gaddy; Charles Hammond; Fred McLean; J. Burns Ward. The memorial program ended with the chairman, Lacy T. Edens, reading "The Rainy Day", a poem Henry Wadsworth Longfellow wrote on the death of his wife. Carl Edens presided over a brief business session. The meeting concluded with the benediction by Rev. Salmon.

1964 – The annual homecoming at Centenary was observed on August 23, 1964. **Pastor Frank D. Salmon** presided at the morning worship service. **Miss Jeanette Stone** rendered a solo, "*I Love To Dwell In Spirit*", accompanied by **Wesley Ward**, music chairman for the day. The sermon was by the **Rev. J. W. Page**, Rocky Mount District Superintendent and native son. **Rev. Van Bullock** led the morning prayer.

At the afternoon meeting, Lacy T. Edens read a memorial for the late William Carl McCormic, whose death occurred in Georgia but who was a native of the Centenary community. Carl C. Edens conducted a brief business session when the same officers were re-elected. J. W. Page gave the benediction. A new parsonage for the Rowland Charge was occupied in November 1963.

1965 – The sixteenth annual homecoming at Centenary Methodist Church was observed on August 15, 1965. Pastor Warner R. Heston presided at the morning worship service. Bishop Paul N. Garber was the guest speaker, giving historical data concerning the founding of the Methodist Church and its spread in America. Other eminent guests were the Rev. Barney L. Davidson, Fayetteville District Superintendent and the Rev. J. W. Page, Rocky Mount District Superintendent.

At the afternoon service memorials were read for W. **Thad McCormic** and **Mrs. I. R. Phillips**. Since last homecoming, the church has been painted and minor repairs made to the steeple, shutters and ventilators at a cost of approximately \$690.00.

1966 - Homecoming Day was observed at Centenary on August 28, 1966. The **Rev. Madison W. Maness** (native son) was the guest speaker for the day. J. Wesley Ward, III and Mrs. Paul {Jean Graham}Smith had charge of the special music. A memorial service was held for Guy S. Crawford and Mrs. Esther M. Edens.

Carl C. Edens presided over a short business session and the same officers were re-elected.

1967 – Centenary Methodist Church observed its annual homecoming on August 27, 1967. The **Rev. Howard M. McLamb**, Executive Director of the Conference Board of Evangelism, was our guest speaker.

After the usual picnic lunch and social hour, the congregation reassembled for the memorial service. Pastor W. R. Heston opened the meeting with prayer. Carl Edens introduced Robert F. Stuart who presented these memorials: Mrs. Harriet Hammond, W. Preston McArthur and Henry K. Crawford.

C. C. Edens presided over the business session. The Rev. Lacy T. Edens resigned as memorials chairman and moved that Robert F. Stuart be made permanent chairman. The Rev. J. W. Page expressed his/our thanks to "Mr. Lacy" for serving so faithfully in the past. Present officers were re-elected. The Rev. Heston closed the service with prayer. A brass altar cross has been presented to the church in memory of H. K. Crawford. John Richard Burns was welcomed into the membership of Centenary.

1968 – The nineteenth annual Centenary homecoming was observed on August 25, 1968. The **Rev. J. W. Page**, native son and now pastor at Hayes Barton United Methodist Church in Raleigh, NC, presided over the services. The **Rev. Michael L. Hale**, pastor of the St. John's United Methodist Church in Fayetteville and husband of the former **Miss Jane Stuart** of this community, was the guest speaker. **Mrs. {Jane} Hale** presented special music.

Following the morning worship service, the **Rev. Page** led the blessing and a bountiful picnic lunch was spread. Good food and fellowship were enjoyed by all present.

The afternoon session opened with prayer. The **Rev. Page** paid tribute to the late **Rev. Lacy T. Edens**, who had in the past been in charge of memorials. He continued by sharing some of his fond memories of growing up in the community - of family – of friends. Memorials chairman **Robert F. Stuart** prepared the following: **The Rev. Lacy T. Edens; John A. Edens; Mrs. Pearl M. Johnson; and Miss Ann Flora Stuart**. Homecoming chairman **Carl C. Edens** conducted a short business session and the meeting dismissed with the benediction.

1969 - The 1969 Centenary Homecoming was held the fourth Sunday, August 24th. The Rev. Don Lee Harris, pastor of the church, presided at the morning worship service. Mrs. Diane Bethea was pianist and presented special musical selections. The Rev. Robert C. Flynn, a former student pastor of this charge and now serving Coats United Methodist Church and completing his undergraduate work at Methodist College in Fayetteville, was the guest speaker for the day. The text was Ephesians 2:4-10 and his meditation emphasized "Repentance, Faith, Love". At the conclusion of this remark, he sang the hymn, "More Love to Thee".

After the worship service, the **Rev. Harris** asked the blessing and everyone enjoyed a delicious picnic lunch.

The **Rev. Jack Ward Page** led the afternoon service. With **Mrs. Ann Burns Tarkington** at the piano, those gathered joined in singing the hymn, "*From All That Dwell Below the Skies.*" **Rev. Page's** remarks were concerned with how nice it is to come back for homecoming.

There were no memorials this year. The present committee was re-elected. After singing "*Blest Be The Tie That Binds*", the **Rev. Madison Maness** offered the closing prayer and gave the benediction.

Weatherwise – those who had been attending the homecoming for a number of years remarked that it was the most nearly perfect picnic day remembered.

1970 – The 1970 annual homecoming was held at Centenary United Methodist Church on August 23, 1970. With **Wes Ward** presenting special music, our pastor, the **Rev. Don Lee Harris** conducted the morning worship service. The **Rev. M. W. Maness**, recently retired from fulltime service and former member at Centenary, offered the morning prayer. **Mr. Harris'** meditation, based on Hebrews 13:8 (Phillips Translation) asked three questions: First: "Have you changed any since last year?" Second: "Has the world changed any since last year?" Third: "Have you changed any more toward Christ, since last year?" The **Rev. J. W. Page** gave the closing prayer, benediction and blessing before adjourning to the yard for the usual bountiful lunch.

The Rev. Page presided at the afternoon session with Wes Ward again at the piano. The congregation joined in singing hymn 402, "And Are We Yet Alive". Mr. Page's comments concerned these "somewhat sentimental homecomings". Robert F. Stuart, memorials chairman, prepared the following tributes (most ever): Claude Faulk, read by Clarence Edens; H.D. "Pete Burns, by Bob Page; Mrs. Lillian Faulk Floyd, by Bob Burns; Floyd Currie by Abe Howell; Wyche F. McCormick by Cliff Hammond; Lacy Gaddy by Robert Stuart. It was announced that William Burns had died on August 13, 1970. A period of silent prayer preceded a memorial prayer by Mr. Page.

Homecoming Chairman C. C. Edens held a brief business session in which last years minutes were read and the day's collection was given as \$417.00.

Some discussion on revising the committee was presented and it was decided that **Mr. Edens** be re-elected as chairman and he is to fill any committee now vacant (by death or moving away) with those "who will get the job done". **Mrs. C. C. {Myrtle Ward} Edens** asked to be relieved from the music committee and suggested that **Wes Ward, Jim Ward** and **Lucy Burns** be placed on it. The **Rev. Page** pronounced the benediction.

Weatherwise – Threatening skies gave way to sunshine and a nice breeze.

1971 – The Centenary Memorial Association, formerly Centenary United Methodist Church, held its annual homecoming on August 22, 1971.

The **Rev. Don Lee Harris** presided over the morning worship service. John Wesley Ward, III, pianist, and Miss Mackie Butler, soloist, presented special music, "God Is My Salvation" by L. Calder.

On behalf of the Methodist Conference, C. C. Edens presented the church deed to the Centenary Memorial Association chairman, **Robert F. Stuart**, Jr. The **Rev. W. A. Tew** of Enfield, pastor when these homecoming services were begun (1950) brought the message entitled "Wonderful Words of Life".

The **Rev. Frank Salmon** of Shallotte, NC returned thanks on the churchyard where the usual bountiful picnic dinner was spread.

The afternoon session with the **Rev. Harris** again presiding opened with the congregation singing "Faith of Our Fathers". Mr. Harris' remarks "our continuing process of faith." Robert Stuart, memorials chairman, gave the tribute to John David Stuart and mention was make of Mrs. Gaines (Testa) Phillips whose interment was here at Centenary the past week following her death in an automobile accident. C. C. Edens conducted a brief business session when present officers were re-elected. Mr. Edens announced that the following persons had been named as the Board of Trustees of the new Centenary Memorial Association: Robert F. Stuart, Jr., Chairman; Hal Douglas Burns, Jr.; John Clarence Edens; Clifford Marvin Hammond; James Gaddy Ward, Jr. Mr. Harris pronounced the benediction.

1972 – The Centenary Memorial Association observed their homecoming on August 27, 1972. Wes Ward, pianist, presented a varied musical program. The choir sang "Turn Back, O Man" and Miss Mackie Butler rendered a solo, "*But the Lord Is Mindful*" by Mendelsohn. The **Rev. Don Lee Harris** presided over the morning service assisted by The **Rev. J. W. Page.** Guest minister was **the Rev. W. C. Wilson**, pastor of the Rowland Charge from 1939-1944 and now retired (living in Raleigh). His sermon was entitled "Hallmarks of the Vital Christian Faith" with the scripture lesson from the book of Ruth.

The Rev. Page pronounced the benediction and we adjourned to the yard where a most enjoyable picnic lunch was served.

The congregation joined in singing the hymn "Abide With Me" to open the afternoon session. The Rev. Harris read appropriate scripture and his remarks were concerned with our being able "to remember those of the church family and church fellowship who have died this past year", and how "we must have faith as we remember". All observed a period of silent prayer and Mr. Harris concluded with a memorial prayer. Robert F. Stuart, memorials chairman, prepared the following memorials: J. W.{James Worth} "Jake" Burns, a former member at Centenary.; Wyvis Phillips, a former member at Centenary; Ernest Miller, attended Centenary in early life but was never a member; Matthew L. Page, of the Centenary community. Mr. C. C. Edens conducted the business session. Mr. J. Gaddy Ward made a motion that the money which was in the name of the Centenary Memorial Association on Certificate of Deposit in the Southern National Bank of Rowland be placed in the Centenary Cemetery Fund and that as funds were needed for the Centenary Memorial Association said funds could be removed from Centenary Cemetery Fund into the checking account of the Centenary Memorial Association. Mr. Robert Stuart seconded the motion which was carried without a dissenting vote. On a motion by Robert Stuart, the homecoming committee will remain the same. After the group joined in singing "God Be With You Til We Meet Again", Mr. Harris pronounced the benediction.

1973 – The annual homecoming of Centenary Memorial United Methodist Church was observed on a partly cloudy and mild day, August 26, 1973.

The **Rev. Don Lee Harris** presided over the eleven o'clock worship service and gave the sermon. The lesson from the Holy Scriptures was from the 2nd chapter of Philippians (the text being (9-11) "wherefore God also hath highly exalted him, and given him a name which is above every name; That at the name of JESUS every knee should bow, of things in heaven and things under the earth; and that every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the Glory of God the Father." **James Gaddy Ward, III**, was in charge of music and Miss Mary Ann Moore presented a solo, "*Let There Be Peace On Earth*" by Miller and Jackson.

The Rev. Michael Hale of Elfand, NC offered a prayer of Thanksgiving for good fellowship and good food after which everyone enjoyed the generous picnic spread.

At 1:30 a brief business session was held. Mr. Carl C. Edens, chairman, presided. The group joined in singing hymn 416, "Blest Be the Tie That Binds" accompanied by Miss Lucy Burns at the piano. Madison Maness inquired {about} the old church records which are at present at the J. Gaddy Ward home. It is hoped that they can be placed here in the church vestibule in a suitable desk or case. Questioned about a marker for the church, Jimmy Ward said he is planning to see about one. After a brief discussion, Leon Stuart was asked to be in charge of markers for some of the graves in the cemetery. He consented to serve. Mrs. Louise Nye made a motion that the same committee serve again, which, of course carried unanimously. Mr. Harris gave the benediction. In Raymond Leslie Miller and Mrs. Ethel Memorial: Miller Lynch.

1974 – The Twenty-fifth annual homecoming was held at Centenary on August 25, 1974 – another partly cloudy, warm and humid day – the twenty-fifth year of good picnic weather.

James Gaddy Ward, III was responsible for the music. Miss Mary Ann Moore sang "*Give Us This Day*" by Kaye and Day. The **Rev. Don Lee Harris** of the Rowland United Methodist Church gave the Meditation entitled "God Is Good". The text was 1st Chronicles 16:34 – "O Give thanks unto the Lord for God is good – and his steadfast love endures forever." During the announcements, **Mr. Carl C. Edens** gave the memorials for the past year: **Murphy B. McLean, Ernest G. Ayers, and Cole Page**. A period of silent prayer was observed.

The **Rev. Madison Maness** gave the closing prayer and benediction including the dinner blessing. A sumptuous picnic lunch was served in the churchyard.

The singing of hymn 416, "Blest Be the Tie That Binds", opened the afternoon session accompanied by Jim Ward at the piano. Mr. C. C. Edens, chairman, presided and thanked all the various committees for their hard work. Mr. Harris explained about the combined Methodist/Presbyterian Youth Group cleaning the church and the church yard. A donation from the church to the Youth group was, in turn, their gift to the local rescue squad to help in purchasing a resuscitator.

Bob Burns made a motion that the committee remain the same with the exception that **Cliff Hammond** be made alternate chairman. It was seconded by **Robert Stuart** and carried unanimously by the group. The session dismissed with the singing of "*God Be With You Til We Meet Again.*"

1975 – The twenty-sixth annual homecoming was observed by the Centenary Memorial Association on a very hot and humid August 24, 1975. **The Rev. Don Lee Harris** presided at the worship service and presented the morning sermon. **James Gaddy Ward**, **III** had charge of music and **Mrs. Robert O. Bridgers**, soloist, offered "*Come Ye Blessed*" by J. P. Scott.

The **Rev. Madison W. Maness** gave the benediction and everyone adjourned to the church yard for fellowship and food.

With Wes Ward at the piano, the afternoon session opened with the singing of hymn 416, "Blest Be the Tie That Binds". Chairman Carl C. Edens presided over the business session. Mrs. C. H. {Carolyn} Hammond read the minutes of the 1974 homecoming. Mr. Carl expressed to Mr. Harris and all the ladies his thanks to each for his/her part in "making this a good day." There was a brief discussion to change the time for annual homecoming but no action was taken. The collection was \$432.00.

Upon a motion by **Robert Stuart** and seconded by **J. Gaddy Ward**, the committee will remain the same. The day's events adjourned with prayer by **Mr. Harris**. The congregation for worship service was smaller than usual due to the very hot weather. The men had removed their coats prior to the service at the suggestion of **Mr. Harris**. The Methodist/Presbyterian Youth Group had helped clean the church and grounds again this year. Memorials: Daisy B. Ward.

1976 - The Twenty-seventh homecoming was observed at Centenary Church on August 22, 1976. The Rev. Al Morris of the Rowland United Methodist Church presided at the worship service and delivered the sermon entitled "Re-entry, For Fine Homecoming" was the text: "And while they looked steadfastly toward heaven as he went up, behold two men stood by them in white apparel; which also said, "Ye men of Galilee, why stand ye gazing unto heaven? This same Jesus, which is taken up from you into Heaven, shall so come in like manner as ye have seen him go into heaven." Acts 1:10-11. John Wesley Ward, III, tenor sang "The Gifts of Love" by Hopson - accompanied by James Gaddy Ward, III, who also presented other appropriate musical selections. Mr. Morris pronounced the benediction and asked the blessing. Then everyone enjoyed a bountiful picnic lunch and fellowship in the church vard.

The afternoon session was presided over by Co-chairman Clifford H. Hammond. The group joined in singing "Blest Be the Tie That Binds". Mr. Hammond expressed a vote of thanks to Maude Allen Stuart, Emily Stuart, Iola and Mary Alice Burns and Parthenia Ward for their part in cleaning the church. Harvey Maness reported on several relatives with Centenary connections and expressed his "great pleasure at being back at Centenary. Robert Worth Burns made a motion that the homecoming committee remain the same - seconded by Frank Page, and approved by the group. The collection for the day was \$697.00. B. O. Burns made a motion to express to J. Gaddy Ward how much he was missed today at the first homecoming he had ever missed. The entire group seconded the motion. Bill Page of Riverside, California offered a few words of observation on seeing so many of the folks and his renewed faith by just being here at Centenary today. Jack W. Page made a few remarks concerning the continuation of these homecoming services. Robert F. Stuart moved that the meeting adjourn and J. W. Page pronounced the benediction. A cool overcast morning was pleasant for the worship service. By time to put away the tables and finish straightening out the church yard, it was hot and humid! Memorials: Victor Bryan Beck, Leon Douglas Edens, Alton Lee Gaddy, Gilbert Worth Stuart.

Weatherwise: A cool overcast morning turning into a warm and humid day.

1977 – The 1977 homecoming at Centenary Church was observed on the fourth Sunday, August 28th. The **Rev. Al Morris** of the Rowland United Methodist Church brought the message – "SOUL – FOOD" WAS THE TEXT FROM Amos 8:11 – "Behold, the days are coming, says the Lord God, "when I will send a famine on the land; not a famine of bread, nor a thirst for water, but of hearing the words of the Lord." **Miss Mary Alice Burns** was in charge of musical selections for the day. She presented **Doug Page** of Raleigh (son of **Preston and Pearl Page**) who sang the hymn, "Beneath the Cross of Jesus." The **Rev. Jack W**. **Page** introduced some of the Centenary families and his guest, **Henry Graham**. He then gave the benediction for the morning service and asked the blessing. The picnic tables laden with goodies were arranged behind the church. Friends and families joined together for good food and fellowship.

The afternoon session opened with the hymn, "Blest Be the Tie That Binds". Co-chairman Carl C. Edens expressed the thanks of all for the work of the various committees and turned the rest of the meeting over to cochairman Clifford H. Hammond. The secretary gave the minutes of the past year. The Rev. Al Morris expressed his thanks to "those who keep up the church" for the new paint job and the sign. B. O. Burns made a motion that the committees remain the same – seconded by Robert F. Stuart and carried unanimously. Collection for the day was \$308.30. Madison Maness wondered aloud if "The Robesonian" (Lumberton paper) would have a write-up and Ms. Courtney Sharp-Ward was recognized. Mr. Morris closed the homecoming events with prayer.

Weatherwise – a warm, mostly sunny with a nice breeze in the church yard.

Memorials: Mrs. Blanche M. McLellan, Mrs. Mattie Ward Bullock, John Tarkington, J. O. McArthur, Mrs. Ruth Stuart Atkinson, Mrs. Flonnie Sue Gaddy.

1978 - Centenary Memorial United Methodist Church held its annual homecoming on August 27, 1978. The Rev. Al Morris of the Rowland United Methodist Church presided at the worship service. The Rev. Madison W. Maness of Fayetteville administered the sacrament of infant baptism for Jonathan Foster Page, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Foster Page (Bob and Sally) of Raleigh; and grandson of Mrs. Frances Foster Page, and the late Rev. Jack Ward Page. - to be called "Jack." James Gaddy Ward, III, in charge of music, presented Miss Sharon Burney, soloist, who rendered "The Holy City" by S. Adams. The Rev. John Richard Edens, son of John Clarence and Betty Jean Edens of Laurinburg and grandson of Carl C. and Myrtle Ward Edens, brought the morning message -"What Mean These Stones?" with scripture selection from Joshua 4:1-7, 20-24 and 11 Timothy 1:1-15. Rick's wife, the Rev. Jill Edens led the morning prayer. Both Rick and Jill are recent graduates of Yale Divinity School and serve as associate pastors at Elm Grove United Methodist Church, Elm Grove, Wisconsin. Mr. Maness gave the benediction.

Mr. Morris asked the blessing. An abundance of tempting foods graced the picnic tables where friends and relatives joined for good food and good times.

The afternoon session opened with the singing of the hymn, "Faith of Our Fathers." Co-chairman Cliff Hammond presided, thanked the various committees for "jobs well done". The secretary read the minutes of the 1977 homecoming and then announced that the committee had purchased a "weed-eater" for working around the cemetery markers; that a professional crew had cleaned the church; and urged friends to remember that these are expenses each year - so remember when the collection plate is passed. 1979 – The Centenary Memorial Association observed the 30th anniversary of these homecomings on August 26, 1979. **The Rev. Orville W. Watson** of the Rowland United Methodist Church led the service and preached the sermon entitled, "Dying Men, and the Living Word", with the text from Zechariah 1:1-7. Musical selections for the day were prepared by **Miss Mary Alice Burns** and **James Gaddy Ward, III**, soloist, presented "*The Birds' Song*" by Williams. Mr. Watson gave the benediction.

Rev. Madison Maness offered the blessing as we gathered around the picnic tables where tempting foods were spread, then shared. The usual "Gaddy Ward axe handle tea" was enjoyed by all. However, the very warm day found us dry at the tea table for the first time ever.

Chairman Clifford H. Hammond called the afternoon session to order. The group joined in singing the hymn, "For All The Blessings of The Year" accompanied by Mary Alice Burns. All committees were graciously thanked for jobs well done. The secretary read the 1978 minutes. Bob Burns gave an update on last years speakers. Rick and Jill Edens, who are now in Chapel Hill, NC serving the United Christian Church {United Church of Chapel Hill}. Collection was \$565.05 (some added later via mail). B. O. Burns made a motion that committees remain the same. seconded by Robert F. Stuart and carried. Madison Maness, accustomed to speaking at such gatherings, remarked how good it was to see the church filled almost to capacity. The group for dinner was unusually large with most of the Burns grandchildren in attendance. Mr. Maness closed the meeting with prayer. Weatherwise -HOT AND HUMID! Memorials: Carl Corprew Edens. The display case at the left front of the sanctuary has been placed in the church in loving memory of Ethel Crawford Ward by her husband J. Gaddy Ward.

1980 - Beautiful sunny skies and gentle easterly breezes were the order of the day when we observed the 31st homecoming at Centenary Church on August 24, 1980. An especially large congregation assembled to hear a former pastor, the Rev. Don Lee Harris, now serving Rosemary United Methodist Church in Roanoke Rapids, NC, bring the morning meditation entitled, "I Will Cling to the Old Rugged Cross." His Scripture and text were taken from Galatians 6:11-14. Mr. Harris said that every gospel "emphasized the cross" - We must first identify with the cross, then understand the cross, finally accept the cross. The Rev. Amos H. Stone of the Rowland United Methodist Church presided at the Worship Service. Miss Mary Alice Burns did her usual excellent joy in preparing the presenting appropriate musical selections. James Gaddy Ward, III presented a solo, "The Twenty-third Psalm" by Williams. The Rev. Allen Lee, retired Methodist minister of Red Springs, closed the service with prayer.

Mr. Stone asked the blessing when folks had the tables spread with "the bountiful supply" and Gaddy Ward had the "axe handle tea" ready to serve.

After a delicious sampling of special sought out goodies and joyful visiting of friends and relatives, the group reassembled for a brief business session. Chairman C. H. Hammond called the meeting to order and the group joined in singing Hymn 546, "For All the Blessings of the Year". Mr. Cliff thanked the various committees for their good work in preparing for homecoming (with a special note of thanks to P.T.W.) {Parthenia Thompson Ward}. The secretary read notes from the 30th homecoming and announced the day's collection of \$595.00. John Clarence Edens made a motion that Robert F. Stuart be made a cochairman with C. H. Hammond and it was approved. Parthenia Ward suggested that Mary Alice Burns be placed on the music committee since she "often gets left holding the bag." James Gaddy Ward, Jr. and Bill Ward were recognized also for a job well done - grounds, tables, etc. With no further business the group joined in the Methodist Youth Fellowship benediction (Numbers 6:24-26). A made to order picnic day. The unusually large crowd for the worship service attested to the love and esteem with which Don Lee and Emma Harris are held in our community. Also, about sixty-five of the Burns-Page relatives shared the day. Memorials: Dora McCormic, Sam Jessup and Nora Ayers.

1981 - Tropical depression Dennis drenched the area with showers in the week prior to the 32nd annual homecoming at Centenary - but August 23, 1981 was a partly cloudy with pleasant cool temperatures that found us with windows closed in the sanctuary. The Rev. Amos H. Stone of the Rowland United Methodist Church led the service and preached the sermon entitled "Live One Day at the Time" with the scripture lesson from Matthew 6:25-34. Mary Alice Burns was pianist for the service and Bert and Debbie Ayers presented special music, a duet, "Love is Why" by Ellis and Lakey. Chairman of Centenary Memorial Association Trustees, Robert F. Stuart announced that the church needs a new roof and work on the steeple. There are also plans to extend a stoop over the front steps. The Rev. Madison Maness closed the worship service with prayer and asked the blessing.

Gaddy Ward's "axe handle tea" (he did help) and much good food and fellowship were shared by all those in attendance. The extremely pleasant weather kept the crowd in the yard visiting longer than usual.

About two o'clock a short business session was held. Cochairman Robert F Stuart presided and the group joined in singing "Blest Be the Tie that Binds". The secretary read the minutes from the last homecoming. Collection for the day was \$760.85. Bob Burns made a motion that the committees remain the same and it was approved. There was some discussion of next year being the 100th anniversary of the organization of Centenary and that some special plans should be made. J. Gaddy Ward suggested that Madison Maness would be the appropriate speaker. Madison accepted and discussed briefly the "historical message" of Centenary. Robert Stuart thanked all those who worked to help make the homecoming possible. Mr. Maness dismissed the group with prayer that emphasized "thankfulness and pride in our forefathers who organized this church." The Trustees met for a discussion of the repairs to be done to the church and to the cemetery fence. Centenary Church Family and Centenary Community Memorials: Shep McArthur, Lizzie McCormick, Alicia S. Crawford, Sam and Ruby McLean, and Ethel B. Ward.

1982 – The 33rd homecoming of Centenary Memorial Association was observed on August 22, 1982. This year is also the 100th Anniversary of the founding of the church in 1882. The **Rev. Amos H. Stone** presided at the worship service. The sermon was delivered by **The Reverend Madison W. Maness.** Special music was presented by **Wes Ward** of the First Presbyterian Church of Lumberton and **Debi Parker**, soloist, who sang "*All Things Bright and Beautiful*" by Eugene Englert. The sacrament of infant baptism was administered to **Andrew**

Guy Burns, son of Hal Douglas and Carolyn Smith Burns.

After the benediction and blessing, all gathered around the picnic tables where the usual tempting foods were spread, then shared.

During the afternoon session, B. O. Burns gave a slide presentation of past homecomings. Memorials: Frank K. Salmon (former pastor), Orville W. Watson (former pastor), J. Gaddy Ward, Sr., J. Mack Straughn, Myrtle Ward Edens. It was also noted that Mrs. Leila Pate died on Saturday. The Picture in the vestibule is given in loving memory of J. Gaddy Ward, by the B. O. Burns family. Ministers who served today were Madison W. Maness, John Richard Edens and Amos H. Stone. Clifford H. Hammond and Robert F. Stuart were Co-Chairman of Homecomings {There were no minutes for this year. The information has been taken from the church bulletin.}

1983 - The Rev. Robert F. Moore, pastor of Trinity United Methodist Church in Fairmont, NC was the guest speaker at the 1983 homecoming service on August 28th. His sermon, entitled, "The Marks of a Fool" followed the scripture lesson from Matthew 23:1-2, 13-24. The service was presided over by the Rev. Amos H. Stone of the Rowland United Methodist Church. Wes Ward was organist for the service and Mackie Pate was soloist, presenting "Now with Thanksgiving" by D. Busaro. The coordinating arrangements of yellow and white chrysanthemums were in memory of those who departed this earth since the last homecoming: Pope P. Crawford, Mrs. Evelyn C. Stuart, Stacy McLean, Mrs. Neva Gaddy Townsend, Douglas Hammond, Ora McCormic, Rev. W. A. Tew (former pastor), Rev. W.C. Wilson (former pastor).

Dinner on the church yard was a time of sharing food, memories and planning ahead.

Robert Stuart gave a report on the \$2,000.00 given for the tornado victims of the Red Springs area. Frances Page reported a \$100.00 contribution to the Robeson County Church and Community Center for Peggy Straughan. Iola Burns suggested that Maggie Morrison and Frances Page serve on the music committee. Preston Page was made permanent presiding officer at the evening session. Rev. Stone dismissed the session with prayer. Memorials for 1984 were: C. Badger Gaddy and William Burns Page. Also memorial gifts were: matching fern stands in the Sanctuary in loving memory of William Burns Page by Mrs. Jake Burns and Mr. and Mrs. B. O. Burns; the

oak fern stand in the vestibule in loving memory of **Ora Elease McCormic** by her niece, **Sara Mac Boyer** and family, **Delton, Susanne, Jason and Mackenzie.**

1985 – The 36th annual homecoming at Centenary was held on August 25, 1985. The **Rev. Amos H. Stone** presided over the morning service. The guest minister was the **Rev. M. E. Seahorn** (retired) who is the father of **Mrs. Sarah Ballard**. John Wesley Ward, III was in charge of the music. **Mr. Mac Porter**, soloist, is a tenor in the adult choir of the First Presbyterian Church in Lumberton and is employed by the Lumberton City Schools. He sang "Come Ye Blessed" by J.P. Scott and "At the River" by Aaron Copland. The Sacrament of Baptism was given to Leslie Elaine, daughter of **Hal and Carolyn Burns** and granddaughter of **Mrs. H. D. (Elaine) Burns**. {There were no minutes for this year. The write-up was taken from the bulletin.}

1986 - The 37th homecoming at Centenary was held on August 24, 1986. Rev. David Francis presided and brought the morning message. Wes Ward and the Kirk Singers of First Presbyterian Church, Lumberton brought special music. Jeremy Michael Clifton, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Clifton and grandson of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. O. McArthur was baptized during the morning service. In the afternoon session presided over by Robert Stuart and Cliff Hammond, the following memorials were given: Beatrice Faulk Peoples, Parthenia T. Ward and Mary N. Hammond. Memorial gifts: the ceiling fans in the sanctuary and vestibule are given in loving memory of Carl C. and Myrtle Ward Edens by their children, Carl C. Edens, Jr., Doris E. Bartlett, John Clarence Edens and Catherine E. Watkins; the two chairs in the vestibule in loving memory of Polly T. Ward and J. Gaddy Ward, Sr. were given by W. E. Lupo and were refinished and reupholstered by the Centenary Memorial Association.

1987 – The 38th annual homecoming at Centenary was observed on August 23, 1987. As usual the weather was hot but the newly installed ceiling fans given in memory of **Mr. and Mrs. Carl Edens** by their children made the church more pleasant.

The **Rev. David Francis** of Rowland United Methodist Church presided at the worship services and delivered the sermon entitled "Forgiveness". He brought out we always have one more opportunity to ask for forgiveness and admit our mistakes. Saying I am sorry and forgiving is one of the hardest things to do. Special music by **Wes Ward** of the First Presbyterian Church of Lumberton and **Mac Porter** guest soloist.

Memorials: Earl Gaddy, Richard (Dick) Edens, Hayes McArthur, Alice B. Stuart and Cornelia Ayers.

After the benediction, **Rev. Francis** asked the blessing and everyone gathered outside around the picnic tables to enjoy good food and fellowship.

Afterwards a brief business meeting was held with **Preston Page** presiding. He thanked the **Edens** family for the fans and how much they meant to all of us. There was no new business. All officers were re-elected. **Frank Page** commented that today was one of our best meetings. **Wes Ward** made a motion that we have homecoming on the third Sunday in August instead of the fourth, due to the fact that so many parents were taking their children back to college at this time. The motion was passed.

1988 – The 39th annual homecoming at Centenary was observed on August 21, 1988. The **Rev. David Francis** of Rowland United Methodist Church presided at the worship

service and delivered the sermon entitled " The Wedding Feast of the Lamb".

Special music by Wes Ward of the First Presbyterian Church of Lumberton and Mrs. Pam Stone guest soloist. Memorials: Mrs. John Hugh (Louise) McArn, Mrs. Cole (Elizabeth) Page, Mr. Gaines Phillips.

After the benediction **Rev. Francis** asked the blessing and every one gathered out side around the picnic tables to enjoy good food and fellowship.

A business meeting was held afterwards with Preston Page presiding. New officers were elected. Clarence Edens, Co-Chairman, Mrs. Elaine Burns, Secretary. Wes Ward commented that Mrs. Mary Alice {Burns} Usher would be in charge of the music next year. Bob Burns made a motion that Jack Ward Page, Jr. preach next year and it was approved.

1989 - The 40th Annual Homecoming was held on August 20, 1989. The Rev. David Francis of the Rowland United Methodist Church presided at the morning worship and welcomed "one of our own", Rev. Jack Ward Page of Coats United Methodist Church as the guest minister. Ward gave an inspiring message on "Imitations of God." Wes Ward, baritone, sang two lovely hymns "The Church in the Wildwood" and "Others". Rev. Francis administered the sacrament of infant baptism for Zackarey Kyle Ward, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Ward, grandson of James Gaddy Ward, Jr. and the late Polly Ward. Memorial flowers were for Mr. and Mrs. Carl Edens by the family and Mrs. Beulah Rogers by Bud Rogers. Flowers honoring Zachary Ward by Mr. and Mrs. James Gaddy Ward, Jr. and Mr. and Mrs. Frank Page by Mr. and Mrs. Bob Burns were given.

After the benediction and blessing, a delicious and delightful picnic lunch was enjoyed on the grounds.

During the business session, a report from the trustees was given that **John Clarence Edens** had been elected as Treasurer. The trustees asked that everyone be encouraged to give more money so that we can be assured that Centenary Church will be maintained after this generation is gone. Nothing major is foreseen as needed in the near future. The CD at the Bank earns about \$2800 a year. Collections usually pay for upkeep expenses of Homecoming. It was suggested and approved that **Rev. Richard Edens** be the guest minister for the 1990 services.

Mr. Porter, a tenor, sang two beautiful hymns: "There's Something About That Name" and "My Tribute" accompanied at the piano by our Minister of Music, Wes Ward. Members who have died in the past year were Rev. Madison Maness and Mrs. Pope (Vera) Crawford.

Memorial flowers were placed in the church in memory of Madison Maness by Bob and Iola Burns, Ruth and Elaine Burns; in memory of Mrs. Pope Crawford by the Crawford family; in memory of Louise McArn by her family; in memory of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Edens by the Edens family. After the benediction and blessing of our usual delicious and bountiful picnic, lunch was enjoyed on the grounds. It was rather hot but with all the visiting and joy of seeing friends and loved ones, no one mined!

During the business session the minutes of last year were read and approved. **Clifford Hammond** suggested **Ward Page** be asked to be guest minister next year. **Clarence Edens** thanked all committees for their work for making another successful homecoming. **Bob Burns** made a motion that the same slate of officers serve next year. This was seconded by **Frances Page**. It was suggested that the trustees names and officers be on the Homecoming bulletins.

1991 - The 42nd Annual Homecoming of Centenary United Methodist Church was held on August 18, 1991. Rev. David Francis conducted the morning worship services and welcomed the Rev. Jack Ward Page. Ward who completed Divinity School at Duke in May and is the minister of the United Methodist Church in Washington, NC. Ward used as his Scripture Deuteronomy 4:32-40 and brought us an inspiring message, "God's Family Album." David welcomed Jay Ward of Lumberton as our soloist this morning. Jay is a rising senior at Woodberry Forest High School and is the son of Betsy and Wesley Ward of Lumberton. Jay sang "Spirit of the Living God" and "Turn Your Eyes Upon Jesus". He was accompanied on the piano by Wes Ward. Memorials were for Miss Bessie Gaddy, Mrs. Willie Mae Hasty, and Mrs. Beulah Ward. Memorial flowers were placed in the church for each. In addition, flowers were in memory of Mrs. Louise McArn by John Hugh McArn and in honor or Ward and Karen Page by their cousins.

After the benediction and blessing we could hardly believe our good fortune to be able to have our bountiful picnic lunch on the grounds. The threat of storm "Bob" had continued even during the morning services, but the day couldn't have been more delightful! A little warm, but just enough breeze to keep the insects away.

During the business session chaired by Preston Page, several suggestions were made as to ministers for the coming years. He also cleaned and hauled soil in the depressed areas. Robert also asked that everyone from Centenary act as host for our Homecomings, not just the ones on committees. It was brought forth that new shutters are needed. Robert Stuart and Clarence Edens will check this out.

The offering was { } and for the Preservation Fund was { } **Iola Burns** was appointed to be in charge of the flowers for next year. **Bob Burns** will be looking after Publicity as he has been on the committee.

1992 – The 43rd Annual Homecoming was held at Centenary Memorial Methodist Church on August 16, 1992. The **Rev. Wayne Thomas** {of the Rowland United Methodist Church} welcomed the congregation to his first Centenary Homecoming. **Jane Stuart Hale** gave the prelude, "*Praise To The Lord Almighty*" with her son **John** on the trumpet. Later in the service, **Jane's** daughter, **Lisa Hale**, sang two solos, "*Love Will Be Our Home*" and "*People Need the Lord*". **Jane** is one of our own, the daughter of **Leon and Emily Stuart**. She is a graduate of Methodist College and the wife of Dr. Mike Hale who is Family Life specialist with the Methodist Home for Children. John is a junior at Southview High School and a member of their Marching Band. Lisa recently graduated from UNC at Greensboro with a major in music and will be teaching in the Cumberland County School system. The talented Hale family live in Hope Mills. During the service Worth and Marie Burns presented their daughter, Mona Leigh for Baptism. Her grandparents, Bob and Iola Burns and Uncle and Aunt Stan and Mary Usher had lovely flowers in Mona's honor. Rev. Thomas gave an inspiring message on "Our Christian Heritage" with scripture from Jeremiah 12:9. Clarence Edens had a notice in the bulletin that the Centenary 21st Century Preservation Fund has grown to \$3,222.96. The Trustees thanked all contributors and asked for continuing support. A memorial was given for Mr. Theodore M. Crawford. Flowers were presented to the Glory of God and in loving memory of Mr. Crawford by his wife Elizabeth M. Crawford, his daughter Betsy C. Hardin, grandson Ted Hardin. Also in memory of Mr. Crawford and other loved ones by Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Crawford and Miss Halene Crawford; In loving memory of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Edens by their children Carl Edens, Jr., Doris E. Bartlett, Clarence Edens and Catherine E. Watkins; In loving memory of Stacey McLean by Mrs. Stacey McLean, son Walter Duncan McLean and Katie. The security lights on the church grounds have been given in loving memory of John David Stuart by his parents, Emily and Leon Stuart.

After the benediction and blessing of the noon meal, everyone adjourned to the grounds for a delicious lunch under sunny skies. After the rainy Saturday, we were truly blessed with the sunshine. Many members lacked faith that we could continue our unbroken string of picnics on the churchyard with no rain.

At the business session, presided over by **Preston Page**, thanks were given to committees for their work. It was noted that **Maude Allen Stuart** and **Carolyn Hammond** were not present due to illness, making the first time either had missed a homecoming. The new 14 shutters had been purchased since last year, \$180.00 per window. It was suggested that **Dr. Mike Hale** be invited to be guest minister next year and that his family also be invited. **Joe Burns** volunteered to contact the **Hales**. **Robert Stuart** reported 2 trees cut down and **Sonny Butler** cleaned up the limbs, etc. **Bob Burns** moved that same officers continue for next year.

1993 - The 44th Annual Homecoming of Centenary Memorial Methodist Church was held on August 15, 1993. Rev. Audrey Holmes conducted the morning worship service for the first time as the Rowland minister. A beautiful prelude of music was presented by Mrs. Michael Hale, the former Jane Stuart, daughter of Leon and Emily Stuart. Special music in song "Softly and Tenderly" was sung by Lisa Hale Packer. Lisa is the daughter of Jane and Michael Hale and teaches in the Cumberland County School System. A very meaningful message was brought in the sermon, "Harvest Time" by Dr. Michael Hale. Dr. Hale is a graduate of Methodist College and has a doctorate of Ministry from Southeastern Baptist Seminary. He is with the Methodist Home for Children as a counselor and Family Life Specialist. Dr. Hale brought into his message how happy he is that his son John has been taught the love of the farm by his grandfather, Leon Stuart, in this church's community. The following former members or friends of Centenary have died during the past year: Mrs. Esther McLean Bray,

Miss Bessie Hammond, Mrs. Rethea Straughan, Mr. David Stuart and Mr. Frank Stuart. After the closing hymn "*Take My Life and Let It Be*" was sung, the benediction and blessing given for the noon meal, the congregation adjourned to the church yard for the always delicious and bountiful picnic lunch and axe handle iced tea prepared by **James Gaddy Ward**.

A report in the bulletin by Treasurer Clarence Edens shows that the Centenary 21st Century Preservation Fund added \$2,064.70 during the year making a total of \$5,278.66 in this very special fund. At the afternoon business session presided over by Preston Page, the following things were brought up: Betsy Hardin offered to give 9 wooden folding chairs in memory of her father {Theodore Crawford}. Bob Burns made the motion that Centenary Church buy 9 which would give us the number needed for extra seats. It was brought out that we need more old hymn books. Suggested that we contact other churches that might have some stored away. It was agreed that the church needed to be washed down to do away with the mildew, suggested that W.C. Connor be contacted to do this. Clarence Edens reported that Centenary is now approved as Tax Exempt. The offering had not been counted but there was a good crowd at morning service. A motion was made and seconded that same officers continue for another year. Joe Burns is to fill in for Preston Page should Preston be unable to attend afternoon sessions. It was agreed Richard Edens will be guest minister next year.

1994 – On another beautiful Sunday August 21, 1994, the 45th Homecoming of Centenary Memorial Methodist Church was held. **Reverend Audrey Holmes** conducted the worship services. A beautiful prelude of music was presented by **Wes Ward**, Director of Music Ministries, First Presbyterian Church, Lumberton. The Sacrament of Holy Baptism was celebrated for Amanda Rae Edens, daughter of Alan and Claudia Edens of Durham, granddaughter of Clarence and Betty Jean Edens by Rev. Richard Edens {her uncle}. The Sacrament of Infant Baptism for Alexander Benjamin Worth Burns, son of Worth and Marie Burns of Columbia, SC grandson of Bob and Iola Burns, given by Rev. Audrey Holmes. These beautiful children have many long ties connected with Centenary Church. The Reverend Richard Edens of the United Church of Chapel Hill where he serves as co-pastor with his wife, Reverend Jill Edens, was our guest minister and brought the morning message. His scripture from Isaiah 61 referred to homecoming, very appropriate with his message. Memorials were noted for Burns Stuart and Andrew Hasty who died during the past year. Flowers were presented to the Glory of God and in loving memory of: Burns Stuart by his wife Mavis and his son and daughter-in-law Anita, a vase of roses from his granddaughter Alli Stuart were in the altar area; Mr. and Mrs. Carl Edens by their children, Carl Jr. ,

After the usual bountiful and delicious picnic meal and much visiting among friends and relatives while drinking many cups of the "Axe handle" tea prepared by **Jimmy Ward** in the rather hot weather, the afternoon session was presided over by **Joe Burns**. **Clarence Edens**, treasurer reported that between \$2600 and \$2700 was collected from last year. Of that amount \$1600 went into the Preservation Fund and the rest into the local budget with all bills paid including **W.C. Connor** for washing down the building. He also reported that **Betsy Hardin** will get nine additional chairs and Centenary will buy nine.

The motion was made, seconded and carried to change the Homecoming date to the second Sunday in August due to parents taking children to college and teachers already in school workshops. It was suggested that cards be mailed in the near future so the date could be put on calendars. Also everyone at the session was asked to pass the word. Wes Ward, chairman of Music Committee, said we really need to get another piano; he would not suggest spending more money on the present one, but definitely would not recommend a new one since it's used only once a year; asked that all present be on the look-out for a good used piano, possible someone would donate one. He would be glad to try it out to check the condition. Wes also asked that someone else be asked to play next year. He said it's hard for a paid church organist to get off often. He would be back-up if no one else could do it. Someone suggested we might use an electronic key board if we can't find a piano. It was decided that Rev. Don Lee Harris be invited as guest minister for 1995 and Jack Ward Page, Jr. would come if Mr. Harris can't come. The officers will remain the same for another year. Thanks to Frances Page for minutes for the afternoon session.

1995 - On Sunday August 13, 1995, the 46th Homecoming of Centenary Memorial Church was held on a beautiful but extremely hot day. Reverend Audrey Holmes of the Rowland United Methodist Church conducted the worship services. James "Jim" Ward of Chicago presented a beautiful prelude of music. Special music in song was given by Worth Stuart of Atlanta, Georgia. Worth sang as an anthem "When I Survey the Wondrous Cross" and as a response to the sermon, "The Lord's Prayer". Worth is the son of Mavis Stuart of Charlotte and the late Burns Stuart, the grandson of Worth and Alice Stuart and great grandson of Alice and Worth Burns. The Reverend Don Lee Harris, former minister of Centenary Church, was guest minister and used as his topic, "Celebrating Our Roots". Rev. Harris has close connections to Centenary as his grandparents on the Webb side attended Centenary. He referred often to his ties with the church, to records of church attendance by his family and paid homage to so many of the former members who are not with us now, particularly to the ones we lost this past year: Bob Burns, Cliff Hammond, Mary Ella Cotton and Lena Barfield Gaddy. The flowers on the center table were given by Mrs. Clifford Hammond her sons Dick and Jack and their families. The flowers on the left were given by Mrs. Bob Burns and her children, Worth and Mary Alice and their families. The arrangement on the curio cabinet in the vestibule was given by Ruth and Elaine Burns in memory of Mr. and Mrs. Worth Burns, Jack and Pete Burns.

Rev. Holmes closed the service with a beautiful *"Thanksgiving Prayer"* read in unison, the hymn *"Blest Be The Tie That Binds"* and the blessing of the noon meal.

Although it was very warm on the grounds, a bountiful picnic meal was enjoyed with many cups of **James Gaddy's** iced tea.

A short business meeting was held with Joe Burns presiding. The minutes were scanned with no corrections. It was decided that Jack Ward Page would be asked to be guest minister next year. Clarence Edens reported that the "Centenary 21st Century Fund" was started five years ago and before the collection today was \$9,187 with \$9,000 being in a CD and the \$187 on savings. The collection for today had not been counted. The matter of buying folding chairs was brought up but nothing more had been done. It was suggested that in the letter next year we recommend causal dress or light, comfortable clothes because of the heat. It was asked about the reaction to the 2nd Sunday but no one had any complaints. It was suggested that a memorial list of the charter members be made up and hung in the vestibule; also that we check into the old records and books and put copies of these in one book. Joe and Clarence thanked Rev. Holmes for her help as well as everyone who worked to organize this Homecoming.

1996 – We were blessed with another beautiful sunny day for the 47th Centenary Homecoming on August 11, 1996. **Rev. Audrey Holmes** of Rowland UM Church conducted the morning service. The opening hymn "*Love Devine All Loves Excelling*" was followed by the Apostles Creed and the Gloria Patre with opening prayer by the guest minister, **Rev. Jack Ward Page**, son of **Frances Page** and the late **Rev. Jack W. Page**, **Sr**. He is beginning his 10th year as a United Methodist Minister in the NC conference, presently serving his second year at Lemon Springs UMC. He and his wife **Karen** have three children, **Russell Ward**, **Benjamin Odom and Jordan Melissa**.

Mrs. Stan Usher, the former Mary Alice Burns, daughter of Iola Burns and the late Bob Burns presented a program of music before service began. She accompanied John Tarkington of Kohomo, Indiana, son of Ann Burns Tarkington and the late John Tarkington in the anthem "He Lives" beautifully sung from the heart. He sang "Softly and Tenderly Jesus is Calling" as the offertory.

Using as his scripture Luke 15:11-32, **Rev. Page** gave an inspirational message of "Homecoming at God's House".

Memorials were for Junius Gaddy and John Hugh McArn.

A bountiful lunch was enjoyed on the grounds with a good breeze. James Gaddy's iced tea was most refreshing!

A short afternoon meeting was held with Joe Burns chairing. Preston Page requested Joe do this in the future.

Minutes of last year's Homecoming were read and a treasurer's report given in amount of \$2609.35.

Jack Hammond made the motion that an estimate be secured for painting the church as well as repairing leak in the vestibule. Frances Page moved that we rent a piano for next year – that we should be proud of our music and cannot do so with the old piano. Wesley Ward suggested that we not spend so much money each year on renting. He is to get an estimate for reworking the piano. It was suggested we keep present piano because it has a story behind it.

Clarence Edens was asked to check into the charter members of Centenary that can be displayed in the vestibule. **James Gaddy Ward** said he would have plaque reworked in front of the church. It was suggested that trees be planted for the future. Trees struck by lightening may not die. It was decided that **Rick Edens** and his wife **Jill** be invited as guest ministers next year. Richard Edens** of the United Church of Chapel Hill brought the morning message "The Challenge Before the Call". **Richard** and his wife, **Jill**, are graduates of Yale Divinity School and co-pastors. He is the son of **John Clarence and Betty Jean Edens** of Laurinburg and the grandson of the late **Mr. and Mrs. Carl Edens**. Richard's message was inspiring and touching.

The hymn "God of Grace and God of Glory" was sung before the Lord's Prayer followed by the concerns and loves of the church. **Rev. Goldfinch** graciously thanked **Rev. Edens** and our musicians for their part in the wonderful Homecoming service.

Worth gave a beautiful, very moving rendition of "How Great Thou Art" as the Offertory solo. The service closed with "Blest By The Tie That Binds" and the blessing of the lunch.

The flowers presented to the Glory of God and in Loving Memory of were: Center Table: James W. and Mary McLellan Crawford and in honor of other loved ones by Halene and Lawrence Crawford. Left table: Bob Burns by his wife, Iola, and his children, Worth Burns, Mary B. Usher and their families. Right Table: Mr. and Mrs. Carl Edens by the Edens family. The new Centenary Memorial Plaque is given in loving memory of Mr. and Mrs. Gaddy Ward, Sr. by Mr. and Mrs. James Gaddy Ward, Jr. and family.

The delicious and bountiful lunch was eaten in the best weather we've had in several years, good breeze and not too hot. John Burns substituted at the tea table for Jimmy Ward who was unable to be present.

An afternoon meeting was held with **Joe Burns** presiding, a small group attending. **Richard Edens** opened with prayer. Minutes of last year read and approved. Treasurer's report: Preservation Fund is \$13,455, Operating fund of \$53,413. **Betsy Crawford Hardin** had given 8 chairs in memory of her parents – must be in next year's bulletin. **Robert Stuart** reported that **James Gaddy Ward** had cut out the trees struck by lightening.

1998 – We celebrated another beautiful Centenary Homecoming on August 9, 1998 with a large but not overflowing crowd. Again it was very hot but NO RAIN. The wonderful ceiling fans given by **the Edens family** made the church very comfortable.

Reverend Gene Goldfinch, pastor of the Rowland Methodist Church welcomed former members and friends from near and far, Minnesota to Florida and in between. He introduced Mr. Van Bullock, a former native of Rowland now living in Winston Salem, as our guest speaker. Van is the son of the late W.T. and Mattie Ward Bullock and has many Centenary ties. In his message "Connections" he referred to many Centenary "greats" and their influence on our church, especially Mr. Gaddy Ward whose foresight enables the church to be maintained so well. He said "The Lord has done great things, Let us be glad and rejoice in it". Beautiful and inspiring music was made by Harriette Floyd Lovin, music director at Lumberton Senior High School, pianist and Brandon Gaines a junior at LHS. Brandon sang "The Lord's Prayer" and "Create in Me a Clean Heart, O Lord".

Memorials were for Halene Crawford, Mrs. (Madison) Ruth Maness, Mr. Frank Page and Mr. Jessie Barfield. Flowers were presented to the Glory of God and in loving memory of Halene Crawford by the Lawrence Crawford family, Mr. and Mrs. Gaddy Ward, Sr. by the James Gaddy Ward family, Mrs. Madison (Ruth) Maness by Frances Page and Mr. Frank Page by his sons Bill and Mike and their families.

Eight folding wooden chairs are given in loving memory of Theodore McLelland "Buck" and Mary Beth McAshan Crawford by their daughter and grandson, Elizabeth M. Betsy Crawford Hardin and Edward Reel "Ted" Hardin, Jr. After the closing Hymn "Blest be the Tie That Binds", the Benediction and blessing were given by Rev. Goldfinch.

A bountiful and delicious picnic lunch was shared under the pine trees. Although it was extremely hot, much visiting and welcoming each other was done with many cups of **James Gaddy Ward's** "axe handle" tea. **Jimmy** was assisted by his grandson, **Zack Ward**. During the morning services, **John Clarence Edens** announced that next year Centenary will celebrate it's 50th Homecoming. He wants to redo the history of the church and asked that anyone with pictures or comments send them to **Elaine Burns**.

A poorly attended business meeting was opened by Joe Burns; he asked John Burns to open with a prayer. Minutes of last year's Homecoming were read by Elaine Burns. A treasurer report was given by John Edens. Suggestions for the 50th Homecoming were given – pictures, stories, pictures of old posters, etc. Wes Ward said he would plan special music. In old business Robert Stuart was to check into planting trees in late fall; John Edens was to check into a painting contractor for painting the church early spring. The Crawfords had said they would like to do something special for the church, but no specific answers were given.

1999 - The fiftieth Annual Homecoming at Centenary was on August 8, 1999, a very hot day. The Rev. Connie Stutts welcomed the church full of former members. friends, relatives, and visitors. This was her first Centenary service but she sensed the very special feeling we have for our church and was very gracious in her welcome and announcements. The opening hymn was "Majesty and Wes Ward, Director of Music as First Power". Presbyterian Church in Lumberton, was our pianist and Jonathan Llovd, trumpeter, along with members of Wes's choir gave several beautiful selections - "The Hymn of Promise" and "When in Our Music, God is Glorified." William Russell Leggett, son of Grady and Jamie Ashley Leggett, grandson of Ann and Red Ashley and great grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Stuart, Sr. received the Sacrament of Baptism from Rev. Stutts and Rev. Harris. "Jesus Loves Me" was sung.

Rev. Stutts welcomed **Rev. Don Lee Harris** of Rocky Mount as our guest minister. **Rev. Harris** was the last pastor of Centenary before it was merged into the Rowland United Methodist Church. We are deeply indebted to **Rev. Harris** and the late **Rev. Jack Ward Page** for their efforts in convincing the North Carolina Conference to deed the church to the Trustees of Centenary as a Memorial Church. The late **Mr. Carl Edens** presented the deed to the Centenary Memorial Association at Homecoming August 22, 1971.

In his message, "Faith The Way Of Life", **Rev. Harris** said to believe because you have seen but happy are the ones who haven't seen and believe, God has promised He will be with us with faith, someone to hold at a breaking point, that justice will walk by faith, the Bible says fight for faith, that faith is a way of life good times and bad times. **Rev. Harris** asked for a show of hands of those present that had been at the first Homecoming. He was sorry his wife, **Emma** could not be with him due to her health. His own great grandmother worshipped in this church in 1904 so he feels he belongs here by birthright.

The closing hymn, "*The Church's One Foundation*" was followed by the benediction and blessing of the picnic lunch to follow on the grounds.

A bountiful lunch was spread and although it was very hot, everyone present enjoyed greeting each other, the delicious food and drinking the welcomed, cold iced tea dipped by **Jimmy, Bill and Zack Ward.** Mr. Gaddy would be pleased at his successors.

Memorials: Mrs. Estelle DeHart Crawford, Mrs. Ann Burns Tarkington, Joseph B. Nye, Anne Hammond Bailey. Flowers were presented to the glory of God and in loving memory of the above, Burns Stuart, and Mr. and Mrs. Robert Stuart, Sr., and in honor of Russell Leggett.

The afternoon business session was called to order by Joe Burns and Worth Burns gave an opening prayer. John Edens gave a treasurer's report; 21st Century Preservation fund has a CD for \$17,000. The church was painted at a cost of \$4,600. The monuments in the cemetery were cleaned. The Cooley Nursery of Wagram will plant trees around Thanksgiving. No other repairs {are} needed now. The cemetery fence may need work later on. Hal Burns said that David Burns, of Greensboro had looked over the inside of the church and was impressed with it. He is an architect of Greensboro. Someone said that the two Hammond Brothers had done interior work. Motion was made and carried that Homecoming be held next year on 4th Sunday of August due to popular demand (August 27th). Ward Page will be asked to be guest speaker. Rev. Stutts was complimented on her part in the service and in helping organize and get prepared for homecoming. One

hundred twenty-five registered. {Commemorative fans with a picture of the church were given out to all attending the 50th Annual Homecoming.}

2000 – The first Homecoming for Centenary Memorial Church in the new millennium, our fifty-first homecoming – was August 27. A special and warm welcome was given by **Rev. Connie Stutts.** Mrs. Harriet Floyd Lovin presented a period of music as the church filled with former members and friends. During the offertory she accompanied Jackie Ward Spencer with the lovely hymn of Promise. Jackie is the daughter of Maggie Ward Morrison and the late John W. Ward, Jr. She will enter Duke Divinity School this fall.

Pastor Stutts introduced Rev. Jack Ward Page, Jr., son of Mrs. Frances Page and the Late Reverend Jack Ward Page. Ward used scripture from Genesis 2 and 3 to bring his sermon on the Knowledge of Nakedness. He asked the question, naked good or bad – maybe both.

John Clarence Edens talked about the pictorial directory which he and Mrs. {Betty} Edens are putting together. We especially want pictures and information of former members. He asked that pictures be sent to him this fall so that a book can go to press by the first of the year. Beautiful mugs are available for cost on the grounds today.

Memorials: Lawrence Crawford, Robert McArthur Humphrey, Mrs. Katherine Stuart, Joe Pete Ward. Beautiful flowers were given today to the Glory of God and in loving memory of : Mrs. Annie Bailey by Leon and Emily Stuart and Hilda Griffin; Mrs. Katherine Stuart by her family; Mr. Lawrence Crawford by Mr. and Mrs. L. E. Crawford, Jr. and a memorial was also listed for Mr. Robert McArthur Humphrey.

The service was closed with the traditional hymn "Blest Be the Tie That Binds", the blessing and benediction. A delicious picnic lunch was spread in delightful weather, one of the best days we have had. The axe handle tea was delicious as usual.

The afternoon business meeting was chaired by **Joe Burns** who opened with a prayer of thanks for our church and the great day. **John Edens** gave a treasurer's report. Trees were planted at a cost of \$2,400, upkeep of grounds to date is \$1,960. **Joe** complimented **John and Betty Edens** on the pictorial directory and encouraged people to sign up for a copy. The sale of the mugs was going slow but can be bought later on.. It was suggested that we give **Pastor Connie** \$50.00 for her extra help in directory.



Personally Speaking/Gene Smith

Sunday was a good day! Time was, a couple hundred years ago, folks created churches a few miles from each other. Because most folks didn't have the means to ride they had to walk to church and churches sprung up within walking distances of homes. The denomination was not important because most folks clustering together were from the same country and were members of the same church.

Baptist, Methodist, Presbyterian, Lutheran —--none of it mattered as long as they had a church they could walk to.

Progress destroyed most of this. Folks got buggies or carriages so distances became less important. Then along came cars so distances became less important.

Once where three miles was an hour away 10 or 20 miles became unimportant.

So country churches which so once were so important became less important. One church could serve an area that once six churches served, and one suddenly became the hub of 12 or more.

Country churches started dieing. I grew up in one.

Presbyterian. Second or third Presbyterian church established in the Cape Fear Valley. Its claim to fame was that Sherman in his march from Georgia tied his horse to a sapling, went inside and wrote instructions to the preacher on topic's for Sunday's sermon. Horse ate the top out of the sapling. Tree grew, funny at the top, preacher didn't follow Sherman's instructions because the preacher was a genuine Southerner.

My church survives today, barely.

The one I attended Sunday didn't make it. Founded in the late 1880s, it was built as a labor of love by members. The wood is heart of pine, the pattern work in the ceiling is a delight to look at. Small by most standards it can squeeze in 125 or 150 if folks are not too overweight.

"Family" comes back once a year. "They" come home. "They" are the old ones, the middle ones and the young ones. Four, five generations will be present at Centenary's Homecoming.

We were there two years ago for my neice's wedding. As a tot and as a toddler she had attended Sunday School and church services there; later when the church closed they came back for "the day". She pledged her love and plighted her troth there a couple years ago. It was a hot, humid, swelthy day.

Sunday was the church's "homecoming" and her brother wanted his first-born daughter to be christened there. So we went. Hot, humid, swelty. Leslie Elaine cried and fretted during the entire ceremony despite being regally dressed in a long white christening gown.

I have been to christenings and baptismals before that included sprinkling as well as dipping.

But Sunday's ceremony touched me deeply. I had never seen or experienced the mood or the emotion before.

The preacher was Methodist which doesn't bother me. But after baby had cried and fretted once he called the parents and grandparents forward the baby stopped crying. Preacher took baby girl and made some comments, dipped his hand in the bowl of Holy water and gave the normal ritualistic blessing of hand on the head.

Every time before when the christening and baptismal has been done then child has been returned to parent (if he-she left parent's arms) and the ceremony was concluded.

This time the preacher kept the baby and walked down one aisle, came back up, talking to the congregation and introducing them to Leslie Elaine. He said she was the newest child of God and wanted them to see her close up.

Came back to the front and then went down the other aisle. There was no haste. It was done in leisure and gave everyone a chance to see the newest member of the church.

I thought it was a classic touch. Here we were in a church which has only one service a year. Folks were old and gray, fat and fading, had attended the same church as tots and toddlers. They welcomed this newcomer who had travelled from Illinois for the event because it was the church of her father, her grand-daddy, her great-grand-daddy and his folks. She was home.

But the preacher didn't care where she was from or which church she attended. He wanted the folks of Centenary to meet her, to know her and to love her.

The sermon which followed really wasn't that important. Nor was the food on the picnic tables outside after the service. It was typically Southern country cooking and too much and too good for someone watching calories and waistline. Those who have been to country church homecomings know what I mean.

But the event of the day was when the preacher said let me introduce you to our newest member. That literally destroyed me because it was such a wonderful approach to something which dif too often becomes ritualistic and meaningless to all but the members of the family.

I shed tears for reasons which are important only to me but it was a very, very emotional moment.

As I said early, Sundy was a special day.---GENE SMITH.

Cleaning Up at Church

Gambling on an outdoor feast for your relatives and friends

I've never experienced a rained out picnic lunch at Centenary Homecoming. It's been hinted that we could move the buffet to the Rowland United Methodist Church's Fellowship Hall on a rainy day—but I've never learned of any actual contingency plans on how this would be done. No plans to move the Tea Table. No plans for emergency table set-up. No plans to control the mass exodus of Buicks and Chevrolets speeding from Cotton Valley to Rowland at exactly the Noon hour, each vehicle bulging with casseroles, cakes, ham biscuits, chocolate cakes and, of course, full of hungry people.

I've always assumed that Centenary Sunday would be weather-perfect. A bit hot...a bit humid...but always a glorious day for a gathering underneath the trees on the lawn of a picture-perfect wooded church.

However, for those of you who don't know, many hours of planning, preparation, and precision are executed each year to pull off this event.

For many years, I worked summers and Saturdays at the Ward Company, operated by one of Centenary's most faithful, Mr. Gaddy Ward. At the beginning of each August, Mr. Gaddy would dispatch a team (usually two store employees) to mow the grass, trim around the gravestones, pick up any stick larger than two inches, rake the yard, wash the windows, remove the wasps' nests, sweep and clean the outhouses, polish the pews and vacuum the carpet. For me, this time was one of my first experiences of working unsupervised, but I soon learned that Mr. Gaddy could tell if you were making progress.

Centenary Homecoming could also be considered the "season of the great picnic table round-up" We would drive throughout the community borrowing picnic tables to be placed end-to-end to form the buffet line. In later years, Mr. Gaddy purchased twelve heavy-duty banquet tables that are stored in one of the old classrooms at the church. These tables are one of Mr. Gaddy's legacies, because their density and weight will probable outlast most of the current members of the congregation.

Centenary Homecoming has many traditions. The tables for the buffet must be placed in exactly the same location (slightly modified as the pine trees grew bigger) to allow for appropriate shading. There are exactly three groupings of tables and it appears each family knows exactly where to park their dishes.

Mr. Robert Stuart always brings a cooler filled with icy water, strategically placed at the entrance/exit of the church. For many years, this spot was shaded by a huge tree. But the tree is gone and the water cooler remains in the same location.

I think many people may journey to Centenary for a glass of Homecoming Iced Tea. Again, Mr. Gaddy was the legendary tea-mixer, using two zinc wash buckets that are carefully maintained year after year and stored in the attic of his home. The tea is always stirred with two wooden axe handles. James Gaddy Ward, Jr. assumed the mantle of tea-mixer upon Mr. Gaddy's death. The concoction of frozen lemonade concentrate, cut up and mashed lemons, lemon juice and sugar, coupled with gallon cartons and jars of tea from households throughout the community create a refreshing liquid to prevent dehydration in the summer heat.

And of course, we all remember the food. I've tried to describe the picnic lunch to my friends who have never attended; twelve, 10 foot tables covered with every imaginable casserole, cake, pie, fried chicken, deviled eggs, salads...you name it, it's there. All of the food is randomly placed and as the crowd surges through the line, each extra-strong paper plate is filled to capacity.

For many years, I accompanied Mr. Cliff Hammond to his home to retrieve Mrs. Carolyn Hammond's culinary preparations for the day. Since the Hammonds lived just down the road, Mr. Cliff could dash back home post-collection and pre-benediction. Mrs. Carolyn's ham biscuits and coconut cake are legendary.

Centenary Homecoming...a feast of faith, family and friends. May the tradition continue!

Large Crowd Attends Annual Homecoming At Centenary Church By Mrs. Neil Collins, Jr.



ROWLAND – They came from all over North and South Carolina and as far away at Kokomo, Ind, to attend Homecoming at Centenary last Sunday.

This lovely and mellowed white frame Methodist Church is situated on Highway 130, four miles east of Rowland in a peaceful oak grove. It stands like a monument to the Christian men and women who gave of their time, land, and money that their children and others like them might live in a community based on Christian principals.

Descendants of these families, the Wards, Stuarts, Burns, McLeans, Crawfords, McArthurs, Gaddys, Edens, Hammonds, McLellands, Phillipps, Ayers, Faulks, and the three "Macs" – McCormicks, McCormics, and McCormacs, were well represented at Sunday's homecoming.

At the morning session **Rev. J.H. Parrish**, pastor of the church preached the sermon after which dinner was served on the grounds.

On returning to the Sanctuary after lunch, the Memorial Service for those who had died during the year was led by **Rev. Lacy T. Edens.** Paying tribute to **Homer B. Ward, Robert Stuart** reminded the congregation of the devotion Mr. Ward held for Centenary during his boyhood and on throughout his manhood.

Mrs. B.A. Edens paid tribute to her personal friend, Mrs. Sallie McCormic Connelly in a very touching way. Mrs. Connelly has lived away from the community much of her adult life, but is buried in the church cemetery.

Rev. Jack Ward Page, nephew of the late **J. Worth Burns**, paid tribute to him. The **Rev. Page** who is pastor of Hay Street Methodist Church in Fayetteville, explained how the influence of **Mr. Burns** was in a great way responsible for any success

that he and others like him might have found in their chosen vocations. He was a great leader in the church life at Centenary and in the Centenary – Rowland community as well.

In charge of choosing the lovely flowers used in the church in memory of those three deceased members was **Mrs. J. Gaddy Ward, Sr.**

Conduction the business session was **Frank Page** of Elm City, NC. **Preston McArthur** was elected chairman for the next year, **J. Gaddy Ward**, vicechairman; and **Mrs. Clifford Hammond**, secretary. **Lacy T. Edens** is the Church Historian.

A Church like everything else is judged by its "finished product". Centenary's first families have spread until they reach not only into Rowland in great numbers, but all over the state as well. In almost every instance these children and grandchildren take their places of leadership in their respective churches and communities in a way that would have made their elders very proud.

It is especially worthwhile to note that since its organization about 1880, three ministers of the gospel have gone from the rolls of this church. These are: Lacy T. Edens, now retired, Madison Ward Maness, now pastor of Trinity Methodist Church, Fairmont, N.C., and Jack Ward Page, mentioned before as pastor of Hay Street Methodist Church in Fayetteville.

The Rowland Methodist Church is an outgrowth of the Centenary Church. Due to the small Sunday School membership, and the accessibility to the Rowland Church, the Sunday School was disbanded some few years ago. However, as part of the Rowland Circuit, services are held twice monthly and very successful meetings are held annually. One such series is in progress this week with **Rev. Parrish** and his son, **Rev. Billy Parrish** preaching.

While many of the members have moved their membership to the Rowland Church, many others have, through love and loyalty to the church of their fathers, left theirs on the old church rolls. Some of these have presented their infants for baptism in recent months. These are: **Robert Worth Burns**, son of **Mr. and Mrs. B.O. Burns; William Ward**, son of **Mr. and Mrs. J. Gaddy Ward Jr.; Lucy Elaine Burns**, daughter of **Mr. and Mrs. Hal Burns**; and **Robbie Stuart**, daughter of **Mr. and Mrs. Robert F. Stuart Jr.**

It was indeed an inspiration to observe these friends and relatives on Homecoming Sunday enjoying fellowship together – meeting new members of the families, remarking on the fast growth of the children and finally visiting the adjoining cemetery where many of the Christian men and women of many years ago lie – still an influence for good to those who will only pause in their rush to reflect on the real meaning of life.

ROWLAND - Nearly 80 years of religious service to a community will be celebrated Sunday with a homecoming at Centenary Methodist Church near here.

Members, former members and friends will return to a scene rich with memories.

The name of Ashpole Mission appears first in the North Carolina Conference minutes of 1882. It was in the Fayetteville District, which ultimately became Maxton Circuit.

Before there was any organization or church building in this immediate community, preaching services were held in an unfinished building owned by **Alex McCormic.** Ministers from Maxton on the Ashpole Mission did the preaching.

Along about this time, preachers from South Carolina were coming to a brush arbor located about two miles south of where Centenary Methodist Church now stands. It was close by the home of a **Mr. Arch Stuart.** Indeed, a church building was started at this spot, but was never completed.

Preachers who served Centenary in the first five years, from 1882 to 1886 inclusive, included W. S. Chaffin, I. W. Avent, and J. A. Hornady.

Centenary was dedicated on May 9, 1886, with a sermon by **S. D. Adams**, presiding elder of the Fayetteville District. **Jonathan Sanford** was pastor at the time.

While Centenary was on the Robeson Circuit, the parsonage was located at Ashpole, now Fairmont. During part of this period, the church was in the Fayetteville District and the remainder of the time it was placed in the Rockingham District.

Presiding elders included S. D. Adams of Fayetteville, W. H. Bobbitt of Fayetteville, J. T. Gibbs of Fayetteville, M. L. Wood of Rockingham, W. H. Moore of Rockingham, and W. S. Rone of Rockingham.

When Rowland Circuit was created by the annual conference in 1902, Centenary became a part of it.

At one time, Centenary was the strongest church on the circuit, but the picture gradually changed as more and more of the people moved from the community, into Rowland and elsewhere.

Despite the smallness of its congregation, Centenary becomes alive and grows big at homecoming, always held on the fourth Sunday in August.

For old friends who gained their first knowledge of Sunday School and church at Centenary, the historic old church is a sanctuary for the renewal of faith as well as the renewal of old friendships.

Two-Church Merger Made at Rowland

ROWLAND – Centenary United Methodist Church has officially united with the Rowland United Methodist and merged with the local congregation.

The pastor of the charge, the **Rev. Don Lee Harris** led in the act of merger, and **James Pate**, trustee for Rowland United Methodist Church on its behalf responded and acknowledged the church merger. **Carl Edens**, trustee for Centenary United Methodist church acknowledged on behalf of the church the merger and declared it so in a brief litany of church merger.

The two churches celebrated the observance of the Lord's Supper which followed a meditation delivered by one of Centenary's minister sons, **The Rev. Madison W. Maness**.

The Historic Old Church has formed a Memorial Association and will continue to have its annual homecoming, and other special services.



Centenary Church Ceases As Full-Time Congregation

ROWLAND – The function of a historic Methodist Church has been changed. Centenary Methodist, south of Rowland, no longer harbors Sunday morning congregations for services, but it will be maintained and will be used for special services, the annual homecoming, and perhaps funerals. Members of the congregation will presumable attend other nearby churches of the same denomination.

The church, dedicated in 1886, has been deeded by the United Methodist Conference to the Centenary Memorial Association, chairmaned by **Robert F. Stuart, Jr.**

The congregation came into being when an unfinished building owned by **Alex McCormic** was provided, and preachers from what was then known as the Ashpole (Fairmont) Mission conducted services.

About the same time preachers from South Carolina were going to a brush arbor some two miles south of the present Centenary site, and a church building was eventually begun there. It was never completed and the new location was selected because, in those days, transportation difficulties made it necessary to have the sanctuary in a central location.

The church was first called Cotton Valley. It was begun in late 1884 and completed in 1885.

Centenary Sparkles on Its 28th Homecoming By Courtney Sharpe-Ward

Centenary Memorial United Methodist Church newly painted was sparklingly white and shiny for its 28th annual homecoming Sunday with several hundred attending. After 11 a.m. worship there was picnicking in the grove and then a brief business session. The church is four miles east of Rowland on Rt. 130.

The best of Robeson County cooking was offered on long groaning boards and nearby were smaller family sized tables where folks visited and lingered.

The Memorial Association Trustees and Homecoming committees were reelected. Trustees are: **Robert Stuart**, chairman, **James G. Ward**, **Jr.**, **Clifford (Jack) Hammond**, **Hal Burns**, **Jr.**, **John Clarence Edens**.

Renamed committees for Homecoming are: co-chairmen – Carl C. Edens and Cliff Hammond; secretary – Mrs. James G. Ward, Jr.; publicity – B.O. Burns; welcome – Mrs. H. D. Burns and Mrs. Clifford Hammond; - music – John Wesley Ward III, Jim Ward and Miss Lucy Burns; historian and memorials – Robert Stuart; church – Mrs. J. G. Ward, Miss Ora McCormic; flowers – Mrs. John McArn; grounds and tables – J. G. Ward, Sr. and Mrs. J. G. Ward, Jr.; supplies – Mrs. J. G. Ward, Sr.; water and ice – J. G. Ward, Sr., Robert Stuart and Leon Stuart. The interior of the church is handsomely paneled and flowers were largely pompon chrysanthemums in yellow and bronze which showed up well against the dark brown woodwork.

Flowers for the sanctuary were memorial gifts given by relatives and friends. Those whose memories were honored in this way were: Mrs. Blanche McLellan, given by Mrs. Gladys Priest and Mrs. Geneva Salvage; Mrs. Mattie Bullock – from Mr. and Mrs. J. G. Ward; John Tarkington by his family; Worth Stuart by his family; J. O. McArthur by his family. Also remembered were Mrs. Flonnie Gaddy and Mrs. Ruth Stuart Atkinson.

The homecoming worship message was by **Rev. Al Morris**, pastor of the Rowland United Methodist Church. A solo was sung by **Doug Page** of Raleigh, son of **Mr. and Mrs. Preston Page.**

The subject of the sermon was "Soul Food" for which the minister said that the peoples of the world are starving. "The Church hasn't been feeding the Bread of Life. It is more like a Garden Club feeding something like cotton candy," said **Morris**.

"If religion is to regain its authority it needs passionate belief in Christ and concern for fellow men."

Centenary is a gem of a country church with its gleaming whiteness accented by green shutters and green belfry touches. The church was established in 1882 and built in 1885. Since the church has become a Memorial Church, Homecoming is the one regular service in the year. Occasionally it is the scene of a christening or a wedding.

Homecoming Day at Centenary Church By Courtney Sharpe-Ward

Church Homecomings were an important part of the past in Robeson County and are a happy part of the past which has continued viable. The first for this fall was at Centenary Memorial United Methodist near Rowland on Sunday.

"What Mean These Stones?" was the sermon topic for the **Rev. Richard Edens** and the pastoral prayer was offered by **Rev. Jill Edens**, his wife. Richard is the grandson of **Carl C. and Myrtle Ward Edens** {and son of John **Clarence and Betty Jean Edens** of Laurinburg}. **Mr. Carl** is co-chairman of the Homecoming committee and was reelected to serve in this way.

The ministers who were married in May two days before they graduated from Yale Divinity School were the focus of much attention during the bountiful picnic as well as worship.

The **Rev. Edens'** ministry is in Wisconsin where, she said, there are ten clergy couples and all of them serve separate churches which are close to one another. **Richard and Jill** are associates in the same church working largely in education. They look forward to the time when each of them will be the pastor of a church. While they were at Yale about 40 per cent of the theology students were female.

Some of the places from which guests came were Shallotte, Raleigh, Charlotte, Kinston, Fayetteville, South Carolina, Georgia and New Jersey.

The Memorial church and adjacent cemetery were shiningly cleaned for this once-a-year occasion. Centenary is opened and in use for special events, too.

A special feature of the Homecoming was the celebration of Holy Baptism for Jonathan Foster (Jack) Page, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Foster Page of Raleigh.

The musical feature of the homecoming was a solo, "*The Holy City*" by **Miss Sharon Burney.** Accompanist and pianist for the service was **Jim Ward.**

Memorials were for Rev. Jack Ward Page, Edith Ward Edens, Ethel Crawford Ward and Bessie Ayers.

The lovely paneled interior of the small white church was decorated with very handsome floral arrangements given in memory of the deceased.

In loving memory of the **Rev. Jack Page** flowers were given by **Mrs. Jack Page** and family. **Mr. and Mrs. Carl Edens** gave flowers in memory of their mother, father, sisters and brothers.

Flowers in memory of Mrs. Ethel Crawford Ward were given by J. Gaddy Ward and family who also gave an arrangement honoring the memory of Mrs. Edith Edens. Mrs. Gladys Priest gave flowers in memory of her sister, Mrs. Blanche McLellan. Clifford Hammond was elected to serve with Carl C. Edens as co-chairman for the 1979 Homecoming. Ushers Sunday were Worth Burns and Clifford Hammond. Other ministers assisting in worship were Revs. Madison Maness and Al Morris.

Centenary church was established in 1882 and the building erected in 1885.

Church Homecoming: Robeson Fall Event By Courtney Sharpe-Ward

Distinctively Robeson County are church Homecomings in the fall. One of the first to usher in this season's round was Centenary Memorial United Methodist church a few miles from Rowland.

The program for these events follows a pattern and Centenary conformed to the usual. There was visiting on the grounds, worship with memorial flowers, bountiful picnicking from heavily laden tables under great old trees, more socializing and then a brief business session.

These events worship God and also celebrate family and kinship ties. Folks return to the church of their fathers and often meet kinfolk they see at no other times.

Display Case

The personal touch this Sunday at Centenary at its 30th annual Homecoming was the addition of a display case to the right of the pulpit as it faces the congregation.

This glass and oak case was placed in loving memory of **Mrs. Ethel Crawford Ward** by her husband **J. Gaddy Ward. Mrs. J. Gaddy Ward Jr.** is the custodian of the displays and showed them to this reporter.

In the case, preserved for posterity, are Communion Services and hymnals of the nineteenth century. The communion cups are taller than those usually used today. They are molded at the bottom to fit special groves. The tray and cover are oak.

Also on display is a hymnal only two by two and a half inches and with tiny type which is eye straining to read. It is known to date from 1845 to 1865. One hymn is "*For the expulsion of a Member*." It expresses the hope that the offender will reform and can be welcomed back to the fold.

The **Rev. Orville Watson**, new minister at Rowland Methodist, presided and preached on the subject "Dying Men, and the Living word". Special music was a solo by **James Gaddy Ward III. Miss Mary Alice Burns** was pianist.

The afternoon session was presided over by Clifford H. Hammond, chairman for Homecoming. Centenary Memorial Association Trustees are: Robert F. Stuart, J. Gaddy Ward, Jr., Clifford M. Hammond, Hal D. Burns, Jr., John Clarence Edens.

Tributes were read honoring the memories of Shep McArthur, Lizzie McCormic, Alicia Crawford, Sam and Ruby McLean and Ethel B. Ward.

Flowers in the sanctuary were given in loving memory of Alicia Crawford, Mrs. Blanche McLellan and Mr. and Mrs. J. Worth Burns.

Sun Shines On Faithful At Church's 100th Event

ROWLAND - The day before had been gray and dreary and the night had brought a steady, summer rain, but Sunday dawned a bright, beautiful and perfectly clear day in Rowland.

The folks at Centenary Methodist Church in Rowland, who were celebrating the 100th anniversary of the church's organization with an ingathering Sunday, were not a bit surprised about the weather.

"This is our thirty-third year and we've never been rained out" said Robert Stuart, 60. Stuart, who grew up in the Centenary church and counted the offering Sunday.

"Since the church was officially made a memorial church 12 years ago, we just have this one service a year, except for an occasional wedding," he said. "In-gathering" activities included a Sunday morning worship service, dinner on the grounds, slides of past reunions and singing of favorite hymns. "We've never been rained out," echoed Mrs. Clifford Hammond. "one year, we had to pick up our things right quickly after we ate, but that was all."

Mrs. Hammond said she came to the "very first one" in 1935 and "hasn't missed a one since."

"My husband grew up in the church," she said. "His grandfather did most of the work on the ceiling."

The Centenary church was organized as a mission church in 1882, and erected in 1885. The Rowland area was then known as "Cotton Valley." Annual reunions of church members and their families, called in-gatherings, have been held the fourth Sunday in August for 33 years.

The memories and rituals contained in the annual ingathering of the Centenary church are awesome. Parents and grandparents seem intent on instilling the love they have for their church and ancestors into their children and grandchildren.

"We had 77 people at my house last night for hot dogs," said Elaine Burns. We do it every year the night before homecoming.

"The Lord blesses us with good weather again this year. Everybody left the house last night around 10 o'clock, and at 10:30, it started raining," she said.

Mrs. Burns' grandson, Andrew Guy Burns, was christened at the service Sunday morning. Andrew is the son of Hal Douglas and Carolyn Smith Burns.

The Rev. Madison W. Maness delivered the morning sermon. Maness is one of three ministers produced by the Centenary church.

Neither C. B. Gaddy, 81 or Bessie Gaddy remember the first time they attended the Centenary church.

"I've been coming here since I was a baby," said C. B. Gaddy.

"When I came here I was in my mother's arms," said Bessie. "I was brought up in the church right here." Mrs.

Gaddy now lives in Lumberton but comes back every year to the August service.

A fond ritual at the yearly in-gatherings in the axe-handle tea made in two, huge metal tubs full of ice and lemon, and kept cool under the yard's many shade trees.

James Gaddy Ward, Jr. and his son, Bill, spooned the tea out this year.

"Mr. Gaddy (James Jr.'s father) used to do the tea," said Polly Ward Jr. "James inherited it. He uses the same axehandle (to stir the tea) his father used.

Polly, "secretary" of the yearly reunions, sends out reminders of the in-gathering and gets the church in shape for the event.

Abe Howell brought the crowd into the church from the yards Sunday for "home movies" by clanging an old cow bell.

"I was married in this church," said **Howell**, "on July 27, 1958. It was the hottest day you've ever seen.

Howell married the former Patsy Crawford. They now live in Matthews.

The day began and ended with the singing of hymns. "When we're singing the old hymns, I can just see the old ones standing up there singing." Said one longtime Centenary church member, **Ora McCormic**. The ones who have left us. It's real touching."

HISTORICAL SUMMARY

Centenary Methodist Church was organized in 1882 as an outgrowth of the brush arbor preaching services previously held in the **Stuart/Ayers** area near the North Carolina/South Carolina line. This is about two miles south of the present church site. Prior to the organization a circuit rider from South Carolina held meetings at various intervals. He came to preach and stayed in the homes of those prominent in helping to finalize the organization.

In August 1882 **Duncan A. McCormick** and wife, **Mary** gave (for the sum of five dollars) a portion of land so described for the church to be built (see copy of Deed). Until a church building could be built, preaching services were held in an unfinished building owned by **Mr. Alex McCormic.**

A building was erected in 1884-1885 and dedicated on May 9, 1886. The sermon was preached by presiding Elder of the Fayetteville District, S. D. Adams. His text was Psalm 126:3, "The Lord hath done great things for us, whereof we are glad." Jonathan Sanford was pastor of Centenary at this time. The church was first named Cotton Valley, later Centenary.

Family names prominent in the church records prior to 1900 were: McArthur, McCormic, Stuart, Ward, Easterling, Hammond, Jackson, Thompson, Butler, Smith, Campbell, Faulk, McLellan, McPhail, Martin, Burns, Edens, Kinlaw, Curtis, Murray, Sealey, Lowry, Oliver, Crawford, Carter. These additional names are found in the records of the early 1900's: Webb, Rowel, McLean, Ivey, Davis, Ratley, Gaddy, McLeod, McGirt, Johnson, Sellars, Rodgers, and Walker.

Old records show that the Sunday School was an active part of Centenary through the years. The **Baraca Class** in 1915 had thirty-four members on roll. The **Philathea Class** of the same year enrolled twenty-two. These classes were for young men and young women, respectively, **and Lacy T. Edens** and **Miss Attie McArthur** were the teachers.

Sunday School was held at Centenary until the early 1940's and the beginning of World War II. The work of the women of the church continued actively until the late 1940's. The Sunday School and Woman's Society of Christian Service joined then with members of the Rowland Church.

In 1969 Hal Douglas Burns, Jr. was preparing a Boy Scouts of America God and Country project and talked with the older member of the church who told him that the steeple, vestibule and Sunday school rooms were added in 1905. Pastor J. W. Bradley joined members as they did the work. Materials were also supplied by the members.

Centenary Methodist Church continued to hold worship services twice monthly until 1970 and in 1971 it was made a memorial church. Centenary Memorial Association chairman, Robert F. Stuart, Jr. was presented the church deed at the 1971 homecoming. Other Trustees are Hal Douglas Burns, John Clarence Edens, Clifford Marvin Hammond and James Gaddy Ward, Jr. The Board of Trustees has authority for the property and the funds and the Methodist Conference has no jurisdiction. Homecoming services are held each year on the fourth Sunday in August. The church is also open for Christenings, weddings, funerals or other religious services as needed.

Over the years the board of trustees has maintained the building with repairs, when necessary. A gas heating system was installed in 1950. A new roof and steps and painting were done in 1957. Nineteen sixty-five found minor repairs needed to the steeple, shutters and ventilators to go with the painting and all new doors. Carpet was placed in the aisles, in the chancel and in the vestibule in 1972. The green/gold tweed was selected to compliment the diagonal beaded ceiling paneling. A weed-eater was purchased in 1978 to be used especially around the cemetery markers.

In the winter of 1982 textured aluminum siding was added to the steeple before a new roof was put on. The stoop was then added. The vestibule floor was refinished after removing the carpet because of earlier leaks.

Hollies were set out on each side of the stoop in the spring of 1982.

It's too bad we have so little record of the history of the Centenary Methodist Church, because that missing record represents an awfully important part of the history of the families that have built it and kept it alive for more than 100 years. This stout little community church is, itself, part of the history of Robeson County, and has played such an important role in the lives of five or six generations in the Cotton Valley area, that it's difficult to ignore one's fascination with the history it represents. The laying on of hands that have brought it to its present state is the story of the love and importance that this church's families have bestowed upon the building as they lived out their lives in the countryside that surrounds Centenary.

The original church was a squat and modest little building, with no steeple, no vestibule, and just a little spit of a front stoop. Like many churches and public buildings of the farmland and pioneer country of the Carolinas, its length was roughly equal to the height of its front gable. This made for a very stout and stable box that could withstand some pretty tough storms - including the spring storm of 1905, which nearly destroyed the church in Rowland. But it also made the math easier when calculating lumber dimensions and window proportions. And that was an important function in rural building design, because so much of the work was accomplished by minimal educations, only basic folks with construction tools, and limited, but not insufficient, building construction experience.

We know that the vestibule was added on in 1903, and that it was painted, perhaps for the first time, in that same year. There's an old photo of the adjacent school house, taken in 1906, that shows it unpainted but sporting window shutters that are apparently identical to the shutters on Centenary Church. Were they built by the same hands, or in the same shop?

The original church front had a single, central entrance door, but entry from the new vestibule into the meeting hall is by either of two doors. So, the face of the original building was probably modified by covering the central opening and cutting two new doorways through the original front wall that now separated the vestibule from the meeting hall. Removing the center doorway would have allowed more space in the meeting hall for additional pews, at the rear. It seems that the original pews could have been moved back – say, by taking two or three pews from the front of the church and moving them to the newly created back rows.

In fact, some pews were added near the front at some point in time. These are the ones that lack the little rosettes on their end panels (rosettes are the applied disks, with concentric rings and flutes, that adorn the ends of the pews). The wood of these newer pews is different from that used in the originals, and it has aged and darkened differently from the others. Rosettes that were applied to the original pews may have been bought at a store in Laurinburg or Lumberton. It's conceivable that they were made in the shop that fabricated the pews, but not very likely, since the process of milling them usually relegates them to specialty factories with high-production equipment.

The pews at Centenary are very special items. The regular, rippled waves of a hand-planed surface speak of persistent, ritual, human labor in a way that few other human artifacts can. Each pew represents many hours of tedious hand planing, yet the result is unrefined. A professional shop would have possessed longer planes capable of making smoother surfaces over long runs.

The jack planes or smoothing planes used on these pews could have been found on many farms in Cotton Valley, and would have been used for everything from barn repairs to wagon outfitting to household maintenance. And most farmers would have had some experience with such tools, because the American farm of the 19th century required a set of mechanical skills that can be matched by few Americans of the 21st century. It wouldn't be surprising to learn that the pews were made by one or more of the original members of Centenary.

The vestibule doors have been replaced with modern ones. The doors that originally hung there were quite thick and heavy – were probably solid pine and nearly twice as thick is the ones hanging there now. On each doorjamb, the stop moldings are of two different styles, indicating that whoever replaced the doors and installed the moldings recycled moldings from somewhere else in the church or from another project.

Robert Stuart remembers the loud hissing of the carbide lamps, sizzling in the background throughout the evening-long revivals of his childhood. At some point, the carbide lamps were replaced by electric lights and, eventually, ceiling fans were added. He also remembers the old pot-bellied stove that heated the church until 1950. A wire chase, housing the electrical wires for today's ceiling fans and lights, spans the length of the meeting hall ceiling. It probably also conceals the main beam of the roof, which, considering the length of the hall, must be an impressive timber.

The windows represent another technical point of interest in this old building. Old growth timber, still available to mills of the 1880s, was quite strong and stable. But the window frame stock is narrow and appears to be much too fragile to remain flat and true for more than a few years in the extremes of North Carolina's climate swings - even if the best of lumber were used. Yet, these windows slide and seal in their tracks as if they're nearly new. Some panes have been replaced over the years, but much of the original glass float, with its bubbles and swirls, remains in its original glazing. Most windows in new homes today will not outlast these 125-year-old testaments to the quality of American workmanship that existed in the century before last. And there appear yet to be many decades ahead for this old building.

Not much is know about how Centenary got built, except for occasional writings that imply the congregation built this church with its own hands. Who did the carpentry, the furniture building, the glazing? How many hours spent in doing this or that – and how did they find the time to manage the farm and the home and still build this church? How much was done directly and how much in mill shops or by hired hands? If there are records of this, they remain hidden to this day. Perhaps some of this evidence is hidden away in your closet or attic . . . Wouldn't it be interesting to find and share? David M. 
