HISTORIC SKETCH OF GREEN LAKE CHURCH George G. Terry

The Green Lake Methodist Episcopal Church, South, one of the oldest Methodist Churches of Richmond County, has made an outstanding contribu-tion to the moral life of the county. It is the Mother Church of a large family of churches throughout the county.

The Green Lake Church has an interesting history. It had its birth in a great Brush Arbor Revival conducted by Lemon Shell in 1854. In 1855 Shell organized the church, purchased from R. J. Steele a site for the building, and started the building which was completed in 1856.

Norman McLeod was Treasurer of the Building Committee. His reports, dated March 20, 1856; to April 24, 1858, are in the possession of his son, A. B. McLeod, and shows the amounts donated to the building by the charter members. The exact report is as follows: "March 20, 1856, Norman McLeod, treasurer of the building commit-


It appears from the record that the contract was let to Tilman Dunn and that much of the work was done by Robert Webb and M. R. Mc-Donald. The original building was a splendid structure, built of good material at a cost of about \$600.00. During 1888 under the supervision of the late T. B. Ledbetter the church building was remodeled, ceiled, and changed from the round-top roof to: the present from. Under the direction of Rev. E. L. Hill, pastor, further repairs were made in 1919, this time new siding and paint was added.

As to the name of the church, tradition has it that back in the 'thirties, there was a road from Randolph County to Fayetteville passing a four-acre pond near Gibson's Mill, called Green Pond. The road bore the name, Green Pond Road. And so in 1855 when the church was organized and built, right on this green Pond Road, the organizers naturally adopted the name "Green Lake" Church.

This fine old church represents the heroic and sacrificial efforts of many preachers and laymen who have long since gone to their reward. The church building is a castle of sacred memories to many who still gather there for worship. Great life decisions have been made at its altars. Weddings, baptisms, and big meetings have taken place within its walls. Up the aisles of this church the faltering footsteps of sorrowing families have followed their loved ones.

Not only does this church stand as a memorial to past achievements but it is also making a significant contribution to this day and generation as it continues to train the boys and girls of that community for leadership among the noblest professions of men.

History of Green Lake United Methodist Church

The founding idea for Green Lake Methodist Church originated during a "Brush Arbor Revival" during the summer of 1854. Rev. Lemuel "Lemon" Shell preached and James O'Brien led the praying and singing.

Rev. Shell was born March 1, 1820, in Brunswick County, North Carolina, and was licensed November, 1844, at Conference in Pittsboro, North Carolina. In the fall of 1854-1855, he was sent to Rockingham Circuit. In the fall of 1856, he was appointed to Tar River Circuit. He died June 12, 1883, in Pineville, North Carolina and is buried in Oakwood Cemetery in Raleigh, North Carolina.

At the end of the meeting members of Bear Branch, a frame structure one and one-half miles south which stood by a cemetery, Pleasant Hill, a log structure five miles east, which stood on a hill back of J.T. McLeod's home, and Zoar, a log structure three and one-half miles north, which stood on a spot of the Murphy Lovin land, decided to come into one church to be known as Green Lake.

In 1855 a building committee, naming Norman McLeod as treasurer, was appointed to design a building. Among those contributing to the building fund were the following:

Mr. Norman McLeod, treasure, made his last financial report, April 24, 1858, having received from the building committee to that date, \$504.89.

On October 22, 1855, a site of land, approximately three acres, was purchased from R.J. Steele for \$1.00. The deed was made to Bryan Lovin and trustees of the church.

The contract for the building was let to Tilman Dunn with Robert Webb and M.R. McDonald doing much of the work. The church was completed in 1856 at a cost of approximately \$600.00.

During 1888 under the supervision of Thomas Benson Ledbetter (co-owner of the Ledbetter Yarn Mill), Green lake Church was remodeled, ceiled and changed from a round-top roof to the present form. This work was done at his own expense.

Extensive remodeling was done again in 1919 under the direction of Pastor E.L. Hill. New siding was put on and the church was painted. Also, new and more comfortable seats were installed.

After this work was completed, the church members celebrated by having a service followed by a picnic meal. It was decided to do this each year. So started the custom of the Annual Church Homecoming, which is held on the first Sunday of August every year. Until 1902, the church remained in the Rockingham Circuit, but that year changed to Roberdel Circuit and later to Roberdel Charge.

E.B. O'Brien was a child of only three and one-half years and remembers being at church with his mother and the rest of the babies and seeing the crowd standing around. After a man made a speech, a leader with a drum led a line and volunteers would step out of the crowd and fall into line.

The purpose of the public meeting in 1861 was to raise additional volunteers for the Third Company in Richmond County, The Richmond Boys. The meeting was addressed by Mr. Brown, Lieutenant S.M. Ingram, Captain O.H. Dockery, and James P. Leak, Esquire.

Green Pond Road

During the 1800's a group of people stopped at the E.B. O'Brien place, a farm onehalf mile north of Green Lake Church, seeking employment. Mr. "B" O'Brien put them to work clearing "new ground," cutting bushes, grubbing stumps, etc., at five cents each per day. Mr. O'Brien soon learned that they knew how to operate a gristmill, which ground corn into meal. Since there was a need in the community for such a mill, one was built east of the present R.L. Jones Chapel AME Zion Church, which is one-fourth mile north of Green Lake Church. A stream was dammed forming a lake and the new gristmill was run by waterpower.

One of the men in the group was named "Green" and another's name was "Lake." These two men operated the gristmill.

The road, only a wagon trail at that time, ran about three hundred yards east of the present highway between the E.B. O'Brien and the John W. Covington, Sr. farms. Since the road ran past the gristmill operated by Green and Lake, it is assumed that it became known as the Green Pond Road and is listed as such on old maps.

In 1855-1856 the "New Church" was constructed. It is said that Dennis O'Brien picked the name for the new church. He selected an Irish name for "Green Lakes" which nobody could pronounce and it drifted into simple "Green Lake."

In **1919**, the chandelier was bought from Roberdel Baptist Church for the sum of \$5.00.

In **1941**, the chandelier was wired for electricity by Rev. F.B. Brandenbury and Guy Midgette.

In **1947-1948**, wood shingles were removed by Crawford McNeill. Top solid sheeted and asphalt shingles were put on.

In 1950, the church was underpinned with brick.

In the spring of **1950**, the church bell was contributed by the estate of Mr. Tom Howell.

In 1951, walls and the ceiling were remodeled.

In 1953, the oak floor was laid and finished.

In **1954**, the concrete porch and central entrance was completed. The original entrance to the church was by two doors, one located at the base of each steeple, now replaced by windows, and one side door, which is still in use. New windows were also installed.

On May 8, 1960, the dedication service for the Education Building/Fellowship Hall was held. The cost for the building was \$18,000.

Also, in **1960**, new pews were purchased and a piano was given by Mr. Lindsey Frazier.

In **1963**, the Cemetery Memorial Fund was begun by former pastor, Rev, D.D, Traynham, A.T. Hutchinson, and Wade Terry, trustees, with a deposit of \$35.00.

In **1964**, carpet was purchased and the pulpit area was remodeled and new furniture was given by Mr. Lindsey Frazier.

On August 8, 1968, Homecoming Day, new Methodist Hymnals were dedicated. They were given by members of the church and friends.

In 1971, a new roof was put on the church. Also, land at the upper side of the cemetery was purchased from the Hector Little estate.

In December, 1972, new windows were installed in the Educational Building.

In 1973, there was major remodeling in the church with a new ceiling and new light fixtures installed. The church was repainted and rewired, and carpet was installed for the choir loft. The Chancel Rail was given in memory of Mr. and Mrs. Wade G. Terry, by their daughter, Nancy Terry. The Choir Rail was given in memory of Mrs. Florence McGee by her son, William T. McGee. The floor in the Educational Building was also covered. This work and the materials were donated by the United Methodist Youth. Also, walls were painted and new drapes were hung.

In November, 1974, the outside of the church was repainted by Paul McQueen at a cost of \$1250.

In **July**, **1975**, a new Hammond organ was purchased and paid for at a cost of \$1250.00. This organ was given in memory of Mrs. Pearlie O'Brien McIntosh and also in memory of the A.C. McLeod Family by a sizeable gift from Mrs. H.M. Smithey. Many friends of Green Lake contributed gifts to make this memorial possible.

In August, 1975, some additional cemetery land was cleared and sown with grass.

In **October**, 1975, a new cross, candle holders, and vases were purchased by the United Methodist Women. Paramount Cloths were given in memory of Mr. and Mrs. Wade G. Terry by members of the family.

In November, 1975, choir robes were purchased and received.

In **1976**, an air conditioning unit was installed in the Educational Building. A combination gas-heating and air conditioning unit was installed in the church by Cecil Berry. The total cost for both units, wiring, and overhead insulation was \$5200.00.

Also, approximately one acre of land (on the south side of Roberdel Road fronting on Ledbetter Road, a part of the Victor Womac estate) was bought and donated to Green Lake by Arlie and Linnie Baldwin.

In **October**, **1976**, a Centennial Celebration was held at Green Lake. A Time Capsule was buried in the cemetery. Items enclosed included: Copies of all property deeds, newspaper clippings, a history of the church, a transistor radio, a Sears catalog, and rules and regulations of the cemetery. The Time Capsule is located just below (east) of the tall Thomas H. Howell monument. A grave marker with the following inscription is just below the Time Capsule: "Eugene, son of L.H. and V. O'B. Webb, Oct. 30, 1874-Nov. 1, 1874" the first person buried at Green Lake. (However, there is a tombstone above this marker bearing the name of Daniel C. McLeod, born January 10, 1818, died June 10, 1870.) It is assumed that this was the first person buried at Green Lake, unless he was buried elsewhere and later moved to Green Lake.

In 1977, two doors to small classrooms inside the sanctuary and entrances were made into the vestibule of the church. This work by Claude Hall at a cost of \$624.00. Carpet was put on floors of the Youth and Young Adult classrooms by members of those classes. The cost was \$300.00.

In **1978**, church pews were refinished by Ron Lee and Don Lee. The cost was \$720.00 and was paid for by the Young Adult Class. A new roof was also put on top of the old one on the Educational Building by Booker Bowman at a cost of \$845.00. The shingles were purchased from Rockingham Hardware. The cost of the labor was \$192.00. Thirty-two squares of shingles, nails, and cement cost \$653.40.

In **January**, 1979, a new kitchen door and storm door were installed at a cost of \$80.00 by the Young Adult Class.

In **April**, **1979**, the front of the church, the windows and the window sashes were painted as well as the wood trim on the Educational Building by Paul McQueen. The cost was \$600.00, and was paid for by the Young Adult Class. Also, in April, electrical outlets, new switches, and an attic fan were added in the Educational Building. Work was done by Ralph Bellamy and Dolph Rankin. The cost was \$170.00 and was paid for by the Young Adult Class. In **March**, 1982, the Baptismal Font was dedicated in memory of Guy Midgette and Fannie T. Midgette Shaw. The Baptismal was given in memory of their parents by the family.

In April, 1982, work was done on the drives by Curtis Dawkins with most of the work donated. The cost was \$162.19.

In November, 1982, windows were purchased and installed in the Educational Building by Rev. George Marsh and Rev. D.D. Traynham. Windows and materials were purchased from Wicks at a cost of \$1255.69. Stain was purchased from Rockingham Glidden for \$11.98. Locks were purchased from Rockingham Hardward for \$20.30. Plates and engraving were purchased by Miss Lena Marks for \$54.39. Trim and moulding valued at \$300.00 were donated by Brown Moulding, for a total of \$1642.36.

In May, 1984, the church was painted on the outside as well as the trim on the Educational Building. Paul McQueen did the work at a cost of \$2,200.00.

In 1985, pews were covered in memory of Linwood Dawkins and the Memorial Board was begun.

In **1986**, Roberdel Charge was dissolved. Roberdel Church became Station; Green Lake and Ledbetter were left as a two-point charge. Rev. D.D.Traynham was appointed as Pastor, retired supply.

In **June**, **1987**, a new Communion set was purchased using money from the Memorial Fund at a cost of \$373.42. The old set, with Bible and bell are in the display case in the Fellowship Hall.

In September, 1987, the entrance to the cemetery and columns were added. The cost included \$1,050.00 for brick work done by Bill Lammonds; Metropal's Statuary, ball caps, \$250.00; Jack's Brick, bricks, \$449.00; Timms Memorial, engraving name plates, \$208.00; for a total cost of \$1,957.00.

In November, 1988, a new roof was put on the church by Ray's Construction for \$4,400.00. White vinyl siding and trim was put on the Educational Building by Ray's Aluminum and Construction at a cost of \$13,600.00. The total was \$18,000.00. Work was supervised by Wayne Dawkins.

In 1989-1992, Green Lake was placed on charge with Beaver Dam for three years.

In **1990**, acrylic paneling was placed inside the church windows at a cost of \$403.00. Those helping were Wayne Dawkins, Bill McGee, Ned Dawkins, and Rev. Earl Ussery.

In May, 1991, a handicapped ramp was built by Charles McInnis. Work was checked by Ned Dawkins. The cost was \$3,700.00.

In November, 1991, an aluminum awning was installed by Ron Goodwin over the section of handicapped ramp at a cost of \$1400.00. C.P. Dawkins checked the work.

In **May**, 1992, landscaping the church grounds was done by John Bass at a cost of \$1782.00. Wayne Dawkins checked the work.

In **June**, **1992**, Green Lake was made a one-Church Charge appointment to be supplied by retired Minister, Rev. Lee A. Phillips.

In **July**, **1992**, paint for the Fellowship Building, bathrooms and wallpaper were provided by Wayne Dawkins at a cost of \$400.00.

In August, 1992, work was done on the driveways by Jasper Christmas at a cost of \$500.00. Work was checked by Bill McGee. Also, in August, repair to the tall steeple and siding on the church building was made because it had been struck by lightning on Thursday, July 23, 1992, at approximately 5:00 pm. Materials for repair came from the

following: Southern Builders \$2,150.00, Bellamy Electric \$182.00, American Office for microwave, \$454.74 for a total of \$2,786.74.

In **December**, **1992**, new Paramount Cloths were obtained using \$430.00 from the Memorial Fund.

In May, 1993, Branford Pear trees were planted by C.P. Dawkins and were given in memory of Pauline and Rufus Dawkins by the family.

In **June**, 1993, drives behind the church and downhill were worked and pipes put in for drainage by Jasper Christmas at a cost of \$800.00. C.P. Dawkins checked the work. Painting of the sanctuary was done by Wayne Dawkins at a cost of \$425.00.

In July, 1993, a storage building was purchased from Discount City for \$1131.00.

In November, 1993, a new sound system was installed in the church by Rev. J.C. McQueen. The cost was \$893.00. The sum of \$700.00 was contributed in memory of Crawford and Ida Dawkins by their daughter, Geraldine D. Atkinson, and family. A \$200.00 memorial gift was made by the Monroe Dawkins family. A cabinet for the system costing \$135.00plus \$200.00 labor was also installed. A \$100.00 memorial gift was give by Ned and Ernestine Dawkins. The cost was \$1228.00. Ned and Ernestine Dawkins checked the work.

In **February**, **1994**, the roof was replaced on the Fellowship Building with 25-year warranty shingles, with two years on workmanship. Work was done by Edward Hatcher, Contractor at a cost of \$2,900.00. C.P. Dawkins checked the work.

In **June**, 1994, the exterior of the church windows and doors were painted. Also the metal lintels over the windows of the Fellowship Building (John Wix) at a cost of \$450.00. C.P. Dawkins checked the work.

In July, 1994, new carpet was installed in the foyer and towers and was paid for from the Youth fund at a cost of \$500.00 by Wayne Dawkins.

On August 15, 1994, storm windows white with one-fourth inch clear glass and insulation with vinyl wrap around were installed by Superior Awning at a cost of \$2710.00. Ned Dawkins checked the work.

In **May and June, 1995**, one rest room was enlarged to accommodate a handicapped person. Work was done by Ted Waters, Jr. at a cost of \$3,862.88. Floor covering costing \$191.00 was purchased by Wayne Dawkins for a total cost of \$4,053.88. C.P. Dawkins checked the work. Future plans included remodeling the altar area to return to its round design as it was in earlier years.

In August, 1995, a new kitchen stove was purchased at a cost of \$639.94. A gas-pack for the Church was replaced by Terry Brothers of Ellerbe, North Carolina.

In **November**, 1996, the gas furnace was replaced with a gas-pack in the Fellowship Hall by Terry Brothers of Ellerbe, North Carolina. Also, computer thermostats were put in both buildings. The cost was \$3,487.00.

In **1996**, emergency lights and fire extinguishers were placed in the church and Fellowship Hall. The door on the south side of the church was changed to open out. These additions and changes were made to comply with the Richmond County fire code. Crush and run were put on the center and south drives of the cemetery. Work was done by Jasper Christmas at a cost of \$1000.00.

In **1997**, five disc CD units for the sound system were purchased for \$160.00.

In **1998**, floodlights on the ground were installed at the front of the Church by Cary Baldwin and his son, Billy Baldwin at no charge.

In **July**, **1999**, a 32-inch television set was purchased and placed in the Fellowship Hall at a cost of \$655.00. Floor covering was installed in the men's rest room because of water damage. Work was done by Rex's Floor Covering of Rockingham, North Carolina at a cost of \$339.00.

Also in **1999**, new tile was put on the Fellowship Hall floor and carpet was replaced in some of the classrooms. New tile was put on the kitchen and nursery room floors. The work was done by Wayne Dawkins at a cost of \$10,555.00. The commode in the men's restroom was also replaced at a cost of \$200.00. A VCR was purchased for the television at a cost of \$84.00. One classroom was converted to the Pastor's Parlor by Wayne Dawkins using the old pulpit furniture.

In **2000**, asphalt shingles were stripped off the church roof and three-eighths inch plywood was put on top of the original sheeting with 25-year asphalt deminisal shingles put on by A-Roofing Company of Hamlet, North Carolina.

In **October**, **2000**, sixty-three new heart-pine hymnal racks were put on pews by Jimmy Liles of Hamlet, North Carolina in memory of C.P. Dawkins and Buck Blakley and were paid for by family members at a cost of \$800.00.

In **December**, 2000, forty new hymnals were purchased in memory of C.P. Dawkins by the family at a cost of \$678.48. Twenty pew Bibles were given by Rita Melton in memory of her father and in honor of her mother and two sons. Twenty- three pew Bibles were given in memory and honor of others.

On Sunday, **December 3, 2000**, a dedication service was held for the hymnal racks, new hymnals and pew Bibles.

Also, in **December, 2000**, an outside weather-proof water faucet was installed by Terry Heating and Plumbing of Ellerbe, North Carolina. A ten-bulb chandelier was hung in the vestibule of the Church by Wayne Dawkins.

In **2001**, round light fixtures with 150 watt bulbs were replaced in the Church with ten-bulb chandelier fixtures.

In April, 2001, Ned Dawkins put velpar pellets in the briar patch in the ballpark area.

In **October**, 2001, Ned Dawkins sprayed bush sprouts and briars in the ballpark area with arsenal.

In **November**, 2002, Pastor Gary Murphree and men of the church worked for four hours in the cemetery hauling dirt to fill sunken graves and straightening some leaning grave markers.

In **September**, 2003, a porch was added to the front entrance of the church by Mr. Doug McGee and his son at a cost of \$13,325.00. The two front doors of the church and one on the end of the Fellowship Hall were replaced with fiber-glass doors at a cost of \$704.64.

In **January**, **2004**, due to water damage from an old leaky ice maker, the kitchen floor had to be recovered. It was covered with block tile by Rex Taylor of Rockingham, North Carolina at the cost of \$682.00.

Dear Hed.

Since my note of the other day, I have found some more material concerning Green Lake, and I thought you might like to have it, if you do not have it already,

These are notes made by Mrs. Pearlie O'B. McIntosh, and were in some papers and records of hers which were given to me by William AcIntosh a year or so ago:

> "Green Lake Church started near 1854, finsihed in 1856. was formed from 3 other churches Bear Branch which stood on cemetery. Pleasant Hill which stood on hill back of J. T. McLeod house. Zoar which stood on spot that the Lurphy Lovin house now stands and one of old sills can yet be seen in one of the buildings. Lenuel Shell was pastor of the former three, he conducted a meeting (on Green Lake grounds) under a brush arbor and that was the beginning of Green Lake. In 1861 it was a meeting place for volunteers and were mustered out from there.

O'Brien was a ziri of only 3' years of age, and remembers being there with his mother and rest of babies and seeing the crowd standing around, and after a man made a speech, a leader with a drum led a line and volunteers would step out of the crowd and fallin line. Poppa gave me this information today after church at Green Lake, Paster E. C. Crawford. Sunday, April 14, 1935."

The Hill Liquor Lill pending in The North Carolin Legislature purposes to set up legal whiskey stores in North Carolina and place whiskey within easy reach of all the people of the State.

The bill purposes to keep these stores open from 9 in the morning to 9 in the evening. We would then have a 24 hour whiskey business, the legalized shift operat-

ing in the day and the bootleg shift working "atnight. This would only make bad matters worse. This bill would apply the "stretch-out" system to the liquor business of our state.

On Nov. 7, 1933, the people of Richmond County voted against legalize whiskey by a majority of 1792. These same people should write to Z. V. Morgan and James E Garrett and urge them to use their vote and influence to kill the Hill Bill. After a happy day on the grounds as the sun was sinking low, we went to the old home where there is a dear old brother and his wife, who perhaps have done more to hold up old Green Lake and its traditions than any one else. GREEN LAKE HAS FINE HOME COMING

Big Crowd Enjoys Excellent Program with Former Pastor Preaching. Interesting Home Comers. Cemetery Well Kept.

For many years the first Sunday in every August has been set apart by the Green Lake Methodist church congregation as Home Coming day. Likewise absent or former members and old residents of the community, who have moved away, keep the time in mind and return with unfailing regularity to enjoy a day at their old home church, an institution that played a major part in the building of one of Richmond county's finest rural communities. The "faithful few" continue to keep the home fires burning and are never in doubt of big results when they broadcast a welcome to these special annual meetings.

meetings. So the Home Coming August 2nd, 1936, easily takes its place among the many other successful ones at Green Lake. There have been other times when the program was more elaborate and the attendance possibly larger, but none in the past has brought more genuine joy to the hearts of the home comers or been more in keeping with the spirit of the day.

The program opened with a song service in which the fine home talent was ably assisted by the Rockingham Male Chorus. Many old time hymns were sung and it was a feast of music not soon to be forgotten. Mrs. T. J. Fletcher was at the piano.

E. B. O'Brien, grand old man of the Green Lake country and the oldest representative in the community of a family having a prominent part in the church's affairs since its very beginning, was fittingly selected to voice the official welcome to the home comers. And this faithful old spirit, with a long life of service and devotion to his church and to his people behind him, was very happy in performing this duty. His words were so cordial and sincere as to leave no doubt of their meaning.

John W. Covington, of Rockingham, who "pitched his tent" in the Green Lake section for several years and now anxiously looks forward to the annual home comings, responded to the aidress of welcome. He descended from an old stock of shouting Methodists, and is grateful to the ladies of the community for their efforts in making possible these yearly gatherings. The Commissioner made a good speech and ought to be encouraged to be more liberal with his talent along this line.

The outstanding number of the morning program was the sermon by a former pastor, Rev. J. G. Johnson, now of Laurinburg. Mr. Johnson was pastor at Green Lake in 1924 and is still very popular with his former charges. Pastor W. L. Dawson and his flock were unanimous in extending an invitation to him to return as preacher for this home He has committed much of coming. the Bible to memory, and last Sunday read the Scripture lesson and quoted many passages during his sermon without once opening the Book. His sermon was a masterly effort and, although it lasted a full hour, the audience was quiet and attentive to the last word.

The long dinner table out in the caks, that did duty on so many other public occasions, is gone and dinner was served by family groups. However, it was a regular Green Lake dinner and nothing was lost by the change, as much care was exercised to see that no one was left without an invitation to join in the feast. Much fine vituals were returned to baskets for lack of consumers. Barrels of ice water, with drinking cups, were placed in different parts of the grove.

The cemetery on the church grounds was in perfect condition last Sunday. THE HOME COMING AT GREEN LAKE

Annual Event Held Aug. 1, 1937. Church Packed, and Fine Spirit of Fellowship Evidenced.

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The first Sunday in every August is set apart as Home Coming day at old Green Lake Methodist church. People of the whole community surrounding and friends and former members from far and near keep this date in mind and return with remarkable regularity to enjoy again a day of worship and fellowship at this beloved old shrine. On these special occasions there is never any doubt about the congregation. The large auditorium is always filled.

And so it was last Sunday. An audience that taxed the building's capacity heard the eloquent address of welcome by Pastor Lupton, in which he extended the glad hand to members of all denominations. He preaches the old-time gospel religion, uninfluenced by denominationalism to the extent that he sometimes almost forgets what denomination he himself belongs to. In closing, the pastor called attention to the brave efforts the present; depleted membership was making to hold the work up to its accustomed standard, care for the large cemetery, keep the building in repair, etc., and suggested that some public spirited friends of the sacred old place could do a worthy deed by contributing to an endowment fund to guarantee its vermanent upkeep and continued usefulness.

Commissioner Chairman John W. Covington responded to the address of welcome in words that seemed to be coming direct from his heart. He lived out among these good people for awhile. They love him for his sincerety and co-operation, and never let him beg off from taking a part in their special programs.

Pastor Lupton, who presided during the day, introduced Rev. E. C. Crawford, former pastor at Green Lake, who had driven all the way from Northampton county to preach what he said was the first Home Coming sermon he had ever consented to deliver.

Notwithstanding his confessed inexperience along this line, the former pastor proceeded to deliver a masterpiece, apparently with the greatest ease because if the favorable atmosphere surrounding his effort. Much good work had been accomplished during his 3-year pastorate. For these years the most cordial relationship existed between the preacher and his flock, and now. after an absence of 20 months, he was recalled by unanimous vote to do the honors on this special occasion. And he did it to the complete satisfaction of all, judging by the way congratulations showered upon him at the end of his discourse. Mr. Crawford read a list of the 36 preachers who served the church since its beginning. Only 10 of them are still living.

Rev. Mr. Crawford is pastor of a circuit of churches at Rich Square. He said his wife had promised to give him a spanking if he failed to get back in time for his night service, so the preacher had to leave immediately after dinner for the 200 mile drive back home.

Like most other country churches, Green Lake has suffered serious loss in membership due to the harvest of death among the old members and the cityward movement of its young people, but somehow the remaining "faithful few" manage to get up Home Coming dinners well in keeping with the standard set in earlier days. Last Sunday there was an abundance of the finest vituals and everybody got a cordial invitation to join one or more of the numerous spreads scattered here and there over the grove. And, of course, there was the big barrel of refreshing ice cooled water.

High class music is always a special feature at Green Lake Home Comings, and never in recent times at least, has it been better than it was last Sunday. Among the members of the selected choir were Mrs. W. R. McIntosh, Mrs. John W. Covington, Mrs. Dan Allen, Mrs. Lacy Mc-Nair, Clyde Swink, Grover Wheliss, C. O. Funderburk, Leo Warburton, John Lupton, Dr. Isaiah McPhail, Mr. Flannagan, Mrs. Maggie Bennett. Mrs. T. J. Fletcher was pianist The very large cemetery and church grounds were beautifully clean, a task that is now much

too heavy for the small resident membership—but they have never failed to do it. Many of the graves were decorated with flowers.

The afternoon service was devoted almost entirely to music, with the exception of a few remarks by the pastor and one or two others.

At some Home Comings more elaborate programs were undertaken, but this one, with more time allowed for fellowship, possibly brought as much joy to the hundreds who attended as any yet held in the now 82-yearold building.

"But," as one old-timer sadly remarked, "Our Home Comings will never be the same." He was referring to the absence of Mr. E. B. O'Brien, Green Lake's grand old man, whose death occurred Nov. 29th, 1936. For years Mr. O'Brien seemed to be as much a part of the old church as the steps or the floor and benches in the building. He loved Green Lake and the folks who went there, and many missed his firm handshake, his smiling face and cordial greeting-"I am glad to see you," given in a way that left no doubt of sincerity. The death of this quiet, unassuming, faithful man left a vacancy in both church and community that will be hard to fill.

Green Lake 99th' Anniversary

Will be 100 in 1955

Annual Home Coming First Sunday in August. Steele Land Bought in 1855.

The question has been asked the Post-Dispatch as to exactly when Green Lake Methodist church was organized. The three acres were bought October 2. 1355 from Dr. R. J. Steele for one dollar.

From all authentic records available to this writer, the congregation was formed in 1855, and so it will be 100 years old next year—and can then celebrate its 100th anniversary. Singularly, October 2, 1955, fails on a Sunday! Be perfect timing for such a Celebration.

The annual Home Coming will be held this first Sunday in August but it will be the 99th year of its existence, according to the belief of this paper.

The first person buried in Green Lake cemetery, insofar as a marker is concerned is Daniel C. McLeod, born Jan. 10, 1318, died June 6, 1870.

died June 6., 1870. The way Green Lake was formed is interesting.

Rockingham Circuit 100 years or so ago embraced a number of churches.

From 1836 to 1841 Rockingham Circuit was in the Wilmington District. From 1841 to 1847 we were in the Cheraw District. 1848 to 1850 in the Fayetteville District, then from 1850 to 1858 in the Greensboro District.

The Presiding Elder of this Greensboro District in 1855. '56 and '57 was Rev. N. H. D. Wilson. Pastor of this Rockingham Circuit in 1854 and 1855 was Rev. Lemon Shell (or Schell?) The Circuit consisted of the Methodist groups Hebron, Philadelphia, Concord, Zoar, Pleasant Hill, Bear Branch, Mount Pleasant, Bethel, Rockingham, Provdence and Nebo.

In 1855 Rev. Mr. Shell conceivea the idea of holding a (Continued on Page Eight)

"meeting of days" in a location in reach of various churches of the Circuit. So a "brush arbor" was erected near where the present Green Lake building stands on the Greep Pond road, and a meeting or revival was held, this in 1855. It is even to this day referred to as "Shell's meeting"-it was so successful. Shell did the preaching and James O'Brien leading the singing and praying. At the end of the meeting the members of Zoar, Pleasant Hill and Bear Branch decided to come together into one church-Green Lake. It is said that Dennis O'Brien picked that name-an Irish name for "Green Lakes," nobody could pronounce the Irish and it drifted into simple GREEN LAKE.

A site was bought from R. J Steele the deed dated October 2, 1855. It consisted then of two acres (but a larger area for the expanded cemetery has since been added, \$1 was paid. Clerk of Court was L. H. Webb. The deed was made to Bryan Lovin and about a dozen other men as Trustees.

The contract for a building was let to Tillman Dunn, with Norman McLeod as treasurer, and Robert Webb and M. R. Mc-Donald doing much of the work. The building was completed in 1856 at a cost of about \$600. In 1888 it was remodeled and again in 1919. Until 1902 the church remained in the Rockingham Circult, but in that year it was switched to Roberdel Circuit with Rev. Z. T. Harrison as pastor. followed in 1904 by Rev. A. J. Groves who served until 1908 when Rev. J. M. Ashby took charge, followed in 1911 by Rev. G. H. Biggs, then in 1912 by Rev. Y. E. Wright, etc.

Rev. Lemon Shell came to this Rockingham Circuit in 1854. It is reasonable to suppose that it required some months, probably that first year, to get familiar with his new Circuit, and plan to launch his "brush arbor" revival in summer of 1855.

In 1856 the pastor of the Circuit was Rev. Peter Doub, assisted by Thomas L. Triplett. In 1857 by Peter Doub assisted by G. W. Heptinstall, Then in 1858 Peter Doub, was made Presiding Elder, and the pastor of the Rockingham Circuit was Rev. S. D. Adams. In 1856 it was still Rev. S. D. Adams but assisting was Rev. Marquis LaFayette Wood, a Missionary back from China. In 1860 Rev. John Tillet, assisted by Rev. William H Wheeler. In that Green Lake community were three small groups—ZOAR a log structure 3^{1}_{2} miles north: PLEASANT HILL, log. 5 miles east: BEAR BRANCH, frame, 1^{1}_{2} miles south.

Dennis and Jackson O'Brien hewed the timbers for the new church, and Tillman Dunn had the contract, assisted by Robert Webb and M. R. McDonald, But it is presumed just about every able-bodied man pitched in and helped, as it was built in late fall of 1355 and following winter, and finished in 1356.

The following contributed a total of \$504.89 to the building fund in 1355 and 1856—and you now in 1954 are descended from some of them, towit, W. E. Smith, Mrs. R. Smith, Norman McLeed, Walter Covington. John Terry, John Watson, Daniel Gibson, Matthew and Samuel Watsor, Bryant Lovin, Wilson Howard W. A. McDonald, Daniel McLeoo Eli Terry, R. B. Webb, Thomas Covington. Daniel McDonald Samuel W. Gibson, John Shortridge, Nelson Terry, Aaron Gibson, Lewis R. Thomas, and H. G. Terry.

Treasurer Norman McLeod made his final report as treasurer of the building fund, on April 24, 1858.

There is a sign in front of the church stating that it was organized in 1854. However, I be-

lieve the foregoing brief history is nearer correct.

At any rate, we are positive of the October 2, 1855, Deed, and of the \$504.89 as reported by Treasurer McLeod, and that the church building was not started until October, 1855, and finished in 1856.

However, it is possible that some sort of community revival may have been held in 1854 but the main, or Rev. Lemon Shell brush arbor revival was not until summer of 1855; and therefrom sprang the Green Lake congregation.

The Post-Dispatch makes bold to suggest a county-wide 100th Anniversary for Green Lake in August. 1955; or better still, have the Home Coming on October 2nd, 1955. which definitely is the 100th anniversary of the Deed given the baby congregation.

Let that 100th Anniversary be the Daddy-Rabbit of all Home Comings. And let all then join heartily in



Guy Midgette

Guy Midgette had been in failing health for some time, though he continued to work, and I had not known that he was critically ill until a news account of his death appeared in the Post-Dispatch. Have been expecting that someone would contribute a more extended account of his life. Since none has appeared, I will undertake to write briefly of this excellent citizen whom I have personally known and admired for many years. ing.

Mr. Midgette was born at Swanquarter on Pamlico Sound in Hyde county, N. C., Sept. 15, 1894. His father and mother were B. F. and Linnie Midgette. When Guy was only 11 years old death invaded the home and claimed his mother. A year later his father passed away and the subject of this sketch became one of six orphaned children—three girls and three boys. Four still survive—B. F. Midgette, Jr., and J. R. Midgette, of Swanquarter, Mrs. John Salter, of Beaufort, and Mrs. T. B. Swindell, of Kinston.

The John W. Bennett family, who formerly lived about a mile north of old Roberdel, established a large sawmill and timber business at Swanguarter and young Guy Midgette became very much attached to them. When the Bennetts were ready to return to Richmond county, in 1914, Mr. Midgette, then 20 years old, refused to part with his good friends and came along with them. He obtained work in old Roberdel mill and was promoted to the position of loom fixer, where he became a dependable and master craftsman-serving the mill in this exacting capacity for 25 years.

Mr. Midgette joined forces with one of Richmond county's great old families in his marriage to Miss Fannie Terry, daughter of Stephen Terry, a prominent and highly esteemed citizen of Gibson Mills. Mrs. Midgette and two daughters—Linnie, wife of Sgt. Arlie S. Baldwin, of the armed forces, and Miss Lucille Midgette survive the devoted husband and father.

Before coming to Richmond county Mr. Midgette had joined the church at Bell Haven, N. C. After his marriage he moved his membership to Green Take and up to the time of his and so completely self-enacing that only his closest friend realized the magnitude of his good qualities and his work as a citizen, churchman, loyal friend and dependable neighbor. He had abundantly lived the good life here and often told his devoted wife that he was ready and willing to go whenever the summons came. 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

Storm Resulted In Damage To Church, Power Outages

A storm that settled over Richmond County late Wednesday afternoon caused power outages in some parts of the county and caused damage to at least one structure — the Green Lake United Methodist Church building.

Power was lost to two businesses in the vicinity of downtown Rockingham when a truck driven by Ronald Young of Ellerbe struck a utility pole near the Dairy Queen restaurant on US 74. According to the report of the Rockingham Police Department, Young said his vehicle hydroplaned when it hit a pool of water in the highway and ran off the road, striking the utility pole. The pole containing a utility transformer snapped, blocking all four lanes of traffic. Police and firemen had to direct traffic through town until the pole could be repaired, a fireman told the Daily Journal.

Representatives of Carolina Power & Light Co. and Pee Dee Electric Membership Corp. said their workers handled power outages throughout the county Wednesday evening.

James Moore, an engineer for CP&L, said residences and businesses were without power in scattered locations from Hamlet to Ellerbe, although he did not have the specific number of outages related to the storm. CP&L workers restored power from 7:30 p.m. Wednesday till early this morning, he said. Some CP&L customers were without power for between five to six hours.

M. C. Long, district manager for Pee Dee Elecaric Membership Corp., said between 2,000-2,500 customers were without power between Laurel Hill and Norman. The loss of power at a substation in the Roberdel community caused outages to 300-500 of those customers, he said. Power was restored in two hours to the customers, he said.

Two members of Green Lake Un-

ited Methodist Church, located on Ledbetter Road near Rockingham, told the Daily Journal lightning had struck one of the church's steeples during the storm, damaging the steeple and siding along the building.


Storm damage was also reported by the Assiciated Press in other counties around the state

Lightning ignited fires that damaged one home, a business and a barn in Davidson County, while heavy rains flooded nearly every street in Siler City, officials say.

Carter's body shop near Arcadia was destroyed in a fire caused by lightning, said firefighter James Coppley of the Arcadia, Ruddy Creek and Hampton Township Fire Department.

The fire, reported shortly before 7 p.m., caused about \$10,000 in structural damage and about \$10,000 in damage to the contents, including a couple of cars and parts.

Lightning caused another fire at a house, Coppley said. Wiring caught fire in the attic, and insulation was burning when firefighters responded about 9:30 p.m. There wasn't much damage to the house, he said.





Green Lake Cemetery

The Green Lake Perpetual Cemetery Fund was begun in the spring of 1963 with the deposit of \$35.00 in the Richmond Savings and Loan of Rockingham, North Carolina from the sale of some pine trees on the property of Green Lake Church. Rev. D.D. Traynham, Mr. Wade Terry, and Mr. Arthur Hutchinson were responsible for taking this action.

It was the intent of the Founding Group that contributions, money from grave opening fees, and sale of grave lots would be placed on deposit and ONLY THE INTEREST FROM SAID DEPOSIT BE USED FOR THE MOWING AND UP-KEEP OF GREEN LAKE CEMETERY.

Needless to say, it was many years before the Fund generated enough interest to start paying the expense of mowing the cemetery. During that period when the cemetery needed mowing, a "hat was passed" and money was raised by the church members.

During his live-time, Mr. Wade Terry assumed the duty of taking care of the Fund, and also the sale of grave lots, the collection of grave opening fees, and supervision of the cemetery mowing. It took a lot of volunteer work on the parts of church members and friends to clear the trees from the cemetery, to dig stumps, and to spring centipede grass (Prior to this time, 1963, it had been the responsibility of lot owners to keep their graves clean; some did, but most did not; and a few had planted centipede grass on their lots.). The establishment of a uniform grassy sod was a long and arduous task; much of the credit for this pains-taking work goes to Mrs. S.C. Gardner, Sr., her children, and her grandchildren. The Gardner family took care of the cemetery for many years. Grave lots had been marked off with rocks, cement blocks, iron pipes, wire fences, chains strung between metal or wooden posts, and various other methods of identification. It took a lot of negotiating on the parts of church officials to convince people to remove these objects and to place proper corner markers to their lots.

After the death of Mr. Wade Terry, his daughter, Nancy, became treasurer of the Cemetery Fund and Ned Dawkins took the job of cemetery custodian.

A Memorial Service is held annually and letters of invitation are sent to persons who have family buried here. The collection from this service, plus contributions mailed to us are placed in the Cemetery Fund.

Since its inception, the Green Lake Perpetual Cemetery Fund has been supported by the following: Contributions, Memorial Day service collections, grave-opening fees, and the sale of grave lots.

In September, 1983, a document referred to as the Green Lake Perpetual Cemetery Fund Trust Agreement was drawn up by the trustees with the help of James Pittman, Attorney at Law of Rockingham, North Carolina and presented to the Administrative Board for their approval and later to a Rockingham Charge Conference for its approval. Both bodies were in consent and the Trust Agreement was then recorded in the Richmond county Register of Deeds Office on the 5th day of October, 1983 at 2:29 pm, Book 662; pages 145,146, 147, and 148. (This Agreement was corrected and re-recorded on October 16, 2001, in Book 1133; pages 02017-0221).

Sign Is Explained 1-29-1984

To the Editor,

The picture of the sign at the cemetery of Green Lake United Methodist Church, which appeared on the front page of the Journal on Monday, Feb. 27 really gave me a jolt as it (or a similar one) has been in this spot for the past 20 years and of course I have become accustomed to it and don't really notice the wording.

I can understand how a person upon seeing this sign for the first time might consider it a bit ludicrous; detracting from the beauty and serenity of the cemetery behind it.

However there is (or rather was) a definite reason for placing the sign in the cemetery.

In 1963 the members of Green Lake started a fund to mow and otherwise maintain the cemetery and grounds in a proper manner. Prior to that time the burial lots had been given to anyone and this eventually led to abuse. People would come and stake off lots without the knowledge or permission of church officials; bury without securing a lot and often this would be on someone else's burial plot.

Consequently Green Lake developed a reputation as being a cireap place to bury. A lot of still-born babies are buried here; graves unmarked and forgotten. The members of the church cleaned the grounds once a year; the week before homecoming. However the burial plot owners planted all manner of trees and shrubs; fenced their lots with wire, cement blocks, iron posts with chains, all of which when left unattended for years became extremely unsightly.

Finally in 1963 with the encouragement and direction of our pastor, Rev. D. D. Traynham, a fund was started so that we would have money to mow the cemetery when needed. With the permission of the grave lot owners we gradually removed the wire fences, block walls, iron posts, trees and shrubs and planted centipede grass. We now forbide anything on a person's lot except floral arrangements.

In September of 1983 the Trustees of Green Lake United Methodist Church drew up a trust

agreement which is entitled Green Lake Perpetual Cemetery Fund. Said Trust Agreement was duly approved by the Administrative Council of Green Lake United Methodist Church, the Roberdel Charge Conference of the N. C. Methodist Conference and has been recorded by the Register of Deeds of Richmond County. The Fund will be kept at no less than \$16,000 and only the interest from said Fund can be used to mow and maintain the Green Lake Cemetery. Thus ensuring the perpetual care of this cemetery.

But, to get back to your picture of our sign I'm reminded of the time I asked to use a friend's bath room. They directed me to a small room equipped with a lavatory and commode. Above the commode was a crude picture of an hour glass; drawn I'm sure by a child in Bible School. The picture being placed here no doubt by the loving parent because of lack of wall space in the house. The drawing showed that most of the sand from the top portion of the hour glass had flowed to the lower section. The caption underneath read: Watch and Pray. When I laughingly mentioned the picture to my friend she immediately removed it.














BEHIND THE BOYS

Casey's Cheese Straws

(as given to me by Grandma Betty)

2 packed cups grated cheese (let it set at room temp for 8 hours) 1 stick of butter (also room temp) 1 ½ cups plain flour sifted 1 tsp baking powder 1 tsp paprika ½ tsp salt ½ tsp red pepper (less if you don't want them spicy)

Sift the flour once. Add the baking powder paprika, salt and pepper to the flour and sift again. Cream together the cheese and butter, then add to the flour mixture. Using cookie press place on ungreased cookie sheet. (I use a baking stone.) Bake at 450° for 10 to 15 minutes.

*Note in pressing out the dough, smaller cheese straws tend to be crunchier than larger ones.

Sausage & Egg Muffins
