HISTORICAL STATEMENT ABOUT
THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE

The North Carolina Conference was set off from the Virginia Conference in May 1836, and in 1850, and again in 1870, North Carolina territory in the South Carolina Conference was transferred to this Conference. In 1890 North Carolina territory in the Holston Conference and in the Virginia Conference, except that beyond the Chowan River, was transferred to the North Carolina Conference, and the Conference was divided into the North Carolina and the Western North Carolina Conferences. In 1894 the remaining North Carolina territory in the Virginia Conference was transferred to the North Carolina Conference.

The North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church was composed of the North Carolina Conference of the former M. E. Church, South, and parts of the North Carolina Conference of the former Methodist Protestant Church and the Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference of the former Methodist Episcopal Church. The former Methodist Episcopal Church gave to the North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church 9 preachers, 11 charges and 1,837 members; the former Methodist Protestant Church 23 preachers, 20 charges and 9,152 members; the former Methodist Episcopal Church, South, 273 preachers, 226 charges and 132,735 members.

This Historical Statement may be found in many of the North Carolina Conference Journals including 1956, 1957, and 1958.

THE BEGINNING OF METHODISM IN FAYETTEVILLE

In the late 1700's the Reverend Henry Evans came to Fayetteville on his way to Charleston. He was a shoemaker by trade, a free-born Virginian. He was a negro licensed to preach by the Methodists of Virginia. Bishop Francis Asbury must have had some knowledge of the Reverend Evans although his journal does not yet mention him.

Some said of Reverend Evans that there were not many men more conversant in the scripture than he. He was a man full of the fire of revival. He wrote "Fire to preach with doesn't fill the belly. I tell you a black free-man in Virginia in 1790 lives a hard life. A black shoemaker makes no shoes, and a black Christian is not trusted by black man or white."

Henry Evans left Virginia for Charleston where he had heard artisans fared better. He got as far as Fayetteville, stopped for a few days, and saw that people of his race were without spiritual guidance and never heard preaching from any source. With deep conviction he made known his plans to preach in Fayetteville. He was surprised at how, after several sessions, the news of his arrival and preaching to the slaves and black free-men had spread.

Under the guidance of the Reverend Henry Evans there was the beginning of a great religious awakening in Fayetteville and in the Town Council there was the beginning of alarm. Councilmen thought that it was dangerous to have a negro preacher with the ability and influence and effectiveness of Henry Evans in the community. The Council, thus, ordered him to stop preaching.

"But" said Evans "I pressed on. I pressed on. I continued holding services until the Town Council finally drove me out of town. I withdrew into the woods, so that I was outside the law of the Council; but, this did not stop the opposition from passing into the hands of the mob. Still I escaped the mob by changing my appointments so that when the angry mob went to work their will upon me at one place, I was preaching elsewhere. I determined to preach Christian salvation, to do what I could to reconcile my enemies to me, and to leave the rest to God."

Henry Evans' conviction proved to be true, for his work produced results. Opposition slowly faded. Slaves, and even their masters were being spiritually transformed. One after another of the white people began to feel and believe that their servants were attending his preaching not because they were made worse but because they were made better. It was not long before there was a change in public opinion.

As Evans wrote "When I resumed preaching in the town of Fayetteville there was not a single church edifice in that city; so I determined to build one. I leased land at Cross Creek for seven years, and from a saw mill across the creek I carried the timbers on my own shoulders. It was a small frame structure, 50 feet by 30 feet. I set seats apart for the races. I felt the building wholly adequate for the time.

For the time, yes. But soon the whites crowded out of their designated seats, took possession of those in the rear until eventually the small church had to be enlarged.

In the winter of 1788 Bishop Francis Asbury had come to Fayetteville. The date was February 19. His journal records simply that he was unable to preach.

In February 1805 Bishop Asbury returned to Fayetteville. He wrote in his journal "We rode 12 miles to Fayetteville. I was invited to preach in the State House (where the Presbyterians held their services) but it did not suit my mind since the object of my visit was a Methodist Congregation. Home is home. Ours is plain to be sure but it is our duty to condescend to men of low estate. Therefore, I felt justified in declining the polite invitation of the Reverend Mr. Flinn to preach in the State House in preference to preach at Brother Evans African Meeting House."

In 1808 Henry Evans was no longer able to carry on his work and it was then that Bishop Asbury handed over the charge of the Methodist Episcopal Church in Fayetteville to the Reverend Thomas Mason.

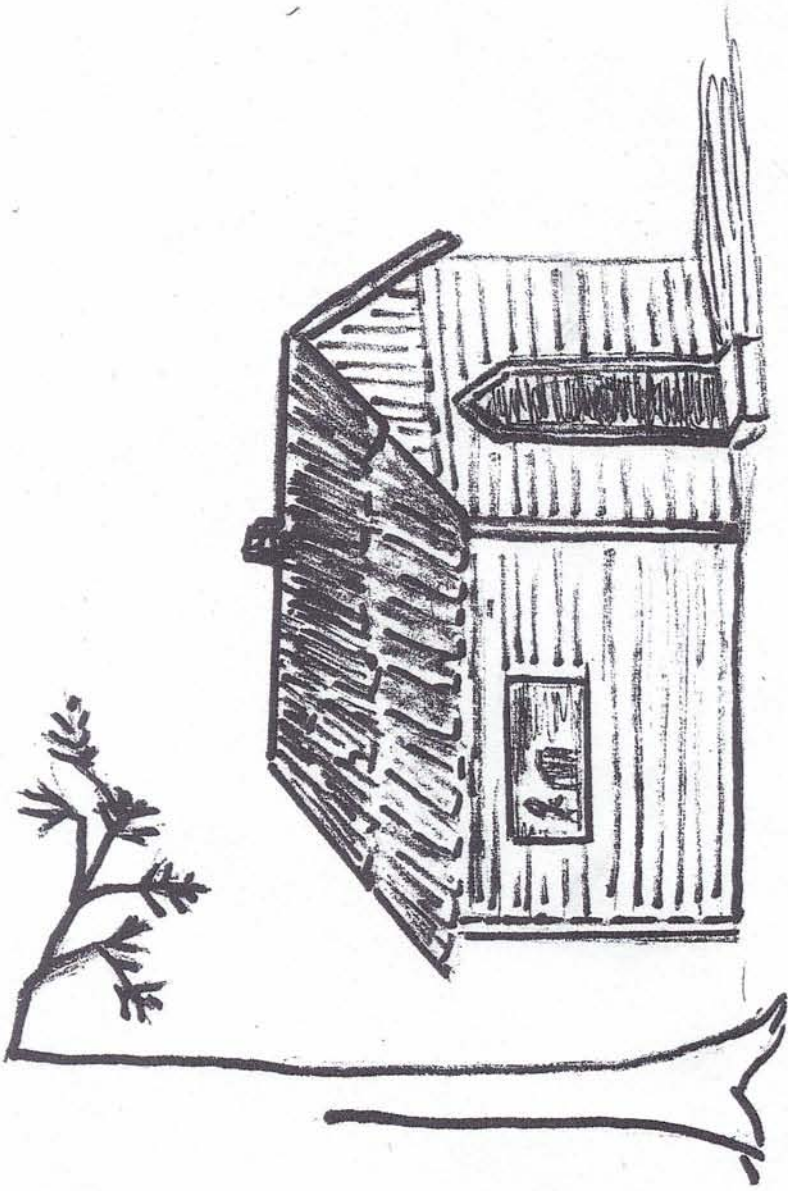
In 1834, on Hay Street in the center of town, the Methodists were building a new church. There were money problems and other delays but in October 1834 it was decided to hold the first service.

It is recorded "Sunday, the 13th of October, we all of us, both white and colored, marched from the neat little chapel built by Father Henry Evans on Cool Spring Street to the new church building on Hay Street and made it a time of great rejoicing. We marched together." The colored congregation returned to the church on Cool Spring Street. It is now known as Evans Metropolitan A. M. E. Zion Church. The white congregation occupied the building on Hay Street beginning the congregation known as Hay Street Methodist Church.

Again the congregation outgrew the building. During 1908, the Centennial of Methodism in Fayetteville, another building project was undertaken and the church building we now recognize as Hay Street Church was built.

The need for a Methodist Church on Haymount Hill was felt in the early 1940's. In 1945 thirty-five families withdrew from Hay Street Church and began a new congregation. They called it Haymount Methodist Church.

A CHURCH IS NEEDED IN HAYMOUNT

The history of Haymount Methodist Church did not begin with the appointment of a committee, the selection and assignment of a pastor, nor did it begin with the laying of stone. Our Church actually began to take form in the minds and hearts of a very small group of devoted Christians who were anxious to venture out with their time, their efforts, and their possessions, even to the extent of sacrificing, if need be, to make their mark in the building of Christ's Kingdom.

During the war years, 1939 through 1945, hundreds of persons migrated to Fayetteville from other communities to find employment or to be near their loved ones at nearby Fort Bragg. As a result of this migration several thousand new homes were constructed and occupied in and near the Haymount section of this city. Conditions such as this, and for the same causes, were developing throughout the Country.

The General Conference of the Methodist Church in 1945 launched a campaign throughout the Country for Church Extension. The Council of Bishops had seen the need for new Churches in cities of rapid growth such as Fayetteville.

It was as a result of this campaign that, under the leadership of the Rev. W. L. Clegg, District Superintendent of the Fayetteville District, several members of Hay Street Methodist Church including W. L. Williams, John W. Hensdale, Taylor Melvin, R. E. Adams, and George W. Tinnin, and others, began to make plans for organization of Haymount Methodist Church.

On the night of September 18, 1945 a called meeting by the Rev. Mr. Clegg was held in the District Parsonage to discuss the organization of a Methodist Church in the Haymount section of the City. J. W. Hensdale and the late Horace Sisk were appointed to a committee to select a building site with another committee being appointed to secure a place for the pastor to live. These committees began functioning immediately and it is needless to say here that they carried out their duties in splendid manner when we look with pride at our beautiful Church property today.

On October 28, 1945 there was another called meeting by the Rev. W. L. Clegg of all persons interested in the new church. This meeting was held in the Confederate Woman's Home Chapel with about 50 people attending. Interesting and inspiring talks were made by several members of the group and all were in favor, and of one accord, in going ahead with plans for the new church. It was at this meeting that the Rev. J. D. Bundy made a very inspiring talk encouraging the movement, and it was here that he said and I quote "It is one of my supreme desires in my closing days to see a Methodist Church in this part of the city" end of quote. It was, also, at this meeting that a motion was made and carried to organize the Church. The District Superintendent appointed a Steering Committee consisting of J. W. Hensdale, Mrs. Sutton, George W. Tinnin, W. L. Williams, A. T. Moore, R. R. Johnson, Taylor Melvin, L. C. Lawrence and R. E. Adams.

The next meeting was held on November 14, 1945 at the District Parsonage, this was the first meeting following Annual Conference, and those present had the privilege of meeting our first pastor, the Rev. Virgil E. Queen and his wife. Immediately following the committee meeting Rev. Mr. Clegg called a Quarterly Conference, the purpose of which was to complete the organization of the Church, and the Church was duly organized at this Conference.

Mr. Charles Pearson's Remarks continued.

The first services were held at Westmont School and later the meeting place was moved to the Confederate Woman's Home Chapel where services were held until the present Church building was completed, which was in 1951.

As I stated earlier, our first minister was the Rev. Virgil E. Queen who was an outstanding minister, organizer and church builder. Mr. Queen served the Church as pastor for a period of seven years leaving in 1952 to become District Superintendent of the Wilmington District.

The Rev. Mr. Queen was succeeded by the Rev. E. Stanley Potter who served the Church in a splendid and faithful manner until November of 1954. By this time the Church had grown to a membership of over 500. Our next pastor was the Rev. Clyde E. Boggs who served from 1954 to 1957. The Church also experienced considerable growth during this period.

Mr. Boggs was succeeded by our present pastor, the Rev. Russell S. Harrison, who has now served us in a splendid manner for a period of 2 years, during which time our membership has continued to increase.

Now, I would like to review with you some of our past accomplishments in the hope that we might be inspired to continue our expansion program. Within the first year after the organization and with a membership of less than 150, the Church has purchased, and paid for, this entire block of property including the parsonage, and within 7 years, with an average membership of approximately 350, more than \$100,000 had been paid into the building fund and within the past 8 years we have applied and additional \$90,000 in principal and interest in retiring our total indebtedness. I believe it fitting here to pay tribute to the Women's Society of Christian Service, because within the past 5 years they have through special projects raised and contributed to the building fund more than \$10,000. This has made it possible to retire our indebtedness 3 years earlier than we would have done otherwise.

We have met the challenge thus far, but we cannot stop here, we must go forward and complete the work which we pledged ourselves to in the very beginning.

Our overall plans call for the present buildings being used for Educational and Recreational purposes, our future plans, as prepared by our architects indicate a Sanctuary and Educational Building which will be joined with the present structure. The entire Church Plant will be of Gothic Architecture using North Carolina stone. This is not something that has been added, this is a part of the dream and if we are to keep faith with ourselves and those who planned before us we must strive for completion of the entire project.

In closing allow me to say this to you. We are here tonight because a small group of people 14 years ago had a dream and with it the faith and courage to press forward in the face of many obstacles. Many others have joined to work toward that goal and with the same faith and courage we will continue to build until our dream becomes a reality.

HISTORICAL RECORD
THE HAYMOUNT METHODIST CHURCH

The Haymount Methodist Church was organized November 28, 1945 at a Quarterly Conference held in the Chapel of the Confederate Womans Home, Fayetteville, N.C. The Reverend Wm. L. Clegg, District Superintendent of the Fayetteville District presided.. Robert E. Adams was elected Secretary.

The creation of a new Methodist congregation in Fayetteville was effected to meet a long neglected need. For several years the population of the city had been growing _ moving steadily westward. The World War II years 1940-45 had witnessed a tremendous expansion in the part of Fayetteville known as Haymount. Here was a community of 10,000 persons with no Methodist church.

The Quadrennial program of 1944-48 known as the Crusade for Christ, set aside the year of 1945-46 as the year of Evangelism. Part of this emphasis called for the organization of 500 new Methodist congregations to meet the need of the numerous new communities developing as a result of the country's population shifts. Haymount was one of these new projects.

Preliminary Steps

Recognizing the desparate need for a Methodist Church in Fayetteville's Haymount section, the Reverend Wm. L. Clegg, District Superintendent of the Fayetteville District, called to-gather a small company of persons known to favor this church extension project. This meeting was held at the Fayetteville District Parsonage, 1019 Hay Street, on the evening of September 18, 1945. The following persons were present: Mr. and Mrs. Robert E. Adams, Joseph Gilbert, John W. Hensdale, C.P. Pate, Horace Sisk, and Mrs. Thomas H. Sutton. At this meeting two Committees were appointed. The one was to locate a possible building site; the other to find suitable living quarters for a minister. John W. Hensdale and Horace Sisk were appointed to investigate available building sites; Joseph Gilbert and Robert E. Adams were appointed to find proper living quarters for a Pastor. This meeting adjourned to meet again on September 28, 1945.

This group met on September 28, 1945 at the Fayetteville District parsonage, 1019 Hay Street. Those attending were: Robert E. Adams the Reverend Wm. L. Clegg,(D.S.), John W. Hensdale, L.J. Gardner, Taylor Melvin, George W. Tinnin, and Wm. L. Williams.

The question of temporary facilities for church services was discussed. The Westlawn School was considered adequate, and the chair appointed Robert E. Adams and Mrs. Thomas H. Sutton to appear before the City School Board at its next meeting to request permission to use the Westlawn School for church services until such time when a permanent place could be secured.

The Committee appointed to locate a building site reported that no suitable place had been found; the Committee was continued with instructions to pursue the matter further.

On Saturday, September 29, 1945, another meeting was held at the Westlawn School attended by; Robert E. Adams, the Reverend Wm. L. Clegg, LT. Brundy Melvin, Taylor Melvin, and Wm. L. Williams. This group approved the Westlawn School as a suitable place for beginning church services. This group also visited several building sites at this time but none were chosen.

The Fayetteville City School Board met on Oct. 2, 1945. Robert E. Adams and Mrs. Thomas H. Sutton presented the request for permission to hold public religious services in the Westlawn School under the auspices of the Methodist Church. The School Board consented for the proposed congregation to use the Westlawn School building as a temporary place of worship.

On Sunday evening, October 28, 1945, the Reverend Wm. L. Clegg invited the public to a meeting held in the Chapel of the Confederate Womans Home. Approximately fifty persons attended. Several talks were made by various persons on the desirability of a new Methodist Church for the Haymount area of Fayetteville. Among them was the Reverend J.D. Bundy (Retired), who said, "It is one of the supreme desires of my closing days to see a Methodist Church in this part of the city."

Joseph T. Lloyd moved that the District Superintendent proceed with plans for the organization of a Methodist congregation for Haymount. His motion was seconded by R.R. Johnson. The motion was adopted.

The District Superintendent, Reverend Wm. L. Clegg appointed a Steering Committee composed of the following members: R. E. Adams, John W. Hensdale, R.R. Johnson, L.C. Lawrence, Jr., Taylor Melvin, Arthur T. Moore, George W. Tinnin, Mrs. Thomas H. Sutton, and Wm. L. Williams. John W. Hensdale was made Chairman and Robert E. Adams, Secretary-Treasurer of this Steering Committee.

A Property Committee was appointed as follows: Robert E. Adams, L.C. Lawrence, Jr., Taylor Melvin, Arthur T. Moore, Mrs. Thomas H. Sutton and George W. Tinnin. Taylor Melvin was designated Chairman of this Committee.

Robert E. Adams and Taylor Melvin reported that the property at 1700 Ft. Bragg Road, lying between Pearl Street and Cape Fear avenue was available at a price of \$11,000.

A Pastor Is Appointed

At the session of the N.C. Annual Conference, which met in Saint Paul Church, Goldsboro, N.C., Bishop W.W. Peele appointed the Reverend Vergil Erwin Queen as the Pastor of a new church to be organized in the Haymount section of Fayetteville. Mr. Queen arrived in Fayetteville on November 14, 1945. That evening a meeting was held at the Fayetteville District Parsonage, 1019 Hay Street, called by John W. Hensdale, chairman of the Steering Committee. Those attending this meeting were: Robert E. Adams, the Reverend and Mrs. Wm. L. Clegg, John W. Hensdale, R.R. Johnson, Dr. J.H. Judd, L.C. Lawrence, Jr., Mrs. L.C. Lawrence, Jr., John C. Lawrence, Joseph T. Lloyd, Mrs. Joseph T. Lloyd, Taylor Melvin, J.R. McPhail, Jr., Mrs. Thomas H. Sutton, George W. Tinnin, Arthur T. Moore, Mrs. Arthur T. Moore, Reverend Vergil E. Queen, and Mrs. Vergil E. Queen.

The Reverend Wm. L. Clegg, District Superintendent, declared a called session of the Quarterly Conference and the following persons were elected as the Board of Trustees:

The following Committee was appointed to study the matter of choosing a proper name for the proposed congregation: Dr. J.H. Judd, Mrs. L.C. Lawrence, Jr., Mrs. Joseph T. Lloyd, Joseph R. McPhail, Jr., Mrs. Vergil E. Queen, and Mrs. Thomas H. Sutton.

The Committee reported on the property investigation and recommended that the site on Ft. Bragg Road between Pearl Street and Cape Fear Ave. be purchased as the location for the new building, the price to be \$11,000.00. Joseph T. Lloyd moved and R.R. Johnson seconded the motion, authorizing the Trustees to purchase said property. The motion was adopted.

An offering was taken and approximately \$1000.00 was received to apply on the purchase price of the property.

It was announced that the new minister, the Reverend Vergil E. Queen, would be presented to the community at the morning service in the HAY Street Methodist Church, Sunday, November 18, 1945 at the 11:00 o'clock service at which Mr. Queen will be the guest preacher.

The First Public Services

The first formal service of worship held by the newly gathered congregation took place on Thursday, Nov. 22, 1945 (Thanksgiving Day) at 10:45 a.m. An offering was taken for the Methodist Orphanage. Regular morning and evening worship began the following Sunday, November 25, 1945.

World War II

Fayetteville became a military community because of Ft. Bragg and Pope Air Base.

There was a large influx of new residents into Fayetteville.

A need was seen for a Methodist Church in the Haymount area.

The General Conference of the Methodist Church adopted as it's Quadrennial theme for 1944-1948 "Crusade For Christ."

1945-1946 was designated as the "Year of Evangelism" with the goal to build 500 Methodist Churches nationwide.

September 18, 1945

A meeting was called by District Superintendent W. Lemmuel Clegg to discuss the organization of a Methodist Church in the Haymount area of Fayetteville. Those attending were members of Hay Street Methodist Church. Among them were R. E. Adams, John W. Hensdale, Wilson Yarborough, Mary Sutton Lamb, George W. Tinnin, and Horace Sisk. They agreed to the need for a church in that area and they agreed to proceed to make it happen. Two committees were appointed: a Building Site Committee with John W. Hensdale and Horace Sisk as co-chairmen and a Parsonage Committee.

September 28, 1945

A second meeting was held at the District Parsonage. The problem of finding temporary facilities for holding church services was discussed. Westlawn School (now Alma Eason) was suggested. Robert Adams and Mrs. Thomas Sutton were appointed to appear before the City School Board to make the request.

October 2, 1945

Also, in October the Board of the Confederate Women's Home was contacted about using their chapel as a meeting place for a new Methodist congregation. Permission granted.

October 28, 1945

A meeting was called by District Superintendent W. L. Clegg. It was held in the Chapel of the Confederate Women's Home. 50 people attended. A motion was made and carried to organize a church in the Haymount area. A Steering Committee was appointed. Shortly thereafter, Bishop Peele was visited by a group including George Tinnin who told him "Send us a pastor and we will build you a church."

November 7, 1945

The Seventh Annual Session of the North Carolina Conference, Richmond Area, of the Methodist Church was convened by Bishop Walter W. Peele at Saint Paul Methodist Church, Goldsboro, North Carolina.

November 11, 1945

The Reverend Vergil Erwin Queen was appointed by Bishop Peele to serve as pastor of the new Methodist Church in the Haymount area of Fayetteville.

November 14, 1945

The Reverend Vergil E. Queen and his wife, Frances Sharpe Queen, moved to Fayetteville into a house at the corner of Ellington Street and Calcut Street, one block from Ft. Bragg Road.

November 14, 1945

A meeting held at the District Parsonage called by the District Superintendent, W. L. Clegg, was declared to be a Quarterly Conference. The new congregation was officially organized. A committee was appointed to consider a name for the congregation.

The Property Committee, George W. Tinnin chairman, reported that a 3½ acre tract containing a two story frame house located in the 1700 block of Ft. Bragg Road was available for \$11,000.00. A vote authorized the new trustees to purchase the property. An offering taken that evening raised \$1,000.00. Also, on the Property Committee: Dabney R. Allen, Vice Chairman and L. E. Lawrence, Jr. Secretary.

The group was determined to launch a full program of Methodist work: Evangelism, Education, Missions and Stewardship.

November 1945

Mason Bell became Music Director. As the new church did not have any money for salaries the Trustees allowed Mason to live rent free in the two-story house on the new church property in return for his musical services.

November 22, 1945 Thanksgiving Day

The first worship service of the new church was held in the Chapel of the Confederate Women's Home. Membership at the time was officially 38.

November 25, 1945 Sunday

The first regular worship service was held.

November 28, 1945

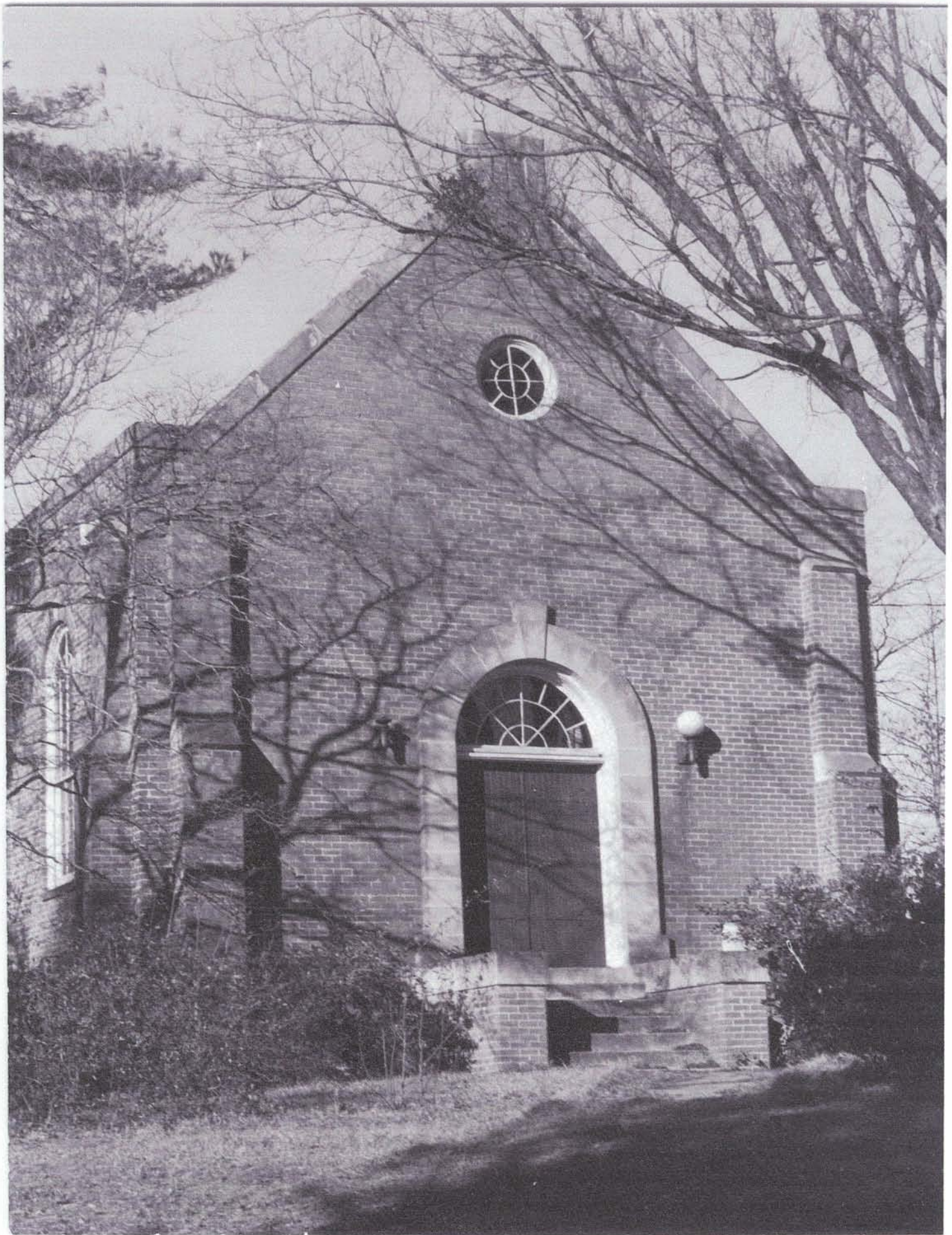
A Board of Stewards was organized: John W. Hensdale, Chairman, Dabney R. Allen, Vice-Chairman, and L.E. Lawrence, Jr. Secretary.

December 3, 1945

A Board of Trustees was elected: George W. Tinnin, Chairman, Arthur T. Moore, Vice-Chairman, L. E. Lawrence, Jr. Secretary.
A Finance Committee was organized: W. L. Williams Chairman, Taylor Melvin Vice-Chairman, and J. T. Loyd Secretary.

December 9, 1945

The Church School was organized. The Adult Bible Class had 18 members. The teacher was J. T. Loyd.

IMPORTANT DATES - 1946

January 1946

January was Charter Membership Month. 112 people became Charter Members.

January 6, 1946

A Charter Sunday Service was held with Bishop Walter W. Peele as guest preacher.

January 14, 1946

The organizational meeting of Haymount Methodist Women's Society of Christian Service was held with 20 women present. Officers elected were:

Secretary	-	Mrs. Warren Atwater
Treasurer	-	Mrs. E. W. Shepherd

January 14, 1946

The name "The Haymount Methodist Church" became official by vote of the membership.

Other Items Of Interest In January

The house on the church property was rented to a tenant for \$40.00 per month. The tenant was renting out the second floor for \$60.00 per month. The whole building was badly in need of repair. The Official Board voted to ask the tenant to move so that they could repair the building, then raise the rent. It never happened. The tenant didn't move out.

George Tinnin resigned as Chairman of the Properties Committee. Mr. E. W. Atwater became Chairman.

Mr. C. C. Culbreth became Secretary of the Official Board replacing L. E. Lawrence, Jr.

February 1, 1946

Charter Membership was closed. There were 112 members representing 35 families.

March 11, 1946

The Property was completely paid for.

There was a need for Sunday School class rooms particularly for the teen-agers. A building campaign was anticipated. Rev. Jesse D. Bundy (retired) made the first donation to the anticipated campaign of \$100.00.

March 14, 1946

A Building Campaign was agreed upon. The following committees were set up:

- Executive Committee
- Plans Committee
- Finance Committee

A five room house adjacent to the church property was for sale. It was agreed to purchase it for use as the parsonage. This was accomplished by April.

1946

In a written statement by Mason Bell about the house in which he lived on the church lot facing Cape Fear Avenue, he wrote:

"The windows in the living room came down to the floor. It was a huge living room. A 9'x12' rug was only a postage stamp on the floor."

Mason held choir practice in his home. The house did not have a heating system. It had a "Warm Morning" heater in the room next to the kitchen which was used as a den. There was a kerosene heater in the living room. There was not any heat upstairs. .

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INFORMATION ABOUT 1947

January 14, 1947

The Men's Fellowship received approval from the Official Board for it to sponsor a Boy Scout Troop. A Cub Scout Pack is, also, being formed.

An agreement was reached by the Official Board to pay the WSCS ladies a regular amount for each person served at Fellowship Dinners.

April 7, 1947

Because of the growth of the Sunday School Department, there was a need for more chairs.

Charles Adams, treasurer, reported that the Parsonage was fully paid for.

June 9, 1947

Evening services were discontinued until September 14.

It was agreed to have a church-wide visitation of church members by volunteer laymen. One of the purposes is to acquaint the stewards with the members.

July 8, 1947

George Tinnin was praised by the Property Committee for the good work in getting the church site cleaned up in preparation for the building program.

September 8, 1947

So far, the visitation program has had only moderate results.

The treasurer reported that all Conference items had been paid. With the exception of running expenses, all receipts for the remainder of the Conference year will go into the Building Fund.

A need was felt that there should be discussions with the church building architect about the projected church plans. There is a need to have something concrete to present to potential givers. A sketch of the proposed church building would be helpful.

November 3, 1947

It was unanimously agreed to return the elected members of the 1947 Official board to serve again in 1948. The house-to-house campaigning was discussed.

December 1, 1947

Pledges to date for the new year amounted to \$8,800.00. A problem: how to get all members to pledge.

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INFORMATION ABOUT 1948

February 2, 1948

At the Official Board meeting, Rev. Queen showed interest in having programs using visual aids.

The Church is in need of a permanent organist.

There was discussion about the Building Program, whether to build the Sanctuary first or the Educational Building.

April 1948

The WSCS was asked to raise \$500.00 for the Building Fund to buy a load of stone. Each of the five circles took the responsibility of raising \$100.00.

Summer 1948

Mr. John Hensdale, manager of the Belk-Hensdale Store downtown offered space for a food booth at the store. Each Saturday in May, August and September one circle supplied cakes, pies, cookies and sandwiches for sale. In August, the W.S.C.S. gave the Building Fund \$500.00.

September 8, 1948

Because of the needs of the Confederate Women's Home, it requested that Haymount only use the Chapel on Sundays.

It was decided that Sunday evening services would be resumed in October.

A rotation plan of membership on the Official Board was adopted. A member must be off the Board for one year before being re-appointed.

The Church architect raised questions about the heating and air-conditioning systems to be used.

October 29, 1948

The Official Board elected new officers. They were:

December 6, 1948

A motion passed that the chairman of the Official Board appoint each quarter a member of the Board to be responsible for supplying ushers to serve at all Church services in that quarter. Mr. Warren was appointed to serve the first quarter.

IMPORTANT FACTS OF 1948 - continued

December 1948

W.S.C.S. met in The Hut for its December meeting. They held a Pollyanna Christmas Party. The circles were selling Christmas cards and 100 bottles of flavoring. The money raised would go to the Building Fund.

In addition, the W.S.C.S. gaved money to the Building Fund raised from their Fuller Brush Parties.

IMPORTANT FACTS OF 1949

January 3, 1949

Windows in the Chapel of the Confederate Women's Home were in need of repair. It was unanimously agreed that repairs should be made to those windows that could not be closed.

Also, the subject of assuming responsibility for the heating of the Chapel was discussed.

A motion was passed that in order to make the budget current each quarter, the pastor was authorized to write such letters as he deemed necessary to those members who were delinquent in the payment of their pledges.

A letter to Mr. W. L. Smith, manager of Sears, Roebuck & Co. was authorized, thanking him for the collection of toys so generously donated by him to the Church School.

The Boy Scouts have been meeting in one of the Huts. They were given permission to take out a partition in the Hut and put up a curtain instead, giving them more room.

February 7, 1949

The Property Committee was authorized, in cooperation with Rev. Queen, to have signs made and placed as they saw fit.

March 7, 1949

George Tinnin reported to the Official Board that he had discussed with the City Engineer the matter of a church sign in front of the Chapel of the Confederate Women's Home and found it would be impractical to erect a sign the required distance from the street.

Attendance at the Sunday evening services has been low. Discussion about continuing to hold them would be held in April.

Haymount held its first gathering on the new church grounds with a Barbeque and Chicken Salad Dinner sponsored by the W.S.C.S. on May 3, 1949.

May 16, 1949

The W.S.C.S. installed the following:

IMPORTANT FACTS OF 1949 - continued

May 30, 1949

A special meeting of the Official Board was held, meeting in "The Hut" on the grounds of the Confederate Woman's Home. The meeting was called to discuss adjustments in the plans for the building. A motion was made that the architect be asked to furnish immediately plans and specifications for the Sanctuary including the Tower but without the steeple. This was to include the heating system for the entire project and whatever else was needed to complete the project.

June 10, 1949

At a special meeting, the Official Board heard a report from Mr. Wagoner about the plans for the building.

July 11, 1949

The Official Board agreed to lend to the Men's Fellowship Club \$130.12 to build an outside furnace.

August 1, 1949

Mr. Layton McDonald graded the building site property. He, also, had some of his equipment stolen. The Church agreed to compensate him in some manner for the loss.

A special committee from the W.S.C.S. requested of the Official Board that the residence on Cape Fear Ave. be vacated and opened up for general church use. The request would be granted as soon as Mr. Mason Bell could make arrangements for another house.

Specifications for our Church sanctuary were expected during the week. A committee was named to submit the plans for bids to builders.

September 12, 1949

The Board authorized a letter to the District Superintendent that Rev. Vergil E. Queen be reassigned to Haymount.

October 24, 1949

At a special meeting of the Official Board, Dixon Construction Company was awarded the plans and specifications for the new building.

IMPORTANT FACTS OF 1949 - continued

November 7, 1949

Mason Bell had not been able to find a new home to live in so the Church's house was still occupied.

December 5, 1949

A committee appointed by the Board to assist Mason Bell in finding a house had been unsuccessful.

Mr. R. E. Adams, Church treasurer, reported the Church to be in excellent financial condition.

Regarding The Plans For A Complex of Buildings

During the first months of 1949 there was great concern about the plans for the proposed Haymount Methodist Church complex of buildings which would include a sanctuary, offices, classroom space and a recreational hall with kitchen.

The drawings for this complex were completed and delivered in late summer 1949. Bids were requested. It was learned, then, that the cost of building this complex would be prohibitive for the congregation. Loans were available but, they, also, were prohibitive. Consequently, a great deal of discussion took place.

After lengthy discussions with the architect, it was determined that the recreational hall and the educational unit could be erected as a complete church plant, if some adjustments were made. These adjustments would be to adapt the recreational hall, designing it to serve as the sanctuary. This could be done for \$125,000. (See report of The Building Committee, 1950 file.)

FACTS OF 1950

January 2, 1950

The Committee to help Mason Bell find a house was not successful. Suggestions were made.

The steps of the house Mason Bell rents are in need of repair. And, several glass windows need to be replaced in the "Huts."

February 6, 1950

Mr. R. C. Adams gave a "splendid" report about the Church finances for the period November 1, 1949 through January 1, 1950.

There is a possibility that Mason Bell will buy a house. The steps to his present house have been repaired.

A motion passed to have the Official Board recommend to the Finance Committee that they make a report to the Board of the steps that should be taken in raising money for the Building Fund.

The Board voted not to have a special Building Fund Drive at this time.

March 6, 1950

During the meeting of the Official Board, Carl Barrington, chairman, appointed J. L. Beck and C. W. Pearson to investigate the possibilities of developing a program for the youth of the Church who are in the Primary through the Intermediate Departments of the Church School.

The Official Board authorized the Building Committee to proceed with the plan of building offices, classrooms, and a recreational hall with kitchen, with the recreational hall being adapted for use as a sanctuary.

May 1, 1950

Reporting for the Property Committee, Mr. W. B. Warren said that the Church lot had been cleared off at a cost of \$16.00.

Mr. J. L. Beck, reporting for the Sunday Evening Fellowship Committee pointed out that much progress had been made. A recommendation passed that the Sunday Evening Fellowship be financed through the regular Church School budget.

June 6, 1950

A joint Membership and Evangelism Committee is being formed.

FACTS OF 1950 - continued

July 3, 1950

It was reported that the house on Church property rented by Mason Bell was now vacant. No decision was made at this meeting to rent it.

August 4, 1950

Mr. Fred S. Dixon, architect, was present to discuss the availability of materials, some being in short supply due to war needs. He felt that if orders were placed immediately for steel, cement and mill work that the materials could be obtained. After discussion it was agreed to begin construction of the first phase of the church building immediately. Modifications were made to the plans for the Fellowship Hall so that it could serve as a temporary sanctuary, seating 350.

The architectural design was modified Gothic. The building materials were to be Wake County granite and limestone with interior oak trim.

Fall 1950

An arrangement was made with Methodist College for 3 college students to work with Haymount's youth groups, Junior, Middle and Senior High MYF. These students were to participate in planning and implementation of the programs of the specific youth group to which he/she was assigned. Each of the students would receive a tuition grant of \$150.00 for each semester.

October 23, 1950

From the 4th Quarter Report made by pastor Rev. Vergil Queen.

"The Haymount Methodist Church approaches the end of its fifth year with mingled feelings of triumphs and disappointment; triumph in a sense of God's guiding providence and in a sense of special mission and purpose; but, disappointment nevertheless, in that the original aims and goals of the church have not been accomplished. However, the Church faces the future with faith in itself and a serene confidence that "He will continue the good work begun in us."

October 29, 1950

At 2:00 p.m. the laymen inaugurated Haymount's first Every Member Visitation Week, asking for loyalty and support during the coming year, especially on pushing the Building Program.

November 23, 1950 - Thanksgiving Day

The Fifth Anniversary of the Church was celebrated. A note in the bulletin reported that there was still a need to raise \$40,000 before the end of the year to complete the new church building.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION OF 1951

January 1951

Mrs. Harold Pigott and Mrs Roy C. Warren were hired to direct Children's Activities. Each was to receive \$10.00 per month.

From the Pastor's Report to the Quarterly Conference:

Central aspect of the program is the completion of the building.

The Church uses the Official Board plan of organization.

The organizations of the Church - Methodist Youth Fellowship, Women's Society of Christian Service and the Men's Fellowship - are doing excellent work.

The general church's "Advance" program is on "Christ and His Church." The Advance book is "Endless Line of Splendor". Mr. Queen preached a series of sermons on this topic which dealt with Methodism.

February 5, 1951

Ways of reducing the hazard of fire in The Huts was discussed at the Official Board Meeting.

March 5, 1951

A committee was appointed to study the problem of church furnishings in the new building, particularly the Chapel seating.

April 2, 1951

The Committee On Church Furnishings reported that they favored chairs instead of pews for the Chapel.

May 7, 1951

Report was made to the Official Board that 300 chairs had been ordered at \$11.95 each.

June 11, 1951

Booklets containing the history of the Church and the church membership list have been made. They will be distributed after the membership occupies the new building.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION OF 1951

Continured

August 6, 1951

In an effort to underwrite the purchase of the chairs, the president of the Adult Class, the Pastor and the Program Committee of the Methodist Men were asked to present the matter to their groups.

September 10, 1951

The Trustees were given permission to act in the matter of disposing of the frame house on the Church lot.

September, October 1951

Haymount Methodist Church moved into its now completed building.

October 1, 1951

The Women's Society of Christian Service reported in its Report To The Quarterly Conference that it was involved in these activities:

Keeping the Church nursery, Flowere, Special project for the Building Fund, Purchased the Church organ, Gave aid for needy families at Christmas and provided the Methodist Youth Fellowship refreshments.

October 28, 1951

There were 350 members.

A formal opening service was held.

(The unit was dedicated later, on June 14, 1959 when the debt had been paid.)

Mainly From Official Board Minutes

January 7, 1952

Letter read from Dixon Construction Company that all work on the building had been completed.

Arthur Moore, Church treasurer, reported that the building and equipment had been insured for \$110,000.00.

The Church has been interviewing applicants for the position of Director of Religious Education.

January 20, 1952

The Young Adult Class presented "A Service Of Worship In Drama."

February 4, 1952

Mr. Queen has been investigating the purchase of a bulletin board for the Church lot.

Additional chairs, a small table and carpet were authorized to be purchased for the nursery.

The Board agreed to allow Radio Station WFNC to broadcast Haymount's Sunday morning service.

March 10, 1952

The purchase of tackboard and blackboard for the Primary and Junior Departments was authorized.

The Committee continues to look for a Director of Christian Education.

April 7, 1952

Mr. Queen reported that an order had been placed for an outside bulletin board. It was agreed to hire an Emory University student, in theology, as Assistant Pastor on a temporary basis.

May 5, 1952

A motion passed authorizing the payment of \$200.00 per month to Mr. Atwater from the date of his arrival until the convening of the Annual Conference.

June 2, 1952

Mr. Atwater agreed to the terms of employment. He was to arrive June 12, 1952. A room would be rented for him at the home of Mr. L. C. Lawrence for \$30.00 per month.

Discussion was held about continuing Sunday Evening services during the summer months. The decision was put off until July.

July 7, 1952

Mr. George Tinnin was asked to look into the matter of establishing Church signs on Bragg Blvd at the intersection of Cape Fear Ave. and Pearl Street.

August 4, 1952

Mr. George Tinnin reported that the city would allow church signs to be placed on Bragg Blvd at the intersections of Pearl Street and Cape Fear Avenue.

Information of 1952 - Continued

September 1, 1952

It was reported that leaks in the roof of the church had been repaired. The District Superintendent and the Bishop needed to know the minimum and the maximum amount of salary for the pastor for the coming year. The Board set the minimum at \$5,000.00 and the maximum at \$6,000.00.

October 6, 1952

Because of the purchase of necessary but unbudgeted items of equipment, there was a shortage of funds. It was voted to bring the matter to the congregations attention at the next worship service emphasizing the need to pay all pledges.

November 1952

Haymount's pastor, Rev. Vergil E. Queen has been named District Superintendent of the Wilmington District.

The Reverend W. Stanley Potter will assume duties as pastor of The Haymount Methodist Church on Sunday, November 9, 1952.

November 10, 1952

The budget for 1952-1953 was presented and accepted.

The present parsonage was said to be inadequate for the Potter family. The Property Committee and the Parsonage Committee were appointed to investigate the situation immediately..

New officers for the Official Board were elected for the coming year.

This was a called meeting of the Official Board.

Plans to enlarge the present parsonage were proposed and accepted. It was expected to cost \$7,000.00.

December 1, 1952

Mr. Potter has been unable to hire a Church secretary.

Discussion was held about appointing an Associate Board of Stewards, elected to serve for one year, with all the privileges of the Official Board except the right to vote. It would be a training board for young men and, also, would acquaint board members with church problems. The idea was approved.

December 28, 1952

A "Student Recognition Service" was held with Bob Allen presiding.

INFORMATION ABOUT 1953
From Official Board Minutes

January 5, 1953

The Church is trying to hire a Church Secretary. It is, also, still looking for a Director of Christian Education for Haymount.

February 2, 1953

The project of adding on to the Church parsonage is nearly completed. The cost is near the estimate of \$9,000.00.

Mrs. James A. Auman has been hired as Church Secretary on a trial basis. A plan was presented to the Official Board for the formation of a Church Library. It would be a memorial library. The Board voted its acceptance of the plan.

Due to excessive telephone line costs to the Church, it was decided to discontinue the broadcasting of Sunday Services at the end of February. Discussion was held about the hazard of on-street parking on Fort Bragg Road.

March 2, 1953

Discussions were held about:

- the placement of fire distinguishers
- the hanging of an architectural drawing of the Church
- the traffice hazard on Fort Bragg Road
- the registration of visitors at services
- sbuscriptions to the Christian Advocate
- the request of Mason Bell to have the organ lowered.

It was announced that Miss Katherine Price is working in the Youth Department for experience.

April 6, 1953

J. Vernon Jessup reported that the materials for the library shelves and racks were not yet available. Mrs. Maurice Murphy accepted the position as Librarian for the new Memorial Library.

Mr. J. E. McDavid will serve as Official Board Treasurer.

April 17-26, 1953

An Evangelistic Mission was held. The Reverend Eugene S. Dunbar of Summer-ville, South carolina assisted.

May 11, 1953

Mr. W. B. Warren, Chairman of the Property Committee, reported that there were several leaks in the Church roof and window casements. He was instructed to contact Dixon Construction Company.

It was announced that Family Night would be May 13.

Plans for the Annual Vacation bible School were being made.

Early in 1953 a Music Committee was organized. Mrs. John C. Pate was the first Chairman.

Information About 1953 continued.

June 8, 1953

There was a discussion about holding night worship services during the summer. A motion to discontinue them during June, July and August was passed.

July 6, 1953

Plans were discussed for contacting members whose pledges are not up to date and those who have not made pledges. The shelves for the Library have been made and installed. Rev. Potter reported the Miss Katherine Price would join the staff on a full time basis on August 15, 1953. Discussion was held regarding air-conditioning the Church but no action was taken.

August 3, 1953

WSCS will hold its Annual Supper and Bazaar on October 6, 1953. Mrs. George Tinnin, president, asked for support of the Official Board and the men of the Church.

Mr. Wilson Yarborough, Chairman, pledged the cooperation and appointed the following committees: Ticket Sales, Bread, Barbeque, Publicity and Contributions. A long discussion was held on Church finances. \$12,000 is still needed to finish the Church year.

It was decided to print the monthly financial statement in the first Church Bulletin following the regular meeting of the Official Board.

September 7, 1953

\$8,200 is still needed to complete the Church year.

The last quarterly Conference and the October Official Board meeting will be October 7, 1953 at 7:30p.m.

Mr. J. H. McDavid said that plans were underway to organize a Cub Scout Pack. He asked that the Church be the sponsoring organization. A motion to do this passed.

September 28, 1953

(special meeting of the Official Board)

The recommendation of the Nominating Committee for the Officers of the Official Board for 1954 were accepted and elected.

Mrs. George Tinnin expressed the appreciation of the women to the men for their support in making the Supper and Bazaar a success. Special thanks were given to the Boy Scouts for traffic control.

October 19, 1953

\$2,905.04 needed to complete the current year.

It was decided to borrow the amount needed and to include it in the 1953-54 Church budget.

The Budget for 1953-54 for \$34,880.74 was presented and adopted.

From Report to the Quarterly Conference October 31, 1953

Youth: divided into two groups

 one for 13-14 year olds

 one for 15-17 year olds

There were Sunday morning and Sunday evening sessions of Methodist Youth Fellowship. They participated in Methodist Youth Fund, in District and Sub-District activities, camps, cooperated with the Church in special projects and recreational activities.

November 2, 1953

This was the first meeting of the new church year.

Because the basement facilities have proven inadequate, the Boy Scouts were given permission to use the main chapel (now Fellowship Hall). The Church gave \$30.00 to help equip the Pack.

The Board endorsed the participation of the Young Adult Class in a non-commercial religious parade to be sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce.

The 8th Anniversary Service of the Church would be held at 10:00a.m. Thursday, Thanksgiving Day morning.

A Welcoming Committee of Haymount members was appointed to welcome to Fayetteville the new District Superintendent, Reverend O. L. Hathaway.

December 7, 1953

The Music Committee reported that Miss Vera King has been hired as Church Choir Director starting immediately. Mrs. S. M. Howie, Jr. has been secured as Church organist starting January 1, 1954. Mason Bell submitted a letter of resignation to the Official Board November 18, 1953.

The W.S.C.A. WAS COMMENDED FOR THE SPLENDID CONTRIBUTION OF AN ORGAN TO THE Church and for making the final payment ahead of schedule.

INFORMATION ABOUT 1954
Mainly From Official Board Minutes

January 4, 1954

Rev. Potter asked that the matter of continuing the Sunday night services be considered in light of the small attendance in past weeks. This was discussed and a motion passed to discontinue them for the time being. Rev. Potter, also, asked that the matter of an Evangelistic Service for the Church be discussed. It was decided that an Evangelistic Service should be held during the year to be arranged by the Committee on Membership and Evangelism.

February 1, 1954

Mr. A. B. Campbell, chairman of the Property Committee, reported that the last heavy rain had leaked into the Church around the windows of the Fellowship Room and into the room upstairs.

Evangelistic Services were scheduled to be held March 14 through March 19 with Rev. O. L. Hathaway, District Superintendent, as the preacher.

A Leadership Training School would be held at Hay Street Methodist Church February 14 to February 18. Haymount was assessed \$80.00 to help pay expenses. There was discussion about the unfair distribution of the cost of the School and the lack of representation leading to the assessment.

Mr. J. L. Beck, Chairman of the Finance Committee, reported that collections for the first quarter of the Church Year were short of the goal. 2-01-54

February 14 - 17, 1954

A Cumberland County Methodist Christian Workers' School was held at Hay Street Methodist Church at 5:30 p.m. Everyone brought their picnic supper. Courses offered were:

- Plans Of The Church For The Kindergarten
- Guiding Primary Children in Christian Growth
- Plans Of The Church For Junior Boys And Girls
- Guiding Intermediates
- The Methodist Youth Fellowship
- Helping Adults Learn
- The Teachings of Jesus

March 1, 1954

Rev. Potter reported on the coming Church activities:

- Pre Easter Services with Rev. O. L. Hathaway as guest minister.
- There would be Visitation Evangelism for two nights before services and for two nights after the services involving ten or twelve teams.
- Dedication of the Church Library.
- A Membership Class would be held.
- Nineteen Haymounters attended the Leadership School at Hay Street Methodist Church. Haymount's assessed fee was reduced to \$50.00.

March 1, 1954 continued

Mrs. L.C. Lawrence for W.S.C.S. requested that W.S.C.S. be given permission carpet the Altar Area. This was granted.

An assessment of \$3,000 for the Methodist College Foundation Fund was referred to the Finance Committee.

Because the Church was delinquent in payment of some bills, a motion passed giving the Finance Committee authority to borrow any amount up to \$2,000 the debts.

A committee was named to investigate the per capita cost of meals to Methodist Youth Fellowship.

A motion passed allowing the Adult and Young Adult Sunday School Classes to retain 25% of loose collections for flowers and other expenses.

March 14, 1954

The Haymount Methodist Church Memorial Library was dedicated on March 14, 1954. It was and is a work in progress beginning in 1952 with books given by Mr. and Mrs. George W. Tinnin. On December 30, 1952 Mr. Wilson Yarborough gave money for a Memorial Library in memory of his mother, Mrs. Romelia Marsh Yarborough. Since that time others have given books, individuals as well as Church organizations such as the Circles of W.S.C.S., The Wesleyan Service Guild and Sunday School classes.

April 5, 1954

After a discussion of MYF meals, it was agreed to let the Executive Committee of WSCS handle them.

W.S.C.S. was thanked for the beautiful carpeting placed in the Church.

It was agreed that the Church would continue to sponsor a Youth baseball team.

Rev. Potter was given authority to hold two services on Easter morning, one at 9:00a.m. and the other at 11:00 a.m.

Church School Superintendent C. W. Pearson reported that:

- attendance was increasing
- a Church School Paper was being published
- attendance was outgrowing the facilities
- the Building Fund had been reactivated.

May 3, 1954

It was agreed that a Committee would secure a Coca-Cola machine, placing it in the kitchen. This was a result of requests by the Youth. Any profits would go towards their meals.

D. E. Maul, Chairman of the Junior Baseball Committee, reported that a team had been entered in the League and that a manager had been secured. The League would start in early July.

May 3, 1954 continued

After much discussion, a system of visitation for the Church was adopted. The object is to get to know members and their families better, to receive suggestions and criticisms of Church program and acquaint members with all phases of Church program.

June 7, 1954

Rev. Potter announced that an older group of MYFers (18-24) was being formed. A letter from the Official Board was sent to Mrs. George W. Tinnin, President of W.S.C.S. thanking the women for the carpeting placed in the Church. A Committee was formed to investigate the possibility of starting a Kindergarten at the Church.

Because of the great need felt for additional classroom space, a Survey Committee was formed to meet with architect, Mr. Wagner, to discuss plans for getting a Building Program underway on the 10th Anniversary of the founding of the Church.

July 1, 1954

The Junior Baseball Program is doing well according to Col. E. E. Maul, but they did need money for fees.

There was interest in establishing a Kindergarten at the Church in the fall. Due to inadequate facilities and lack of teaching personnel the idea was deferred to the first of the year.

A Committee was appointed to study the advisability of securing plans for the Educational Unit of the Church plant.

August 2, 1954

A lengthy discussion was held on the matter of finances. All members were urged to contact members to try to raise collections to meet the remaining portion of the Church budget.

A motion was passed to convey to Miss Katherine Price the Church's thanks for her good work as Director of Christian Education. A second motion passed that her employment would continue for another year.

September 6, 1954

\$8,000 is needed to finish the year ending October 31, 1954.

A Layman's Day Service will be held. Arrangements will be left to the discretion of Rev. Potter and the Church Lay Leader.

After discussion, a motion passed that a Church paper be started.

Rev. Potter will assist in a Revival to be held at St. Pauls September 20-September 24.

It was announced that the W.S.C.S.'s annual Barbeque and Bazaar would be held October 12, 1954. The Board of Stewards was asked to cooperate with the project.

October 4, 1954

Finances were again the subject of general discussion.

October 4, 1954 - continued

Rev. Potter reported that the Christian Youth Mission held at the Church had been a success. A group from Haymount Church will assist in a like mission in Chatham-Lee Sub-District on October 16.

October 11, 1954

The Chairman opened the meeting with a plan for the solicitation of members to help raise the deficit needed to finish the Church Year. The date for reporting back was October 18, 1954.

Regarding funds for Church School classes, a motion passed allowing all classes to withhold 25% of class collections for the Class treasury.

The Budget for 1954-1955 was presented amounting to \$35,720.36.

October 18, 1954 - special session

Still needed is \$5,000 to complete the Church Year.

A motion passed that gave the Finance Committee the power to borrow the amount needed to meet the Church's obligations but not to exceed \$3,000.

October 26, 1954 - special session

Plans were made to canvas the membership for pledges to cover the 1954-55 Budget.

November 1, 1954

Chairman Carl Barrington announced that under new Conference rules, the Church Year would end June 30, 1955.

As he was being transferred, the Official Board adopted a resolution thanking and commending Rev. Potter for his services to the Church.

November 17, 1954 - special session

The purpose of the special meeting was to act upon a request that an informal reception be given in honor of Haymount's new pastor, Reverend Clyde S. Boggs and his family. An amount of \$200 was set as the cost limit. A committee was appointed: John C. Pate, David Padgett and Jim Pharr.

December 6, 1954

John C. Pate announced that a reception would be held in the rear of the S Sanctuary Sunday night, December 12, 1954 from 7:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. in honor of Haymount's new pastor, Rev. Clyde S. Boggs and his family.

INFORMATION ABOUT 1955

January 3, 1955

The Official Board voted to send The Christian Advocate to all families. There was a reminder that the General Church is having a nationwide Church Attendance Crusade.

A motion passed that the Official Board and the Associate Board would attend a class on "The Church Discipline" and "Church Administration" for thirty minutes before each meeting in February March and April.

February 7, 1955

A motion carried to accelerate the payment of building indebtedness and complete the payments within two years.

A motion passed that the chairman appoint a Survey Committee to examine the needs of the Church School. It would then meet with the church architect to consider plans for a new building.

March 7, 1955

A motion by Maurice Braswell passed that the Good Literature Committee make a study of all church literature.

The Music Committee will study the question of purchasing stoles for the choir.

May 23, 1955

From the Pastor's Report to the Quarterly Conference on May 23, 1955.

The Commission on Education and Worker's Council meets monthly.

A Parent-Teachers Association has been organized in the Children's Department. Mission Studies have been held in the Children's, the Young Peoples' and the Adult Departments.

Prayer Services are held each Wednesday evening with those who attend taking their turn leading.

Picnics, Fish Fries, and many get-together Fellowship Meetings have been held so that the membership might get better acquainted and have wholesome fun with our children.

A series of studies "What It Means To Be An Official" was conducted.

June 6, 1955

Whether or not to allow food to be served in the Sanctuary (which at that time was the current - 2002- Fellowship Hall) was a problem under discussion.

Rev. Boggs was not in favor of the Official Board voting on the matter. A motion was made and carried that left the matter to the discretion of the Women's Society of Christian Service with the provision that the serving of food to any group be limited to church activities irrespective of denomination. John Lawrence, Treasurer, reported that the Church needed \$800 - \$900 to clear the indebtedness incurred during the eight month church year ending

June 30, 1955. This deficit was brought about by unbudgeted items. Board members who were present subscribed \$550 and agreed to contact other members not present.

July 11, 1955

John Lawrence, treasurer, reported total collections for the period November 1, 1954 to June 30, 1955 of \$25,550.33.

Church membership now totalled 632 members.

A motion carried that Rev. Boggs be given a two week vacation in addition to the two weeks he serves in the Army Reserves.

North Carolina Annual Conference meets at Hay Street Methodist Church June 27 - July 1. Members were asked to let the Church office know if they could take care of any delegates in their home.

A National Youth Caravan will come to Haymount July 16 - 23 to lead a Youth Activities Week for Haymount and the Cumberland Sub-District to aid the Youth Work in the Church.

August 1, 1955

The Building Survey Committee reported that it had met with church architect, Mr. Harold Wagone r, who was in Fayetteville. No definite decision has been reached for a future building. The architect's fee on all new buildings will be 7% instead of the former 5%.

The Boy Scouts have purchased a \$100 movie camera. The Board was asked to carry insurance on it. This request was referred to the Trustees.

September 12, 1955

Discussion was held about the membership of the Official Board and the terms of their office.

Regarding MYF suppers, a motion carried that the Circles of Women's Society of Christian Service be paid 5¢ out of the treasury for each MYF meal and an additional 20¢ for any child unable to pay.

The Property Committee was given power to act to rectify the leaks in the parsonage.

Information About 1955 - continued

A \$1,000.00 note was due October 24, 1955. It was voted to reduce the note as much as possible and then renew the balance for one year. The Trustees were asked to investigate burglary insurance.

November 7, 1955

Treasurer, Sam Wooten, reported that he had made a \$750.00 payment on the \$1,000.00 loan and extended the balance of \$250.00 until January 23, 1956. Rev. Boggs reported that the parsonage is receiving too much heat. (The parsonage received its heat from the Church at that time.)

A motion passed instructing the Church to purchase burglary insurance at \$500 if it was available, otherwise at \$1,000.

The pastor was requested to hold a church service on Thanksgiving Day and give publicity to the fact that it was the anniversary of the Church.

December 5, 1955

C. W. Pearson, treasurer of the Building Fund, reported that as a result of the Thanksgiving Day Building Fund offering, coupled with the approximately \$1,200 contributed by the Women's Society of Christian Service, he was able to make five principal payments on the Church indebtedness leaving a present balance of \$36, 608.61.

A motion passed allowing the Children's Department to have a Christmas tree in the rear of the Sanctuary.

Rev. Clyde Boggs was pastor. E. Maurice Braswell was chairman of the Official Board. (Board of Stewards)

January 9, 1956

Church treasurer, S. A. Wooten, reported that total collections for the period July 1, 1955 to December 31, 1955 amounted to \$17,822.78. However, \$2,000 of this was not collected for use under the budget.

The question of membership on the Official Board was discussed. The Board unanimously expressed a desire to put membership on the Board of Stewards and the commissions on a rotating basis and that this action would be retroactive.

A Nominating Committee was named:

Fulton Tyler, Russell Crowell, John Hensdale and Paul Felsberg.

A motion by secret ballot passed: that the pastor's salary remain at \$6,100.00 with a \$500 car allowance for the insuing year.

Other motions that passed:

to appoint a committee to study church activities with a view toward establishing definite work hours.

to put Boy Scouts under the overall direction of the Commission on Education.

the Chairman of the Scouting Committee to be made a member of the Commission on Education.

authorizing the payment of \$15.00 membership fee for the Boys Basketball League plus the amount of \$1.00 per member not to exceed 15 members.

February 6, 1956

There was a discussion of the Communion Services, the date and number to be left to the discretion of the pastor.

March 5, 1956

The Policy Committee, chaired by W. F. Yarborough recommended:

The Pastor is to have 30 days vacation time which is to include the time needed for camp.

The Director of Religious Education is to have 2 weeks vacation time, plus 2 weeks if she attends Lake Junaluska.

The janitor is to have one week vacation time.

The Pastor or the Director of Religious Education is to be present while the other is absent.

The janitor and the Director of Religious Education are to be under the supervision of the Pastor.

The Policy Committee is to approve appearances of a member of the Negro race on a program.

April 9, 1956

Discussed the cost of air conditioning.

1956 Information - continued

May 7, 1956

A vote was taken about the recommendations from the Policy Committee about vacation time

The pastor and the Director of Christian Education plus any paid secretary will be given 2 weeks.

The janitor will have one week.

The pastor will be given an additional 2 weeks for Reserve Duty.

The pastor reported that there were 155 pledges.

The Music Committee was authorized to purchase 20 white light weight summer robes for the choir at \$12.50 each.

June 4, 1956

Treasurer, S. A. Wooten, advised the Board that \$4,930.43 was needed to complete the annual budget.

June 25, 1956

In a special session the Church treasurer, S. a. Wooten, said that \$1,500.00 was needed to complete the budget and clear all Conference items by June 30, 1956. A motion carried to borrow the money then canvas the Church membership to pay off the debt.

In his report to the Quarterly Conference, Rev. Clyde Boggs said that in the period December 1, 1955 to February 2, 1956 the Commission on Education held a leadership training school for 50 Church members. The Commission on Evangelism obtains the names of those moving into the area and visits them. The Commission, also, visits the shut-ins and the sick.

July 2, 1956

At the regular Official Board meeting a motion carried to hold a Fish Fry in the early fall to help raise the \$1,500.00 borrowed to complete the 1955-56 fiscal year budget.

The Chairman suggested that the Pastoral Relations Committee meet with the pastor to arrange an old fashioned Love Feast.

The Associate Board was elected.

A Library Selection Committee was appointed to select books to be purchased. This is to include those that are being bought with Memorial Funds.

November 5, 1956

The treasurer reported that the Church was \$2,346.00 behind in paying our Conference items.

Motions that carried:

To obtain a Choir Director at a salary of \$100.00 per month.

To raise the organist's salary from \$75.00 to \$100.00 per month.

(The current organist is Mrs. James Taylor.)

To search for a Volunteer Director for three younger choirs.

In a report by Chairman of the Finance Committee, H. Fulton Tyler, it was noted the following as affecting the finances of Haymount:

The lack of a spirit of Christian Fellowship.

The once friendly feeling that dominated the congregation is missing.

There are too many who are unwilling to donate time to the Church.

1956 Information - continued

Committees and Commissions are unable to act in an intelligent manner and achieve their goals due to the lack of interest shown by the members in not attending meetings.
Old members are not showing interest and fellowship.

December 3, 1956

The Official Board will sponsor a Mission Study in January 1957.
According to Mr. Wilson F. Yarborough, Sr. all insurance policies and deeds to the Church parsonage have been placed in a Safe Deposit Box at Branch Bank and Trust Company.

Six copies of the Revised Edition of the Methodist Discipline will be purchased when available.

A current Roster of Church Families will be prepared.

Rev. Boggs was given permission to attend a School For Chaplains at Fort Bragg in March.

The Board of Trustees will look into the matter of purchasing a parsonage away from the present Church property leaving the present parsonage for the use of the Church School.

A motion passed to approve payment of \$50.00 a month for a Director of 3 children's choirs.

December 11, 1956 (a special meeting of the Official Board)

The purpose of the meeting was to discuss the finances of the Church. A letter will be drafted and sent to the membership.

Motions that passed:

To welcome new members into the Church with literature, envelopes etc.

To employ a parttime financial secretary for the months of December and January spending up to \$50.00 per month.

To print a brochure giving the history fo the Church.

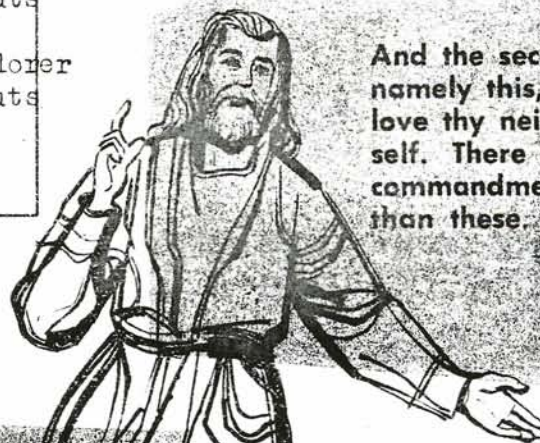

A suggestion was made that a Memorial Calendar be set up for those desiring to place flowers in memory of someone on a particular Sunday. If there is no one designated to receive the flowers, they will be taken to the Confederate Woman's Home.

Christian Social Relations - John Bain reporting.

At its meeting the Commission discussed world situations including the U.S. extension of the draft for another four years and the trade exchange with Russia. Discussion was, also, held as to the treatment of a negro should he attend our Church service some Sunday morning.

A general discussion was held by the Official Board about the possibility of negroes attending services. There were several suggestions but no one thing was agreed upon.

It was agreed to set up a Memorials Committee. The Memorial Fund would be made up of donations from individuals.

Air-conditioning for the Sanctuary will cost \$5,000. \$1000 has be pledged.

The question was raised as to what is being done about a secretary as Mrs. Rench has resigned as of the end of April. Mr. Harrison said something would be worked out but he was getting along satisfactorily with part-time help.

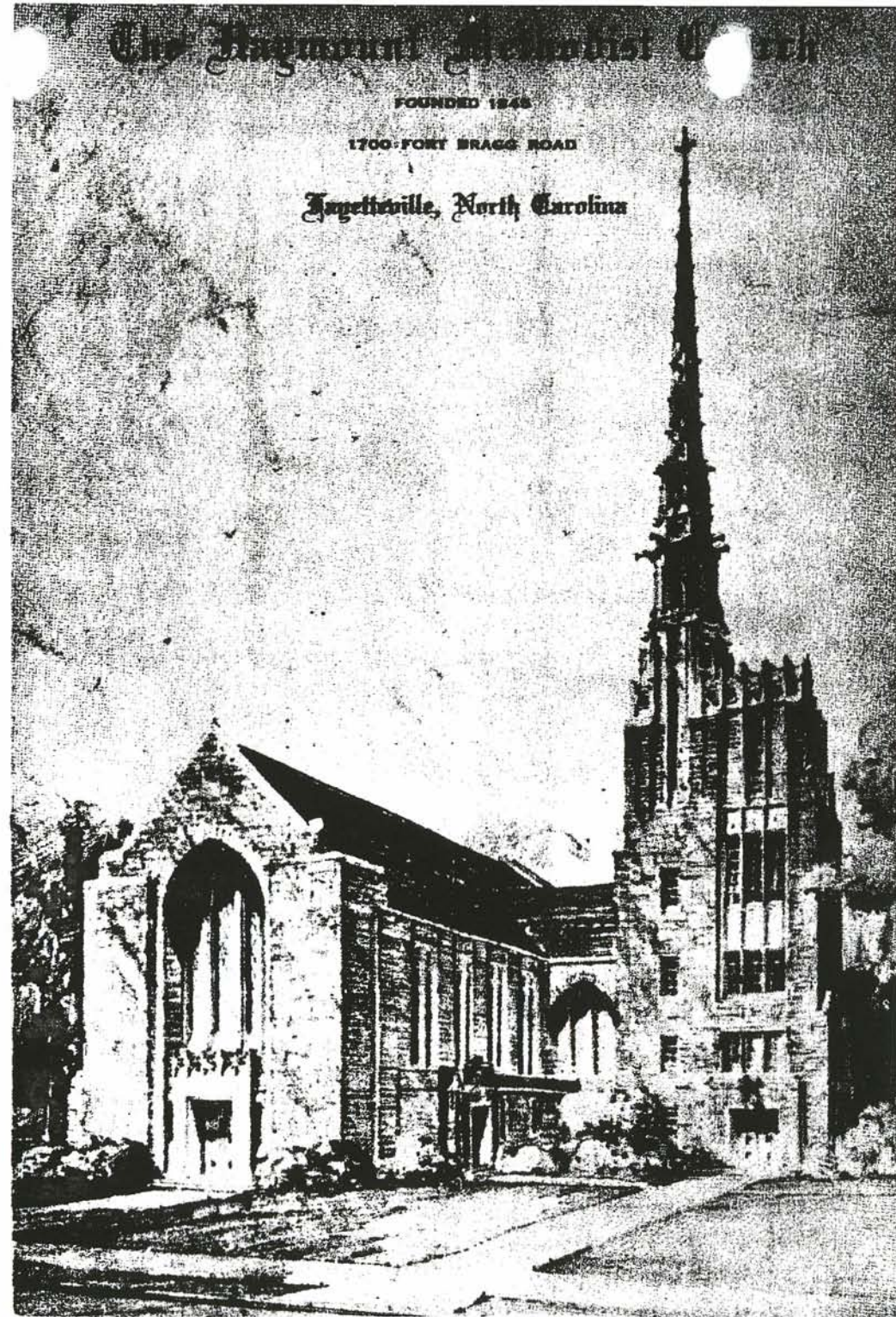

INFORMATION ABOUT 1960

Reverend Russell Harrison was pastor as the Church entered the second half of the Conference year. Dr. Robert H. Morrison was Chairman of the Official Board.

According to Paul Elosser, Chairman of the Commission on Membership and Evangelism, the Commission was concerned about the attendance at the Sunday morning worship service. The Commission planned and held a "Church Attendance Crusade" from January 1 through Easter using cards to record attendance each Sunday. Other cards were sent to absentee members. The goal was to have 75% of the membership in attendance at Sunday morning worship. In addition, the Commission members made visits to new and prospective members one or two nights a week. Twenty area chairmen were selected for "Membership Visitation."

Special evangelistic services were held March 20-25 with Rev. Herman Winberry the guest preacher. Attendance was not considered good as there were only 50 - 60 present each night.

On July 1 Charles McAdams became chairman of the Membership and Evangelism Commission. In August he reported that there had been a 15% increase in Haymount's membership for the past Conference year, 1959-1960.

At the North Carolina Conference Annual Meeting June 27-30, 1960 Reverend Russell Harrison was reassigned and Reverend Theodore R. Jenkins was named pastor of Haymount Methodist Church. He was introduced to the Official Board at its meeting on July 11 by Mr. John Hensdale. Mr. Jenkins spoke to the group asking for its prayers, love, sincere loyalty and devotion. He told of his plans for a weekly paper and, also, stated the need for manuals for the Commissions.

The Commission on Education chairman, David L. Padgett, held several Church-wide studies. One was a children's study on Africa. A Church-wide study "Medical Missionaries" was held jointly with Hay Street Methodist Church.

In July Mrs. Carl Barrington was appointed Superintendent of the Children's Division. Mrs. W. Ritchie Smith was appointed Superintendent of the Youth Division and Roy McAlister was appointed Superintendent of the Adult Division.

Mr. D. R. Allen made a strong effort to get new subscribers to the Christian Advocate and the Ten Dollar Club as there were only 4 Church subscribers in May.

In May Thad Cherry, representative for the Scouting program announced that there had been a change in leadership. Warren Fischer became chairman. Dr. Robert Owen continued as his assistant as did Sgt. Dennis. Mr. Cherry said that the Scouting Program was well organized, the Cub Pack was growing and the overall Scouting Program was in good shape.

The Treasurer's Report for the Conference year July 1, 1959 to June 30, 1960 showed that the Church spent \$41,874.57. It ended the Conference year with a balance of \$683.25.

1960 continued:

Paul Elosser, Chairman of the Commission on Spiritual Life and Assimilation, said that the Commission wanted every member of the Church to be committed in some way to one of the Church's programs. Plans were made to survey all families in order to secure information about their talents, interests and experiences as related to the work of the Church.

The Annual Bazaar and Barbecue was planned for October 11 from 1p.m.-8p.m. at the Church.

Fred Owen, Chairman of Stewardship, reported that the largest offering received so far was on the last Sunday of October. It was \$1,523.00. He, also, reported on November 7 that the Church was \$2,000.00 short on its giving for Benevolences.

By the end of December the Commission on Education reported:

that improvement had been made in keeping Church School records.

a Committee on Family Life was being organized with Mrs. J.L.Sutton chairman.

the newly organized Young Adult Bible Class had 30 members with an average attendance of 15.

an Older Youth Class started November 27 in the parsonage with Mrs. T. R. Jenkins teacher. Four were present.

the importance of bringing one's Bible to Sunday School was stressed.

dates for Christmas programs were:

December 18 - Youth and Methodist Men's party for children.

December 22,23,24 - Live Nativity Scene

A new Building Committee was appointed in December by Official Board Chairman Dr. Robert Morrison:

INFORMATION ABOUT 1961

Special activities for the year began with the Christian Workers' School and the Fayetteville District Conference. On January 18 there was a Family Fellowship Gathering, a covered dish supper with new members as the honored guests.

Youth Week nationwide was January 27-February 3. Youth in many churches and communities around the nation participated as did Haymount's youth. The theme was "Into All the World Together."

Membership Classes for children up to 11 years and young people 12 and up began February 18. They would be received into church membership on Palm Sunday, March 26.

On February 19 there was a gathering of young people interested in starting a youth choir.

Revival Services were scheduled for February 26 through March 3 with Dr. W. L. Clegg as guest preacher. Cottage prayer services were held February 22 in homes in various sections of the Church community.

Plans were made to hold the "Every Member Canvas" for the year 1961-1962 during the month of May, May 7 - May 14. Mr. Clyde Quick, general chairman, felt that the Canvas should be the most meaningful ever as it involved so many people who were planning our Church's programs and making provision for underwriting it. A Prayer Vigil was held May 14 at the Church from 12 noon to midnight.

In July 1961 Margaret Cotton (later Mrs. George Harriss) was welcomed to Haymount as Director of Christian Education. In thanking the congregation for the warm welcome she said:

"We would not neglect our physical needs or the physical needs of our children. We, also, see to their schooling. With the same diligence let us feed our spiritual lives. They must not be neglected."

Information About 1961 continued.

In September the loan for the Sanctuary was made. On September 11 there was a congregational dinner meeting to learn about the Church's programs.

In October, members of the congregation could see more and more stone arriving and placed on the church grounds. This was for the building of the new sanctuary.

There was a North Carolina Conference program "Knock On Every Door." A census was taken October 22 to determine affiliation. Haymount participated by supplying 100 census takers. Carl Weeldreyer was Haymount's chairman. All Conference Methodist churches were doing the same thing at the same time. Results would be studied to determine the need for outpost Sunday Schools.

On November 12 the Quarterly Conference was held after the morning worship service to approve what the Building committee had done.

On Sunday evening November 26 the Women's Society of Christian Service held a study "Churches For New Times." The Senior MYF participated. Special emphasis was given to Haymount and its mission.

The 8 Circles of WSCS meet monthly. The WSG meet regularly. The Boy Scouts, Cubs and Boy Scouts, the choirs, Chancel, Youth and Melody, all meet regularly.

Christmas programs in December included:

December 21 at 7 p.m. the Methodist Men's Childrens Program. Each family participating was requested to bring a gift wrapped in white.

December 22, 23, & 24 - the live nativity scene on the Church lawn from 7:00 p.m. - 8:30 p.m.

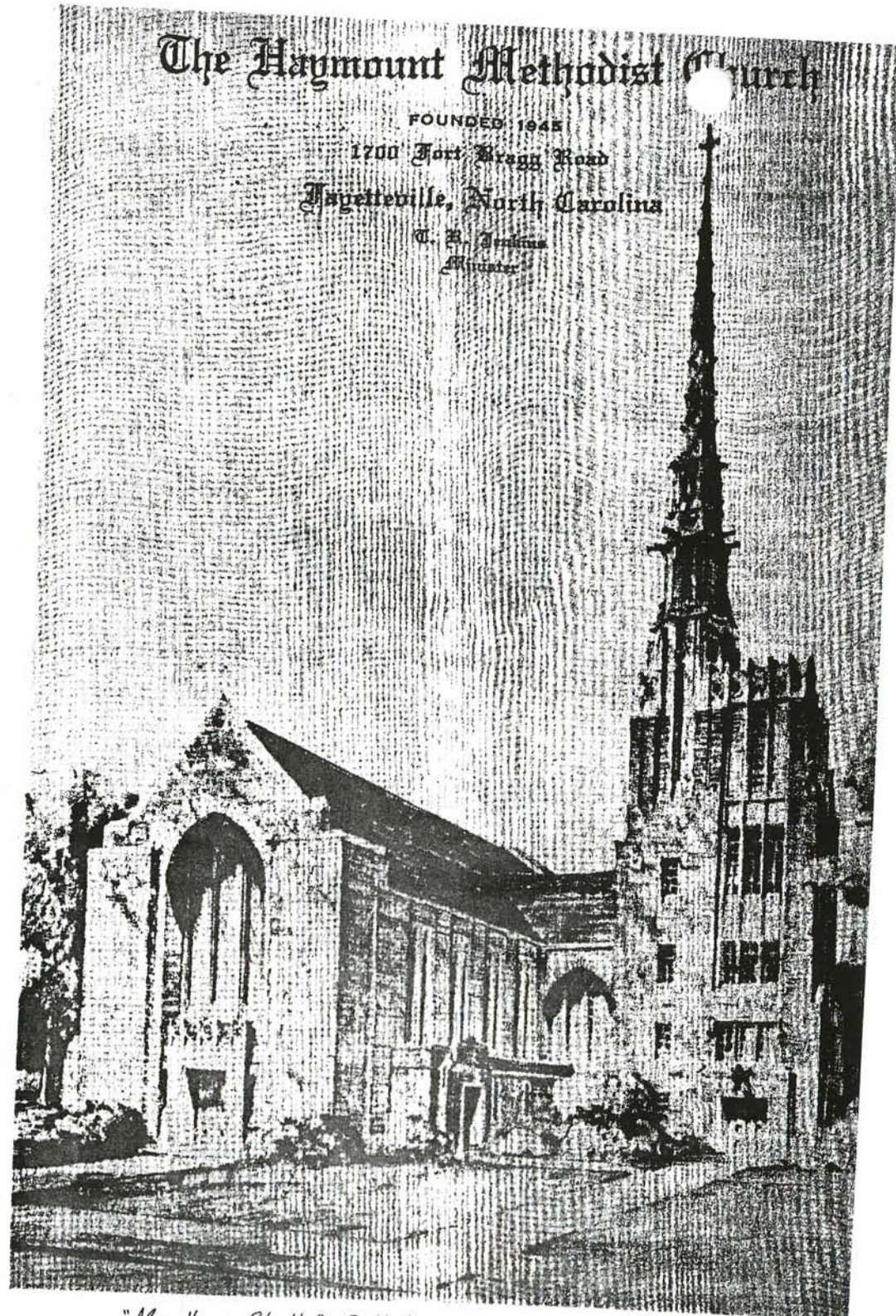

INFORMATION ABOUT 1962

The Church was in good hands as it began the year 1962. The Church Lay Leader was E. Maurice Braswell, Official Board Chairman was Dr. Robert H Morrison, District Steward - Charles W. Pearson, Recording Secretary - Mary Frances Lewter, Hospital and Home Steward - Mrs. W. B. Hall, Secretary of Stewardship - E. C. Longest, Membership Secretary - Mrs. Billy Cummins, Lay Member to Annual Conference - George W. Iinnin, Church School Superintendent - N.N.Rand, Director of Music - Mrs. W. F. Smith, Jr.

The Commission on Membership and Evangelism under the leadership of Charles McAdams organized and held Cottage Prayer Meetings on March 7 in twelve homes with twelve leaders. These were held in connection with the beginning of Lent.

In April the Commission of Membership and Evangelism was in the process of organizing "Groups of Twelve" for bible study, prayer, and visitation to inactive members.

A Prayer Vigil was held April 4 from 12 noon until 12 midnight with emphasis on Stewardship. Directions for prayer and meditation concerning stewardship were on the table.

The Women's Society of Christian Service held four studies during the year: The Meaning of Suffering, Latin America, Churches For New Times, and The Church and Public Affairs. The W.S.C.S. operates the Library, serves meals to Methodist Youth Fellowship and to Methodist Men. They volunteer at the local hospitals, at the Red Cross, the U.S.O. and other community activities.

In May the Commission on Education happily reported that there was a marked increase in enthusiasm. It was especially evident in the Junior High Department.

The pastor, Rev. T. R. Jenkins, in his Quarterly Conference report May 2, 1962 wrote:

"We have had a most wonderful year here at Haymount. Our Church attendance has been good all year. The greater percentage of our people are loyal in their support of the Church in attendance, giving, and in the use of their talents. Financially we are in much better shape than we were last year at this time."

He expressed his gratitude to the people of the Church for their love, their devotion to the Church's causes and their fine spirit of cooperation "in all of our efforts."

On May 7, R. R. Allen reported to the Official Board that final plans for the Sanctuary had been returned from the architect. Bids were sent to contractors. They would be opened May 24.

On June 4 at the Official Board meeting it was reported that \$5,000 was needed to pay out the Conference year. D.C.E. Margaret Cotten reported that a Young Adult Fellowship was organized with 20 attending the first meeting. Maurice Braswell, Chairman of the Building Committee said that the contract to construct the Sanctuary and Cloister had been awarded to L. P. Cox Construction Co. of Sanford at a low bid of \$285,900. This did not include paving,

walks or furniture. A congregational meeting would be held June 17 to ask for authority to borrow \$25,000 for furnishings. Also endorsements for \$100,000 would be sought from church members in order to close the loan. Ground Breaking was set for June 17, 1962 at 4:30 p.m. with a picnic supper afterwards.

.....Our property is in good condition and is being improved. Our new Sanctuary is in the process of being constructed and we hope to accupy it sometime about July or August 1963."

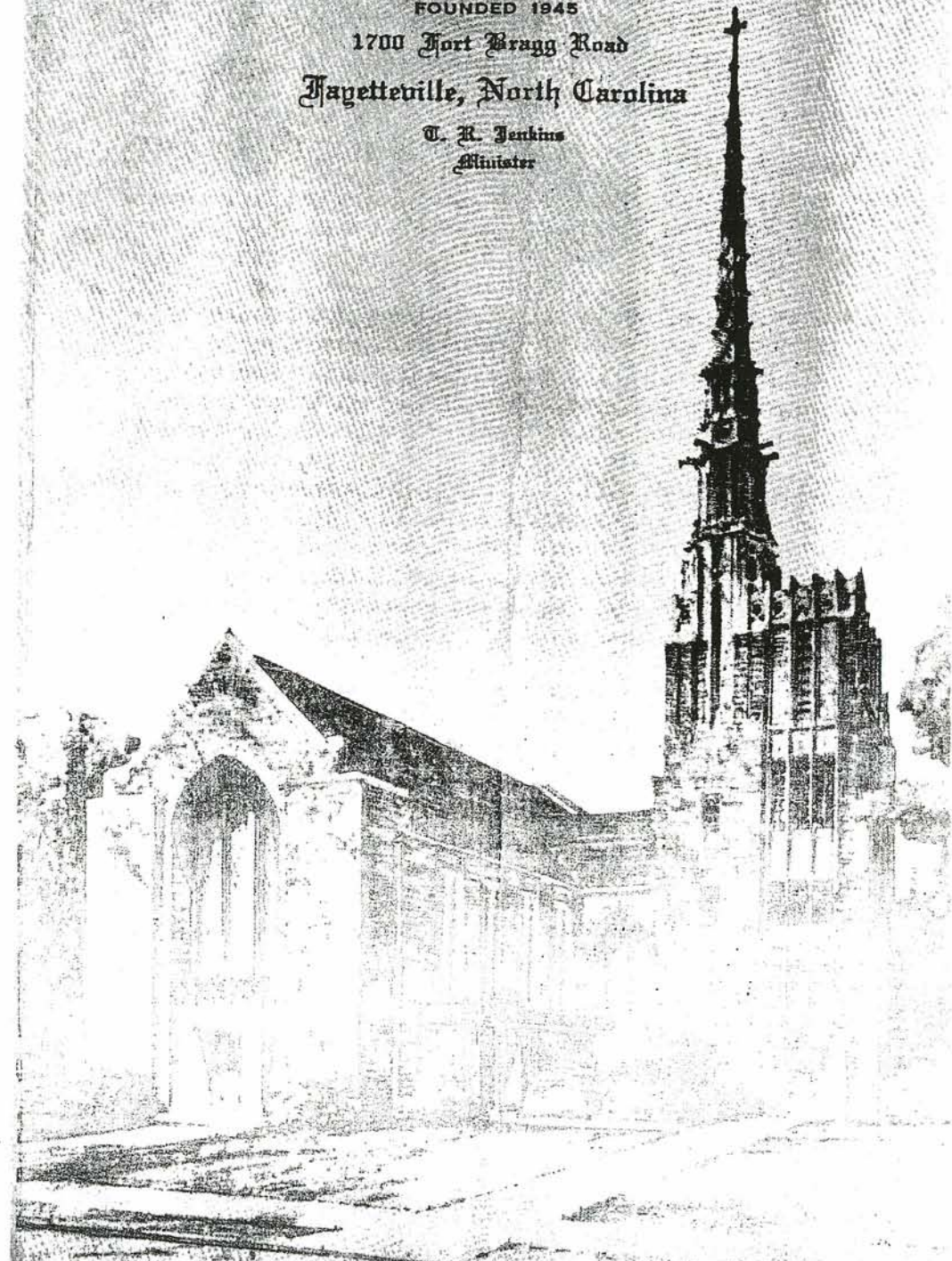

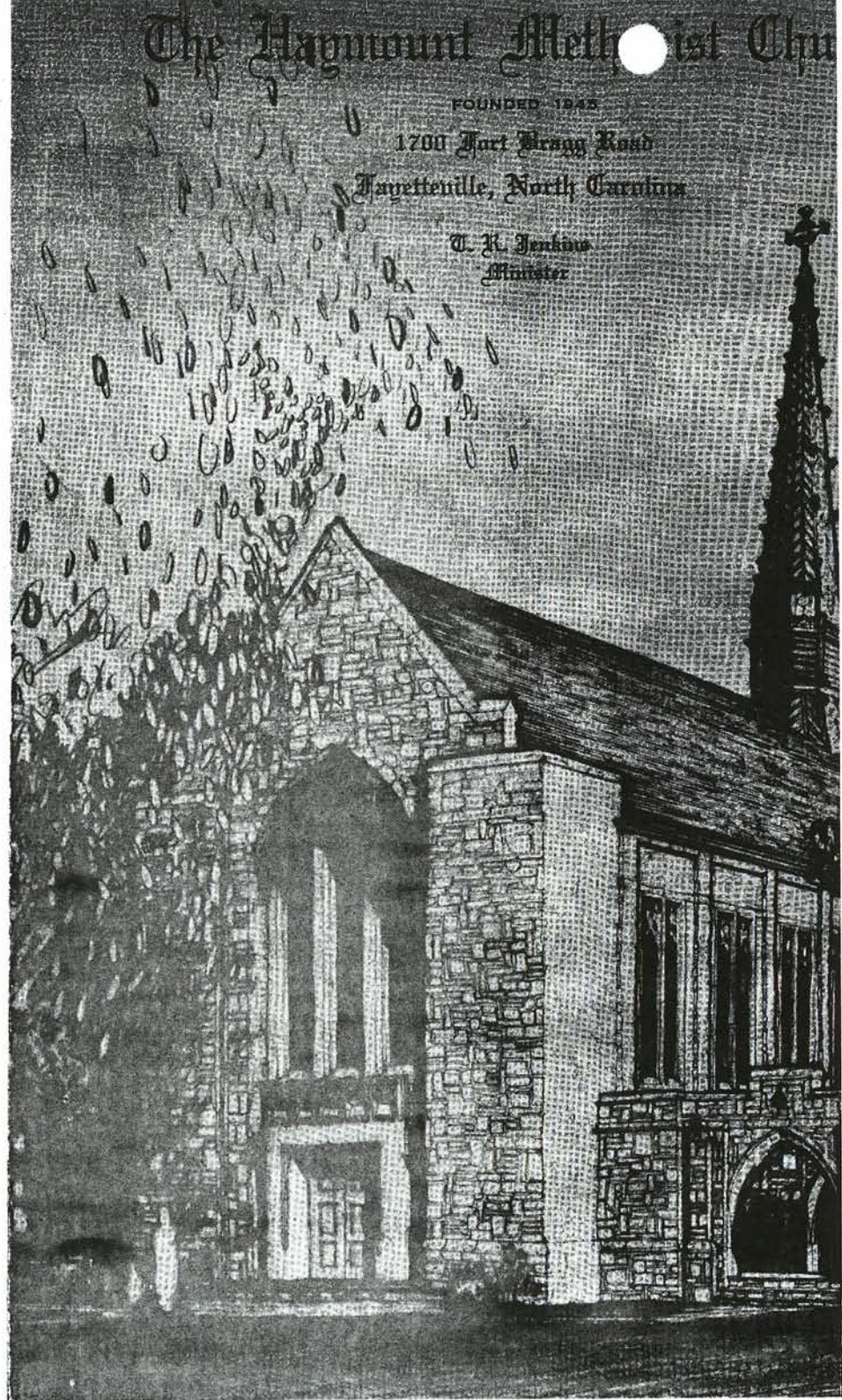

INFORMATION ABOUT 1963

As the year 1963 began, the Official Board was chaired by R.R.Allen, the Commission on Membership and Evangelism by Hubert Willis, the Commission on Education by Mrs. W. Ritchie Smith (Nellie). Mrs. Robert Morrison (Tuck) was chairman of the Committee To Revise the Church School. Mrs. James B. Bundy (Kay) was Director of Vacation Church School and Von Autry was Chairman of Stewardship and Finance.

There were plans to have Revival Services February 10-15 with a special Prayer Service on February 6 led by laymen, The Revival was a success with three breakfasts served during the week. Because of this, it was suggested that three breakfasts be served during Holy Week. The Church finances were in better shape than they had been for several years. Budget forms for the year starting in July were given to each commission chairman.

A Policy Committee on Church employees was asked to study personnel questions such as duties, vacation time with and without pay, hours of work and length of employment period prior to receiving benefits. The Committee was, also, to look into the possibility of drawing up a yearly contract between the Church and the Director of Christian Education. A report was to be made to the Official Board in April. This was. After a few changes it was approved.

Regarding the parking problem, the Board appointed Mrs. S. T. Cherry to work on the problem and to work with architect Mason Hicks on a permanent parking solution

Mr. Allen appointed a committee to interview young ladies for the position of Christian Education Director. The Committee was : Rev. T. R. Jenkins, Mrs. Nellie Smith and George Tinnin.

The Board approved a motion to send a letter to District superintendent Millard Dunn asking that the pastor, Rev. T. R. Jenkins be sent back to Haymount for another year. The budget for the church year 1963-1964 was presented and approved in March. The amount was 73,567.00.

The full building Committee met March 8. It submitted a report to the Official Board in April saying that the drawings for the church furniture had been made. Estimates were to be made before the final drawings were complete.

Charles McAdams reporting in May to the Official Board for the Commission on Membership and Evangelism announced goals for the remainder of the year. It will concentrate on cultivation and conservation of membership. In order to facilitate its work, it will conduct a 5 week membership registration during the Church worship services.

A fourth Prayer Vigil of the year will be held on Tuesday, May 14 from 12 noon until 12 midnight.

The Commission will visit families who have not followed through with their Church pledges. This would be a "cultivation" visit, not one in which to collect pledges.

HISTORICAL STATEMENT

Thanksgiving Day - November 28, 1963 - Cornerston^e-Laying exercises for Haymount's new Sanctuary are being held, following the Thanksgiving Service. The Reverend Theodore R. Jenkins is the present pastor, having been appointed to serve the church at the 1960 Annual Conference of the Methodist Church. The Architect for the structure is Harold E. Wagoner of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. Mason Hicks of Fayetteville is the Supervising Architect. L.P. Cox Construction Company of Sanford, North Carolina is the builder. The building has been constructed at a cost of some over \$ 365,518.24, including furnishings, but not including a future pipe organ and a few other items - such as walking areas, parking, and various smaller items attendant upon the use of the place of worship, which will probably bring the cost up to near \$ 400,000.00.

Haymount Methodist Church was organized November 28, ~~1945~~¹⁹⁴⁵ under the leadership of The Reverend W.L. Clegg, then Superintendent of the Fayetteville District. The first formal service for the new congregation was held on Thanksgiving Day, November 22, 1945. The first pastor of the new church was The Reverend Vergil E. Queen. The following pastors, in the order named, have served the church: The Reverend W. Stanley Potter, The Reverend Clyde S. Boggs, and The Reverend Russell S. Harrison. The Reverend Theodore R. Jenkins is the present pastor. Quite a few persons, too numerous to name in this statement, but whose names will be found elsewhere among the items placed in the cornerstone, have had to do with the organization and progress of Haymount Church. There were 113 charter members on February 1, 1946 - the closing date for receiving such persons. The present membership stands at 811.

The first unit of the church plant was erected in 1951. The Sanctuary, which is the second unit, is now almost ready for occupancy. Still another unit, an additional educational wing, is planned for the future.

Haymount Methodist Church is a thriving institution, with a congregation whose eyes are to the future. Its current general Estimated Budget - including operating budget and building fund budget - amounts to some \$ 73,813.00; but, by the end of the fiscal year, will most probably exceed that figure. With a leadership devotedly aggressive, and a membership highly responsive, it bids well to become one of the really great churches of North Carolina Methodism.

The Episcopal Fund goes for the salaries, expenses of our Bishops.

The Dist. Supt. Fund goes for the salaries of the District Superintendents of our Conference. The present uniform salary of the District Superintendent is \$ 9,600. annually.

The Pension Fund goes for the retirement pay of our preachers. The retirement pay amounts to approximately \$ 60. per year's service.

MRF & Emergency Fund has a two-fold purpose. MRF began as a kind of Conference Social Security Fund. The preacher pays to it each year 1% of his salary, and the Charge he serves pays 1%. The Emergency Fund is a later addition of 1% which was added to help take care of emergency sickness among the preachers, when they are unable to take care of it.

The District Work Fund goes for the upkeep of the district parsonage, and, maybe, a small portion of it for use of the District Superintendent in the pursuit of his duties.

The Minimum Salary Fund goes to supplement the salaries of those preachers whose Charges are unable to pay them the minimum salary which the Annual Conference has set.

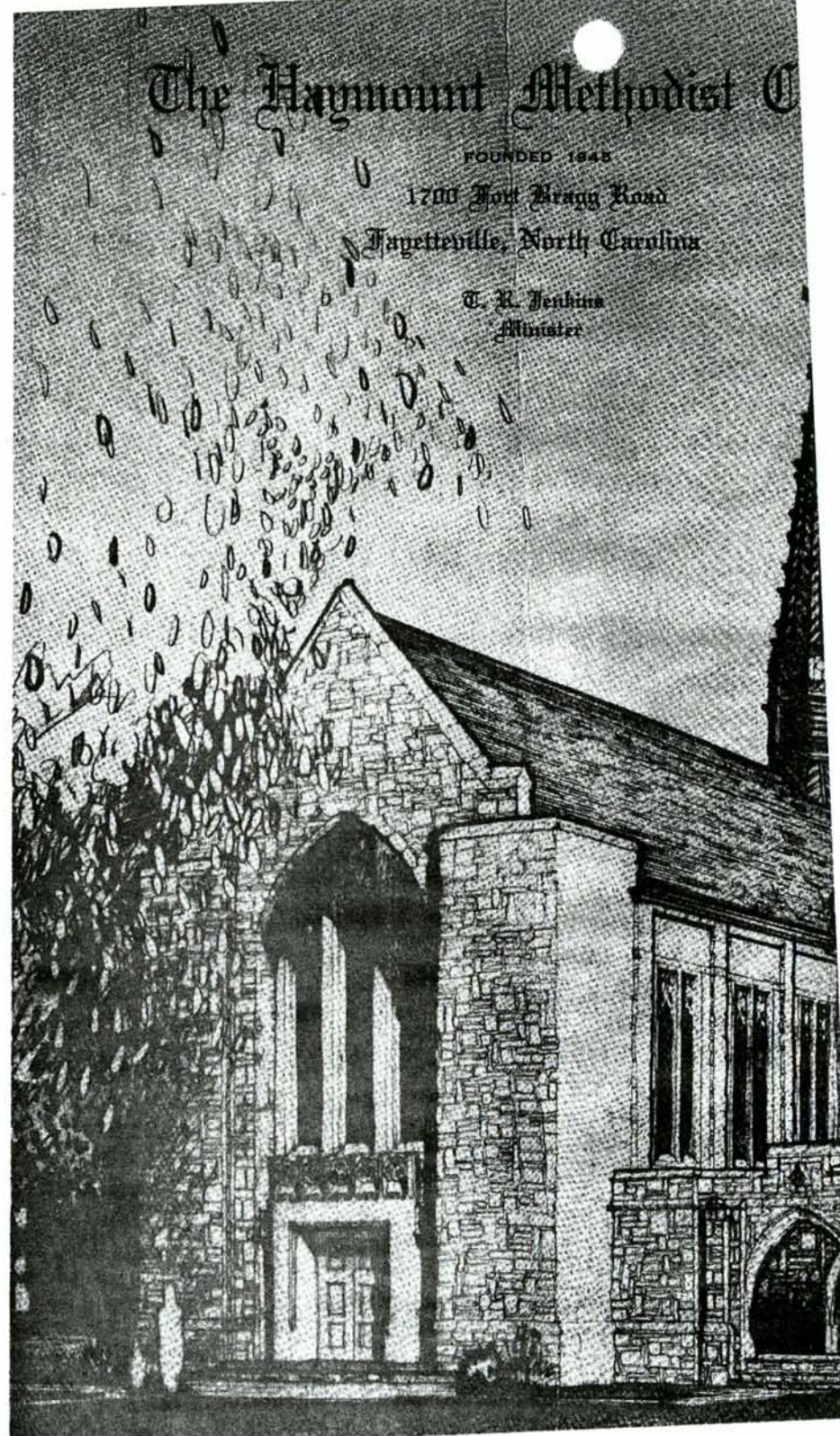

INFORMATION ABOUT 1964

The usual procedure for opening the Official Board meeting was for the chairman to call the meeting to order then introduce the member who would give a devotion. This was followed by the Roll Call and the minutes of the previous meeting. Very often the devotion was given by the pastor, T. R. Jenkins.

In January the report from the building Committee was that the pews and altar furniture for the new sanctuary would be completely installed by the end of February.

In remarks to the Official Board in January Rev. Jenkins commented on "the smooth building program, the wonderful cooperation from the entire membership during the building and said there had been nothing like it in the church history."

The Commission on Membership and Evangelism was making a close follow-up on all new members in an attempt to make them feel welcome and at home in the Church.

A Mission Study was scheduled to begin January 12 and run for 3 Sunday nights. Before each study there would be a snack supper at 5:30p.m.

Concern about the crowded conditions in the Sunday School led to a meeting of a committee from the Commission on Education and the Building Committee. The Education Committee was composed of Nellie Smith, Russ Crowell, T. R. Jenkins and Florence Weaver.

The Building Committee said in February that they would need a short term loan of \$25,000 for such things as landscaping in order to finish everything before moving into the new building. Members of the Church were asked to underwrite the loan.

John Collie and Hugh Geddes were appointed to go with architect Mason Hicks and the sexton to go over the new plant so that the sexton would have good working knowledge of the entire plant.

New robes for the choir were ordered.

Pledge Sunday for the year 1964-65 was announced as April 19. Chaplain Bill Rone and A. C. Jones were co-chairmen.

A Lay District meeting was scheduled for February 14 at 2:30 p.m. for all District church officials. There would be supper followed by the Lay Rally.

For a year and a half Haymount Church had been preparing for the completion of its second building unit. It was finally completed and the furniture moved in. The first service in the new Sanctuary was held Sunday, April 5, 1964. The official opening and dedication was held Sunday, April 26, 1964. Harold Wagoner from Philadelphia was the architect. Mason Hicks Fayetteville architect supervised the construction. L.P. Cox Construction Co. of Sanford was the builder. It was designed to seat 600.

Information About 1964 - continued

The Sunday School had outgrown its facilities. The immediate plan was to secure another parsonage and use the existing one for Sunday School space.

Dr. L. Stacy Weaver was inaugurated as first president of Methodist College on April 10, 1964. He was elected to office on June 22, 1957. For three years there was really no college as there were no students. The first freshman class enrolled September 16, 1960. Inauguration of the president was postponed until the first senior class became a reality and Methodist College was a full fledged college.

During May there were concerns about meeting the unified budget. There were several weeks to raise \$6,550.66 before Annual Conference in June. But, it was accomplished and all obligations were paid in full.

Vacation Schurch School was held June 8 - 12. Church members were to save coffee cans and oatmeal boxes. 123 boys and girls attended. There were 37 workers.

In "Steeple Echoes" July 1, 1964 Rev. T. R. Jenkins wrote about the many good things that had happened at Haymount during the past four years: a gain of 172 members, gain of 98 in Church School, increased obligations of \$2,200, an increase in the overall budget of \$53,100, the addition of a full-time secretary (now the Church had a minister and 5 full time staff members) plus a beautiful new Sanctuary.

In August Judy Aycock and Ann Smith held a 3 day workshop for the Boys and Girls Choirs to work on music fundamentals, great hymns and responses used in the Methodist Church, vocal techniques and anthems to be used in services.

Starting in September, the Children's Division of the Church School began using new literature. Its use entailed the participation of parents in the teaching process. The units were developed around 5 areas of life-long questions. What is the meaning of life? What is God like? What does it mean to be a child of God? What is the work of a Christian? What is the church?

Revival services were held September 13 - 18. Prior to the meetings prayer services were held Wednesday, September 9 in 13 homes.

December observances:

Sunday, December 13 11:00 a.m. the choir presented a Christmas Cantata.

December 22, 23, 24 the Church's annual live portrayal of the nativity took place on the front lawn of the church. This event was a tradition looked forward to by the whole community.

December 20 at 6:00 p.m. "Christmas in the Sanctuary" - carol singing and pagentry depicting the nativity.

December 16 Methodist Men's annual Christmas Party For Children.

One of the big projects of 1964-65 was deciding on and promoting the "Date and Data Book". This was the first attempt to present a list of names of the members and historical information. WSCS, also had the honor of inaugurating the Sunday night suppers at the U.S.O.. They, also, presented a new kind of sale - a Hat Sale. No price was over \$5.00.

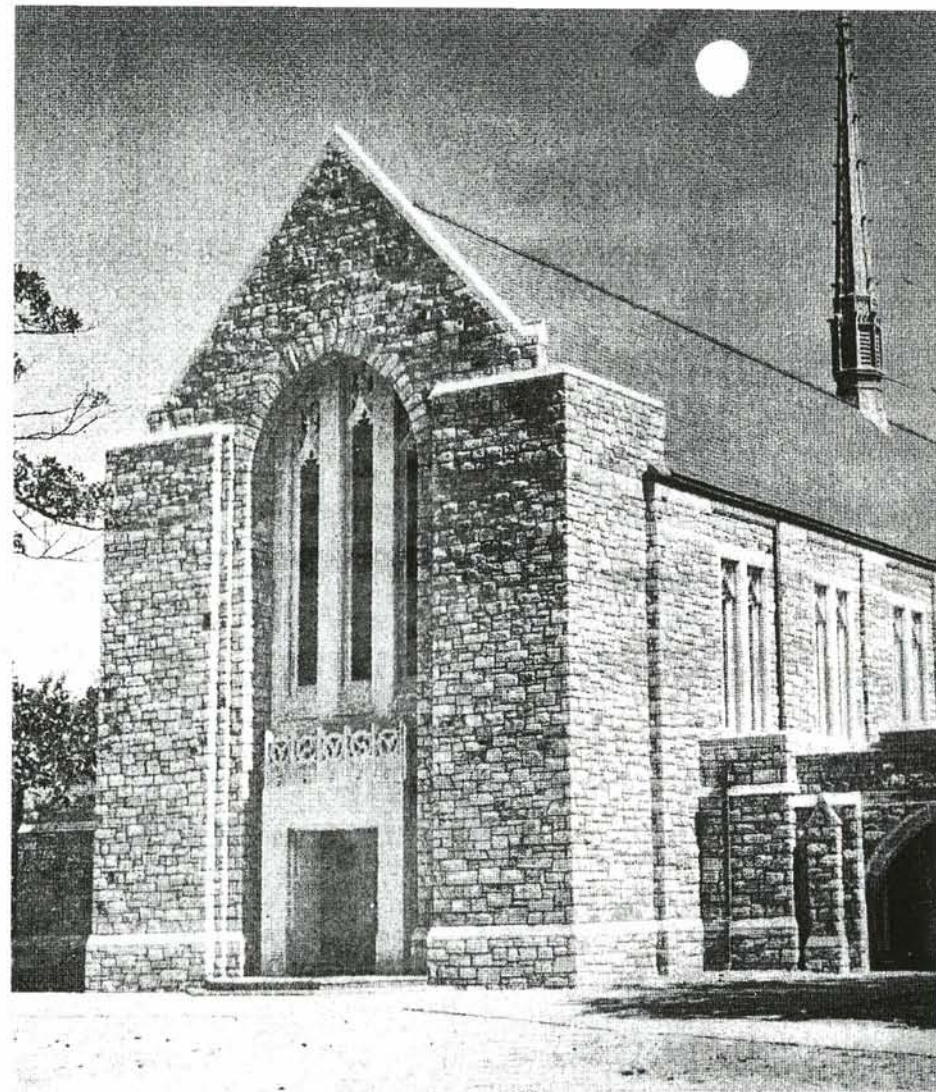

INFORMATION ABOUT 1965

One of the first events in 1965 was a mission study about Spanish Americans. Dr. Esperanza Escudero, professor at Methodist College, was guest speaker.

Bishop Paul N. Garber, resident Bishop of the North Carolina Conference and Haymount's Bishop, spoke at the February 21, 1965 service. He was introduced by Fayetteville District Superintendent Reverend Barney L. Davidson. Mrs. Garber, also, was present.

Speaking the following Sunday, February 28, was Reverend Charles K. McAdams head of the Public Relations Office at Methodist College and a member of Haymount Methodist Church.

The W.S.C.S. was proud to have 8 circles meeting monthly. Two met first Monday mornings, three met first Tuesday mornings and three met first Tuesdays at 8:00 p.m. The Wesleyan Service Guild, also, met monthly on first Wednesdays at 8:00 p.m.

On Sunday afternoon, February 21, Bishop Paul N. Garber lead the Ground Breaking Exercises at Camp Rockfish in the Fayetteville District. Haymounters who worked to make the Camp a reality were confident that there would be camping at Camp Rockfish during the summer.

The Every Member Canvas for the purpose of subscribing to the 1965-1966 church budget was held Sunday, March 28. Stressed was: "Every member is expected to make a pledge for the financial support of the church." This is because each person on becoming a member pledged to support his church through attendance, prayer, gifts and service. 263 pledge cards were turned in March 28 representing 380 members. 38,392.44 was pledged to the Unified Budget and 23,301.60 was pledged to the Building Fund.

The Commission on Membership and Evangelism planned three Prayer Breakfasts for the men of the Church to be held during Holy Week at 7:00 a.m.

Church Membership classes for children and young people began March 20.

Commissions meeting regularly were:

- Commission on Christian Social Concerns
- Commission on Membership and Evangelism
- Commission on Education
- Commission on Stewardship and Finance

The service on April 4 marked the first anniversary of moving the Church services into the new Sanctuary.

With the coming of April came interest in softball. All men interested in being on the Church softball team were asked to meet at the Church Tuesday, April 20. The first practice session was April 29 at Honeycut Field.

Information about 1965 continued.

In addition to its regular General and Circle meetings, the Woman's Society of Christian Service participated in the study "The Nation and the Kingdom" presented at Hay Street Methodist Church April 28 and 30.

A series of sessions sponsored by the Commission on Membership and Evangelism on "The Exploration of the Book of Genesis" were held May 3-5 at the Church. The leader was Dr. Bernard Boyd of the Department of Religion at the University of North Carolina

In May the Commission on Missions presented a program by Mr. Seavy Carroll of Fayetteville, missionary to Southern Rhodesia. He showed slides and spoke about his experiences in that country.

The men's Softball Team was active and playing regularly at Honeycutt Field.

Vacation Church School was held June 7 through June 11 from 9:00a.m. to 11:30 a.m. There were classes for children ages 4 through 11 (kindergarten through elementary 6). All boys and girls of Haymount were urged to come and bring their friends for a week of Bible stories, songs, games and activities.

"Date and Data" books were created by the WSCS with informative data, a history of the WSCS and a membership roster of WSCS. They sold for 1.00.

On Sunday June 20 the Reverend W. Junius Neese was welcomed to Haymount as its new pastor. An informal reception was held Tuesday evening June 22 for the Reverend and Mrs. T. R. Jenkins in appreciation of their five years of service at Haymount.

A Quarterly Conference was held on July 4, 1965 for the purpose of taking action on the recommendation of the Parsonage Committee to purchase a house on Pine Valley Loop to be used as a parsonage. The members voted to do this. It was purchased at a cost of 42,000.00.

The formal opening of Camp Rockfish was held on Saturday, July 31 at 11:00 a.m. Bishop Garber attended and gave the address. All were requested to bring a picnic lunch with them.

Several one week camps were held at Camp Rockfish for Haymount boys and girls who had completed grades 4 - 8.

During August Haymount Church as a whole held 6 sessions on "The Letter To The Ephesians. In September there was one session on the book "One Witness In One World" by Bishop Roy H. Short.

On October 27 the Methodist Men and the WSCS combined thier efforts hosting a Barbecue Supper for the benefit of the Church.

In December special observances of Christmas were the Christmas Cantata "The Christ Child" by C. B. Hawley presented by the Choir on Sunday, December 12 at 11:00 a.m; the Children's Christmas program Sunday, December 19 at 7:00 p.m. in the Fellowship Hall. At this time the Methodist Men presented their annual Christmas treats to the children. All were asked to bring "white gifts" for Jesus which were presented at the altar and donated to the needy.

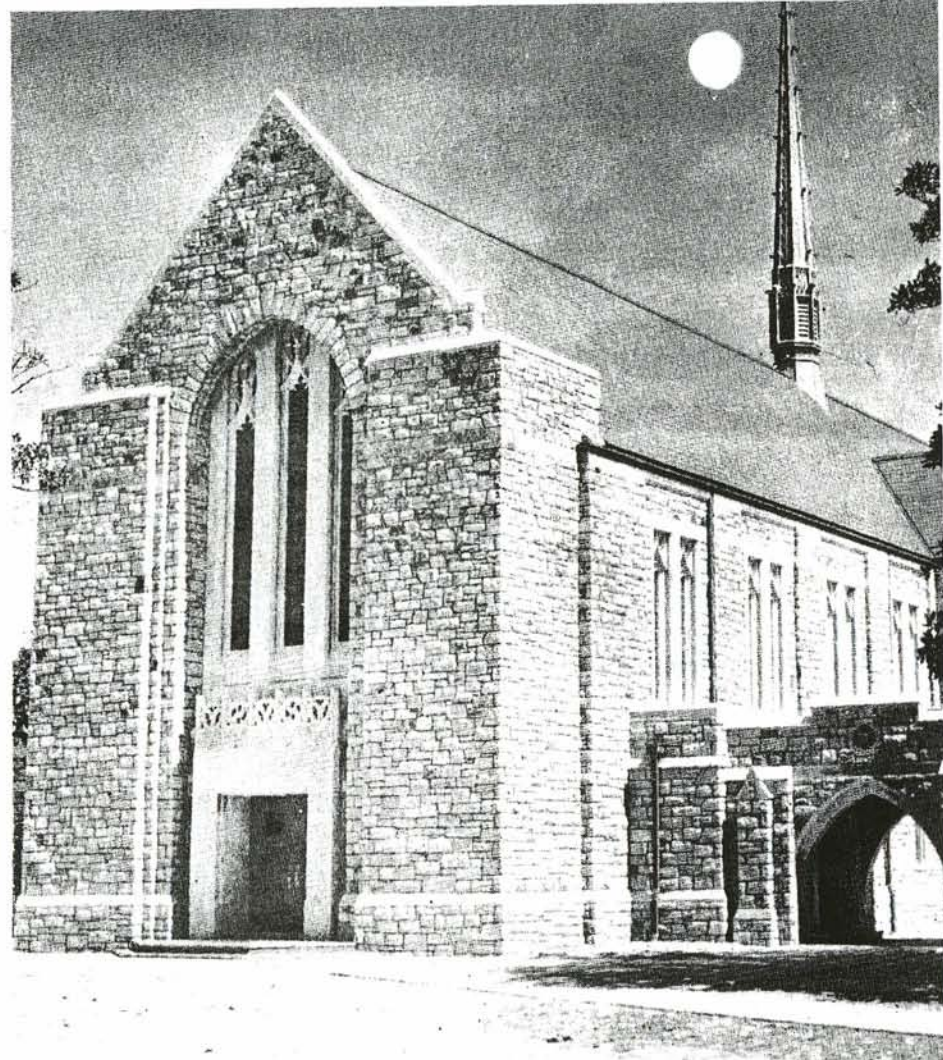

Dear Member of Haymount Methodist Church:

In 1958 the North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church began a Crusade to raise five million dollars for Christian Higher Education within the bounds of our State. The specific purpose of the campaign was to build two new colleges and expand Louisburg college. The two new colleges established were Methodist College and N. C. Wesleyan College. It was our purpose also to give some support to Greensboro College, High Point College, Duke Divinity School, and the Wesley Foundation. In 1962 we began the second phase of this campaign with the purpose being to complete the original crusade for five million dollars.

At this time a progress report shows that the present enrollment at Methodist College is 818; at N. C. Wesleyan it is 650; and at Louisburg it is 675. This is a tremendous achievement, and we are all very proud of what has been accomplished with the funds we have contributed to this cause. Here in our area we are especially interested in Methodist College, and through the foundation we make our contributions directly to this school. We need to be reminded, however, that we have not yet raised even four million of the original five million we set out to raise. Back in 1962 our local church accepted a fair share quota of \$25,000. To date we have raised only about \$16,000 of that quota. We still have much work to do in the next few months.

On Sunday, November 21, we shall observe College Day in our church with the emphasis upon METHODIST COLLEGE. Representatives of the College will be with us during the 11:00 o'clock worship service. We urge you to be present also. If you have made a pledge and paid it up to date, we express our profound gratitude. If you are behind with your pledge, we urge you to use this occasion to catch up. If you have not made a pledge, we urge you to do so. Let everyone make a generous contribution to Methodist College on College Day.

INFORMATION ABOUT 1966

At the January 3 meeting of the Official Board, chairman Von Autry acknowledged the gift of Steeple Lights given in memory of Hugh Geddes by his family. For the Trustees, Mr. Hensdale gave recognition to the good work that David Trice was doing as Building Superintendent.

The Finance Committee reported that the Balance On Hand in the Unified Budget on December 31, 1965 was \$7.84.

For the Woman's Society of Christian Service, Eutha Willis reported that the women would hold a study on Basic Christian Beliefs each Sunday in February. The Worship Committee planned to install a speaker in the Narthex so people in that area could hear the message from the pulpit.

The Administrative Board learned that an Associate Pastor (Rev. Ben Rouse) was being appointed to Haymount.

At its February meeting, the new Associate Pastor, Rev. Ben Rouse, was introduced to the Official Board. In order to provide office space for Rev. Rouse, it was agreed to move the Library to the secretary's office.

Rev. Neese asked for and received approval to show a motion picture at the March meeting which would help the Board to understand the Benevolences of the Conference.

It was announced that "Every Member Visitation" would be held Sunday, April 17 through Sunday, April 26.

In March a study was made of classroom and office space in order to determine the needs of the Church in these areas. The architect, Mason Hicks, made four proposals.

Also, in March:

The MYF sponsored a Barbeque Supper at the Church making a profit of \$130.00.

Dates for the Church bible School would be June 6-10 with Mary Evelyn Hayes the Director.

The Adult Bible Study Class was moved to the Bride's Room.

A Committee was named to set up a lounge in the Fellowship Building.

In April it was decided that because of loans already made, it was not advisable to go into a building program at this time. Only necessary repairs to the building would be done.

A goal of the Worship Committee was to purchase 500 copies of the New Methodist Hymnal. As of July, 350 had been purchased. 156 of these were given through donations as "memorials" or "in honor of" to the Memorial Fund.

In September, our Pastor, Rev. Neese, told the Official Board that he was disturbed over the financial condition of the Church. There is an uncollected balance of \$6,869.92 on last year's pledges. He felt the Official Board members were delinquent in their duties by not reminding members of their responsibilities.

Information About 1966 continued

There was a great deal of discussion about the confusion and mixing of funds in the Unified Budget and the Building Fund and the possibility of combining the two bank accounts.

On Wednesday, October 19, a Church-wide Barbecue Lunch and Supper was held to raise Funds for the Building fund and Debt Retirement. Monies have not been coming in for these programs.

GOALS AND OBJECTIVES FOR HAYMOUNT METHODIST CHURCH FOR THE CONFERENCE YEAR -- 1966-67

I. MEMBERSHIP AND EVANGELISM

1. A Lay Witness Mission in our church during the Fall months.
2. A revival in our church the week of April 9-14, 1966 in cooperation with the N. C. Conference program.
3. A concentrated effort to enlist more of our members in a visitation program-- including a visitation of the sick, shut-ins, prospective members, and new members.
4. A more effective use of greeters at our worship services.
5. The establishment of many more family altars among the members of our church.

II. EDUCATION

1. A provision for much-needed additional educational space as soon as possible.
2. More thorough dedication of our teachers, counselors, officers, ministers, and other workers to their tasks.
3. An effort to secure satisfactory substitute teachers for each Sunday School class where this has not already been done.
4. Provision for leadership training for our workers and prospective workers.
5. An enthusiastic preparation for and acceptance of the new adult literature.

III. MISSIONS

1. A more vital interest in church extension -- locally, conference-wide, and world-wide. A serious effort to enlarge our list of Ten Dollar Club members.
2. A greater concern for Mission Special giving.
3. A Unified Mission Study appealing to a larger number of the people of our church.
4. A more vital interest in the causes represented in our World Service giving.

IV. CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

1. A conscientious effort to help our people understand the reason why the church must be concerned about Peace and World Order, Human Relations and Economic Affairs, and Alcohol Problems and General Welfare.
2. A more enthusiastic observance of the special days recommended by our church to promote these causes.
3. The sympathetic cooperation of the church with the Commission on Christian Social Concerns as it undertakes its work.
4. The acceptance of specific projects by the church in this area of our work.

V. STEWARDSHIP AND FINANCE

1. A stronger effort on our part to keep our budget on a current basis. (The goal of the Commission on Stewardship and Finance is: A minimum surplus each month amounting to one month's expenses.)
2. The use of more business-like controls over our expenditures--keeping each cause within its own budget.
3. A stricter handling of gifts made for specific causes. (The Discipline is clear at this point. Paragraph 267, section 6 says: "Contributions designated for specific causes and objects shall be promptly forwarded according to the intent of the donor, and shall not be used, even temporarily, for any other purpose.")
4. A more enthusiastic promotion of Christian Stewardship throughout the church.
5. A successful Every Member Visitation next Spring with the goal of pledging 100% of our 1967-68 Budget.
6. Offer more opportunities for receiving special offerings for special causes which are now in our budget. (The Discipline requires that offerings be taken in some cases where we now have an amount placed in the budget. By this method we have eliminated offering the Discipline required. See the Discipline paragraphs 250, 760, and others.)

VI. WORSHIP

1. Give increased attention to the growth of our Organ Fund.
2. Give study to ushering techniques to make for smoother worship services and quieter Narthex during the services. Also to the handling of Holy Communion services.
3. Urge others to become members of our Chancel Choir -- especially men.

VII. HIGHER EDUCATION

1. A serious effort to pay in full our pledge to Methodist College this year. (The report of the Foundation shows that we have paid \$18,748.52 and that we still owe \$6,251.48.)
2. Invite representatives, choirs, etc. from our colleges to visit our church to enable us to become better acquainted with them.
3. Continue to explore possibilities of doing a better job of reaching members of the student body at Methodist College.

VIII. CHURCH PROPERTY

1. Give study and planning to paying off our Building Fund (Debt Retirement Fund) as rapidly as possible.
2. Acquire property in the vicinity of the church as it becomes available. (Such property could help us to meet our space needs now, and serve as additional parking space in the future.)
3. Alter the choir of the fellowship hall to make it a stage.
4. Explore the possibility of expanding the air conditioner in the fellowship hall to service the kitchen and other rooms on that side of the educational building.
5. Secure a water cooler for the first floor of the educational building.
6. Improve the appearances and equipment of the church offices.
7. Contribute useful items -- no longer in use -- to new churches being organized.

IX. MISCELLANEOUS

1. Appeal to members of our church through the Committee on Wills and Legacies to place the church -- local, conference, worldwide -- in their wills.
2. Appeal to the young people of our church through the Committee on Christian Vocations to give consideration to church related vocations.
3. Seriously challenge the members of our church to become subscribers to the North Carolina Christian Advocate and Together magazine, if they have not already done so.
4. Beginning in September have Sunday evening meetings at the church -- such meetings to take the form of worship services, forums, panel discussions, fellowship nights, audio-visual presentations, etc.

5- *Ministry* Percent attendance at every Board Meeting.

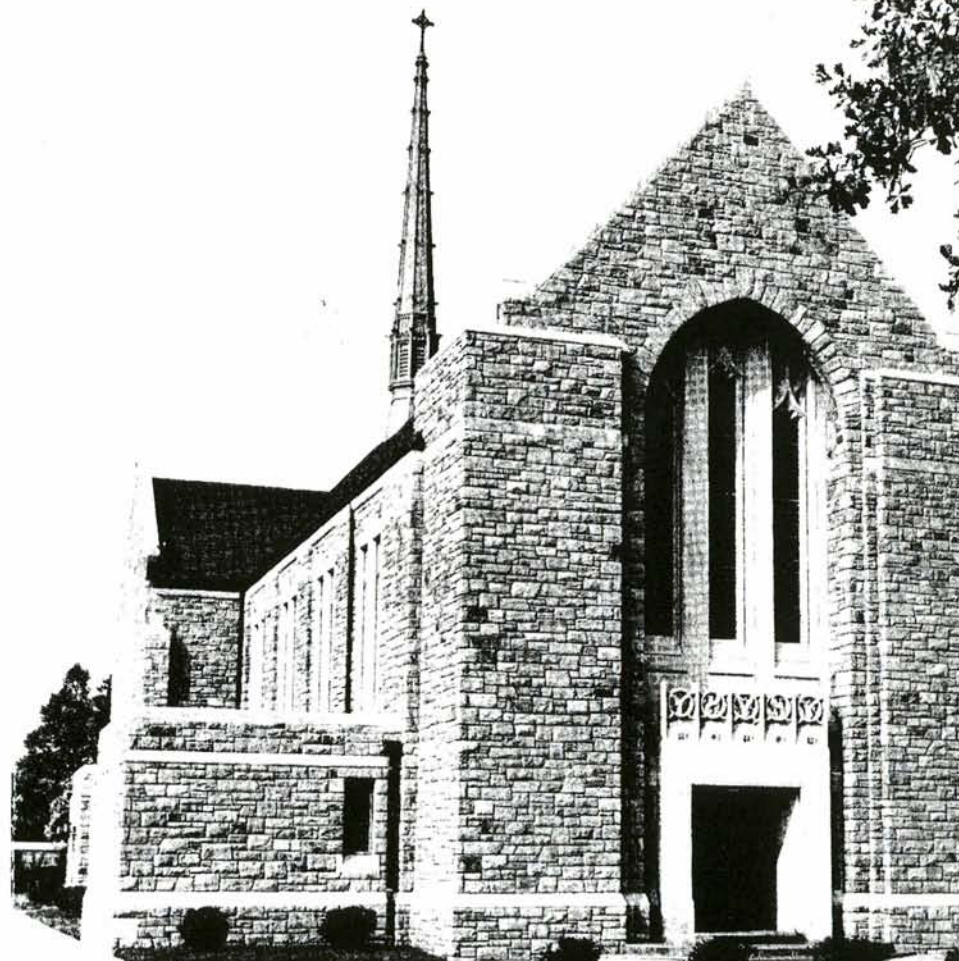

INFORMATION ABOUT 1967

In February the Commission on Missions appealed to the congregation to support the Ten Dollar Club. During 1966 many new churches received assistance through the Club but only a few Haymount families were supporting it. More were needed.

The Commission on Missions, also, made an appeal to the congregation for clothing for the Community Action Programs. With clothing badly needed in the Fayetteville area, the program is seeking help through the churches.

The Commission on Membership and Evangelism held a revival, "Venture in Faith" April 9-13 with Dr. J. V. Early as preacher.

In August the Official Board elected a Building Committee which was given the responsibility of making plans for the erection of an Educational Building. R. R. Allen was named chairman.

The Church still owed \$3,400.00 of the original pledge of \$25,000.00 to Methodist College. A plea was made for everyone to finish making their payments.

A notice in the September 13, 1967 Newsletter read: Cub Scout Pack 740 needs Den Mothers.

A Wednesday evening class was begun in September, "A Man's Search For A Meaningful Faith" lead by Rev. Ben Rouse.

Dr. Samuel J. Womack taught a mission study the Sunday's in October "That The World May Believe." This study included a consideration of the Consultation On Church Union, a proposal in which the Methodist Church would unite with nine other Protestant groups.

On October 18 the Woman's Society of Christian Service and the Methodist Men sponsored a Church-wide Barbecue (chicken and pork) for lunch and supper. Each woman was asked to supply one cake or two pies (homemade). Bazaar items would be sold. Proceeds would go to the Special Building Fund in order to reduce our Debt-Retirement.

A Lay Witness Mission was held the weekend of November 10-12 with Mr. Barnes Boyle, Jr. of Sumter, S.C. as leader. He is coordinator of a group of laymen from a wide-spread area. A Prayer Vigil was held on Thursday the 9th from 10:00 a.m. until 8:p.m. in the Sanctuary.

Several buildings were dedicated at Camp Rockfish on Sunday, November 6, including the Benjamin P. Robinson Lodge which was given by the D.R. Allen family.

The Men's Basketball League began meeting in early December.

The Commission on Worship held four meetings during the year. In addition to regular members, representatives of the following attended the meetings: Commissions of Membership and Evangelism, Education, Missions, Stewardship and Finance, and Christian Social Concerns. Some of the concerns were:

How to properly acknowledge gifts to the Memorial Fund

The Thanksgiving Worship Service

A Christmas Eve Communion Service at 11:30 p.m.

A Watchnight Service on New Year's Eve

Training of acolytes and ushers

The installation of a sound system in the Narthex for the benefit of the ushers

The installation of hearing aids in several pews

The problem of noise in the Narthex

New Methodist hymnals were ordered and received early in the year. They were paid for out of the General Memorial Fund.

The Scouts were meeting in rooms also used for Sunday School classes and other activities. There were problems connected with this. The Scouts would like to have the room, or rooms, "secured" for the scouts so that they might use the room(s) as they saw fit. The Scoutmaster felt there was great potential for Scouting at the Church. If they had a "secured" room it would probably be used every day of the week. The Commission On Education did not want unsupervised use of the room by the Scouts. Scouts and teachers were to meet together to resolve the problem..

On Sunday, December 17 at 8:15 p.m. the Chancel Choir and guest soloists presented "Christmas Oratorio" by Saint-Saens. Ann Smith directed the choir, Judy Aycock was organist and Harlan Duenow pianist. The performance was taped and broadcast Saturday, December 23 at 8:00p.m. over Radio Station WFAI.

Tuesday, December 19 at 7:00p.m. the Children's Birthday Party For Christ was held at the Church.

Junior High MYFers were busy in December. They held a Slave Auction on Saturday, December 16, starting at 9:30a.m. in the Fellowship Hall. A Methodist Youth Fellowship Slave could be bought for the day with proceeds going to the Building Fund and MYF projects. They, also, held a Work Party at the Church December 16 from 6:00p.m. to 10:00 p.m. to complete MYF Christmas projects. They contributed \$84.75 to the Special building Fund.

Outdoor Christmas activities were omitted in 1967 because of lack of time and interest.

IMPORTANT FACTS OF 1968

The Commission on Membership and Evangelism started the year by asking at the Official Board Meeting on January 8 that church members visit new members and prospective members. Carl Weeldryer, also, announced that a second prayer group had been formed.

320 people participated on the first Sunday of January in the Communion Service at the 11:00am worship service.

It was announced at the February Official Board Meeting that General Conference would be held in Dallas, Texas. At this Conference the Church of the United Brethren and the Methodist Church would merge forming the United Methodist Church.

Vance Neal announced for the Commission on Social Concerns that there would be a Spiritual Life Retreat February 21-22 with Dr. Tuttle of Meyers Park Methodist Church, Charlotte as special speaker.

At the Commission on Education Meeting January 22 the question of resolving the problem between Scout leaders and leaders of Church School classes over the use of downstairs space was discussed. No decision was made.

Holy Week Services were scheduled to be held April 7-12 beginning with a Cantata by the Chancel Choir. Speakers for the week: Rev. Ben Rouse, Dr. Samuel Womack, Rev. Vergil Queen and Dr. Graham Eubank.

General Conference of the Methodist Church met in Dallas, Texas on April 21, 1968 at which time the United Brethren Church and the Methodist Church merged to form the United Methodist Church.

The Fayetteville Ministerial Fellowship held a meeting at Haymount on May 21, 1968. It was open to the public. The speaker was Rev. Robert F. Burns, Assistant General Secretary of the National Council of Churches. He presented the history and work of the Council.

At the July 1 Official Board Meeting Hubert Willis announced that Roy Turnage, Conference Lay Leader, would be the speaker for the Lay Sunday services. Members were to attend the Laymen's Retreat at Wesleyan College in August and a Retreat For Education at Lake Junaluska. General Meetings of W.S.C.S. would continue through the summer.

At the August 6 Official Board Meeting the question arose as to who could or could not speak to the Church without approval of the Official Board. It came up because as an integrated church there will be times when negroes will ask to speak. Our pastor, Mr. Neese, suggested that the Official Board give up this requirement and let the Church groups use their own discretion.

For Education, Mrs. Ritchie Smith reported that the Church School would begin extended sessions for kindergarten children in September. The children would remain in their classrooms during the morning worship services. This will be

be handled by Mrs. James Herron.

A young adult couples class was scheduled to begin with Mrs. Richard Hensdale as teacher.

Milton Holmes reported that he had attended a Mission R etreat at Lake Junaluska and thought highly of its literature "Adventure For Missions."

Mrs. Ann Smith and Mrs. Judy Aycok attended a week-long Music Conference at Montreat in July.

At the August Official Board Meeting the need for additional educational space was discussed after which the Official Board approved the following motion: that the authorization of the Board be given for the approval of developing plans for an additional educational unit. These plans are to be submitted to Mr. Mason Hicks, architect, with the stipulation that the initial cost would not be billed until after January 1, 1969. Seconded by Alston Broom and carried.

Wednesday, October 9, was set for the annual Bar-B-Que lunch and supper. Tickets are \$1.25.

Regarding the question of inviting speakers on the basis of race, creed or color, Mr. Charles Pearson made a motion that any action previously taken by the Board in reference to inviting speakers or guests because of race, creed or color be rescinded. Mr. Thad Cherry seconded. it carried.

At the September 9 Official Board Meeting, Mr. Neese reported that the District Superintendent was pleased with Haymount. Of the six District members attending the Conference Lay Rally, four were from Haymount.

A reception for Bishop Cannon was held October 13.

Mr. Roy Turnage, Conference Lay Leader, was secured to speak at the Lay Sunday Services on October 20,.

Revival dates were set for November 3-November 7 with Dr. John Maides of Trinity UMC, Jacksonville, N.C. as guest speaker.

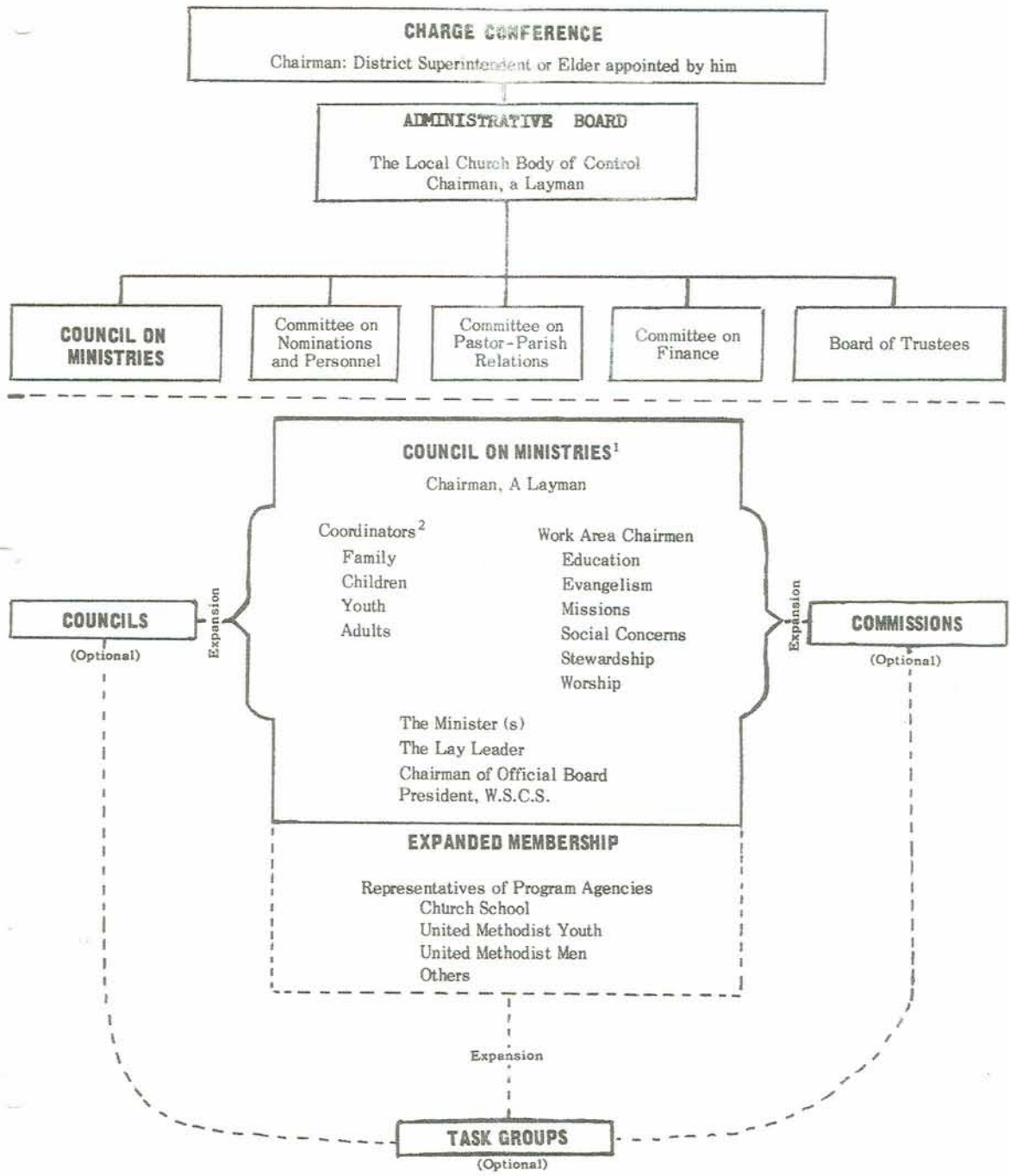
In September it was reported that \$26,050.43 has been given to date to Methodist College. This is more than our pledge of \$25,000.

Dr. Sam Womack of Methodist College taught a study on the book of John the four Sunday evenings in October.

At the December Official Board Meeting the pastor, Rev. Neese, expressed concern that the Thanksgiving offering was below its goal, that the Campus Crusade had not received much concern and that more contributions were needed for Camp Rockfish.

Among the special Christmas activities was the Chancel Choir with guests singers presenting portions of Handel's Messiah. Also, Mount Union Choir of Alliance, Ohio presented a concert in the Sanctuary Sunday, December 15 at 8:00 p.m.

ANNUAL CHURCH CONFERENCE

May be authorized by the District Superintendent or the Administrative Board to conduct all business assigned to the Charge Conference.

CHARGE CONFERENCE

The basic unit in the connectional system responsible for evaluating the effectiveness of the program of the charge in achieving its mission in the community and world; for establishing goals for the congregation(s) of the charge; and for electing the members at large of the Administrative Board and the officers of the local church.

ADMINISTRATIVE BOARD

Is responsible for establishing and administering the organization of the local church; for establishing the goals for the ministries of the church; for receiving reports and reviewing the state of the church; for cultivating interest in all authorized benevolent causes; for discharging all responsibilities committed to it by the Charge Conference, and for initiating and supporting ecumenical ministries.

COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES

Shall consider, develop, and correlate proposals for the church's strategy for mission. It shall utilize resources provided by the United Methodist Church for its ministries, and shall submit its plans to the Administrative Board for revision and appropriate action. Upon adoption by the Administrative Board the Council on Ministries shall implement the plans assigned to it. The Council on Ministries shall make recommendations to the Committee on Finance requesting financial resources for the ministries of the church, both local and worldwide.

Committee on Nominations and Personnel

Shall nominate to the Charge Conference or the Annual Church Conference such officers and members at large of the Administrative Board and Committees as the law of the church requires or as the Charge Conference may determine as necessary for its work.

Committee on Pastor-Parish Relations

Its primary function is to aid the pastor (staff) in making his ministry effective by being available for counsel. It shall cultivate the pastor-parish relationship, counsel on matters pertaining to salary, pulpit supply, travel expense and shall serve in an advisory relationship with the annual conference cabinet.

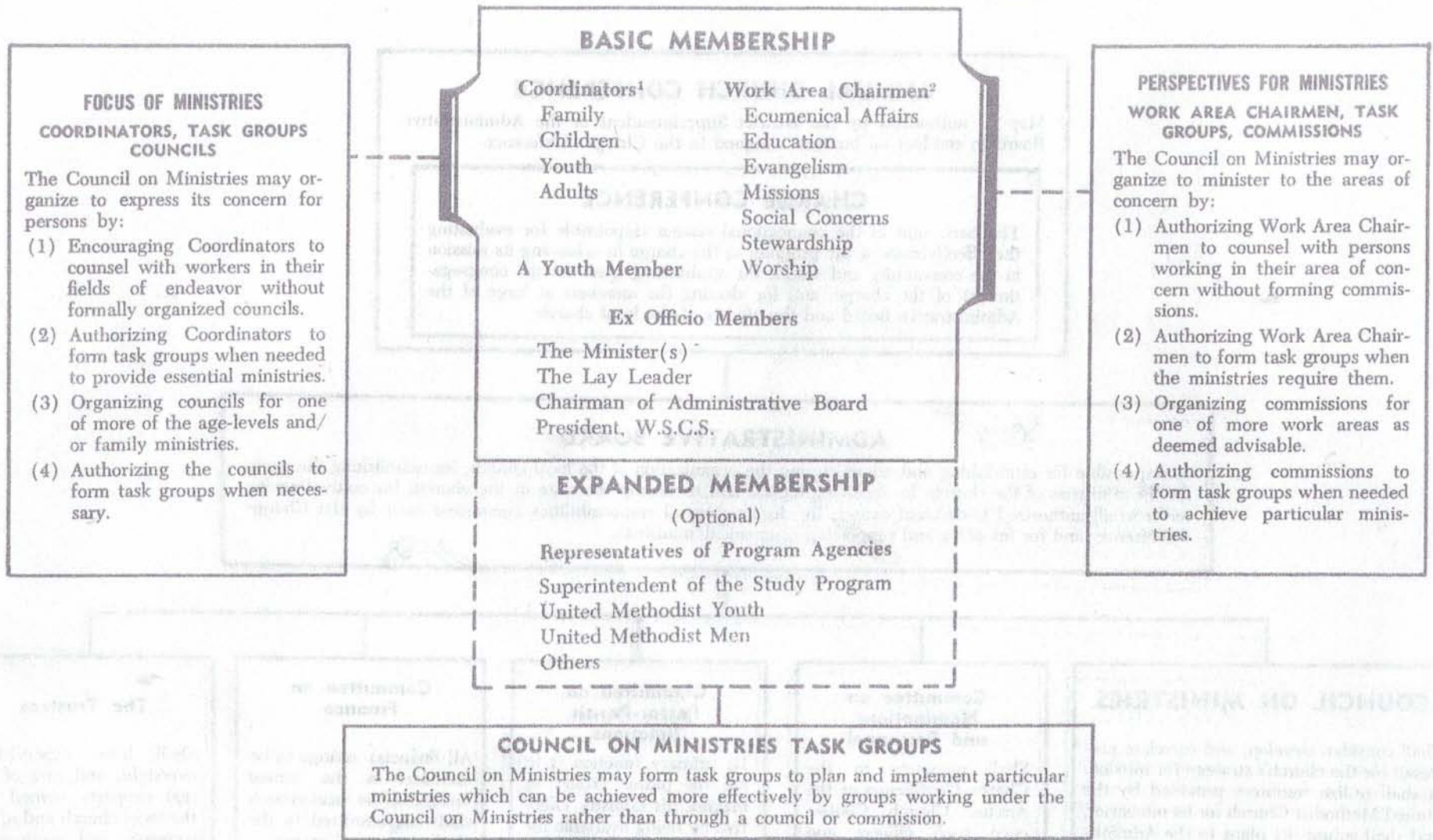
Committee on Finance

All financial askings to be included in the annual budget of the local church shall be submitted to the Committee on Finance to be compiled into the budget for the local church and submitted to the Administrative Board for review and adoption. Then it shall develop and implement plans for providing sufficient income for the local church.

The Trustees

Shall have supervision, oversight, and care of all real property owned by the local church and of all property and equipment acquired directly by the local church or any society, board, class or similar organization connected thereto. The trustees shall respect the decisions of the pastor in the use of all local church property.

THE COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES



EXPANSION PRINCIPLE: The local church should develop the basic organization prescribed in the discipline and expand it only when efficiency and effectiveness demand. The flexibility of structure provides options for local churches of all sizes. Leaders should use discretion in selecting the options most relevant for their situation.

¹ When desirable the Charge Conference may assign coordinators to more than one age level or to a combination of one age level and family ministries.
² When desirable the Charge Conference may assign work area chairmen to more than one of the perspectives for ministries.

5. Secure satisfactory substitute and associate teachers for each class where this has not already been done.
6. Make adequate provision for leadership training for workers and prospective workers.

IV. Commission on Christian Social Concerns

1. Make a conscientious effort to help our people understand the reason why the church must be concerned about Peace and world Order, Human Relations and Economic Affairs, and Alcohol Problems and General Welfare.
2. A more enthusiastic observance of the special days recommended by The Methodist Church to promote these causes, and a more vital concern with the importance and necessity of Christian Social Action.
3. The sympathetic cooperation of the Official board and the entire church with this Commission as it undertakes its work.
4. The selection and approval of specific projects by the church in this area of our work and a conscious and determined effort to complete each project.
5. The circulation of booklets, pamphlets, etc. to our people to help them keep better informed about the need for Christian Social Action.

V. Commission on Missions

1. A Unified Mission Study appealing to a larger number of the people of our church. Let this result in an increased acceptance of Benevolence askings.
2. A better knowledge of and a more vital interest in the causes represented in our World Service giving -- through the use of World Service leaflets used in our worship folders on each Fourth Sunday.
3. A more effective promotion of the cause of Church Extension on the local, conference, and world levels -- making a serious effort to enlarge our list of members of the Ten Dollar Club.
4. The development of a greater concern for giving to special mission causes on the local, conference, and world levels. Perhaps support a missionary.

VI. Commission on Stewardship and Finance

INFORMATION ABOUT 1969
From Official Board and Administrative Board Minutes

January 6, 1969

Rev. Neese expressed the following concerns:

1. That all members should have a greater concern for the Church.
2. The budget
3. That guidelines for the organizational structure of our new "United" Church were available.

February 3, 1969

Rev. Neese reported that the first printing of the plans of the new Educational Building was available. The Building Committee will go over the plans with the architect.

March 3, 1969

Mrs. Ritchie Smith, for the Commission on Missions, reported that Vacation Church School would be held June 9 - June 13 with Mrs. George Harris, Director.

Several members of the Commission on Worship attended a seminar on church music.

April 14, 1969

New officers for the Administrative Board were approved: chairman - Mr. Norman Suttles, Vice-Chairman - Mr. Russell Crowell, Recording Secretary - Mrs. Elizabeth Hall.

May 3, 1969

Instead of an Official Board there now will be an Administrative Board. Mr. Neese explained the set up of the new Administrative Board.

Rev. Ben Rouse announced that a team of two young ministers known as "Dust and Ashes" would perform May 19. Members of the General Board of Evangelism, they proclaim the gospel through the media of folk music.

June 1969

Rev. Neese explained the set up of the new Administrative Board and introduced new members. (The outline of Local Church structure may be found in the Official Board Book of Minutes 1967-1970.)

July 7, 1969

Mrs. David Padgett announced that the Women's Society of Christian Service would begin to partially sponsor Miss Thelma Maw, missionary to Vietnam. She is a physical therapist currently working with the Vietnam Christian Service.

August 4, 1969

Because there were some concerns about the affiliation of leaders of Boy Scout Troop 740 which is sponsored by Haymount, a committee was appointed to restudy the Scout situation. It is to report back January 1970.

According to Mr. Carl Weeldryer there was a well organized visitation program in effect. Visits were usually made the first Sunday in the month.

Consideration of a resolution regarding Boy Scout Troop 740 was postponed until January 1970. A committee was appointed to study Troop 740. Members are: Col. Marlin Stewart, chairman, Mr. Pully, Judge Maurice Braswell, Carl Barrington, J.F., Mr. Harvey Wright and Mr. Lee Close. There has been concern over the lack of communication between the troop and Haymount Church.

September 8, 1969

Approval was given for employing Mrs. W. Ritchie Smith, Jr. as Educational Assistant and hiring Robert Lee Bethea, Jr. as church sexton.

October 13, 1969

It was reported that Haymount was well represented on October 6 as the Sub-District Training Session for all areas of work within the Church. The meeting was held at Hay Street UMC. Nine of those attending were members of the Workarea on Missions.

Mrs. Ritchie Smith, for the Workarea on Education, reported that the Women's Society of Christian Service voted to serve suppers to the Methodist Youth Fellowship on Sunday nights. She, also, reported that Mr. Ed Tindell was the new counselor for the Senior High UMYF.

After attending the Sub-District Training Session Marlin Reid, chairman of the Ecumenical Affairs Committee, expressed concern over the racial situation. His Work area will seek ways in which it can help.

November 3, 1969

Mrs. Carl Weeldryer for W.S.C.S. reported that the annual Bar-B-Que made \$1,679.31.

Methodist Men painted the parking lot last month.

December 1, 1969

It was announced that Mr. Ernest Cook was replacing Mrs. Ritchie Smith as Chairman of the Work area on Education.

A vote that Haymount UMC sponsor boy Scout Troop for the year 1970 carried.

THE LOCAL UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

ANNUAL CHURCH CONFERENCE

May be authorized by the District Superintendent or the Administrative Board to conduct all business assigned to the Charge Conference.

CHARGE CONFERENCE

The basic unit in the connectional system responsible for evaluating the effectiveness of the program of the charge in achieving its mission in the community and world; for establishing goals for the congregation(s) of the charge; and for electing the members at large of the Administrative Board and the officers of the local church.

ADMINISTRATIVE BOARD

Is responsible for establishing and administering the organization of the local church; for establishing the goals for the ministries of the church; for receiving reports and reviewing the state of the church; for cultivating interest in all authorized benevolent causes; for discharging all responsibilities committed to it by the Charge Conference, and for initiating and supporting ecumenical ministries.

COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES

Shall consider, develop, and correlate proposals for the church's strategy for mission. It shall utilize resources provided by the United Methodist Church for its ministries, and shall submit its plans to the Administrative Board for revision and appropriate action. Upon adoption by the Administrative Board the Council on Ministries shall implement the plans assigned to it. The Council on Ministries shall make recommendations to the Committee on Finance requesting financial resources for the ministries of the church, both local and worldwide.

Committee on Nominations and Personnel

Shall nominate to the Charge Conference or the Annual Church Conference such officers and members at large of the Administrative Board and Committees as the law of the church requires or as the Charge Conference may determine as necessary for its work.

Committee on Pastor-Parish Relations

Its primary function is to aid the pastor (staff) in making his ministry effective by being available for counsel. It shall cultivate the pastor-parish relationship, counsel on matters pertaining to salary, pulpit supply, travel expense and shall serve in an advisory relationship with the annual conference cabinet.

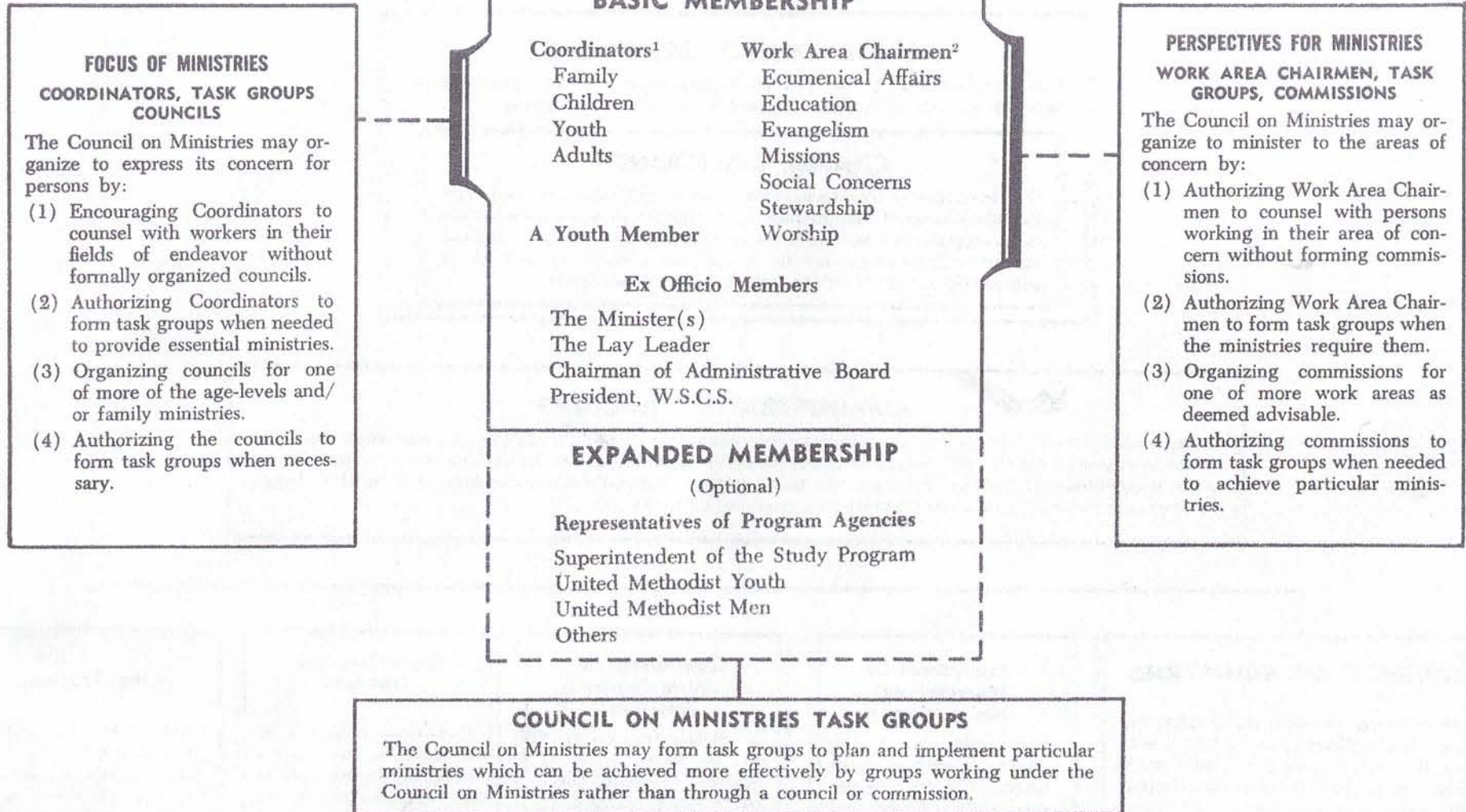
Committee on Finance

All financial askings to be included in the annual budget of the local church shall be submitted to the Committee on Finance to be compiled into the budget for the local church and submitted to the Administrative Board for review and adoption. Then it shall develop and implement plans for providing sufficient income for the local church.

The Trustees

Shall have supervision, oversight, and care of all real property owned by the local church and of all property and equipment acquired directly by the local church or any society, board, class or similar organization connected thereto. The trustees shall respect the decisions of the pastor in the use of all local church property.

THE COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES



EXPANSION PRINCIPLE: The local church should develop the basic organization prescribed in the discipline and expand it only when efficiency and effectiveness demand. The flexibility of structure provides options for local churches of all sizes. Leaders should use discretion in selecting the options most relevant for their situation.

¹ When desirable the Charge Conference may assign coordinators to more than one age level or to a combination of one age level and family ministries.
² When desirable the Charge Conference may assign work area chairmen to more than one of the perspectives for ministries.

SALARIES, TRAVEL ALLOWANCES, AND RELATED ITEMS.....\$32,376.00

In addition, Social security for the lay personnel and group insurance for the ministers are paid from this item of the financial program.

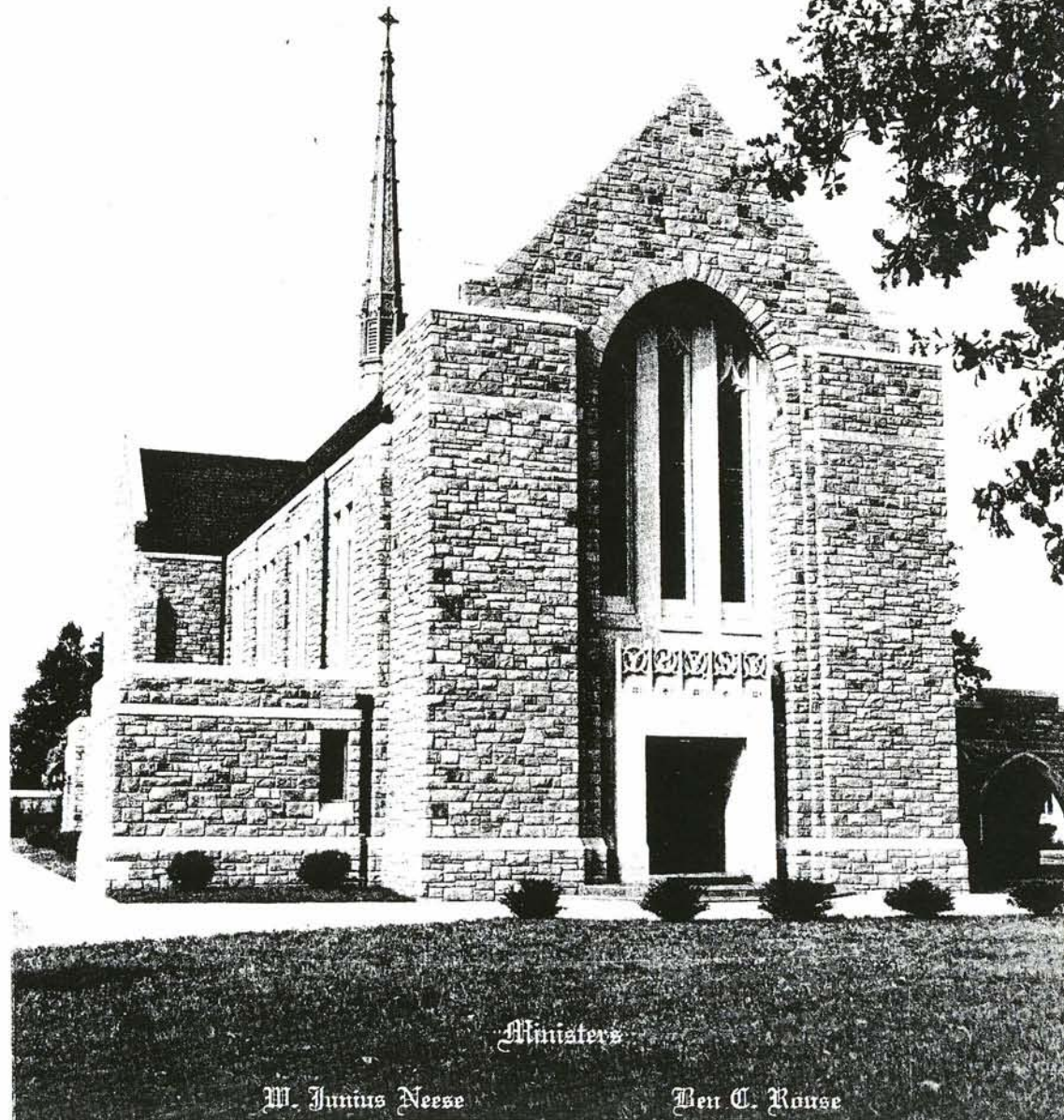

INFORMATION ABOUT 1970

A new structure for the local church became effective January 1, 1970 as a result of the merger in 1968 of the United Brethern Church and The Methodist Church as The United Methodist Church.

The Quarterly Conference became the Charge Conference and the Official Board became the Administrative Board.

The Charge Conference is to meet annually and, also, when authorized by the District Superintendent upon request of the Administrative Board. It is to have general oversight of the Administrative Board and evaluate the effectiveness of the programs. Also, upon the nomination of the Committee on Nominations and Personnel it will elect Committee Chairmen, Lay Leaders and Members-At-Large.

February 2, 1970

Among the concerns at the Administrative Board Meeting was the budget for 1970-1971. It would be adopted at the Charge Conference on April 6, 1970.

Rev. Neese was hoping to have Rev. Warren Petteway from Duke Memorial UMC for a service in March.

The Fayetteville District Lay Rally was scheduled for February 19, 1970 with Mr. Terry Sanford as guest speaker.

Since the Church now has a sanctuary, the trustees asked that the Administrative Board approve remodeling the Fellowship Hall for use as a recreational facility. The Board approved the plans.

For the Workarea on Worship Nrs, George Tinnin said that the Committee was pleased with the way that the choir was processing and recessing on Sunday mornings.

March 2, 1970

Mr. Neese expressed concern about the budget deficit pointing to Goal 19 that states that the budget should be kept current.

April 6, 1970

The Every Member Visitation was scheduled for Monday, April 13. Visitation would be to members who had not made pledges.

It was approved that every member of the Administrative Board would receive the North Carolina Christian Advocate.

May 4, 1970

It was announced that on May 10 a dedication service would be held at Camp Rockfish for the two cabins that Haymount has built. One of the cabins would be dedicated in honor of Reverend Junius Neese, the other in honor of

Nellie Victoria Smith, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ritchie Smith. The Cabin dedicated to Rev. Neese was a gift of Mr. John Wyatt.

The Council On Ministries has revised the 39 Goals and Objectives for the Church.

Betty Padgett gave a progress report which included having a training session for ushers, outdoor lighting, painting the Sanctuary etc.

Mrs. Tinnin, for the Workarea on Worship, expressed a need for more volunteers at the entrance of the Sanctuary on Sunday mornings so that newcomers are properly welcomed.

June 1970

Old officers of the Administrative Board were thanked for their services. New officers and members were recognized.

It was noted that Mr. Norman Suttles and Mr. John Wyatt had donated the cabin at Camp Rockfish which was named the Norman Suttles Cabin.

It was voted not to have the annual Barbeque and Bazaar this year due to the rising cost of food.

After studying "What Is The Mission of The Church In The Problems of Our Schools?" the Commission on Missions decided to begin a tutoring program for students with reading problems.

Mr. Neese was re-appointed to Haymount. He begins his sixth year.

Mr. Neese told the Administrative Board that General Conference approved the proposal of the Consultation On Church Union for study by the local churches, April 18, 1971 was set as COCU Sunday. The study will be held the week following.

The date to celebrate our 25th Anniversary as a Church was discussed. The Council on Ministries asked that Bishop Cannon be invited to participate.

July 1970

Betty Padgett, COM Chair, reported that the Commission on Education recommended five changes in our Education program. After discussion it was decided to have a committee study in depth the church school and teacher recruitment reporting back by January 1, 1971.

August 3, 1970

We are 25 years old this year. Plans are being made to have a 25th Anniversary Program. The date was set for November 22, 1970.

Betty Padgett reported that inasmuch as the life expectancy of organs is 20 years and since our organs is 19 years old and, since it takes about 2½ years to obtain a new one, she suggested that COM appoint a committee to make a study leading to the acquisition of a new organ.

Two committees were appointed. To the IN Debth Study of the Church School Committee: Mrs. James Herron, Chair, Mrs. John Pate, Mrs. D. O. Crumpler, Mr. Carl Weeldreyer, Mr. Ward Page.

To the 25th Annivserary Committee: Mrs. George Tinnin, chair, Mrs. D. R. Allen, Mrs. James Bundy, Mr. Marland Reid, Mr. Joe Walker, Mr. David Padgett.

September 14, 1970

Mr. Neese opened the meeting of the Administrative Board by asking that each member rededicate himself or herself at this time of the 25th Anniversary. Our aim should be toward high spiritual moments for the Church and to be thinking in terms of the future of the Church.

The Youth averaged 50 young people a night during Youth Activities Week August 16-22.

UMW Circle 8 made the recommendation to the Council on Ministries that a Junior Church be started.

October 5, 1970

Mr. Neese introduced the COCU Study to the Administrative Board. He urged each member to familiarize himself or herself about COCU so that when it comes time to vote they would be informed.

Associate Pastor Ben Rouse stated that the Charge Conference on October 4 had elected Mr. George Hines co-ordinator for Children's Ministries. He, also, reminded the Board that currently Haymount does not have anyone working with the Interdenominational Telephone Ministry or CONTACT. Since both are Inter-denominational he felt Haymount should be doing its share.

Mrs. George Tinnin reported that plans were being made for the 25th Anniversary Celebration. A committee consisting of Mr. Marland Reid, Mrs. Nell Allen and Mr. David Padgett was appointed to investigate and make recommendations as to a Special Project for commemoration of the 25th Anniversary Observance.

The Council On Ministries reported that they had decided not to begin Junior Church at this time.

Regarding the need of the Church for a new organ, Russ Crowell appointed a committee to do a study consisting of Mrs. William C. Miller, chair, Dr. William C. Miller, Mrs. Richard Hensdale, Mr. D.R.Allen, Mr. H. B. Hight, and Terry Eason.

November 2, 1970

Mr. Neese reminded the Administrative Board that the 25th Anniversary Celebration would begin Sunday, November 8 with a performance by the Choirs. He, also, stated that Bishop Cannon would be preaching November 29. This will be followed by a picnic in the Fellowship Hall. As the Church had not yet decided on a specific project in connection with the 25th Anniversary, he suggested that "The Bishop's Fund For Reconciliation" be considered. Funds raised would go for engaging in construction programs and projects to help the Conference raise \$20,000,000 to reconcile man to man. One of the approved projects is Robeson County Church and Community Center. A motion was made to accept the Bishop's Fund as a project. Carried.

December 7, 1970

Mr. Neese called attention to the Scrapbook of the first 25 years prepared by Mr. Charles Frederick currently on display in the Fellowship Hall.

It was, also, at this meeting that Mrs. David Padgett stated that there was a need to collect the historical material of Haymount and store it in a secure place. Mr. Frederick was nominated to be chairman. This was confirmed. He thus became our first Historian and Chairman of Archives.

January 4, 1971 Administrative Board Meeting

Mr. Neese expressed his concern about the Church's Scouting program. Troop 740 does not have a Scoutmaster. Vance Neal has agreed to be Chairman of the Troop Committee.

The Educational Study Group gave the Administrative Board a rather dismal report on the status of Church education. The Commission on Education made the following recommendations:

1. That immediate consideration be given to hiring a Minister of Education. At this time there is not a functioning adult co-ordinator.
2. That the appointment of a Superintendent of Study be made as soon as possible. The Superintendent would supervise the Church School monthly worker's conferences and have other responsibilities.
3. That the Committee on Nominations and Personnel operate year-round and be responsible for recruiting and training new teachers, coordinators and counselors.
4. That the Church continue to work towards better physical facilities for Church School teachers and pupils.

The Music Ministry will present the Adult Choir on Sunday evening, April 4, 1971. It will sing "The Seven Last Words of Christ." The Youth Choir concert will be on May 23, 1971.

Back in 1968 the General Conference adopted a Quadrennial Emphasis under the theme "A New Church For a New World" and established as a part of it "The Fund For Reconciliation." The General Conference urged strong continued support for the Fund. It wants the Council On Ministries of each local church to examine its support of this fund and make recommendations to their Administrative Board.

Some of the positive things happening because of the fund are:

Amputees in Vietnam are receiving assistance.

600 youth volunteers have been at work in places of great need.

45 Black Community Developers are working with their pastors on crucial problems.

Mr. Neese said that he is pleased with our financial position at the present time but that we still need to keep on our toes to stay ahead.

February 1, 1971

There will be an Every Member visitation program on Sundays in March.

It was announced that Mr. Homer Rutherford will be the new Scoutmaster for Troop 740.

March 1, 1971

Plans for the Every Member Visitation Program were discussed.

Members were urged to attend the study on "The Consultation For Church Union" in March and April. Nine national Protestant denominations have joined the Consultation on Church Union and issued a trial plan for study by the churches. Rev. Rouse re-emphasized the importance of church members becoming knowledgeable. Four sessions will be held during March and April.

The following four recommendations were presented by the Council on Ministries and adopted.

1. The best available professional help be hired to stimulate and administer the Christian Education work of our Church.
2. The election of a Superintendent of Study be made as soon as possible.
3. That the Council on Ministries, in co-operation with the Commission and under the leadership of Age Level Coordinators, assume responsibility for the recruiting and training of teachers and leaders in our Church School.
4. That the Church continue to work on better physical facilities for Church School teachers and pupils.

As a result of a meeting of women of different Faiths at Beth Israel Center, it was suggested that there be an exchange of some members of the congregation with John Wesley UMC in April on several Sundays.

April 5, 1971

A date was set, April 18, for some members of HUMC to attend John Wesley UMC with some members of John Wesley coming here.

May 3, 1971

An all day session of COCU will be held on May 7 under the auspices of the N.C. Conference Committee to help us understand the meaning and purpose of COCU.

The Scouts are building four patrol huts on Church property. Permission to do this was given in March.

June 14, 1971

HUMC has two new pastors: Rev. Edward Smith and Rev. Frank Lloyd.

A note of appreciation was sent to Mrs. Ben Hayes, Director of Vacation Church School - 1971, for an outstanding accomplishment. The average daily attendance was 150.

Mr. Ben Jones is new Cubmaster for Troop 740.

July 12, 1971

Two items were referred to the Workarea on Worship for consideration.

1. Consider the possibility of an early Church service.
2. Consider the use of red ribbon pinned to visitors cards.

August 2, 1971

Mission study dates were approved:

1. The four Sundays in November were approved for a Church-wide study on Africa.
2. Starting on February 20, 1972 and the following 4 Sundays, a study on Matthew.

September 13, 1971

Mr. Smith stated that he was in the process of receiving bids for publication of a pictorial church directory.

Rev. Lloyd noted that plans were underway to organize an Older Youth Group. This would be for youth 18 years of age or until they were married. He, also, noted that a Youth Council has been formed.

October 4, 1971

The Workarea on Missions will hold a study on Africa for four Sunday nights in November. Rev. Smith will be the leader.

The Workarea on Music reported that H. B. Hight is having approximately 50 youth per session at choir rehearsals.

November 1, 1971

Mr. Joe Walker announced that some earphones have been installed in the Sanctuary. Others will be installed soon.

December 6, 1971

Mr. Joe Walker said that more help was needed to finish the work on the Youth Building.

Volunteers were requested for the Visitation program.

The third 5 minute lecture on COCU was presented.

The Chancel Choir will present "The Christmas Oratoria" by Saint-Saens December 12.

There will be a Christmas Eve Communion Service at 11:30 p.m. and a New Years Eve service.

BECOMING UNITED METHODIST WOMEN

In April 1968 the Methodist Church and the Church of the United Brethern merged forming the United Methodist Church.

It was not until 1972 that the women's groups announced a reorganization and a new name.

There would no longer be a separate group for business women. All women would meet under the name of United Methodist Women.

July

The Chairman of the Commission on Education, Mr. Belche, reported that their cookouts were very successful and well attended.

There was a bank balance on June 30 of \$6,189.51.

There is a need for a parsonage for the Associate Minister. The Board of Trustees recommended purchasing a lot on Lennox Ave. in Stratford Hills and building a home.

JANUARY

Because there will be a change made in the Conference Year next year from being June to June to January through December, a motion was made that no Every Member Canvas be held for this year, the next to be November 1973 for the year 1974. Part of the emphasis will be "Putting God in our Budget." Norman Suttles has been asked to be part of this effort. The motion carried.

For the Workarea on Worship, Betty Padgett announced that wiring was being installed for additional hearing aids in the pews.

Betty also said that the Workarea on Worship recommended that evening Communion Services be held each first Sunday evening of the month except on those when regular morning communion services were held. This was made a motion and carried.

A four session study on India is scheduled for February.

The idea of a pictorial church directory was presented by Rev. Ed Smith. The pastors were authorized to bring such a directory to the Board for observation and discussion.

FEBRUARY

An offer has been made by a church member to purchase additional hymn books. This offer was accepted by the Council on Ministries.

The possibility of paving the parking lot is being thought about.

The Administrative Board has authorized a Pictorial Church Directory.

During Holy Week, the Chancel Choir will perform the "Seven Last Words of Christ."

APRIL

Hubert Willis, Lay Leader, says that the Prayer and Sharing Group that meets on Sunday evenings is very enthusiastic about the work that is going on in the Church at this time.

Reporting for the Scouts, Mr. Wright said the Scouting Program has over 60 active scouts. 25 of these plus 3 adult leaders are registered to attend the National Jamboree in Pennsylvania in August. The troop has purchased a 60 passenger bus for a total of \$2,500.

Mr. Ritchie Smith reported that there was a United Methodist Council on Youth meeting in August in Denver, Colorado. At this meeting Homosexuals and their being ordained as ministers was discussed. A recommendation was sent from the Council to the General Conference of the Church that Homosexuality not be a bar to being ordained as a minister of the United Methodist Church.

After discussion, Rev. Ed Smith made the motion that this Board categorically is opposed to a homosexual being admitted as an ordained minister to the United Methodist Church. And, that this resolution be made to the Methodist Youth Council. It passed.

November

At the Charge Conference on November 4 a motion was made and carried that the Organ Committee was given the authority to sign an amended contract.

1974 continued

A date, November 8, was set for a special offering for Honduras relief. The Bishop had asked that a special offering be received.

The Board of Trustees was given the authority to sell the parsonage at 469 Lennox Drive which has been the home of the Associate Pastor.

The Board of Trustees was, also, given the authority to buy the house and lot at the corner of Pearl and Finnejan Streets.

In working out the general policy of the Church respecting tenure in leadership positions, the Committee on Nominations and Personnel adopted a policy by which after two successive full terms as a Trustee, a Trustee may not immediately succeed himself.

The Council on Ministries referred to the Administrative Board a request from Urban Ministry that Haymount loan some strong families to the Arran Lakes Church for a period of 6 - 9 months for the purpose of strengthening their attendance and overall program.

December

Delivery and complete installation of the new organ is scheduled for mid 1975.

INFORMATION ABOUT 1975

January

The Administrative Board elected Bruce Woodard its chairman, Vance Neal vice Chairman and Elizabeth Hall secretary.

As of January 1, 1975 the bank balance was \$17,472.59.

UMYF voted to give \$200 from the joint Junior High and Senior High UMYF funds to the Kitchen Fund of United Methodist Women.

The Youth will hold a "Starve-In Fasting" for 24 hours with money being paid per hour to each one participating. The money will go to the North Carolina Conference Cause For the Needy.

Youth will, also, have a Car Wash March 29, a Junior High Retreat at Chestnut Ridge February 7,8 and 9. There will be a Senior High Retreat February 14, 15 and 16. There will, also, be a Bake Sale in January.

The Trustees announced that the Lennox Drive property had been sold. Enough money would be realized to cover the purchase of the Pearl Street property.

Rev. Smith said that he felt 1974 had been a good year.

February

For the Education Committee, Jim Herron said that the Education Committee will:

- encourage classes to meet and have fellowship at other times than just the Sunday School hour.
- conduct workshops for teachers.
- have a Christmas pageant for children.

Mr. Herron said that the Council on Ministries had passed a motion that they desired Rev. Ed Smith be returned as Pastor.

May 1 is the tentative date for the installation of the new organ.

April

Several actions have been taken in regards to the Building Program:

- The low bid for insurance for the Church program was from Bob Exum.
- Property on the north side of Pearl and Finegan Streets has been acquired.
- The Church is now trying to acquire property from Mr. Owen.
- Discussions are being held with the City Attorney about closing Finegan Street.

Treasurer, Mr. Wooten, reported a bank balance of \$2,464.23 on March 31. Also, a special Hunger Offering was \$1,262.21.

Final disposition has been made of the Pearl Street property. There was a net gain in value of the property of \$9,500.

The Bishop's Convocation For Methodist Men will be Saturday, April 19 at Methodist College with Bishops Blackburn, Goodsen and Hayes as guest speakers.

MAY

Mr. Russ Crowell, Chairman of the Building Committee, met with the Fayetteville City Council April 28. He presented a resolution to close Finegan Street. The decision was postponed until Monday night, May 12.

However, conditions have been met and discussed with homeowner Mr. Owen, to his and our satisfaction which included leaving the end of Finegan Street open.

Speaking for the Workarea on Social Concerns, Mr. Woodard requested that a contact be established at Haymount to work with Rev. Eric Carson of Fayetteville Urban Ministries in helping to identify children in need of a church home - a church family. It was, also, suggested that Rev. Carson be invited to speak at one of our Family Night Suppers.

For Worship, Mrs. Tinnin presented a letter of appreciation from Ann Smith and Judy Aycock for being given the opportunity to attend the Montreat Music Conference in July.

For Missions, Mrs. Dunn reported that our missionary, Miss Thelma Maw, hopes to visit Haymount during her furlough in late August.

1975 continued

For Finance and Stewardship, Mr. John Collie reported a bank balance on June 30 of \$1,286.28.

He requested that Workarea Chairpersons submit their 1976 budgets to the Church office prior to the second Monday night in August.

AUGUST

For the Building Committee, Mr. Russ Crowell read a memo from home-owners J. E. Owen and Alene Owen which gives Haymount life-time rights to the west end of Finegan Street adjacent to their home. The east end of the street is already available to us. The Building Committee will meet September 2 to begin further progress on the educational building.

For Stewardship and Finance, Mr. John Collie reported a bank balance on hand August 18 of \$948.00 He presented the proposed 1976 budget of \$165,000. He moved that the budget be adopted which was done. The annual Every Member Canvas will be conducted in October.

For the Workarea on Worship, Mrs. George Tinnin expressed appreciation for the "Children's Sermons" on Sunday mornings. She noted that interest is being shown by parents.

Mrs. Tinnin made a motion that a Committee be appointed to investigate the policy regarding outsiders using Haymount facilities.

Mrs. Ann Hux announced that Promotion Day would be on August 31, 1975.

Mr. James Campbell announced that he intended to become a Divinity candidate at Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary at Wake Forest. He asked for the endorsement of the Administrative Board which was given.

In his remarks at the close of the meeting, Rev. Paul Bunn expressed his appreciation for the adoption of the 1976 budget. He said that 16 people from Haymount attended Conference Leadership School at Methodist College in August and that plans were being made for Laity Day October 12.

- Miss Maw will speak to the combined adult Sunday School classes in the Sanctuary at 10:00a.m.
- She will meet with the UMYF at 6:00p.m.
- There will be a mission study on three Sunday evenings in November. The subject is "A Nation Under God."

For Finance, Mr. Collie announced a balance the end of August of \$832.00. Plans have been made for the Every Member Visitation Campaign in October.

Mr. Ralph Hoggard, Superintendent of Study, said that classes were overflowing. He would welcome suggestions to help the situation.

Mr. Ford Buffaloe is president of Methodist Men.

Word was received from the Building Committee that architect, Mr. Harold Wagoner, has been authorized to draw preliminary plans for the new building.

An AD-HOC Committee is being formed to determine what should and could be done for Senior Citizens.

In his remarks, Rev. Paul Bunn reported that Haymount held its first Sunday evening Worship Service on September 14. These services are to continue. They will meet. They will meet the 2nd, 3rd, and 4th Sunday evenings beginning at 7:15p.m. They will start with hymn singing. These sessions will not meet the first Sunday nights ar during the summer. The subjects at present are Bible Study, Art, and Prayer and Sharing.

Mr. James Campbell is now a student at Liberty Theological Seminary, Lynchburg Virginia.

Rev. Paul Bunn reminded us that on the Sunday before Thanksgiving our Church will be 30 years old.

OCTOBER

November

For the Worship Committee, Mrs. Tinnin reported that as Rev. Bunn would be gone for several weeks (in Africa) Dr. Vergil Queen would preach November 27, Rev. Theodore Jenkins November 30 and Rev. Eric Carson December 7. Dr. Richard Pearce would preach on Thanksgiving.

On Sunday, November 23, the Youth will sponsor a 30th Anniversary Dinner as a fund-raising project following the morning worship service.

1975 continued

Mrs. Dunn, for Missions, said that the study, "A Nation Under God", is underway. Mr. Earl Martin is teaching the adult session. There are sessions for all ages. Attendance is right at 100.

January

The treasurer, John Wheeler, reported a bank balance on December 31, 1975 of \$12,609.71. He, also, reported that \$148,000 has been pledged for the 1976 budget and that there are only 33 pledgers still to contact.

On February 25, in conjunction with Family Night, the Work area on Education will hold an Open House style function. The parents will be invited to the classrooms. The chairperson, Margaret Harriss said that the long-term objective of the Workarea is to obtain good teacher training for Sunday School teachers.

A Lay Witness Service will be held in the Spring.

Our organist, Judy Aycock, will present an organ recital on February 29 at 8:00 p.m.

Mr. Padgett reminded the Board members that General Conference would meet in April.

Methodist Men will have a Breakfast on Wednesday, January 21.

According to Dorothy Lewis of Family Ministries, there will be a Family Night Covered Dish Supper on Thursday, January 29 at 6:00 p.m. Mr. Bunn will show slides and a filmstrip of central and south Africa.

There will be an Ash Wednesday service on March 3. Then there will be services each Wednesday evening until Easter.

February

Rev. Paul Bunn reported that 22 Haymount members attended the Lay Rally at Methodist College the first week of February. Nine attended the WHY-GLOBAL meeting in Aberdeen on January 28.

June

In the absence of Mr. Jim Herron, Mrs. Mary Helen Hamlet announced that as Sunday July 4 was Homecoming Day there would be no Sunday School. The worship service in the Sanctuary would convene at 10:30 a.m. Charter members would be recognized and patriotic music would be performed by the Chancel Choir. Dr. Virgil Queen, Haymount's first pastor, would bring the sermon, with former pastor, Rev. Russell Harrison, participating in the service followed by dinner on the grounds.

As of June 21 the Hunger Offering totalled \$1,677.99.

For Finance, Mr. John Wheeler reported a bank balance of \$3,743.94 on May 31.

There has been damage to the ceiling and elsewhere in the Sanctuary. A motion was made and carried that the Trustees review conditions in the Sanctuary and take appropriate action for repairs.

Mr. and Mrs. Ed Tindell have extended an invitation to the Lake Junaluska Singers to be their dinner guests at Highland Country Club on Sunday, September 26.

Pastor-Parish Relations Committee recommended the hiring of Mr. Roger Braun for the period of September 1976 - May 1977. He will work with youth and young adults. Mr. Braun is a senior at Methodist College and a pre-Divinity student.

Rev. Bunn noted that by June 1977 we hope to have a full-time Associate Minister. He, also, stated that the North Carolina Conference cabinet had made the decision to officially assign the members of Lyon Memorial United Methodist Church to Haymount UMC as of June 1976. On the rolls are 195 people including 68 preparatory members.

July

For the Council on Ministries, Mr. Bill Hurley reported that an old fashioned family get-together would be at Glenville Park on July 28. UMYF will be selling homemade ice cream.

For Missions Mrs. Nancy Dunn said that our missionary, Miss Thelma Maw, was recuperating nicely from her leg injury.

Mr. Jime Herron said that Conference Leadership School would be held at Methodist College August 6-8, a week-end. Also, the Junior Choir Fun Shop would be held August 9-13.

Rev. Bunn, reporting for the Board of Trustees, said that Mr. David Trice will be in charge of the repair work to be done in the Sanctuary - the leaking roof, painting etc.

Mr. Bunn showed the Board the preliminary drawing (floor plan and roof plan) of the new Educational Building. He, also, showed the site plan. The District superintendent has to approve the plans as does the Church at a Church Conference. A motion was made and carried that the Administrative Board approve the plans.

The cost is expected to be \$750,000. Mr. John Collie, treasurer, outlined three possible ways to finance it. By the end of the year, the organ will be paid for and there will be approximately \$200,000 in the Starter Fund.

One of the ways to finance was to borrow \$750,000. A motion was made to approve borrowing the money if it was decided to use this method.

For the Finance Committee Mr. John Wheeler reported a deficit as of June 30 of \$1,849.36.

1977 Budget requests are asked to be in within a month.

Rev. Bunn said that he had received a letter from Bishop Blackburn congratulating Haymount on its growth.

August

A Church Charge Conference was held on Sunday, August 15, immediately following the morning worship service. It was to consider the preliminary drawings and the preliminary financial plan for the proposed education unit. These were approved. Architect, Harold Wagoner, will proceed with the working drawings.

Mrs. Margaret Harriss, speaking for the Workarea on Education, said that the 1976 - 1980 quadrenium emphasis will be on Christian Education in the Church School.

Mrs. Betty Padgett reported that Haymount supports two agencies - Contact and Telephone Ministries and Family Life Center. Both agencies have sent us letters of appreciation and have asked for our continued support.

For Finance, Mr. John Collie reported:

a bank balance of \$4,315.37

There are Church bonds of \$64,000

As it will be a complex campaign, a guest speaker will be secured for the campaign workers.

September

The Every Member Canvas will be held the first week in November with George Harriss and Jerry Miller as co-chairmen. To kick off the campaign, the Rev. Jim Bailey of Greenville, N.C. will be guest speaker.

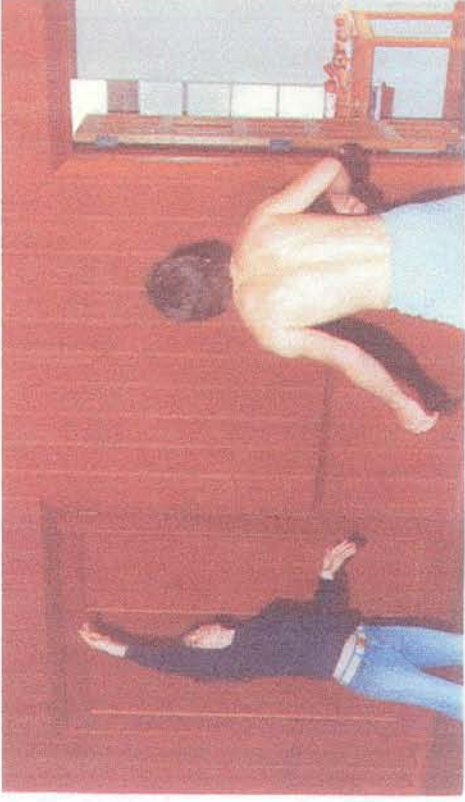

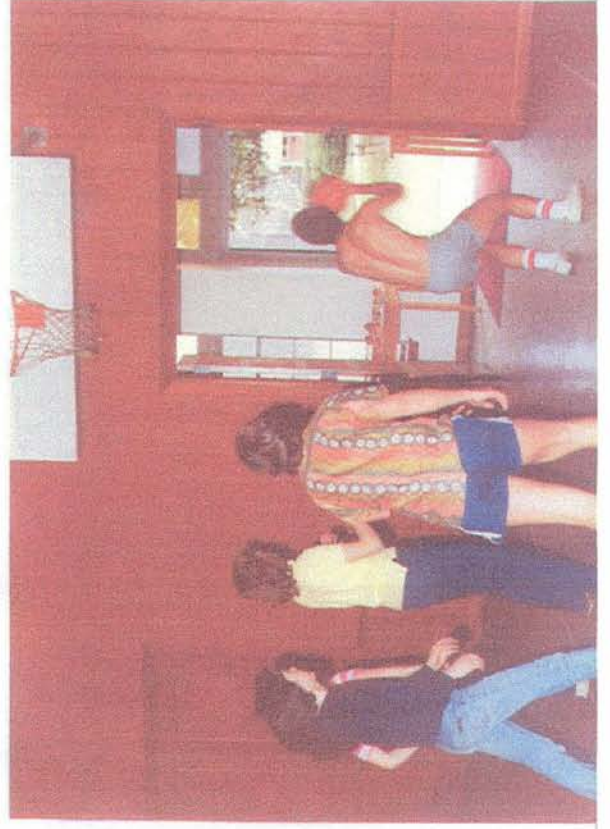
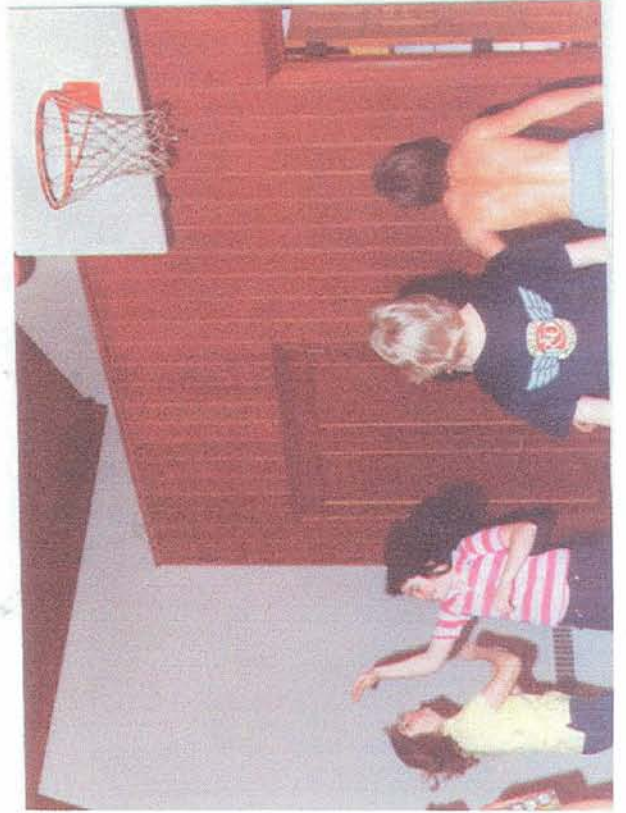

INFORMATION ABOUT 1980

The Council On Ministries started the year by accepting Mary Haracivetss request that Fayetteville HAPpy Hour Senior Citizens Club be allowed to hold its meetings at Haymount UMC on the second Tuesday of the month from 10:00a.m. to 1:00p.m.

The Dinner Theater which met December 15 and 16 was a tremendous success and totally paid for itself.

For the Work Area on Education Jack Page announced that the month of January is Sunday School recognition month. Last year there was a drop in overall Sunday School attendance.. The Work Area is trying hard to turn this around.

Two Work Areas, Education and Health and Welfare, will hold an all day seminar on Sex and Drugs on a Saturday in late Spring. The Christian point of view will be presented with discussion following.

Susan Levis told about a 3-part money making bake sale the youth are planning.

Phase 1 would be a bake sale at Cross Creek Mall on February 2.

Phase 2 would take place Wednesday, February 6.

The Council On Ministries did not meet in February due to bad weather.

In March, Betty Padgett, for the Work Area on Worship, said that Usher Training has been held with 24 attending.

The Work Area on Evangelism's "Proclaim the Work" begins March 23. Belton Joyner will be our guest speaker.

Holy Week plans have been completed. In addition to Floyd Ammons on Monday and C. T. Daniel on Tuesday, Rev. Steve Byrd will discuss the Spiritual Sufferings of Christ on Wednesday. There will be Communion on Thursday. Friday the choirs of HUMC and Highland Presbyterian Church will join together to sing Brahm's Requiem at Highland.

Fayetteville Urban Ministries was the subject of concern this month. Mike Aiken, director, has surrendered his Methodist orders and become a minister of the United Church of Christ. A motion was made and carried to recommend that the Administrative Board cease funding Fayetteville Urban Ministry.

In April JoAnn Stanford reported to COM for Missions that the Study on the Middle East will have Chris and Roger Cpgswell speak on Wednesday, April 16 about their experiences in Jerusalem. Dr. Assad Meymandi will give the Fellowship Program on April 23.

Ford Buffaloe has been investigating the possibility of buying a Church bus. He told of a 1965 model that could be bought for \$5,500. It seats 48 passengers. After discussion and a vote it was agreed to purchase the bus.

Ann Hux announced that United Methodist Women would continue to support Fayetteville Urban Ministries with food, clothing and volunteer help.

There was a record attendance on Easter Sunday with 668 present. After discussion it was decided to have two services on a trial basis at 8:30a.m. and 11:00a.m.

Thursday Worship Services will be continued throughout the summer.

In May our Two Year Olds Play Group was requested to expand to three or four groups next fall. This will be done if teachers can be found.

In June the Work Area on Health, Welfare and Education finalized its plans for the Sex and Drug Seminar to be held on September 13 for Haymount's Youth. Jackie Barnett is Chairman. The Rev. J. L. Williams will lead the morning session. U.M. Women will serve lunch.

The Youth will hold a Rock-A-Thon on July 26 from 9:00a.m. until 7:00p.m. Members are invited to sponsor thri favorite youth to rock in borrowed rocking chairs as a money making project. The proceeds will be split - half for the Youth Fund and half for the Bus Fund. The goal is \$2,000. The Youth hAVE ALREADY MADE A \$1,475.00 donation to the Bus Fund.

The Rerodos has arrived and has been installed. There will be a brief dedication Sunday, July 13. The symbols will be explained.

The Proclaim the Word survey has been completed. The first three of the twenty-two programs are:
