
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

A HISTORY OF OUR CHURCH

Mt. Moriah Church was organized in 1883. According to the best available records the first pastor, Rev. D. A. Watkins, was appointed to serve Mt. Moriah in December of that year. With twenty-two charter members, Mt. Moriah began functioning as a unit of worshipping and witnessing members for Christ in the community; and was assigned to the Newton Grove Charge of which it remained a part until the 1951 Annual Conference.

In the year 1887, land for the present site was deeded to the church trustees and filed for record in the Courthouse of Sampson County. Records are not fully adequate, but it is assumed that a sanctuary for worship was built in that same year. The structure was simple and of the traditional one room type.

Years later, when the need became evident, three small class rooms were built for Sunday School use. They were added to the rear of the sanctuary. This addition fulfilled the needs of the congregation for many years.

In the Fall of 1951 the Wesley Charge was formed, and Mt. Moriah was made a part of this Charge.

Time and tide have a way of waiting for no one. Eventually changing times created a need for further expansion, and in 1952 another addition was deemed necessary. At this time extensive remodeling took place in the rear section of the church. A sizable room was added for use as a Fellowship Hall, the rear roof section was rearranged to provide for three upstairs class rooms, and the sanctuary was improved by the installation of overhead gas heaters.

In 1960 the chancel area of the sanctuary was completely remodeled. Beautiful carpeting was installed over the chancel area, across front of pews, and down the center aisle.

At the Annual Conference in June of 1961 another organizational change took place, and the present Hopewell-Mt. Moriah Charge came into being.

The front of the church was completely remodeled in 1965 by adding an expansive porch with steps extending from side to side and a much needed vestibule. This addition was of brick veneer construction, and added much to the appearance of the entire structure. In 1967 a new central heating system was installed, and in 1968 a central air condition unit was added to assure all year comfort.

When organized Mt. Moriah was a part of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. In 1939 we became a part of The Methodist Church when three branches of Methodism in America came together by unification. At the Uniting Conference in Dallas, Texas, in May of 1968, The Methodist Church and the Evangelical United Brethren formed what is now the United Methodist Church. While this brief history is being compiled, our congregation is carrying the name of Mt. Moriah United Methodist Church.

The future looks bright and plans are rapidly developing to brick veneer the remainder of the present structure and build a new Educational Unit. The work of God must not stand still; and so, with high hopes and strong dreams, the people of Mt. Moriah are striving to preserve the fine Christian heritage passed down to them by stalwart fathers of previous generations, and are pressing on to greater heights for the glory of God.

It is a tribute to the pioneer founders of our church that so much has happened to Mount Moriah United Methodist Church in the past 94 years since its establishment. Just six years short of a century has passed since Alexander Thomas Herring's dreams of a church in this community were fulfilled.

Alex Herring, as he was called, lived 73 years (1840-1913). He married John Everette Parker's daughter, Margaret Marinda, in 1860.

Alex Herring was in the Civil War sometime between 1861 and 1865, and according to facts from Mother that have come down the generations, he promised the Lord that if he would help him to get out of the Army and back home again, he would be a Christian and do what the Lord wanted him to do. He did not renege on this promise.

For several years after returning from the War, he and his family lived near Seven Mile Church between here and Newton Grove. Although he had no home church to attend, the Seven Mile congregation would not allow him to worship with them, but at times when they were not there he would slip in through the window and worship.

Around 1870, he and his brother, Rufus K. Herring, were instrumental in the establishment of Hopewell Church and he worshiped in that congregation until he moved his family one mile west of here several years later.

Again, the opportunity came for him to serve his Lord. He organized the way for another church.

The year was 1883 - and for at least 4 more years, worship services were held in this immediate area under a brush-covered shelter. Land was deeded in 1887; and based on assumption; soon afterwards, the traditional one-room, wood-frame church was built. Its main features were the windowed alcove in the pulpit area and the circular altar railing.

This church institution with 21 Charter Members-was assigned to the Newton Grove Circuit as a part of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. These were the dwindling days of the Circuit Riders, and so the Charge was assigned a full-time preacher who was able to make the rounds to the churches on a more regular basis.

Although there must have been others, the names of 3 men reappeared in conversations down through the years - consecrated men, dedicated, and responsible for Mount Moriah's beginning.

It is <u>factual</u> that Alex Herring was chief instigator and organizer; his Father-in-Law, John Everette Parker, sawed the logs, and Everette and Caroline McArthur gave the land. It is <u>logical</u> to assume that these men and other church members built the church.

To most of us today these men were Grandpa, Great Granddaddy and/or Uncle.

To my knowledge, no one knows how the church got its name. However, it was inevitable that it have one, "AND THEY NAMED THEIR CHURCH MOUNT MORIAH." - At least one thing is certain - it came from the Bible.

The worshipers came by the wagon loads (on special occasions, hundreds of them) parking their mules and wagons all along the roadside and on the acres around. Due to poor travel and weather conditions, back then services were held only 6 or 8 months out of the year.

Many people and many things have held Mount Moriah in place - Many experiences with lasting impressions.

There was the old well; later the boxed-up pump on the McArthur side, spattering water on buttoned-up, patent-leather shoes to the tune of every up-and-down of the pump handle.

The weather-beaten outdoor restrooms down in the woods, (both under the same roof) with a ground-floor walk-way and a long bench for "waiting your turn."

There were the John Henry and Charlie Honeycutt families who kept hanging <u>in</u>, while others were giving <u>up</u>, or pulling <u>out</u>, or slowing progress <u>down</u>.

There was the foot-peddled organ that later sat idle in the back of the church so long.

There was Cousin Nell Herring's Beginners Card Class, seated on foot-square tobacco boxes, hid behind a burlap curtain in the back right corner.

There was the Ten-Commandments Banner Daddy put on this left-side wall with letters so large it could be read from the front door steps.

And Lorene Parker's Junior Class held outside in automobiles. Many classes located in many places.

There was the era of the Mount Moriah-Sharon Cooperative Sunday School System, each with Sunday School at different times of the day, to accommodate two congregations with two preachers, usually with many of the same people.

There were Mr. and Mrs. Pearl Royal, Mrs. Emma Jones, Preacher Hethcox, Aunt Nina's concern for the young soul's salvation, Cousin Lottie Herring's unexceeded ability for teaching young adults.....Mrs. Fannie Royal, Mr. and Mrs. Perry McArthur, Cousin Alex Beaman (who was Alex Herring's namesake and also his grandson) - There were many more.

The years went on and on, leaving behind a trail of history. <u>Some</u> of these years showed signs of dissuasion while others brought forth encouragement and molded growth patterns.

Most of the years were cautious ones, possessed with actions and inactions.

But $\underline{\text{all}}$ the years gave way to new, less cautious generations who had new and different ideas of how to keep a church foundation stablized.

This church has a consecutive six-generation attendance record from the very beginning; John Everette Parker representing the 1st, then Granddaddy and Grandma Parker 2nd, - and the 3rd, 4th, 5th and 6th generations are here today: Aunt Laudie, Alma, Rosita and Norman Wayne, Pinda and Shannon.

First, we were <u>Methodist Episcopal</u>, then plain <u>Methodist</u>, and now <u>United Methodist</u>.

At first, we attended <u>Quarterly Conferences</u> with <u>Presiding Elders</u>, now changed to <u>Annual Conferences</u> with <u>District Superintendents</u>. They have given us our quidelines and at the same time have gently helped us through our ups and downs.

They have moved us in and out of 5 districts 7 times and have put us on 3 different charges (first with $\underline{6}$ other churches, and now have left us by ourselves).

We have had 38 ministers, at least 7 Sunday School Superintendents, numerous teachers and officers and corps of volunteers.

There were musical years with Children's Days, Sunday School and Singing Conventions, and choirs to sing at them.

These years have given us Epworth Leagues, MYF and UMYF Youth Groups, District and Sub-District Meetings, a Woman's Society with 24 Charter Members (and Mrs. James H. Taylor to organize it). Also, Sunday School and Worship Services... Homecomings and Men's Club sponsoring Pig Pickings.

There have been 6 Phased In Building Programs - Phase No. 6 almost ready for us today.

These years have brought revivals that have connected us to the Whole Wide World of Evangelism - And 6 generations of church members to carry on God's work.

These years have given us a Christian Way of Life.

WHY ARE THESE YEARS SO SPECIAL? They have given us our Spiritual Heritage - the only thing that has been passed on to us that could make today's Mount Moriah.

PRESENTATION

I'd like to present to Mount Moriah United Methodist Church as a tribute to these pioneer founders, a two-drawer fire-proof storage vault for safe-keeping church records and other items with historical value; and it is to be placed in a specified vault area in the church built only for this purpose.

Also, a part of my personal collection of Church Newspapers, Correspondence, Program Materials, Books, and a Collection of Church Bulletins dating back to 1933.

Copies of the 21 Charter Members are in the Fellowship Hall for you.



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THE OFFICIAL EMBLEM FOR THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

The official emblem for the United Methodist Church combines the cross and a flame symbolizing the Holy Spirit. The emblem for United Methodist Women likewise includes the cross and the flame.

The cross and flame are ancient symbols of the church dating back to the days of Christ and Pentecost. Each evokes images of sacrifice, witness and service. They remind us of both the opportunities and obligations of discipleship. Paul's ancient words to Timothy have a fresh and contemporary meaning: "...I now remind you to stir into flame the gift of God which is within you." (II Timothy 1:6a--NEB)

As part of the emblem for United Methodist Women these symbols remind us of our PURPOSE, that of helping women to grow in their understanding of and willingness to participate in the mission of the church. These also remind us of our heritage, of women who pioneered in the service for the church at home and abroad and in organizing women for mission service and support in many areas of need.

The shape of the emblem is likewise symbolic. It is fluid and free-flowing, suggesting change and mobility. As organized groups of women, this has been our heritage. Often at the forefront of movements for change, at times supporting the projects initiated by others, but always aware of the times and striving to move with them rather than be overwhelmed by them.

The cross, the flame, and the individual with her abilities and opportunities—all elements of a 20th century movement for United Methodist Women.

MINUTES BUILDING COMMITTEE MEETING MOUNT MORIAH UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

WITH

DR. NESBETT - DUKE ENDOWMENT DUKE UNIVERSITY

Sunday Afternoon March 9, 1975

Attendance - Building Committee Members and Other Interested Members

Comments by Mr. Marion Butler

Mr. Butler opened the meeting with comments regarding the remodeling of the church sactuary and some of the alterations which might be included in the project. He introduced Dr. Nesbett of Duke University who sopke on the resources available through the Duke Endowment Program, and presentation of our request for architectural advisory services and financial aid. There are services available besides money through Duke Endowment.

Mr. Nesbett said we should aim in a direction as if we have plenty of money and go part of the way if we cannot make all the improvements at once. He recommended long-term planning. He said to rely on someone with confidence in church architecture. The Chairman of the Bishop's Committee on Church Architecture is in our district; Mr. Kelly Wilson, Raeford, N. C., who is an authority in church architecture. Go to him and say that we have some real needs and want his help. We should take advantage of him.

A floor plan was presented to Mr. Nesbett which he said he liked, and which seemed to lean toward filling the church needs. He said that sometime this month some of the people from Duke Endowment will be in the Sampson County area.

It was suggested that we should do what we want to do in the sanctuary...we have plenty of space already available without ever having to expand floor space. We should build to seat about two-thirds of our church enrollment and we already have much more than enough for our entire enrollment. Sometimes the way our space is arranged can be a handicap. It might take only some moving around of furniture or pews to make an entirely different appearance as well as make more available space. We could rearrange the pulpit furniture. Have we ever thought about our minister preaching to the isle by standing directly at the end of the church isle, instead of in front of the people? If the minister could stand on one side of the pulpit area he would be in front of the congregation rather than in front of the isle. We have much extra space up at the front of our sanctuary. The only thing that we would have to do to make more seating space would be to place pews up there.

When it was brought up that our choir members, by sitting together away from the congregation, decrease the number in the congregation, Mr. Nesbett suggested that the choir face the minister instead of the congregation to give the appearance of being a part of the congregation rather than performing for it. In other words, a shoir should face the minister instead of the congregation if it is to be considered a part of the congregation. When facing the congregation it appears to be performing. This seems appropriate only on special occasions in small churches.

Minutes of Building Committee Meeting - Continued March 9, 1975

A discussion was begun regarding the church pews slowly being destroyed by powder post beatles. Caldwell Williamson, one of the visitors present from Hopewell Church, said beatles are in the pines before they are cut for timber and they remain there even after the wood is converted into furniture, never having to surface even for water. They only way to destroy them is to destroy the pews.

A short discussion followed regarding stained glass windows.

Mr. Nesbett said that the Duke Endowment Officials meet just certain times during a year. They have a long waiting list and the waiting period before they can help is long.

There was some discussion concerning the establishment of a Church Library. Mr. Nesbett asked what purpose it would serve. There was some mention of the possibility of a combination library-history room and museum. This idea might be a good one since our church is small and a combination could serve several purposes. Also, the library could serve as a Sunday School Classroom. The Cokesbury Book Store in North Hills, Raleigh, was given as a source of supplies for a library.

A church in Beaufort, N. C. was mentioned as being a good example to follow in setting up a museum-library. Also a church near the coast where Mr. Fortescue (one of our past ministers at Mount Moriah) has preached, is an interesting one to visit since it is old and unique.

It was pointed up that now fiber glass steeples are becoming popular rather than the old wood frame type.

Other subjects brought up were cushioned pews and carpet. Someone suggested that cushioned pews, at least down near the front might aid in getting more people to sit closer to the front of the sactuary during services!

It was mentioned that Mr. Frank Grill at the Methodist Conference Building in Raleigh can help with old record finding and preservation. He has a great interest in church histories. Also, Duke Library has a manuscript room where old records can be stored and reviewed, and Mary John Parker pointed out that she had done some research in both of the Duke Libraries and has found some old Mount Moriah records preserved there which have been donated by various church groups or Methodist Officials.

At the end of the meeting it was decided that we should continue with the renovation plans as soon as we can, thinking in terms of wide-scale planning rather than piece-mill or short-range planning.

GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY FOR DUKE ENDOWMENT

One man's dedication to the betterment of others, expressed in unique plan of financial partnership with education, health care, child care and Methodist rural churches and retired ministers, this year reaches the half-century mark in North Carolina and South Carolina.

Over the fifty years since its founding by James B. Duke in 1924, funds shared by The Duke Endowment have had a significant role in cooperative efforts with institutions and agencies of the two States to meet the needs of people and lift the quality of life in the area.

The annual report released by The Endowment in observance of the Golden Anniversary reviews these achievements.

"In this, our fiftieth year, we pay tribute to hundreds of communities throughout North Carolina and South Carolina where thousands of people have combined dedication, vision and ingenuity with financial assistance from countless other sources and The Endowment," Chairman Marshall I. Pickens wrote in the foreword to the annual report.

Allocations and grants by The Endowment through 1973 amounted to \$378,400,693, money shared by four higher education institutions, hospitals, and child care agencies throughout the two states and rural churches of the United Methodist Church in North Carolina.

James B. Duke, a Tar Heel native and guiding force in the family which accumulated a fortune in the tobacco and electric power industries, created The Endowment with an initial gift of some \$40 million. A year later at the time of his death, Mr. Duke, under his will, more than doubled the earlier amount by providing an additional \$67 million for the purposes outlined in the trust indenture.

The Endowment's assets now are in the range of \$360 million an indication of its future potential to continue the good works envisioned by its creator.

The Endowment's special character is expressed by its limitation within a geographic area - the one which supplied raw materials for the Duke fortune - and to specific named beneficiaries.

". . . I have endeavored to make provision in some measure for the needs of mankind along physical, mental and spiritual lines, largely confining the benefactions to those sections served by these water power developments," Duke wrote in the indenture creating The Endowment. "I might have extended this aid to other charitable objects and to other sections, but my opinion is that so doing probably would be productive of less good by reason of attempting too much."

The original gift staggered the imagination when it was revealed at a news conference on December 8, 1924. Surrounded by the associates and advisors who had helped him give legal form to a plan he had developed over many years, Mr. Duke disclosed the purposes to which he intended to turn his fortune.

A newspaper account of the time reflected public reaction to the scope of Mr. Duke's philanthropy.

"Ten years, twenty years or fifty hence - perhaps the magnitude of Mr. Duke's gift will be realized. Just how, it is too stupendour for adequate comment." concluded the article in The Charlotte Observer.

"The material benefits of Mr. Duke's generosity are already apparent." Governor Angus W. McLean said, "but no one can visualize the benefits which he has bestowed on future generations any more than one can see in the tiny acorn the spreading oak, except through the eyes of faith and anticipation.

"For the next hundred years - even longer - there will not be a citizen of the state, young or old, who will not feel the benign influence of his contribution to the great work of making North Carolina a better state in which to live."

The words of Governor McLean became prophetic in the ensuing fifty years of The Endowment's partnership with higher education, hospitals and medical care, aid to children without homes, and religious purposes.

The principal single beneficiary has been Duke University at Durham. Expanding on the foundation of Trinity College, already a distinguished institution for academic freedom and enlightment. The Endowment helped Duke become one of the national leaders in higher education. Over the years, the university has received \$179,262,752 in funds from The Endowment.

Even that sum has been only one source for the growth of the university. Under the leadership of President Terry Sanford, Duke is raising money nearly equivalent to the total of The Endowment's assistance in order to keep pace with its needs.

Duke also named as beneficiaries the institutions of Davidson College, a Presbyterian-supported campus in North Mecklenburg County; Johnson C. Smith University in Charlotte, a predominantly Black institution; and Furman University, a 148-year old Baptist institution located at Greenville, South Carolina. The three have been helped by The Endowment over the 50-year period with a total of \$39,530,025.

There were few hospitals fifty years ago. Duke made then a principal object for philanthropy because "I recognize that they have become institutions, not only by way of ministering to the comfort of the sick but in increasing the efficiency of mankind and prolonging human life."

Allocations from The Endowment to hospitals of the Carolinas have amounted to \$107,694,032, including funds for both a program of aid to care for indigent patients and grants for construction and equipment.

Sympathy for orphans was a trait Duke perhaps acquired from the loss of his own mother at an early age. He gave that concern expression by providing assistance to child care agencies, amounting to \$14,687,943 over the years.

The Methodist circuit rider of the past century ministered to rural areas, which included the Duke family homestead near Durham. Lasting appreciation for this ministry was expressed in the aid through The Endowment to rural North Carolina Methodist churches and to retired ministers and their families. Some \$13,196,838 has been granted for building and operation of rural churches. Pensions for retired preachers has been supported by \$3,651,744.

Chairman Pickens said in the 50th annual report that "the needs of mankind which were specified by Mr. Duke in the fields of higher education, health care, child care, and religion have not diminished in their magnitude or significance. In fact, year by year, they have come to demand increased attention, knowledge, expertise, and greater funding from both the public and private sectors."

For The Duke Endowment, the 50th anniversary is just a point in time to gather from past achievements the inspiration to face the challenges of the years ahead.

Space below is provided for the minister to report the state of the church and to give an account of his pastoral ministry as required by The Book of Discipline (¶ 350.4a).

In the past year there have been 5 funerals (all at Hopewell - 3 of which were members). We have had one wedding. At this time neither church is in debt. Hopewell is just beginning to near the end of its remodeling project. When this is finished the church will have new carpet throughout the ground floor level, new pews (cushioned front and back), the inside of the sanctuary will have been replastered and repainted, the stain glass windows will have been refinished, the lighting fixtures will have been changed, there will have been new molding and woodwork added, a cross will have been placed in the front part of the sanctuary, a new painting that was given to the church this past homecoming in honor of John & Parker Thornton will be hung permanetly in the vestibule, and finally a steeple will be added to the front of the church. All this should be completed by the end of this year (1975). This project has been a worthwhile geal, not only because of the work that needed to be done, but also because of the fact that it helped the entire church joir together in a comman cause. the adults of the church not only pledged their own money to the project but they also headed up fund raising projects such as fire house suppers to help raise menay. The youth also joined in on this project by obtaining sponsers and then taking a 20 mile bike hike. This event by the youth raised over \$500. By charge conference time next year I would hope to have a similar report concerning Mt. Moriah as we hope to begin the remodeling project over there by the beginning of the new year.

The charge newsletter "Agape" is now one year old. It appears to be meeting its goal of being a channel of church news and Christian love and so it will be continued for another year.

The charge entered for the first time a church softball league in Clinton, N.C. We entered both a men and women's team. Both our teams did quite well taking farst place during the regular season and also winning the pest season tournment championships. perhaps even more importantly though, these joint teams brought the young adults from both churches together for a full summer, and allowed them the chance to get to know one another better, and to grow closer together in their Christian love and fellowship. Both amping themselves and to Debbie and I. We have also entered the church volleyball league in Clinton this year.

Both churches are sprong and I feel they are growing. I realize Hopewell showed a net lose of one member over this past year. But I still feel that we are growing. There is, I think, a growing sense of Christian love and warmth within our fellowship. In our recent planning meetings for next year I think we all saw areas, especially in visitation where we could work harder. And so with God's help, and us helping one another I think we can grow more and continue to get stronger, not only physically but also spiritually.

Both churches had excellent homecomings this past year. As has already been mentioned, John & Parker Thornton were honored at Hopewell. At Mt. Morish James & Sophronie Parker were also honored for their service to their church. Finally except for the Interdemoninational Cooperation Fund both churches have accepted their Conference apportionments in full, as well as the new Parish Travel



THE STORY OF THE FIRST CHRISMON TREE AT MOUNT MORIAH

Our Chrismon Tree has been wrapped around much activity during the past year and has come to us through many steps.

For the past several years around November Mother would start saying that she would like for us to have a Chrismon Tree at Mount Moriah. Of course November is too close to Christmas to start making Chrismons for a tree that same year, but when she mentioned it about a year ago she ordered instruction books and obtained copyright permission to make them and purchased materials, hoping for a tree this year. A series of workshops were channeled through the United Methodist Women's Society, and the faces and hands shown in pictures taken at those workshops tell the enthusiastic side of this story. They really worked diligently.

Time must be taken here to give Joyce Warren due credit for her assistance in the project. Phil Cannady kept an eye on the tree at work for a week, sold it to us, and then helped us get it to its destination. Ann Warren made numerous trips to Fayetteville and all around collecting materials. Mae Parker was initiated into the Society during one of these workshops and before that night was over she had worked as if she was a member of long-standing.

This is <u>our</u> beginning of the Chrismon Tree, but lets go further back and pick up the very beginning of the Chrismon Story.

Frances K. Spencer was the originator. Twenty years ago, in 1957, she volunteered to decorate the Christmas tree in The Luthern Church of the Ascension in Danville, Virginia. Realizing that Christmas is a celebration of Christ's birthday, she searched for a way to honor Him. She came across some drawings of designs called chrisma which were reproductions of chrisma designed and carved or drawn by some of the earliest christians, found on old jewelry, utensils, buildings, and some on the walls of the Catacombs in Rome. They were used back then to transmit the faith and beliefs of the one who drew them, to the people who would see them all through the years. Frances Spencer thought patterns could be made from them and used in making lovely Christmas Tree decorations which would bring out the real meaning of celebrating Christ's birthday. Since 1957, the Chrismon idea has spread to christians all over the world. This was her way of being a christian servant. She obtained copyright so that they could be reproduced, and requests for patterns and instructions for making them became so numerous that she could not handle the orders and gave The Luthern Church of the Ascension in Danville permission to take care of all orders for them. Permission to make them can be obtained only through that Church and Chrismons can never be sold nor permission to make them transferred from one to another. This gives assurance that they will never reach the hands of anyone who might make a profit by selling them or by using them in any way except for religious purposes. These symbols are interdenominational in nature and are the heritage of all christians.

THE LIVE EVERGREEN TREE symbolizes the eternal life which our Savior has won for us, and is a background for tiny white lights and white and gold Chrismons. * The lights represent Christ who in Matthew 5:14 said, "I am the Light of the World." The Chrismons, (meaning CHRISt+ MONograms) proclaim the Name, the Life, and the Saving Acts of Jesus the Christ.

Chrismons are symbols from Christian history which refer to our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. They tell the story of God's plan for our salvation that, through faith in Jesus Christ we might all be restored to the Father in a community of love for the Christian Church.

A symbol is a visible material representation of an immaterial unseen object, idea or personality suggested by a sign or mark. Symbolism is the practice of expressing ideas by symbols.

<u>Some</u> Chrismons are simple copies of symbols of Christianity from its earliest days. <u>Others</u> are new explanations of God's ever-changing presence in our ever-changing world. And <u>still others</u> are combinations of several elements, old and new. We hope that these Chrismons will help you understand the truths that the tree proclaims.

We offer interpretations to help identify various elements in a Chrismon and to share the intended message. You, however, will most understand and enjoy those meanings that you discover for yourself.

Chrismons have few colors. White suggests innocence, purity and perfection of our Savior. In our culture it is the color of joy. In the scriptures white is often used to portray purity and equates it with light to denote completeness.

The <u>CANDLESTICK</u> represents the congregation. Exodus 25: 31-40 tells us that in the Tabernacle there was one candlestick of pure gold, with a central shaft and 3 branches on each side illuminating the altar with perpetual fire. In Solomon's Temple there were 5 golden tree-like candlesticks in the Holy Place on the right and 5 on the left. Excavations have shown how the candlestick was used in synagogues in the early centuries of the Christian era.

The <u>STAR</u> is a celestial body with 5 or more points. Stars impressed the Hebrew people by their very intense beauty. The Psalmist considered the stars as fashioned like the fingers of God.

A 6-pointed star represents "The Star of David."

A 5-pointed star reminds us of Christmas and Nativity. Matthew 2:1-2: "Now when Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judaea in the days of Herod the King, behold, there came wise men from the east to Jerusalem saying, "Where is he that is born King of the Jews." "For we have seen his star in the east, and are come to worship Him."

Some people regard the "Star in the East" which led the Wise Men to the Manger Cradle of Christ as a beautiful symbol; others view it as a miracle. (I want to add right here the Hayden Planetarium in New York has made a thorough study of the stars and planets that shine in the Holy Land area and have come up with some very interesting possibilities regarding that Star that spread light over such a large area for such a long period of time for the wise men who traveled from so far away. They have issued a pamphlet entitled, "The Christmas Star" depicting some of these possibilities.)

I have another Christmas Star (silver "Christmas Star 1977) for Mr. and Mrs. William Arthur Warren, Jr. representing their dedicated services in this church during this year which also is Mr. Warren's first year in the ministry.

The <u>CORNERSTONE</u> stands for Christ Jesus. Ephesians 2:20 tells us "Christ Jesus Himself being the chief cornerstone." Mark 12:10 says, "The very stone which the builders rejected has become the head of the corner."

The <u>FISH</u> is a popular symbol for our Lord. The early church used it in numerous ways to depict acts and attributes of the Savior. In the Catacombs, the meaning of the fish symbol might seem deep to us. It symbolized Christ's incarnation. Fishes were drawn on the walls of the catacombs to direct worshipers to meeting places. Use of the fish was and still is a strong confession of faith and an affirmation of the basic doctrine of Christianity. Since we moderns are less accustomed to the use of a fish as a figure for the Christ, our interpretations may be more shallow. We associate the fish with Jesus' miracle when He fed the multitudes. Also we associate the fish with the story of Jonah and the big fish. (A favorite necklace I've been wearing a long time is a reproduction of those drawings in the catacombs in Rome. It is a silver fish with Greek engraving.)

<u>CROSSES</u> have many shapes and forms, but there are 3 basic kinds of crosses. The X shaped one, the one like the plus sign (+) and the post with arms stretched outward above the halfway point of the post. This last one is known as the Latin Cross.

The <u>CROSS</u> we think about most spiritually is that Latin Cross of Christ. During his ministry, Christ had made clear the power that comes to any life which nobly takes up daily its cross of service, hardship and consecration. Mark 8:34 and St. Luke 9:23 almost identically tell us: "And when he had called the people unto Him with his disciples also, he said unto them," "Whosoever will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross, and follow me." That Latin Cross reveals a real religious message to us. The preaching of his cross became the Central Emphasis of New Testament Evangelism. The Cross demonstrated both the enormity of sin and how far God would go to bring sinners back to Himself. This Latin Cross also is referred to as the CROSS OF SUFFERING.

The <u>GREEK CROSS</u> looks like our plus sign (+). When all extensions of a cross are of equal length, it is called a Greek Cross regardless of the shape of the arms or the designs on their ends.

A <u>CROSS</u> turned so that it looks like the letter X is a <u>St. Andrews Cross</u>; Andrew is said to have died on a cross of this shape.

MANY GREEK WORDS AND LETTERS APPEAR ON CHRISMONS.

XP (Chi Rho) (Pronounced Ki Ro) is the most widely known, meaning Christ the King. X (the Greek Chi) is the 22nd letter of the Greek Alphabet. It means Christ in Greek. Our letter P (the Greek Rho) (Pronounced Ro) means King, and is the 17th letter of the Greek Alphabet. Constantine adopted this Chi Rho sign as a standard sign and used it to signify that his was an empire of Christian people under Christ. Constantine, who was a Roman, defended the church against persecution, became a Christian himself, and abolished the cross as a form of execution because his Lord had died on it. Since then, use of this monogram has implied the triumph of Christianity. You can see the Chi Rho (XP) on the cornerstone.

You've heard people say "Let's take the X out of Christmas and bring Christ back into it. This X which is the Greek Chi stood for Christ over a thousand years before the English language of which the word Christ is a part, was even developed.

Later the Alpha and Omega signs were added to the emblem to symbolize the divinity of Christ Jesus. Alpha (A, a) is the first and Omega (W, w) is the last letter of the Greek Alphabet. They are often used in Christian art to suggest, as they do in the Bible, the divinity of our Lord. We find in Isaiah and in Revelation, scripture about these symbols. We also sing hymns about them. These signs are especially familiar to college students who are members of certain Fraternities which bear out christian principles.

IOTA CHI (IX) - This Chrismon is easy for children to understand. Iota and Chi are Jesus Christ's initials in Greek. The Iota (I) is the first letter of our Lord's given name <u>Jesus</u> in Greek. This name means "the promised one." The Chi (X) is the first letter of His Greek title <u>Christ</u>. When the two letters are superimposed, or used together, they become our Saviour's cipher, the symbolic interweaving of initials that some people call a star. Iota means <u>almost zero</u>. You've heard the expression "That's not worth one Iota." You can combine the Chi (X) and the Greek Cross (+) and form the <u>Cross</u> and <u>Chi</u> Chrismon.

CROSS WITH ORB - Place a ball at the end of the Latin Cross and it becomes the CROSS WITH ORB. The Cross (as we have said before) is the Cross of Christ. The ORB represents the world. This Chrismon can be interpreted as our Lord holding the world and the heavens around it. The CROSS ATOP ORB symbolizes His Dominion over the earth.

CROWN OF THORNS - St. John 19 gives an account of Jesus' crucifixion. "Then Pilate therefore took Jesus and scourged him, and the soldiers platted a <u>crown of thorns</u> and put it on his head and said in mockery tones "Hail, King of the Jews."
