#### THE EARLY CHURCH



Old Mt. Zion Church 1840 - 1948

"I was glad when they said unto me, let us go into the House of the Lord". Psalms 122:1.

For untold years, since the first Methodist Society was organized in North Carolina in 1773, a small tree-shaded nook located in Northwestern Johnston County, Cleveland Township, has resounded with God's praises raised by the voices of a multitude of people who were determined, with God's help, to build a Methodist Church and keep it growing.

Mt. Zion was established when our Nation was scarcely fifty years old and only twenty states strong. Hence, God's laborers in the fields of Mt. Zion have witnessed wonders far beyond the dreams of our founding Fathers; far beyond the dreams of Francis Asbury, the first Bishop of North Carolina; also beyond those of John Wesley, the very founder of Methodism in England in 1729.

God has endowed us with His richest blessings in spiritual and material ways, and with His precious help we shall continue to push forward in every phase of His Holy Work. Truly we can say with the Patriot of Old, "What wonders hath God wrought". Out of the wilderness, He led the people to build a temple, gathered them together as a flock, sent His chosen Shepherds to feed their souls and has appointed counselors and leaders among the members of every generation. We do thank our Heavenly Father and praise His name.

The earliest known official record concerning the Church property is that found in Land Book "A", page 236, Registrar of Deeds Office of Johnston County, Smithfield, North Carolina. Prior to this recording, the land on which the Church stood had remained in the hands of the same family, namely the Leach Family, so there was no legal mention

of it on the County Books. The above mentioned record is dated January, 1840, and states that in the division of the lands of Susan Leach, widow of John Thomas Leach, lot Number 3, drawn by her daughter Susan Leach, wife of Adam Banks, contained a certain parcel of land on the south side of Buffaloe Swamp and north side of Middle Creek, "surrounding, but not including two acres on which Mt. Zion Church House stands".

Found in letters in the hands of the descendants of John and Susan Leach is proof that they gave the land and built the Church prior to the year 1825. However, tradition has it about 1809, and claims that when John Leach brought his bride, Susan Parham, who was a member of the "Methodist Society" in Southeastern Virginia, to this community, she was quite unhappy because she could not return to her "Methodist Meeting House" for spiritual sustenance. Consequently, her young husband, in order to make his lovely bride more content, set aside a two-acre plot of his plantation, known as "Leachburg", built the Church, and dedicated it in perpetuity to her comfort and to the Glory of God.

In Volume two of Bishop Asbury's Journal, he mentions that in 1812, on his way from near Fayetteville to New Bern, he went by Mt. Zion Chapel to preach. Since the old "Cornwallis Trail", which was a muchtraveled thoroughfare in those days, ran near the Church, this "Mt. Zion Chapel" could have been our Mt. Zion. However, there is no proof that this is authentic since Bishop Asbury did not definitely locate the Chapel.

It has been handed down through the generations by word of mouth that the first meeting house was small and built of logs and that after a few years, as the congregation increased in number, a more elaborate structure was erected. This was a frame building constructed of handhewn planks and equipped with windows and doors. It also had an open spire rising above the altar with a bell to summon the worshippers as the hour for the services approached. Prior to 1840, this Church was burned and replaced by a still larger building which was also built of hand-hewn lumber. The frame was morticed together and fastened with heart-of-pine pegs. The planks were attached with hand-forged nails. The sanctuary was fifty feet by thirty feet which was ample size at that time. The roof was a hip roof, and no steeple was erected. The walls were plastered, and the chancel, communion table, and altar were built to form a crescent in the north end of the sanctuary. The glass in the windows was treated with some substance that resembled stained glass. However, this was not permanent, and I remember, as a small child in the early 1900's, peeping through the spots where the stain had worn off to watch the birds flit through the branches of the many beautiful oak trees outside.

The newel posts from the chancel railing of this Sanctuary are still used today in the Church as pedestals to hold arrangements of floral offerings. Also, the old curved communion table, made of hand-carved plank, is used in the vestibule as a console table, and the pulpit cabinet

is used in the music room as the storage place for music. So, for those who dream of and love the past, there is still quite a bit of it in reality with us today.

For more than a hundred years this "House of the Lord" was in His continuous service, and was the "Old Mt. Zion Church", attended and loved by the people up to the year 1948. Many, many precious little feet were started on their upward paths through her doors and before her Sacred Altar.

The earliest roll of the Church members found up to this time is dated in the late 1830's and early 1840's. The first name listed before that date is of Elizabeth Willis Sanders Leach, wife of Dr. James T. Leach, son of John Leach. Elizabeth Sanders was the daughter of Colonel John Sanders and Mary Boddie Sanders of near Smithfield. Miss Sanders and Dr. Leach were married in 1833, and it is assumed that she moved her membership from Elizabeth Church in that community to Mt. Zion at about that date.

From the beginning of the Church up through the 1860's, the membership was made up of both whites and negroes. Mrs. Alma Leach Mc-Cullers, great granddaughter of John Leach, who attended Mt. Zion as a small child in those years, remembered vividly the large Negro attendance at the services. She recalled having seen many of them kneel at the altar and receive Communion in brotherhood with their white masters. (Truly this was brotherly love at its greatest.)

Many churches of that day were divided into three sections; one for the Men of the Church, often spoken of as the "Amen Corner"; one for the women and children; and one for the colored people. At Mt. Zion the men sat on the right, the women and children on the left, and the negroes in the back section in the winter season, and in an attached ante-room in the summer months at which time partitions were opened so that they could enter into the worship services.

As in so many churches in the early years, especially in those of the rural areas, there was no musical instrument. The preacher would read the words of the hymn, a "music master" would "hoist" the tune, and the congregation would follow. The volume thus created by the blending of the voices of the white and colored members in singing praises to God would almost raise the roof. As naturally would follow so resounding a beginning, Mt. Zion has always been known as a "Singing Church".

One memory that is very dear to the hearts of the older members of today is that of the clear bubbling spring that used to be a few hundred feet down the hill from the north side of the Church. They remember how deliciously cool and refreshing the water was to them as children after sitting through the two hours of service in the Church on hot summer Sundays. To me, it made the words of Jesus to the Samaritan woman at the well more meaningful, when He said to her:

"But whosoever drinketh of the water that I shall give him shall never thirst; but the water that I shall give him shall be in him a well of water springing up into everlasting life".

John 4:14.

When the first itinerant Methodist preachers came to America, there were no buildings set aside solely for worship; hence, services were held in the homes of those who were "hungering and thirsting after righteousness". After the gatherings grew too large for the homes, the people began to search for more commodious quarters. In the towns they were allowed to use the Courthouses and private schools, and sometimes even the great rooms of the inns and saloons, as well as the Churches of other denominations. When Bishop Asbury came to Raleigh in the early 1800's, he used the State Capitol Building, which was then called "The State House", for services. (Following that first Conference in Raleigh, Edenton Street Methodist Church was established.)

The Quakers, Moravians, Episcopalians, Baptists, Presbyterians, and Lutherans all came to America before the Methodists did, some about a hundred years before, and had already built places of worship

in many of the towns. When the Methodists finally arrived these other denominations, in order to further the Lord's work, quite often, unselfishly shared their sanctuaries with them for services until they could build their own. However, it was entirely a different story in the rural areas. When the congregations outgrew the homes, they moved out into barns and finally into the pastures, fields, and forests. There they worshipped, sitting on logs and stumps, while the boughs of the trees arched as green cathedrals in benediction above their heads. In inclement weather the people would construct brush arbors and flimsy cloth tents for shelter. Nevertheless, there was always an altar erected, and a true spiritual blessing received. We know that this is true because God, through His Son, our Saviour, promised this: "For where two or three are gathered together in My name, there am I in the midst of them". Matthew 18:20. These outdoor meetings soon grew into great Camp Revivals which swept the Gospel across the Virgin lands like a mighty wind and on into the barren hearts of the people. There was always much rejoicing wherever the Methodists went.

Before the 1870's, Mt. Zion was served by those consecrated, wonderful men of God known as Circuit Riders. There were no parsonages at that time for a permanent abode for the preachers; so the Circuit Riders moved from place-to-place in all kinds of weather, over mountains, through swamps, and across the wilderness. They rode astride their horses, carrying all their earthly possessions in their saddle bags. Many nights they spent sleeping on the ground under the trees with their heads pillowed on their saddles, and with the Heavens for a roof. Their faithful steeds stood by at rest, with heads lowered, seemingly thankful for the respite from their burdens. Bishop Asbury, in his Journal, mentions that his horse seemed lame when he had ridden him only five thousand miles each year for five years. (It's a wonder that dear Bishop Asbury could get about - - much less his horse.) It is recounted of the Circuit Rider that they would sometimes ride horseback thirty or forty miles a day and preach three of four sermons enroute. Their average yearly salary was the "great" sum of sixty-four dollars and sometimes "keep for their horses". Truly they gave their all to the Lord.

Very few of these preachers ever ventured into the state of "Holy Matrimony". Most of those who did take the step had to leave their wives and children in the homes of relatives and be separated from them for months and sometimes even years at the time or else "locate" and till the soil to support their growing families. However, these men did not give up the Lord's work when they ceased to travel. They became known as "local preachers" and continued to serve in their communities; and many even built churches, thus increasing the number of worship centers.

It is known that three of Mt. Zion's Circuit Riders married, namely

the Reverend Mr. Thompson Garrard, the Reverend Mr. Robert Crawley Maynard, and the Reverend Mr. William Alexander Smith.

Mr. Garrard was born in 1800 in Orange County, North Carolina and joined the Conference in 1818. He was the son of the Methodist minister Samuel Garrard, who joined the Conference in 1800. He came to this community to preach in the 1840's and married Martha Whitaker McCullers, widow of John McCullers, in 1845 and located here. He died in 1863, at the age of sixty-three and is buried in the family cemetery which is located about three miles from Mt. Zion in Johnston County. More will be said of his many descendants in the community later.

Mr. Robert Crawley Maynard was born in Virginia in 1813, and was admitted to the Conference in 1837. He married twice - - first to Susan Leathers, and following her death, to Seraphina F. Cook. Three of his daughters joined Mt. Zion, and two of them married sons of Mt. Zion. They were Lucie Maynard, who married Dr. John Sanders Leach and Rosa Maynard, who married George Alexander Turner. The third daughter, Anna Maynard, who never married, lived with her sister, Mrs. Leach, and they are both buried in the Leach Cemetery near Mt. Zion. (Mrs. Lucie Maynard Leach was a gifted poet and published a volume of poems in 1877, the title of which is 'Scattered Leaves'.)

Mr. Maynard died in 1863, and was buried in Granville County. His body was later moved to Oakwood Cemetery, Raleigh. Today there are two of his descendants and their families in this vicinity, namely, Wilbur M. Turner of the Holland's Community and John Marvin Turner of Garner. Surviving also is a granddaughter, Miss Lillian Turner, who resides in Raleigh. None of his descendants are affiliated with Mt. Zion at the present time.





Rev. William A. Smith's Ministeral Orders

Mr. Smith was born in Wake County, North Carolina in 1834 near Holland's Church, and, as a boy, united with that Church. In 1860 he was admitted to the Conference and was assigned to travel in Eastern North Carolina and the Southern part of Tide Water, Virginia. While in Onslow County, North Carolina, before and during the Civil War, he met Sarah Syndonia Coston, and in 1864, they were married. Miss Coston was the granddaughter of the Reverend Mr. James Coston who was a Methodist preacher during the late 1700's to 1835. (Mr. Coston was instrumental in helping to establish the historic Queen's Creek Methodist Church near Swansboro, which dates back to 1780. It is said that Bishop Asbury, on his first trip through North Carolina, presided at the dedication of Queen's Creek. In his Journal he mentions the Church several times.) Mr. Smith did not locate after his marriage, but continued to travel. His wife, with their young son, spent the time in the home of her parents, Elizabeth Ketchum Coston and John Anderson Coston, in Onslow County, and that of her husband's parents, Carolyn Walton Smith and Johnathan Smith in Wake County near Holland's Church. (She made the long trip by buggy or wagon before the trains came this way.)

Due to the exposure suffered by Mr. Smith during his travels, he, as did so many circuit riders, contracted tuberculosis. He failed to respond to treatment and died in 1867, only thirty-three years of age. He is buried in the family plot near the spot where the "Little Red Meeting House" stood in Wake County. (Holland's, our dearest sister Church, grew out of this "Little Red Meeting House" which was established about 1812). The cemetery is today included in the location of the Garner Country Club Golf Course, and the exact plot cannot be determined.

Six weeks after Mr. Smith's death, a baby girl was born to his widow. This baby was Sarah Alexander Smith who married Henry B. Brady. She was one of the "pillars" of Mt. Zion Church for more than half a century. I find in the Conference Journa! of 1873 that Mrs. Smith was "appropriated \$125.00 per annum", by the Conference for the support of herself and two young children. To supplement this, she taught school for about three months a year for \$18.00 or \$20.00 per month. (She continued to teach for about fifty years of her long life of ninety years). Mrs. Smith later married Leonidas Armeda Willis and to this union was born my mother, Leute Armeda Willis. Mrs. Willis, her children, and several of her grandchildren are buried in the Mt. Zion Cemetery. (More will follow concerning her descendants).

We are honored to number among our Mt. Zion friends Agnes Doub Jones, (Mrs. Armistead,) of the Garner Methodist Church. She is a great granddaughter of two of our early preachers, namely; the Reverend Peter Doub, one of our Presiding Elders and Bennett T. Blake, one of our Pastors.

The preachers were always welcomed into the Christian homes of the communities in which they preached and were entertained by these cordial firesides as lavishly as the people could afford. This custom, of course, privileged the preachers to shed a more indelible influence on the young people. This proved, indeed, a great blessing in the form of spiritual training for them.

There were amusing incidents as well. One such is related by the Rev. Mr. R. H. Whitaker in his "Reminiscences", thusly:

"Methodist preachers, from time immemorial, have been called 'chicken eaters' . . . I suppose all readers of this paper have heard how, on more than one occasion, the fowls have taken to the woods. The old guardian rooster would fly on the woodpile and crow out, 'The preacher's here t-o-d-a-y!' Another, down in the lot, would flap his wings and ask, 'How long's he gwine to s-t-a-y?', and one nearer the kitchen would say: 'We'd better get a-w-a-y!' Whereupon the guineas would cry out t-- 'Make tracks! Make tracks! Make tracks!, and the old muscovey would ask, 'Where you're gwine?', and the old rooster would answer; 'In the woods to s-t-a-y!' ''.

"Yes, the coming of the Circuit Rider was a big event sixty years ago", wrote Mr. Whitaker in 1905.

There were so few preachers and so many miles between meeting places that most of the time they could get to each place only once a month, and sometimes not more often than once a quarter. They made up for these absences by holding long services. The people were so hungry to hear the Gospel that they sat through some sermons as long as four hours and even longer. Often on Saturday mornings the services would begin and continue, almost without interruption, until late Sunday night. Of course, there was usually more than one preacher present to help with these services. Sometimes the preachers of other denominations would come to help, and the people would bring quilts and lunches and take light refreshments and quick "cat-naps" during the long hours of worship.

Because the preachers so seldom could make their way to the different communities, Sunday Schools were organized in 1786. The first schools began at 8:00 A. M. Sunday and would continue in session until noon. Then early in the afternoon they would begin for the second session which would last until twilight. During these hours the young people were taught to read the Bible and were helped to understand the great truths of God's word. However, since the pastor was not with the people

every Sabbath, the Sunday School soon grew into a worship service led by one of the Saintly Leaders of the Church. This was true at Mt. Zion, and many souls have been led to the Throne of God by the words of Godly wisdom uttered with the tongues of these good people and by the Christ-like spirit shown through them in their daily lives.

The first North Carolina Circuit was formed in 1775, and Dr. John King, who settled about ten miles west of Raleigh, was the first Circuit Rider appointed to this part of the State. Since he died around 1799, it is doubtful that he ever preached in this immediate vicinity. It is said that the very first Methodist preacher to bring a message to the Raleigh area was Jessie Lee, who was stationed near here during the Revolutionary War in 1780. He refused to fight, and the officers placed him in jail. However, on Sunday morning he pleaded so hard to be allowed to preach that his request was granted. His sermon was wonderfully impressive, so much so that the officers freed him, and he continued with his Regiment as their Chaplain. Thus, he was enabled to bring many into a saving knowledge of Christ.

"God works in mysterious ways, His wonders to perform".

As nearly as can be affirmed, some of the Circuit Riders to serve Mt. Zion were: the Reverend Messrs. John E. Edwards, Junious P. Moore, Thompson Garrard, David Culbreth, R. C. Maynard, E. E. Freeman, J. W. Floyd, J. W. Wilson, P. H. Joyner, W. H. Barnes, T. B. Blake, Peter Doub, T. B. Reeks, William Alexander Smith, and John Bobbit. There must have been others during the long life of Mt. Zion of whom no record has been found. The dates of service of some of these men will be given later. What a glorious work they did, under the most trying circumstances! Only God could have given them the strength, wisdom, and power. Praise His Holy name!

Their greatness was the greatness that does not die, but lives onand-on to strengthen and inspire those who follow.

## THE JOHNSTON ACADEMY

Gone is the Builder's School house
Crumbled beyond repair
Down fell the sills and pillars
No longer visible there
But the House the Teacher builded

Jesus said, as recorded in Luke 12:31, "But rather seek ye first the Kingdom of God, and all these things shall be added unto you".

The people of the early Methodist Churches and their leaders followed this admonition of our Lord and established first the temples of worship, and then began to establish institutions of learning in connection with the Churches.

At that time, there were few schools of higher education in America, and these few were in the larger towns and cities. There were only small private schools in the rural areas and these offered merely the most elementary courses. The people of the Mt. Zion Community recognized the need for an institution of higher learning; consequently, the Johnston Academy was established on the Mt. Zion grounds during the first half of the 1800's.

State Superintendent Mebane's Educational Report of 1898 lists among the academies of Johnston County prior to the Civil War the one at Mt. Zion and has this to say:

"The Johnston Academy, a mixed school, is often called the Leachburg Academy from the place where it is situated. Dr. J. T. Leach was prime mover in its organization, which was in 1849".

This school, along with the Church, wielded a great influence on the lives of the people and can be felt even now - - more than a hundred years later. It has been said that "education without God is like a ship without a compass", and we are thankful today that our forefathers placed God first.

In the early years this school was one of the highest institutions of learning in the County and surrounding area. Its curriculum consisted of language, music, teacher training education, and art, along with the Liberal Arts of college status. Not only the young people of this community attended after finishing the local private schools,

but there were boarding scholars as well. Several of the families of the community opened their doors to these young people, thereby serving the Lord in another category. These students came from Smithfield and other nearby villages and settlements in quite large numbers. Some of the homes that were opened to them were those of Dr. and Mrs. J. T. Leach, Mr. and Mrs. Boaz Young, Dr. and Mrs. John Sanders Leach, Mr. and Mrs. Jim Edmondson and Mr. and Mrs. William Pate. In later years, just before the State took over the school, Mr. and Mrs. Henry B. Brady, Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Dickerson Taylor, and Mr. and Mrs. William Edward McCullers also shared their homes with those who wanted to attend the Academy. There were probably others, too, of which there is no knowledge today.

The Academy was a frame building of one large room divided by a removable partition, thus affording two smaller rooms. This partition was removed for presentation of plays, for political meetings, and other community activities. There was a rostrum in each room, and since this was a co-educational institution and the young men and ladies were not allowed to "mingle closely", the girls were placed on one side of the rostrum, and the boys on the other. There was also a music studio.

This was attached to the larger building by a lengthly breezeway so that the efforts of the eager young musicians would not interfere with the musings of the scholars. The music curriculum included, in addition to instrumental training, instruction in sight reading and voice. Miss Anna Rose taught music here for many years, and there were surely others for whom no record can be found. In order for the music studio to be a desirable distance from the rest of the school, it was placed on the land joining the Church property to the north. It is said that this land was later owned by Mr. Anderson Gower, and that he loaned the half acre of land to the Church for as long as it was needed.

The names of only three of the Academy Professors and two teachers can be recalled. These dedicated, public-spirited people were Boaz Young, J. Millard Turner, Rev. J. A. T. Jones, Kate Edmondson (later Mrs. Thomas Stroud), and Nannie T. Leach. It is thought that the Reverend Mr. Thompson Garrard, who lived in the community, taught there also but no proof can be found that this is so. There must have been many more teachers than those mentioned during the years of service of the Academy.

One benevolent lady of the Community contributed to the Academy by establishing a Scholarship Fund for deserving students who were unable to finance their education. This lady was Mrs. Mary Susan (Suckie) Leach Parrish, widow of Charles Parrish and sister of John Thomas Leach, the donor of the land on which the Academy stood. Many young people thereby received instruction who could not have otherwise done so.

The following article is an address delivered by Dr. James Thomas Leach, one of Mt. Zion's sons, a physician, State Legislator, and a Confederate Congressman, from the rostrom of the Johnston Academy in 1881. It is an exact copy of a publication of that day and is just as timely now as it was for almost a hundred years ago.

Dr. Leach was the son of John Thomas Leach and Susan Parham Leach who gave the land and led in establishing the original Mt. Zion.

#### DR. J. T. LEACH ON PROHIBITION

"Fellow Citizens of Johnston County: - - Permit one who has enjoyed your confidence in the past to express the honest convictions of his mind, in words of soberness and truth, upon a subject of more importance to you, present and prospective, than any subject that you have ever been called upon to decide at the ballot-box (the unfortunate war, yet fresh in our recollections, traced by the blood of the brave and tears of the innocent, not excepted,) that of the manufacture and sale of alcoholic liquors as a beverage.

I am opposed to the traffic in intoxicating liquors as a beverage, hence I am in favor of the law passed by the last legislature--known as the prohibition act. I propose to satisfy the minds of the most skeptical opponents of views I entertain on the subject of alcohol as a beverage.

By alcoholic liquors are meant such as are obtained by distillation from fermented substances of any kind. That there may be no doubts upon the minds of those opposed to the views that I entertain upon the the subject, let me call their attention to the immediate effects of alcohol upon one of the unfortunate victims of alcoholic drinks as a beverage, which many of us have witnessed with shame and mortification. I will refer to them in the order that they manifest themselves upon the unfortunate victims of alcoholic drinks as a beverage.

1st., unusual talkativeness or silence; 2, quarrelsomeness and a disposition to fight; 3, profane swearing; 4, a disclosure of theirs or other people's secrets; 5, a rude disposition to expose other people's faults; 6, vulgar and immodest language; 7, fighting with bruised noses and black eyes; 8, singing, hallowing, roaring, jumping, tearing off clothes; 9, in folly it causes a man to resemble a calf; 10, in stupidity, an ass; 11, in roaring, a mad bull; 12, in quarreling and fighting, a dog; 13, in cruelty, a tiger; 14, in fetor, a skunk; 15, in filthiness, a hog; 16, in obscenity, a he goat, and here modesty forbids my saying more. Let us next notice the effects physically, socially and pecuniarily upon the the unfortunate victim of alcoholic liquors as a beverage. Physically their name is legion; there is not a disease that the human system is liable to that may not be produced or greatly aggravated by alcoholic drinks. The liver, the stomach, the kidneys, bowels, brain, with every other organ of the system, is liable, either directly or indirectly to the blighting effects of intoxicating liquors. Socially it produces falsehood, fraud and theft, which is more or less affecting according to the station the victim of alcohol occupies to society. If a husband, oh how deep the anguish that rends the bosom of his confiding and loving wife! If he be a father, see the averted faces, blushing cheeks and weeping eyes of his poor unfortunate children!

If he be a public officer, how soon his friends desert him, and public confidence is destroyed by the fiendish spirit engendered in him by alcoholic drink!

In pointing out the evils produced by intoxicating liquors upon man, let us not forget the effects in a pecuniary point of view; his money is spent, his credit sacrificed, the courts and the public press proclaiming bis insolvency and degradation. And in connection with his own degradation and infamy behold his poor unfortunate children the victims of a father's infamy - - filthy, half clad, without manners, principles, or morals; such a scene is enough to make an angel weep.

My fellow citizens, in the name of humanity, in the name of Christianity I ask you to ponder well in your minds what course you will pursue, what conclusion you will arrive at, in a matter of such importance to us, our children and society generally. The Christian religion, public sentiment, the intelligence and virtue of the country demand that you should speak and act wisely on a matter of such vast importance, present and prospective, as the one now before you.

The first Thursday in August you will have an opportunity, at the ballot-box, of perpetuating or arresting the greatest curse that civilized man is subject to, that of alcoholic liquors as a beverage, personally, morally, pecuniarily and religiously.

There is no sin spoken of in the Bible oftener and none condemned in stronger language than drunkenness; and yet, strange to say, there is here and there, now and then, like the angel visits few and far between, a man claiming a pre-emption right to the kingdom of heaven through and by the blood of Christ, opposed to prohibition. Oh shame, where is thy blush! That there may not be any doubt of the truth of what I say in a religious point of view let me refer to a few of the many passages of scripture condemning drunkenness produced by alcoholic liquors as a beverage, which I ask you to read for my gratification and your information before you cast your votes against prohibition. Viewing the subject from the stand points of common sense, observation and the teaching of the Bible, it does seem to me that the opponents of prohibition assume a fearful responsibility alike to their fellow man and to God.

Permit me to refer you to a few of the many passages of scripture condemning drunkenness.

Genesis, Chapter 9, verse 21.

Deuteronmy, chapter 29, verses 19,20.

Proverbs, chapter 20, verse 1.

Proverbs, chapter 23, verses 29, 30, 31, 32, 33, 34, 35.

Joel, chapter 3, verse 3.

Habakuk, chapter 2, verse 15.

1 Corinthians, chapter 6, verse 10 Isaiah, chapter 56, verses 11,12. Isaiah, chapter 5, verse 11. Gallatians, chapter 5, verse 21.

The language of the scriptures referred to is so plain and pointed that a wayfaring man though a fool cannot be mistaken.

Yes, my fellow citizens we are taught by observation and the word of God that alcohol as a beverage is man's enemy, socially, morally, pecuniarily and religiously, that it cuts down youth in its vigor, manhood in its strength, old age in its weakness, that it breaks the father's heart, bereaves the doting mother, makes wives widows, children orphans, father friendless, and all of them at last beggars. It covers the land with idleness, disease and crime; it despises law, spurns order, crowds the penitentiary with convicts; it is the life of the gambler-the support of the incendiary and midnight assassin; it suborns witnesses, nurses perjury, defiles the jury box, stains the judicial ermine; it bribes voters, corrupts the legislature and dishonors the statesman.

Insatiate with its lust for crime it defies heaven, curses God, then laughs at the misery and crime it has inflicted upon the victims of alcoholic drinks."

During the first decade of the 1900's, the State School System was established, at which time the Trustees of the Academy turned the school over to the County for supervision, and it became a free school. The old building was remodeled by the School Board of Johnston County and was re-named Mt. Zion Free School. This building was sold to Mr. Walter Williams and wife, Ruth Lee Williams in 1939, and became the nucleus with which to raise the money for rebuilding the sanctuary as it is today. (Mr. Williams, who was a member of Shiloh Baptist Church, was always a good friend to Mt. Zion and her people.)

Mt. Zion is still vitally interested in Higher Education for her young people. She is now helping to build two new Methodist Colleges--one in Rocky Mount and the other in Fayetteville. Up to the present time the people of Mt. Zion have contributed \$1,364.00, to this building program and will continue to contribute until the buildings are completed. They have also aided one of Mt. Zion's own young men by furnishing more than a hundred dollars with which to purchase books during his first year in College.

Jesus told us, according to Matthew 16:18, that the gates of hell should not prevail against His Church founded on the rock of faith like Peter's; and we can rest assured that He has always strengthened those of great faith, not only of the by-gone years, but will, also, strengthen those of us today and those who will follow after us through the ages.

We know, too, that reverses often lead to soul searching. This toughens our spiritual muscles and fires us with a determination to hold tight to our convictions of right, and we are thereby strengthened. Many times we need this "trial by fire", and Mt. Zion has surely tasted the bitter dregs of almost defeat. However, her people, knowing full well that "all things are possible with God", with His help, did not succumb to despair.

Twice during the long life of the Church, the Conference has considered closing her doors. The first time was during the dark days of Reconstruction following the Civil War. The countryside had been ravished by the Union soldiers and "Carpet Baggers"; the young men had returned home from war wounded, sick and discouraged; the feeble old men, women, and children could scarcely raise enough food for their impoverished bodies; the Confederate currency had lost all value, and the community was in almost complete devastation. The second time was during the depression days of 1929 to 1933. The condition of the community was not quite so dire as during the Reconstruction period, but was serious enough to cause the Conference to despair of the life of Mt. Zion; but not her people nor her faithful pastor, the Rev.Mr. E. R. Shuller. Each time, a few saintly, devoted members, who could not bear for Mt. Zion to sink into oblivion and thus end the Lord's work in her

fields, clung on with dear life. They knew full well that God would provide for those who sincerely, in prayer and faith, sough His help,

and the doors of Mt. Zion were kept open.

Surely, God was pleased with the efforts of those consecrated people, for we have increased in number and in His work almost beyond belief. "- - - All things work together for good to them that love God - - - ." Romans, 8:28.

No history is complete that does not include the names of those who have labored so tirelessly in shaping the events of by-gone-years and, also, of those who are keeping the good works up even to this present time. We reap the fruits of their labors and we must not show ingratitude by forgetfulness. God said to us through Paul's teachings in Romans 13:7, "Render therefore to all their dues: Tribute to whom tribute is due; honor to whom honor". So here we will honor the Lay Leaders who have worked and are now working in the fields of Mt. Zion.

Down through the eons of time, as recorded in the Bible, God has always raised up great leaders when His children needed human guidance, and He has been no less mindful of the people of Mt. Zion. He has blessed us with many fine young people to take up His work when the older ones have had to lay it down; and has endowed them with an illustrious heritage worth far beyond the value of silver and gold. May we ever grow stronger in faith built on the foundation laid down by the Hallowed labors of those who have gone before us.

There have been a multitude of these consecrated people, and they have rendered services of untold value in establishing the Lord's work at Mt. Zion. In the early history, now veiled in the mist of time, there were John Thomas and Susan Leach, who founded the Church. They reared a large family, many of whom established their homes in the community after they married. Some of their descendents were the Leaches, Banks, McLeans, Youngs, Turners, Edmondsons, Taylors, and McCullers. two of their descendents are at

the present time members of Mt. Zion. They are Nancy Coston McCullers Ferguson and myself, Merdyth Bascom McCullers Lane.

From old wills, deeds, and documents dated from the late 1700's to the middle 1800's, there is found, other than the above mentioned families, those who lived in the community to be the following: Sanders, Myatts, Lees, Williams, Averas, Waltons, Colemans, Clarks, Stephens, Johns, Jones, Collins, Wellons, Wheelers, Gulleys, Utleys, Smiths, Johnsons, Hollands, Yates, Pates, Browns, Barnes, Kings, Parrishes, Overbys, Pennys, Finches, and Messers. It is certain that these families were not all members of Mt. Zion; but since it is recorded that all Protestant Faiths worked together to further God's work in those days, it is reasonable to believe that they as well as others helped in the growth of Mt. Zion.

As has been stated previously, the Mt. Zion records prior to 1840 have been lost, however, there are several names recorded in this 1840 record before the date 1844 appears. These were evidently the members, then active, who joined before this roll was made. The first name noted, as has already been mentioned, is that of Elizabeth Willis Sanders Leach, then the roll abounds in the following family names: Leach, Sanders, Turner, Finch, Garrard, Jackson, Austin, Barnes, Banks, Mc-Cullers, Johnson, Pate, Lee, Riddle, Maynard, Wood, Gower, Young, Stephenson, Holland, Hicks, Stedman, Partin, Taylor, King, Simonds, Suggs, Smith, Mitchel, Wynn, Brady, Willis, Harper, Wrenn, Brown, Tilly, Parrish, Johns, Adams, Walton. Jones, LeMay, Penny, Dodd, Williams, Wright, Batts, Hobby, Lassister, Moore, Gulley, Stephens, Godwin, Barber, Carroll, Barbour, and Stephens. Since the 1920's, new names which have been added are Cline, Messer, Powell, Franks, Best, Thigpen, Holmes,

Lucas, Rogers, Grissom, Zettlemaier, Massey, Britt, Utley, Bonner, Olive, Blalock, Poole, Ferguson, Boone, Lane, Sherratt, Dean, Windham, Collie, Roberts, Faison, McElveen, Veasey, Feirstein, Howard, McIver, Soldritch, Ethridge, McEachern, Terry, Dawson, Walker, Page, Kapplin, Brantly, McLaughlin, Grimes, Ennis, Pendergraph, Sorrell, Ellington, Stanley, Whitley, Harrington, Henley, Garrison, Myers, Coats, Aycock, Jordan, Sauls, Tart, Bennett, Broughton, Cox, Crisp, Raynor, Carey, Albin, Creech, Bridgers, Langley, Gordon, Evans, Goffrey, Humphries, Myatt, McCabe, Crayton, Hudson, Hall, McDaniel, Passmore, Thornton, Hardison, Bagwell, Nelson, Roselli, Council, Howell, Harrelson, Ingram, Ward, Matthews, Lewis, Meadows, Dupree, Deans, Brannon, and Sullivan.

However, couples of the community of olden days who have the most descendents active in the Church today were Lee Penny and wife, Elizabeth Byrd Penny; Zachery Lee and wife, Nancy Frazier Lee; and F. Jackson Williams and wife, Charlotta Ogburn Williams. Their descendents make up about two-thirds of the Church membership today. These three couples settled in the Community more than a century ago.

Mr. Penny was an educator and farmer. Some of his descendents who are most active in the Church today are the Pennys, Deans, Jones, Grissoms, Thorntons, Tarts, McDaniels, Duprees, Evans, McElveens, Franks, Brannings, and McCraws.

Mr. Williams and Mr. Lee were prominent farmers of the area. They are great-great-grandparents of Berry Otha Barbour, who entered the ministry from Mt. Zion in 1965. Berry's grandparents, who many of us remember today, were Johnnie Barbour and Ella Lee Barbour. Mrs. Barbour was a member of Mt. Zion for many years. Others of Mr. and Mrs. Williams and Mr. and Mrs. Lee's descendants who are active in the Church today are the Barbours, Stevens, Utleys, Godwins, Williams, Hudsons, Coxs, Crisps, Sorrells, Ellingtons, Lees, Coats, Franks, Carrolls, Myers, and Councils.

Also, as has already been mentioned, Thompson Garrard, one of the Circuit Riders, married the widow, Martha Whitaker McCullers, and located in this community. Their daughter, Sallie Garrard, married Robert Hite Johnson, and many of their descendents are active in the Church today. They are the Powells, Thigpens, Creeches, Raynors, Pooles, Etheridges, and Howells.

Another family of long ago, who did much to aid in the growth of Mt. Zion and whose descendents are active in the Church today was that of Bartley Johnson. He was married three times: first to Emily Coats, second to Betsy Smith, and last to Olive Stevenson. He and his first wife, Emily Coats, are grandparents of Neil Beckwith Johnson, another of Mt. Zion's sons to enter the ministry. Those who are active in the Church today are the Johnsons, Hobbys, Britts, Messers, Coats, Zettlemyers, and Olives. These are also descendents of Matthew Jones

and wife, Grezelda Ryles, who settled here more than a hundred years ago. Another descendent of Mr. and Mrs. Jones is their grand-daughter, Mrs. Eula Jones Wrenn, who is our oldest living member today.

Several of the descendents of Ransom Bridgers and wife, Adeline Thompson, who were members of the community a century ago are also active in the Church today. Their daughter, Mary Bridgers, became the fourth wife of Alfred Dickerson Taylor. Those who serve Mt. Zion today are the Ennises and Taylors.

Some of the members in longest tenure of service are as follows: Longest in membership and service up to this date are: Sarah Elizabeth Barnes Jones, joined in 1861, died in 1924 at the age of 75 years, having been a member for sixty-three years; Thomas Lane McCullers, joined in 1893, died in 1962, at the age of eighty-five, having served sixty-nine years; Sarah Alexander Smith Brady, joined by certificate from Hollands' Church in 1896, died in 1961, at ninety-three years of age, serving sixty-five years; William Edward McCullers, joined in 1890, died in 1943, at the age of sixty-nine years, having served fifty-three years; Charlotte Penny, joined in 1899, and died in 1964, at the age of eighty-seven years, having been a member for sixty-five years; Charles Edward McCullers, joined by certificate from Holland's Church in 1867, died in 1914 at seventy years of age, having been a member forty-seven years. Many of the other older members served for about half a century. Their dates will be given in another chapter.

Those who are with us today who have the longest years of membership are: Ritta Blalock Johnson, joined in 1908, Eula E. Jones Wrenn, joined in 1908; and Charlott Stephenson Johnson who joined in 1909.

Musicians longest in years of service were: Charles Edward McCullers, Music Master, 1867-1898; William Edward McCullers, Choir Director, 1898-1904 and 1907-1943; Robert Argo Stevens, Choir Leader, 1943 up to the present time. Mary Hocutt Taylor, Director of the Easter Sunrise Music from 1935-1965; Cleo Wrenn, Organist, 1904-4921; and Pansy Blalock Johnson, Pianist, 1940-to the present time. Others who have been organists and pianists are as follows: in the 1800's and early 1900's, Lula Leach, Claudia Leach, Bennie Holland, Ada Gower Wright and Florence Crocker Batts (for whom the exact dates cannot be

determined); Eula Evelyn Jones, 1902-1904; Sarah (Sallie) Lane McCullers, 1921-1931; Ruth Lenoir McCullers, 1931-1940; Julia Carroll was alternate for Pansy Johnson during the years of 1947 to 1953, and Elizabeth Adeline Taylor, (Mrs. Don Carey) was alternate during 1954 to 1957. Evelyn Knott Stevens, Carolyn Sauls Stevens, Betty Lou Rowe Penny, Sarah Nell Johnson, Patricia Johnson and sister, Paulette, have served as assistants. Julia Barefoot Penny (Mrs. Calvin), assisted by Pat and Paulette Johnson, is the organist for our new organ, which is a recent gift from the Methodist Youth Fellowship. The piano and organ together have improved our Church music immensely. Hilda Penny Boman (Mrs. W. L.), of Holland's Church, played for our 1966 Easter Cantata.

For the years during the late 1920's and early 1930's the Junior Choir was directed by Evelyn McCullers, and she directed again during World War II, after she became Mrs. Arch Sherratt. This Choir has also been directed by Maylon Johnson Jordan (Mrs. Felton), Janice Penny Tart (Mrs. J. R.), Bettie Jean Stevens Sorrell (Mrs. Ray), and Lorene Wood Grissom (Mrs. B. M.). For the past few years and at the present time it is directed by Mary Louise Johnson (Mrs. Jack) and Odell McGee Penny (Mrs. Garland). La Vette Cook Boone (Mrs. J. S.) has recently been elected Director of the Senior Choir.

Sunday School Superintendents in longest years of service are William Edward McCullers and Durwood Clarence Johnson, Sr. Mr. McCullers was Superintendent several times between 1890 and 1942, about forty years in all. At one time he was Superintendent of both Mt. Zion and Plymouth Christian Church. He often walked to Plymouth on

Sunday morning to conduct Sunday School there, back home to dinner, and then over to Mt. Zion to conduct the afternoon service. His home was located about three miles from both churches which were located in opposite directions. He also was Superintendent at Mt. Pleasant Presbyterian Church for a season.

Mr. Johnson was Sunday School Superintendent from 1942 to 1956. Sandy Barfield Myers served from 1956-1961. Others who served during the 1800's and some more recently are, chronologically, Dr. James Thomas Leach, Charles Edward McCullers, H. B. Brady, George Turner, J. Millard Turner, Alfred Dickerson Taylor, George Arlington Wright, Earl Creswell Brady, W. E. (Bill) Johnson, Robert Argo Stevens, Bill M. Grissom, Berry Otha Barbour, and Jerry S. Boone, who is the present Superintendent.

As far as can be learned, William Edward McCullers was first President of the Epworth League, (Now the Methodist Youth Fellowship), in 1889.

The first president of the Ladies' Aid Society, (now Woman's Society of Christian Service), was Miss Ella Eure, a teacher of Oaky Nook Private School in 1913. She now resides at the Methodist Retirement home in Durham, N. C. and is Mrs. Arthur Hamilton.

The first Boy Scout Counselor was John F. Harper in 1944. The first President of the Methodist Men, organized in 1957, was Jerry Sauls Boone.

Mt. Zion has sent several young people into full-time Christian service and many others into the work of their Lord as farmers, doctors, poets, lawyers, teachers, nurses, merchants, Congressmen, florists, artists, musicians, mechanics, lecturers, homemakers, typists, secretaries, bookkeepers, builders, executives in many businesses, and members of the National Armed Services.

Those who have entered the ministry are: Charles Edward Steadman, son of Frank A. Steadman and Sarah Anne McCullers Steadman in 1886; Neil Beckwith Johnson, son of Bythan Johnson and Henrietta Jones Johnson in 1920; and Berry Otha Barbour, son of James Otha Barbour and Onnie Lee Boyette Barbour in 1965.

Young ladies who have entered the mission field from Mt. Zion were Katheryn Jane Brady in 1925, daughter of Henry Bernard Brady and Sarah Smith Brady and granddaughter of Rev. William Alexander Smith, one of our Circuit Riders; and Mrs. Nancy Garrison, wife of Rev. J.W. Garrison in 1953. Mrs. Garrison, who moved her membership to Mt. Zion when her husband became our pastor, entered the mission field with her husband who was sent to Brazil.

Three young preachers delivered their first sermons from the sacred pulpit of Mt. Zion. They were William Alexander Smith in 1859; Charles E. Sparks, our pastor in 1956; and Berry Otha Barbour in 1965. Many

others have begun their life's work at Mt. Zion and have prospered under God's guidance.

At the present time, there are three who began their tenure in the Lord's work at Mt. Zion, who hold leadership in their respective fields. Two of them are children of Wm. Edward McCullers and Leute Willis McCullers: namely, Charles Leonidas McCullers, Director of Methodist Men of the North Carolina Conference, and Sarah Lane McCullers Bonner. Diocesan President of the East Carolina Episcopal Church Women. The other is Shirley Godwin Jones, daughter of Howard A. Godwin and Pearl Johnson Godwin, who is a prominent leader of her Baptist Church in Agana, Guam.

There are three young ladies still in school, who have expressed a desire to go into full-time Christian service. These are Paulette

Johnson, daughter of Paul J. Johnson and Mabel Parrish Johnson; Billie Rose Penny, daughter of Garland K. and Odell McGee Penny; and Bonnie L. Grissom, daughter of Billy M. and Lorene Wood Grissom. And one of Mt. Zions younger sons and his assistant have recently been Consecrated Acolyts to serve by lighting the candles for each service. These dedicated boys are Randy Penny, son of Garland K. and Odell McGee Penny, and Macon Grissom, son of Billy M. and Lorene Wood Grissom.

There is also now in school, a son by infant Baptism, preparing for the ministery of the Episcopal Church. He is Thomas Archabald Sherratt and is the son of William A. and Evelyn McCullers Sherratt of New Bern.

The above mentioned names are by no means the only ones who have added so much to the life of Mt. Zion, for each active member has done his or her part in furthering God's Kingdom on earth. I hope that all the names will be recorded before the ending of this book.

For more than fifty years of the growth of Mt. Zion, Alfred Tennyson Taylor, Sr., a member of Oakland Presbyterian Church, was truly a friend in need to Mt. Zion. He entered into every project the Church undertook with not only an open heart, but also an open pocketbook. The people could always depend on "Appie" to help out financially in times of emergency, as well as to give generously for each building fund. He also helped the members in their Christian social concerns with supplies, visits and funds. The Mt. Zion members will always cherish his memory.

Mr. Harry McElveen and wife, Edna Wilkins McElveen, are also our good neighbors and always lend a hand in our undertakings. Several of their children are members of Mt. Zion and are a blessing to her work.

This chapter cannot be ended without paying tribute to those who labored so hard in constructing the physical plant of the first three buildings. These people were the negro slaves, and made up a large part of the membership of Mt. Zion before the Civil War and some of the older ones remained members until they were called to Heaven after the War. Their music and deep sense of the spiritual values added much to the growth of the Church.

With Henry W. Longfellow in his "Psalms of Life", we repeat:

"Lives of great men all remind us, We can make our lives sublime And departing leave behind us, Footprints on the sands of time.

Footprints, that perhaps another, Sailing o're life's solemn main, A fornlom and shipwrecked brother, Seeing, shall take heart again''.

## **ORGANIZATIONS**

"Jesus and We"

"What if our hands are busy,
With other work than His?
What if our feet are walking

Jesus said to the people: "I am the Vine, ye are the branches. He that abideth in Me, and I in him, the same bringeth forth much fruit: for without Me, ye can do nothing". John 15:5

Just so, the organizations of the Church are branches of Jesus, and unless He is in the midst of them, they can do nothing of spiritual value.

For many years, of the growth of Mt. Zion, four affiliated organizations have done much to help in her expansion. These include the young people, as well as the adults; and all along the way they have formed a united front to labor in every project undertaken by the Church members.

The Epworth League, now the Methodist Youth Fellowship, has flourished and then waned many times since it was first organized at Mt. Zion in the late 1880's. As previously mentioned. as far as can be determined. Wm. Edward McCullers was the first President of the Epworth League. This continued to flourish for a decade or so, and then went into a period of rest. It was revived about 1912, with Emily L. Taylor as President. She was followed by Lucy Anderson Wright, Nancy Coston McCullers, Kathryn Jane Brady, and Ester Sanders. Among

the active members were the following: - Vance and Eunice Sanders, Page Taylor, Ida, Elbert, and Claud Carroll, Sybil and Xennie Brady, Blanche and Durwood Johnson, Grace and Bradly Wright, Merdyth, Sallie and Charles McCullers, Elizabeth, Florence and James Batts, Luna and Mallie Penny, Annie and Kenneth Williams and Lillie Wrenn. Again there was a declining period when this group grew up, and some went away to school, and others entered into marriage in the early 1920's. The third time it was revived by the efforts of Evelyn McCullers, Pearl Johnson, Vivian Wrenn, Mozell Godwin, Ruth McCullers, Durwood and Allen Harper, Nell Wrenn, Willard Williams, Christene Barbour, Charles Dixon, Carl Moore, Joe McCullers, and Maylon Johnson. As these left the community for school and marriage in the early and middle 1930's, there was another recession of the League. The fourth time it was given impetus by the efforts of Barbara Taylor, Mary Louise Johnson, Doris Carroll, Julia Carroll, Lillian Ogburn, Christine Carroll, Dorothy Ogburn, Particia Taylor, Dorothy Boone, and Meredith Godwin. After this group grew older. Doris Stevens took up the leadership, followed by her younger brothers and sisters, James, Bettie Jean, Lewis, Hazel, and Linda Stevens. Other participants at this time were Anne Hobby, Geraldine Brady, Marie Parrish, Barbara Anne Barbour, Carolyn and Larry Williams, and Audrey Godwin. During the years that the League was kept flourishing by these young people, the name was changed to the Methodist Youth Fellowship. As this group grew into adult-hood, the M.Y.F. was taken over by Barbara Anne Johnson, Karen and Robin Ward, Patricia and Paulette Johnson, Billie Rose Penny, Billy and Jane Britt, David and Joe Broughton, Danny and Jane Dean, Donald Johnson, Morris Jones, Freddie McDaniel, and Beverly Grissom: and has continued to flourish up to the present time. Billie Rose Penny is the present President; Beverly Grissom, Vice-President; Jane Britt, Treasurer; Jane Dean, the secretary; and Beverly Grissom, Chairman of Christian Social Concerns. There are also two groups of Junior M.Y.F. organized for the younger ones.

In the second decade of the 1900's, we young people of Mt. Zion Methodist, Shiloh Baptist, Oakland Presbytery, and Pleasant Grove Baptist met jointly in one of the five churches on each fifth Sunday night. What glorious meetings and wonderful times we did have!

The young people have always planned projects to help in the church programs. In the 1920's we put on a drive to purchase a new piano for the sanctuary, as the old reed organ was about "played out" with use and "mice". We put on ice cream suppers and raised money every way we could, but in the end the older people came to our aid to finish paying for it. During the second decade of the 1900's, the League, headed by Nancy McCullers, also raised the money and placed an arch over the church driveway with the name and founding date of

the Church inscribed thereon. This arch was destroyed by a windstorm a few years later. Too, the young people have presented many inspiring programs which were enjoyed by the older people, as well as the young ones. The M.Y.F. of the present time has placed a new marker on the Church lawn and has bought an electric organ for the sanctuary.

For many summers delegates from the Mt. Zion Epworth League and Methodist Youth Fellowships have attended the Assembly at Louisburg College or Duke University. Some of those who have been delegates were Emily Taylor, Kathryn Brady, Merdyth McCullers, Vivian Wrenn, Evelyn McCullers, Barbara Taylor, Louise Johnson, Shirley Godwin, Linda and Hazel Stevens, Patricia and Paulette Johnson, Billie Penny, Sherrill Jones, and Jane Dean. These assemblies always fired them with greater zeal to further the work of the organization and to more completely serve their Heavenly Father and their fellowmen.

The Woman's Organization, as far as can be determined, and as has already been stated was first established in 1913. Ruth C. Taylor, (later Mrs. J. H. Massey) and Sarah Smith Brady. (Mrs. H.B.) were the instigators for this organization with Miss Ella Eure as the first President. Miss Eure was followed by Ruth Cornelia Taylor, Sarah Smith Brady, Ada Gower Wright, Mary Smith Sanders, Leute Willis McCullers, and Lizzie Sanders. This "Ladies Aid Society" disbanded during World War I, and for several years there was no woman's organization in the community. Just prior to World War II.

an interdenominational club was formed as the "Good Neighbor Club". These Ladies served all the related churches in visiting the sick, serving meals to the sick, as well as for the bereaved, furnished food and clothing for the needy, and raised funds for the Church which had the most urgent project under way.

The Mt. Zion Woman's Society of Christian Service was organized in 1951 under the pastorate of the Rev. J. W. Garrison. Merdyth McCullers Lane became the first President, followed by Mary Hocutt Taylor, Evelyn Knott Stevens, Christine Waring Walker, Lena Barbour Stevens, Marie Parrish Godwin, Odell McGee Penny, Lorene Wood Grissom, Mabel Parrish Johnson, and Mary Louise Johnson. The Women have done much to improve the appearance of the Lord's House and they, with the help

of all the church ladies, keep it clean and beautified with floral offerings. In 1914, the Ladies of the Church bought a carpet for the Sanctuary, and then in 1954, a new one. They furnished curtains and two accordian doors for the Annex. They also furnished the velveteen drapery for the Pastor's Study and paid for the railing material which was installed by E. P. Broughton and R. A. Stevens. They bought a new Communion Table, new Communion linens, Baptismal Bowl, and two pedestals for flower-arrangements. They also serve supper to the Methodist Men each month, except for once a year when the Men cook for the Ladies!

The Boy Scouts was a flourishing organization for a few years during the 1940's and early 50's, but due to lack of time and leadership, has been disbanded. The Mt. Zion Troop was organized in the early 1940's with John F. Harper as Master. He was followed in office by William Archibald Sherratt, who soon moved away, therefore, Mr. Harper resumed

the leadership. After he moved from the community, Sandy B. Myers became Master, followed by Robert A. Stevens and James R. Stevens. Since the middle 1950's, there has been no troop, and it is hoped that in the near future, it can be reorganized as it is sorely needed. While the Troop was active the members joined in many of the church programs and really accomplished much in the growth of the Church.

The newest organization is that of the Methodist Men which was established in 1957, with Jerry S. Boone as President. Those

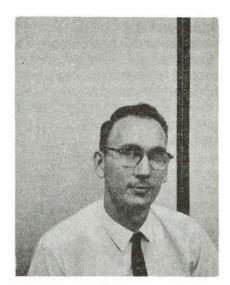

who have followed him in this office are Roy Max Raynor, Joe Gordon Carroll, and Berry O. Barbour. Jerry Boone serves presently for his second term. The Members of this Club have done much to improve the Church grounds by laying cement walks, planting grass, and keeping it mowed. They keep the Church Plant in good repair and did much of the actual building of the Annex and Parsonage. They have recently marked fourteen graves in the cemetery.

There are four organized Prayer Groups—one for the small children, one for the teenagers, and one for the adults. They meet once a week and do receive a great spiritual blessing. The fourth is for the Young Married Couples who meet monthly on Saturday evening.

There is also a group of men organized as "The Twelve". These men meet at the Church to meditate

and pray and then go out to visit the sick, bereaved, poor, and indifferent. They do a wonderful work for the Lord.

We have both a Junior and Senior Choir, and they each add much to the worship services and fellowship meetings. They render an Easter Cantata for the annual Sunrise Service, as well as the Christmas Cantata for the Christmas Service. The Choir functions also as a member of the Choral Club which is made up of a majority of the community churches of several different denominations and sing for funerals in many of the churches, as well as for revivals and other occasions.

We are spiritually blessed each time we raise our voices to God in song.

## MT. ZION AND HER SISTER CHURCHES

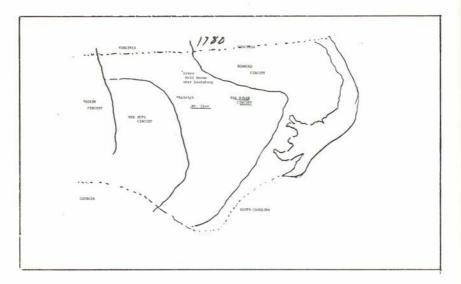
"Behold, how good and how pleasant for brethren to dwell together in unity!" Psalm 133:1

In the beginning of the life of Mt. Zion, there was no North Carolina Conference; therefore, there were no preachers assigned to individual churches or charges as there are today. The first American Episcopal Methodist Societies were formed in New York and Maryland at about the same time in the early 1760's. The first city church was built in 1768 by Philip Embury in New York and was named Wesley Chapel. Later the name was changed to John Street Methodist Church. The first rural church was established in Maryland near New Windsor by Robert Strawbridge also in the late 1760's. This Church was located in Frederick County and was called Sam's Creek Meeting House. The American Conference was formally organized during the Christmas Conference at the Lovely Lane Chapel in Baltimore on December 24, 1784. Prior to this date the American Church had been a branch of the English Episcopal Methodist Church and under the auspices of John Wesley. The Rev. Mr. John Dickens suggested, at this Conference, that the name of the American Organization be changed from the Methodist Society to the American Methodist Episcopal Church, and his suggestion was adopted.

The Minutes of the earliest Journals following this Christmas Conference, included the records of all the American Churches so there was very little recorded about the small rural ones.

The Carolina Conference, including both North and South Carolina, as well as the Southern part of Virginia, was established at the home of the Rev. Mr. Green Hill near Louisburg, ten miles from Raleigh in 1776. The first Annual Conference of the American Methodist Episcopal Church was also held at Mr. Hill's home. This transpired April 20, 1785. Mr. Hill was a Methodist preacher who had located in that community. When he built his home he built it large enough to include a Chapel on the second floor. To this home came many itinerant preachers. It is recorded by Bishop Asbury that as many as twenty preachers would be sleeping there at the time, some on beds, but most on "pallets" on the floor. (The Green Hill house is standing today, and some of Mr. Hill's descendants still reside there.)

In 1780, the Tar River Circuit was formed which was part of the Carolina Conference, and this covered about one-fourth of North Carolina, including the territory from the Central SouthernVirginia down to Northern South Carolina and almost to the Coast on the East. This embraced the East Central Counties, among which were Wake and Johnston. There fore, when Mt. Zion was established this area was on the Tar River Circuit, and was a Sister Church to several churches in Virginia and South Carolina as well as to those in a large section of North Carolina.



The North Carolina Conference was set off from the Virginia Conference in 1834, and this Conference was divided into the North Carolina and Western North Carolina Conferences in 1890.

In the Conference Journals of the 1870's, I find that Cary, Apex, Ebenezer, Garner, Holland's, Marvin, Mt. Zion, and several others had the same pastors; so evidently they were on the same circuit—perhaps the Raleigh Circuit.

During the following decade Mt. Zion was changed to the Smithfield Circuit and was connected with the following churches; Smithfield, Selma Princeton, Sanders School House Chapel, Adam's, Massengill's, Antioch, Elizabeth, Clayton, and Elevation. There were eleven churches served by one pastor! No wonder that the preacher stayed only a year or two in one place before traveling on. We are amazed at their stamina. Surely, God gave them the strength; they could not have continued alone.

In 1881, the Clayton Circuit was consolidated with Hannah's Creek Mission, and Mt. Zion was placed on this circuit along with Elizabeth, Garner, Four Oaks and Corinth, leaving six churches to be served by one pastor. By 1889, only five of the churches remained on the Circuit, Garner having been joined to the then-newly-formed Cary Circuit. This combination continued until 1913, when the Garner Circuit was organized with the following churches as members: Ebenezer, Garner, Holland's, and Mt. Zion. These churches worked hand-in-hand for 37 years. In 1950, Garner and Ebenezer became station churches; at which time Elizabeth was changed from the Four Oaks Circuit and joined with Mt. Zion and Holland's to form the Garner Circuit separate from the Garner Church. Then in 1961, Elizabeth became a station church, thereby leaving Holland's and Mt. Zion to form the Holland's-Mt. Zion two-point charge. In 1965, these two churches came to the parting-of-the-way, and at last, after about a century and a half in the Lord's work, Mt. Zion stands alone as a station Church.

We shall ever cherish our sister churches, especially Holland's for we stood together for more than half a century in carrying on the work of the Lord.

Now that our Methodist Sister Churches have been recorded, there are also other sister churches that have been very dear to us all along the way. The two in the community that we have been most closely associated with are Shiloh Missionary Baptist which is a few miles northeast of us, and Spence's Chapel Presbyterian Church which was located a few miles southeast. (Spence's Chapel has been dissolved, and the membership transferred to Oakland Presbyterian Church on the Cleveland School Road.) Spence's Chapel, Shiloh, and Mt. Zion worked closely together in Sunday School work, and we young ones of fifty years ago felt almost as much at home in one as in the other. We held union Sunday School conventions and combined revivals, as well as joint meetings with each respective young people's organization namely, the BYPU, Christian Endeavor, and Epworth League.

### SPECIAL DAYS AND REMINISCENCES

"How dear to my heart are the scenes of my childhood, When fond recollections present them to view".

From The Old Oaken Bucket by S. Woodworth.

There have been so many special days at Mt. Zion that our hearts overflow with the remembrance.

The greatest day for us all was the day Jesus came into our hearts, and we surrendered our all to God before the Sacred Altar of Mt. Zion. How hard it was to leave our seats and on laden feet to walk to the Altar to kneel in humility and repentence, and what joy flooded our souls after we had received God's blessings. We returned to our pews on winged feet, and could scarcely keep from shouting aloud, and skipping with gladness.

There were other "Own special days" for all of us, too, that stand out most clearly from all other days. Some of these have been recalled to me by members and friends of the Church.

Ruth Taylor Massey, a little girl of the late 1800's, recalls Claudia Leach as her most outstanding Sunday School teacher. Miss Leach required her "little ones" to memorize many passages of Scripture and always presented a prize to the one who learned the greatest number of verses. Mrs. Massey remembers that she was the fortunate one for one year and received a black headed china doll as the reward. This doll was one of her most treasured possessions for many years. But now that she is nearing her eightieth birthday, is almost blind and can no longer read her Bible, she counts the Scripture she commited to memory as the most precious treasure of all. Mrs. Massey also remenbers that the Mt. Zion pastor of 1893-1896, The Reverend Mr. J. M. Ashby, owned a horse with a young colt. When he came to preach at Mt. Zion he usually came on Saturday afternoon and spent the night with one of the church families. Of course, the colt had to follow along with its mother and was a great delight to the young ones in whose home the Preacher spent the night. She will ever remember her narrow escape from serious injury when once she ran between the colt and its mother. As the horse bolted from her tether the small girl was snatched from harm's way by her father Alfred Dickerson Taylor, just in the nick of time.

Grace Wright Collie remembers the songfests that were held in the early 1900's. These were held at either the Church or one of the homes on Sunday evening. Grace remembers, especially, those that were held in her own home. Her mother, Ada Gower Wright, would play the piano, Charles Edward McCullers would play the violin, and the melodious voices of David Cullom, Jim Edmondson, Marcellus Whitaker, Ed McCullers Dick Taylor, and her father, George Wright, would swell on the air in such volume that the very house trembled. Of course, the wives and children joined in too, but with her, the ring of the men's voices lingers yet. These songfests were also held, at times, in the home of Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Batts at which time Mrs. Batts (nee, Florence Crocker) performed at the piano. The home of Mr. and Mrs. W. E. McCullers was another favorite place in which to meet in the fellowship through music. Mrs. Collie also recalls her most embarrassing moment at Mt. Zion. She climbed over the picket fence surrounding her grandfather Anderson Gower's grave and caught the ruffles of her dress on the iron spikes and practically tore it off. Her grief was almost uncontrollable when she was taken home and thus missed the Sabbath services.

Also, in the early 1900's, I recall those glorious summer Sundays when we children who lived over in Wake County would start out walking the two miles to Mt. Zion; the Batts, McCullers, Brady, and Penny children were first. A bit farther down the dusty road into Johnston County, the Sanders, Carroll, and Williams children would join the throng, all led by "Mr. Ed" McCullers, a very "Pied Piper" himself, leading the young ones to the Lord's house and on to Glory Land. He would often take the smaller ones, "in turn", in his arms and carry them part way up Buffaloe Hill which was, in those days, quite steep. I remember how "out-of-breath" he would be when it became my turn to be carried near the top of the hill. The other fathers, (in order to be at hand in case there was trouble with the steeds), mothers, and babies would follow along in buggies and wagons drawn by horses and mules. To me, as a child, the animals held Sunday School, too, as they whinnied to each other from their "hitching" trees in the Church grove. Of course, after the first decade of the 1900's, there were the Model "T" Fords to chug along the dusty roads.

And there were the Children's Days of long ago as recalled by Lillie Godwin Franks. The mothers would dress their little ones in their finest clothes in honor of the day and to the Glory of God; the little girls in purest white, all curled and beruffled, with wide satin sashes and bows in pastel shades, and the little boys in their "Lord Fontleroy" suits, all beruffled, too. We little ones would gather in front of the Altar and sing our songs and speak our "pieces" with that Holy feeling one always has in the presence of the Lord. I remember well my first "speech" which was as follows: (over)

Two little eyes to look to God;
Two little ears to hear His word;
Two little hands His work to do;
Two little feet His way pursue;
One little tongue to speak the truth;
One little heart for Him and His youth;
Take them, dear Jesus, and let them be
Always obedient and true to thee".

(What a wonderful world we would have today if all we adults, as well as our children, would only yield ourselves, "thusly", to God each day). After the Children's Day program, we would enjoy dinner on the grounds, (the men being careful to spread hay for their tethered horses), after which, if our Pastor was present, we would go back into the Church for the sermon. If he could not be with us, one of the Lay Speakers would bring the message. The ones I most vividly recall were Alfred Dickerson Taylor; my father, William Edward McCullers; George A. Turner; J. Millard Turner; and Columbus Marcus Batts.

Lillie Wrenn Ogburn, (Mrs. T. Chester), who now is a member of the Garner Presbyterian Church, gives this reminiscence of the Christmas programs of the early 1900's. "I will always remember the Christmas trees we had. There was no electricity in the country in those days, and the trees were lighted with little wax candles. Most of the decorations were popcorn ropes, and many colors of crepe paper streamers draped around the tree. The odor of the burning candles was so sweet to me

that I can almost smell them now, more than fifty years later. Some of the grown-ups exchanged gifts and, of course, all the children received a gift and a bag of fruit, and nuts. Mr. 'Jim' candy. Middleton, a member of Holland's Church, was Santa Claus for us for many years, and was truly loved by all the Mt. Zion people". Mrs. Ogburn also remembers, as one of her first Sunday School Teachers, Sarah A. Smith Brady, (Mrs. H. B.), who was very much loved by all the little ones. She, too, recalls the many Friday afternoons on which she helped her older sister, Cleo P. Wrenn, clean the Church in preparation for the following Sunday services. There

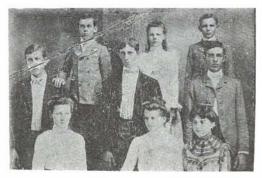

was Sunday School every Sunday and preaching only twice a month. And she remembers an amusing habit of Henry Bernard Brady. He always ate all the chicken gizzards when there was "dinner on the grounds". Many of the ladies brought the gizzards just for his pleasure. She closes with "Mt. Zion is a dear place to me".

The Quarterly Conferences of the early 1900's were recalled by Emily Taylor Henley. She remembers the all-day Saturday service with dinner on the grounds. This was the business session of the Conference which met only once a year, and even sometimes not more often than once in two years at each rural church. The Presiding Elder and Pastor would usually arrive on Friday evening and visit for the two nights in different homes in the community. Our homes seemed greatly blessed when these good men entered. I can feel to this day the awesome quietness that would settle about is young ones. We felt that, more than ever, our homes had become "Holy Ground", for God's messengers had come.

On Sunday, following the all-day Saturday business session, we would again hold an all-day service. This day was set aside for sermons by the Presiding Elder in the morning and partaking of the Holy Communion in the afternoon. I still remember how my grandmother, Sarah Smith Willis, worked over the unlevened bread for the Communion. She would kneed and beat and roll the dough until it was almost paper thin, spread it on a baking sheet and check it off in perfect squares, hardly one deviating from the other. I still marvel at how she did it. She was followed as Communion Steward by her two daughters consecutively. They were Sarah Smith Brady and my mother, Leute Willis McCullers. They, too, made the wafers, but never reached their mother's perfection. After my mother's death in 1947, Ruth McCullers McEachern was the Steward, for a year or so, and then Pansy Blalock Johnson (Mrs. D. C., Sr.) was elected and kept it for about sixteen years. I was elected to follow her, and now Lena Barbour Stevens (Mrs. R. A.) is Communion Steward.

The days of the old reed organ have been related by Evelyn McCullers Sherratt. And all of us who remember those days, join her in honoring Miss Cleo Wrenn, "Miss Cleo", as we lovingly called her. Evelyn remembers "Miss Cleo" pumping the old organ with all her might and bringing forth the melodies of the great hymns of Charles Wesley, Fanny Crosby, Isaac Watts and others in a most glorious harmony. Evelyn also remembers "Miss Clee" as her first Sunday School Teacher and her influence in leading the little ones into a consciousness of the things of spiritual value.

Many of the small ones of the 1940's, as related by Janice Penny Tart, remember as special days, those Sundays that were beautiful enough for "Miss Leute", (Mrs. Leute Willis McCullers), to take ther beginner class out under the trees for the class session. She did this in order to escape the buzz of the other four classes holding-forth in the Sanctuary; the Senior Class in the center, and the other three classes in their respective corners with drawn burlap curtains. Mrs. Tart remembers sitting on the large roots of the gnarled old oak trees, literally drinking in every word of the great truths "Miss Leute" revealed to them. She used as her textbook, in addition to the regulation Bible Picture Cards of that day, a "Child's Bible Story Book". We, her own children, called it the "Brown Book" from the color of its binding. ("Miss Leute" received this book as a gift when she was a little girl back in the 1880s, and I cherish today its tattered and torn leaves among my most valued possessions.)

Another member of today, Julia Carroll, has recalled the inspiration shereceived from "Mr. Ed" McCullers as he stood before the congregation directing the singing in perfect time and leading with his beautiful flowing voice. He especially delighted in having the young ones to sing their own special songs each Sunday.

Still another inspirational Sunday School class is recalled by Vivian Wrenn Barnes, (Mrs. R. K.). Emily Leach Taylor, (now Mrs. Rex Henley) was her teacher, and Vivian remembers how well she revealed God's love and care to them and how much they really loved her. Vivian recalls having grieved so deeply when she was promoted to the next class that she was allowed to go back and remain in the class for another year.

The outstanding Sunday School teacher of my early teen-years was Neill B. Johnson. This was before he felt the call to preach and joined the Conference. However, God had already laid His hands upon him, and he led us all into the depths of his spiritual understanding in a marvelous way. In fact, he taught so well that several of us were appointed teachers for some of the smaller classes while we were yet in our middle teens.

Ida Carroll Penny (Mrs. M. A., Sr.) relates the great joy she re-

ceived by drinking from the ever-flowing spring at the foot of the hill on the north side of the Church. To her it was also a symbol of the everlasting water poured out through the love of God for His earthly sons and daughters.

Another very special day observed for many, many years at Mt. Zion is Homecoming Day, always held, so far, the first Sunday in September. Prior to the 1950's, this, too, was a day of two services, but in recent years most of the congregation disperses after the dinner on the grounds, so the afternoon service has been discontinued. In the days of yore, we had the sermon on Sunday morning, usually delivered by one of our "old" pastors returned home for the occasion, and then after "dinner on the grounds" we would reassemble for the song-fest, memorial service, and the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper. This has always been a great occasion, for there is the reunion of family loved ones, as well as of dear friends who have moved away from the community. In more recent years, we have Sunday School, a sermonette and the observance of the Lord's Supper followed by dinner on the grounds. After dinner we make our adieus and go our separate ways until the next year.

Still another very special service held at Mt. Zion for many years is our Easter Sunrise Service. For several years during the 1940's, we held a joint service with our neighbor churches; namely, Shiloh Baptist, Providence Presbyterian, and Pleasant Grove Baptist, and would meet alternately with these churches. However, as time moved on, each Church decided to observe her own Sunrise Service, thereby gathering together more people to worship on this Glorious Morning. Mt. Zion Church is always filled for these services, some times to overflowing. Friends and loved ones come from miles away to join us as our Pastor reads the Record of the Ressurrection from the Bible and our Choir renders an Easter Cantata. The Chancel is banked with flowers which are taken to the Cemetery for the Memorial Service and Benediction. After the service

a love feast is held in the Annex before returning home. Following a short rest at home, we return to the Church for Sunday School and Church Service. At this hour we observe the Communion Sacrament. To us at Mt. Zion, this is the most Sacred and joyous service of the year. To arise at daybreak and arrive at the Lord's house in early dawn, while the sky is changing from the faintest blush to a blazing pink before the glorious sunrise, fills us with awe. Our souls overflow with gratitude and praise to God and a gladness that can be felt, not put into words, floods our hearts.

And then there is Christmas! The mystery, joy and anticipation of of this Holy Season thrills us as Christians, both young and old. In the days of yore, we gathered in the Church, sang carols and heard the Christmas record read from God's Word. We then marched with lighted candles to the school building where we found a Christmas tree and Santa Claus with gifts and fruit. The tree was decorated with ropes of popcorn and real wax candles, fastened to the twigs of the tree with snap-on holders. With the candles aflame, quite often a twig would catch fire. I remember how quietly and breathlessly we young ones would sit while our fathers slapped out the blaze and then the festivities would begin again. After the school building was sold in the 1930's, the entire program was held in the Sanctuary. Now that we have the Annex, it is held there except for the Christmas Pageant and Cantata which is presented in the Sanctuary on the Sunday night before Christmas.

Our chief moneymaking project, which has been held on the Church grounds for many years, is called "Church Harvest Day". The ladies take vegetables, baked foods, canned foods, poultry, dairy products and and needlework for sale; and the men take farm produce, and livestock for sale. They also take their "pocketbooks". The sale is by auction and the highest bidder gets the item. As can well be imagined, there is much hilarity and "kidding" at these times. We thoroughly enjoy the hours thus spent, as well as the raising of a goodly sum of money for our current needs.

The Reverend Mr. E. R. Shuller, one of our former pastors, has this to say about the depression and our first Harvest day in 1931: "I recall that the church was having a hard time just to keep going. All churches were having financial difficulties because this was during the depression years and money was very scarce. Many members who were not able to contribute money would give the minister chickens, eggs, pork and other items from the farm. It was during these years that "Harvest Day" was instituted for the purpose of supplementing the budget and taking care of necessary improvements. As I recall, the first Harvest Day was not widely attended and contributions not too numerous but the final results exceeded our expectations. We sold a bale of cotton, a pig or two, and many lesser items from the farm and kitchen. Mr. Numa Broughton, from the Garner Methodist Church, was the auctioneer.

There were those in the other churches who wanted to disband Mt. Zion Church because it was in many respects a weak church but the faithful few, lead by "Mr. Ed" McCullers and the pastor, would not consider it. Time has justified our faith in Mt. Zion Church."

Another means for raising money in case of great need is a barbecue supper. This is not an annual affair; we go into the food business only when there seems to be no other way to obtain the needed funds. However, there is always much good fellowship enjoyed in spite of the hard work, and we have a feeling of satisfaction in a job well done.

Down through the years of Mt. Zion's existence there have always been the great occasions of fellowship meals and picnics. The Sunday School picnic is ever hailed with glee by young and old alike. It has always been held in the summer near a stream or pool suitable for swimming. The heavy-laden baskets are filled with the delicious foods that the hungry swimmers most enjoy. The fellowship meals are served at the Church. For many years they were spread on tables set up in the grove. However, for the past few years, they have been served in the Annex; and since 1965, there has been one enjoyed on each First Sunday evening, followed by an inspirational service in the Sanctuary. On each occasion when we gather together in brotherly love, we are drawn ever nearer to the blessed side of Jesus.

Says the typist of this manuscript: "Yes, my friends, it takes all of the above to have a church filled with care and affection for both our God and our fellowmen. Being a native of the Mt. Zion Community and a member for many years of the same church, I have fond memories of the yestervears. As a child I was permitted to ride my little black pony down the mile-long path over to the Church for choir practice on Saturday afternoons, and even sometimes on Sunday mornings. In those days it was not an uncommon sight to see eight or ten ponies or horses patiently waiting while their young masters attended services. God, in His wisdom, surely knows what solitude means to a young person. For after we young choir members, under the direction of Evelyn McCullers (now Mrs. Arch Sherratt), had sung to the best of our ability, "Day is Dying in the West", had said our prayers (though childish, yet heard), and had set out homeward through the woods in the quietness of an approaching sunset, we experienced a real communion with Him. Memories of these days can never be replaced by memories of Cadillacs. A descendant of Presbyterian parents, I always went to Mt. Zion to Sunday School and on to Oakland Presbyterian Church. I looked forward to both because a favorite uncle, Alfred Taylor, Sr., and oft' times my own father, W. Page Taylor, would take me by the hand and lead me to the front "pew" where we sang the old favorite hymns. My parents would then drive us the ten miles to their church. Mt. Zion is, and always has been, not only a "hitching post" in my childhood and during those "dreamy" teen-age years and young adulthood, but the place of God's abode where He heard both my baptismal vows and my wedding vows, as well as where my family and I now find peace and strength during the worship hours".

## **REPAIRS MADE IN 1914**

"God has no hands but our hands
To do His work today".

During the Reconstruction Days after the Civil War and the Depressions of 1899 and 1902, there was very little money in the community. scarcely enough for the bare necessities of life and almost nothing to spend on the upkeep of the Church. Consequently, by 1914, the old Church was becoming quite dilapidated. The roof leaked, some of the plastering had fallen off the walls, many of the window panes were broken and the old Church badly needed painting both inside and out. The financial condition of the community was improving by that time, so, the members decided to pool their resources and do something about improving the Lord's House. They, with the friends of the church, joined forces. and soon there was money enough to purchase the needed materials. Neil B. Johnson, an enthusiastic young Christian who later became a Methodist minister, agreed to take on the work and to guide the work of those who would volunteer to help. Many did so. Soon the roof was repaired, and the interior of the sanctuary was completely done over. The old curved hand-hewn chancel railing was removed and a rectangular one installed along with a pulpit podium to correspond.

Mr. Johnson made a new Communion Table and rectangular pulpit to replace the old curved ones. The broken plastering was removed and the walls replastered, the windows were repaired, and the woodwork refinished. The ladies who were members of the "Ladies' Aid Society" raised money and bought a carpet for the Chancel, the space surrounding the Chancel Railing, and the aisles. The pews were re-arranged with many of the old short ones being nailed together to make longer ones; and instead of having three sections in the Sanctuary, there were only two.

A former member of the Church, Alma Leach McCullers, gave two pulpit chairs in memory of her two grandmothers, Elizabeth Sanders Leach and Martha W. McCullers Garrard.

These two chairs, along with the Communion Table made by Mr. Neil Johnson, a desk from the home of Mr. and Mrs. William Edward McCullers, and a chair used in the old Chancel make up the furnishings

of the Pastor's Study in the North Transcept of the present Sanctuary. The pulpit that "Mr. Neil" made is still used in the Chancel today. We do cherish the memory of Mr. Johnson and rejoice in his handiwork even now.

There was a portable blackboard purchased at this time which is still in use today after more than half a century. Our pastor, the Reverend Dan E. Meadows, has just recently put a new chalk board in the old frame and it is as good as new. This is only a small item, but it has been used in the service of God to bless us all.

## THE PRESENT SANCTUARY (1939-1951)



"Except the Lord build the house, they labor in vain that build it". Psalm 127:1

During the two and a half decades following 1914, Mt. Zion first flourished, then declined during World War 1 and the pursuant depression, and in the late 1930's began to take on new life.

In 1939-1940, the membership, headed by William Edward McCullers, affectionally known as "Mr. Ed", great grandson of John T. Leach, aided by his faithful wife, Leute Willis McCullers, under the pastorates of B. H. Black and D. D. Traynham, started a drive to raise money to remodel or rebuild the old Church. The first money was raised by the sale of the Old Johnston Academy building established on the Church ground during the first half of the 1800's. The first contributor to the building fund was Floy James Leach. So "Mr. Ed" had the nest egg for the rebuilding of the beloved Church. This nest egg soon grew to several hundred dollars and the members were making plans to begin the building. However, World War II was declared in 1941, and the building plans had to be postponed for a season. In the meantime, "Mr. Ed", the instigator of the building program, was called home to Glory, and like Moses of old, his unfinished work was left for other capable hands to complete.

At that time there was still no recorded deed to the church property: only the mention of the two acres on which the Church stood, (land book "A", page 236 Johnston County Court House), as the surrounding lands were sold and re-sold. Since the membership needed the help of the Duke Foundation, which required a recorded deed as a prerequisite to a

gift, one had to be drawn up and recorded. The land surrounding the Church property had been bought in the early 1900's by John T. Wrenn, son of William G. Wrenn, who was a life-long member of the community, and first wife, Arenetta Holland Wrenn. At the time the deed was needed the land belonged to John Wrenn's widow, Eula Jones Wrenn, and her brother, E. Street Jones. Mrs. Wrenn and Mr. Jones are children of the late Rev. Mr. J. A. T. Jones, a Primitive Baptist Minister of the community for more than fifty years, and Sarah Barnes Jones, a life-long member of Mt. Zion.

The trustees, who were at that time, Thomas Lane McCullers, Percy L. Wood, Zonas H. Thigpen, and J. Claud Carroll, contacted Mrs. Wrenn and Mr. Jones, who had previously moved away, and secured the Church deed. In addition to the two acres set aside by John Leach, Mrs. Wrenn and Mr. Jones generously added almost four-tenths of an acre so that the Church Property would border on the new N.C. Highway #50.

On September 2, 1944, for "Consideration of \$10.00 and Other Valuable Considerations", a warranty deed was issued to the Trustees of Mt. Zion Methodist Church for 2.35 acres of land and was duly recorded in the Books of Johnston County, Book of Deeds 459, page 229. So after more than a hundred years, a deed was properly recorded for the Church property.

In 1947, under the Pastorate of the Rev. Mr. N. P. Edens, the building plans were again taken up. The Committee was composed of Durwood C. Johnson, Sr., Thomas L. McCullers, Alfred T. Taylor, Sr., Robert A. Stevens, Percy L. Wood, Dexter D. Penny, Zonas H. Thigpen, and Ruth McCullers McEachern. The plans were drawn up and approved by the Duke Foundation, and Herbert Wrenn, son of William G. Wrenn and second wife, Ella Stevens Wrenn, was hired as contractor.

By hard work and gifts of members and former members, friends, and the Duke Foundation, over \$17,000 was raised and work was at last begun on the new sanctuary. During the period of building, Mt. Zion was served by three pastors; namely, N. P. Edens, R. G. L. Edwards, and J. W. Garrison. Each one played a great part in inspiring the members on to victory.

This Sanctuary was fashioned along the traditional lines of the Ancient Gothic Cathedrals which were in the form of a Cross known as the Cruciform Church. The old Church formed the transverse Arms which includes the Altar, Chancel, Choir Lofts, and North and South Transepts with the eastern half, back of the pulpit, left for Sunday School rooms. The new addition, inserted into the West Center of the old Church, forms the upright part of the Cross and includes the Nave, aisles and vestibule. The South Transept can be closed off from the Sanctuary and used as a classroom when the need arises and the North Transcept has been furnished as the Pastor's study.

The old part of the Church was brick veneered, leaving the original structure intact. The new part was built of cement blocks and also brick veneered. The Church is covered with a gabled roof and a steeple is over the vestibule. The interior is finished with Gothic Arches and designs. The stained glass windows are of Gothic style and depict the symbols of the Methodist Church. A Gothic arch centered with a cross forms the background for the Altar. The pews, chancel railing, Altar, and Chancel furnishings are all designed in the Gothic style. The woodwork is finished in natural pine, the walls are plastered, the lighting fixtures are of the Cathedral type, and the Church is heated with hot air.

The building was finished with all outstanding indebtedness paid off, and dedicated to the Glory of God on June 24, 1951. Bishop Paul N. Garber made the dedicatory address assisted by E. B. Fisher, superintendent, and J. W. Garrison, Pastor. Mr. Fisher was born while his father, Rev. G. W. Fisher, was pastor of Mt. Zion during 1902 – 1905. Because of this, we feel that he is doubly a member of our Church family, and it was truly a joy to have him as our Superintendent for this momentous occasion. Many friends and former members attended this dedication, and following the service, a fellowship dinner was served on the grounds.

Great rejoicing and thankfulness was felt by all. It was truly a great day for the Mt. Zion people.

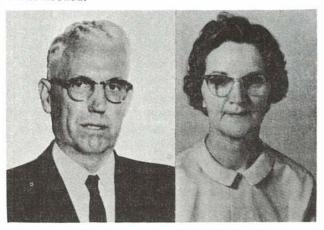
## THE ANNEX

(1957-1961)



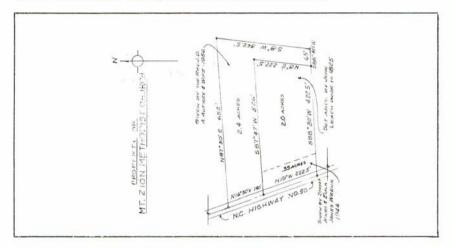
The Apostle Paul states in 1 Corinthians 3:6 that, "I have planted, Apollos Watered, but God gave the increase". As it was true with Paul in his works, even so it has been true with all Christian efforts in every age. Many of those who have planted and watered at Mt. Zion have been called to their eternal rest, and others are now planting and watering, but God still gives the increase.

The members soon realized that the enlarged Sanctuary and use of the East side of the old church for classrooms was not adequate room for the growing membership, and some means of expansion needed to be made. In order to make room for this expansion of the Church plant, more land was needed.

In the early 1950's the land surrounding the Church was again sold-this time to a Methodist minister, The Rev. Mr. J. D. A. Autry and wife, Clara Williams Autry. The trustees, who were then Thomas L. McCullers, Durwood C. Johnson, Sr., Alfred T. Taylor, Sr., Dexter D. Penny, and Paul J. Johnson, offered to buy two acres adjoining the Church property from Mr. and Mrs. Autry. Instead of selling the land, they deeded it to the Trustees of Mt. Zion Church (2.4 acres), "for and in consideration of \$1.00 and other valuable considerations" recorded on February 20, 1956, Book of Deeds 537, page 438, Registrar of Deeds, Office of Johnston County, Smithfield, North Carolina.



After this benevolent gift from The Rev. and Mrs. Autry, plans were begun to build an Annex to the Sanctuary. In the fall of 1957, the members and official board, under the pastorate of the Rev. Mr. C. E. Sparkes, launched a campaign for raising money for this building which was to be used for Sunday School classrooms and other Church school sessions such as Vacation Bible School, Bible study classes, and also for recreational activities of the Community. The Committee to carry out this program was made up of Paul J. Johnson, Sandy B. Myers, Billy Grissom, Zonas Thigpen, Garland K. Penny, and Durwood C. Johnson, Sr. So, the work was begun and the people who were fired with a spirit of unity joined hands to carry the work forward as rapidly as possible.

The structure is of cement blocks, brick veneered to match the Sanctuary, and is situated to the North of the Church. It is joined to the Sanctuary by a breeze-way containing three Gothic Arches on the West and the furnace room on the east side. The roof is planned to blend with the roof line of the Sanctuary, although not as high pitched.

The building contains five classrooms, separated by accordian doors, a kitchen, and two half baths. The accordian doors can be folded back, opening up the entire building into one large room to be used for fellowship dinners, wedding receptions, and gatherings for various other occasions. Again the Duke Foundation helped to meet the expenses and the greater part of the work was done by volunteer help rendered by members and friends of the Church.

At its completion in 1961, it was dedicated to the Glory of God and in the honor of Thomas Lane McCullers, who was the oldest living member and was the longest in years of service of any one to that date. He was son of Charles Edward McCullers and Nancy Temperance Leach McCullers, and also a great grandson of John Thomas Leach and Susan Parham Leach. On August 7, 1962, "Uncle Tom", as he was lovingly called by all those who knew him best, was called home to Heaven. He left a will bequeathing his estate of three houses and lots in the City of Raleigh to his beloved Mt. Zion. The houses are located as follows: 1440 Curfman Street, 1408 Curfman Street, and 1425 Lake Wheeler Road. (Lake Wheeler Road has a long and interesting history. The street was originally a trail worn through the wilderness by the trek of many Indians. In 1760, Royal Governor Tryon and his Army, on the way from New Bern to Hillsboro to confront the Regulators, found it impossible to transport his war paraphernalia through the narrow path. Hence, he encamped on the plantation of Joel Lane, on whose land Raleigh was built, and had his soldiers hack a military road through the forest along

the Indian path. He named the road "Ramsgate". Later it was changed to "Rhamkatte Road", and is now Lake Wheeler Road.) "Uncle Tom's" will is recorded in Record of Wills, Book 4, at page 58, Clerk of Court's Office, Wake County courthouse, Raleigh, North Carolina. Mr. McCullers never married and Mt. Zion Church was his only true love.

## THE PARSONAGE, 1965

Solomon, in his God-given wisdom, tells us in Proverbs 12:7 ... "but the house of rightousness shall stand", and Jesus gave us the Parable as recorded by Matthew concerning the house that was built upon a rock. He said, "And the rains descended and the floods came and the winds blew and beat upon that house; and it fell not: for it was founded upon a rock". Matthew 7:25.

We have now erected our Pastor's home and have built it upon the rock laid down by our Father in Heaven through His children in faith, brotherly love and cooperation. We want it to be a house of rightousness and to always be used for God's honor and glory.

Mt. Zion has shared ownership, with her sister churches, of several parsonages since the late 1800s and rejoice that at last we have built one of our very own and will enjoy the blessings of a full-time pastor. Because Mt. Zion is entirely a rural church, the Parsonage has always been located in a more thickly settled area than our community, so we have never had the benefit of having our pastor live in our midst. Now that we have become a station church, we shall reap that great benefit.

The Parsonage is situated on the Church grounds just north of the Church buildings near the location of the old Johnston Academy and faces Highway Number 50, as does the Church. It is a frame brick-veneered building, to match the rest of the Church plant, and has a gabled roof. The plans are of the cottage-type containing eight rooms and two baths. There is a "Porte-Co-Chere" on the south side and a beautiful

wooded area on the north and east sides - - a beautiful house in a beautiful setting.

This undertaking was financed by the sale of our half interest in the Parsonage located near Holland's Church to her members, the help of the Mission Board, the income from the T. L. McCullers houses, and contributions from members and friends. Much of the labor was done by volunteer help, and consequently our building is valued much higher than the actual money expended.

The Planning Committee for this great step was composed of the following members: Paul J. Johnson, Robert S. Stevens, Billy Grissom, Durwood C. Johnson, Sr., Rex M. Dean, Garland K. Penny, Richard Jack) Johnson, Roy Max Raynor, Berry (Bobby) Barbour, Elmo P. Broughton, David Ray Jones, Norwood Ennis and our pastor, The Rev. Dan E. Meadows. The Building Committee was made up of Paul J. Johnson. Garland K. Penny, Norwood Ennis and Elmo Broughton. The Committee to decide upon colors and furnishings for the rooms was composed of Garland Penny, Flmo Broughton, Durwood Johnson, Shirley Coats Grissom, Clara Powell Raynor, Mabel Parrish Johnson and Merdyth McCullers Lane.

The Landscape Committee has not been appointed yet, but we are dreaming of a beautiful garden for God enclosing the Church plant, Cemetery and Parsonage in a four and eight-tenths acre park.

The Parsonage was completed and furnished by July 1, 1965, in time for our Parsonage family to move in after the Annual Conference in June. The first family is that of our own dear Dan E. Meadows and wife, Jean Bullard Meadows.

May God's richest blessings dwell with those who helped with the building; especially with the architect, Mr. Russell White, the Contractor, Mr. Will Bridges and our Pastor, The Rev. Dan E. Meadows, who led us spiritually.

Our Heavenly Father speaks to us concerning Heaven and those who will enter there-in, as reveiled through John during his meditations on the Isle of Patmos, in these words: "And there shall in no wise enter into it anything that defileth, neither what so ever worketh abomination or maketh a lie; but they which are written in the Lamb's Book of Life." We pray that all those whose names are written on the roll of Mt. Zion are also written in the Lamb's Book of Life.

As has been here before recorded, prior to the Civil War and the emancipation of the Negroes, they made up a great part of the membership of Mt. Zion. After the war, they withdrew from Mt. Zion and established their own church with the help of many white friends. It is located a few miles to the north east of Mt. Zion and is named Ebenezar African Methodist Church. Due to this great withdrawal of members, the Mt. Zion roll was revised and only the names of the living members at that time were listed.

Since the first record has been lost, and only the revised one remains, the entire membership prior to and several years following the Civil War cannot be verified. Only the names of those who have been handed down from generation to generation can be listed and even some of these may not be accurate.

In Luke 18:16, we find recorded these words of Jesus, "Suffer the little children to come unto me, and forbid them not, for of such is the Kingdom of God".

Unto this day, and throughout the ages, there is nothing more sacred and profound that parents can do for their children than to bring them to the Altar in infancy and dedicate them to God through Baptism in the Triune name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit.

Those of our Mt. Zion babies whose names and date of Baptism are recorded and who were publicly dedicated to God are the following: Edmund A. Turner, 1893 - son of J. Millard Turner and Mary Atwater Turner - also their son, William David Turner in 1895. The babies of Henry Bernard Brady and Sarah Smith Brady who were baptised were: Earl Creswell Brady, 1895, Johnathan Xennetus Brady in 1899 and twin daughters Kathryn Jane and Sarah Sybil Brady in 1905; William Edward McCullers and Leute Willis McCullers offered these babies in dedication to God at Mt. Zion, Nancy Coston McCullers, 1902; Merdyth Bascom McCullers, 1904, and Sarah Lane McCullers in 1906. The babies of James Fitzhugh Batts, Sr. and Florence Crocker Batts were Laura Elizabeth Batts in 1904 and James Fitzhugh Batts, Jr. in 1905.

Very dear to our hearts is the sacred earth in which our loved ones are laid to rest. The Cemetery is often called "God's Acre" and to us it really is. As the above poem by Mrs. Sherratt expresses, their Shepherd takes their hands and leads them there. Mrs. Sherratt, who is remembered by many who are living today and is now sleeping her "Sleep in Jesus", often came to Mt. Zion and always read one of her lovely poems as part of the Memorial Service on Home Coming Day. Her home was in Philadelphia and she was the wife of William Sherratt. (Their only son, William Archabald Sherratt, came down to Raleigh to school and met and married Evelyn Edward McCullers, one of Mt. Zion's daughters. Evelyn is the daughter of William Edward and Leute W. McCullers.)

After the gift of the additional land by the Rev. and Mrs. Autry, the Cemetery was enlarged and fenced. The Cemetery Committee leveled the plots and planted grass which improved the appearance of our Memorial Garden a great deal. However, as yet, there has been no land-

scaping done. We hope that in the near future much planting and beautifying will be planned.

Many of the members of the by-gone years have been borne up the aisle of Mt. Zion to lie amid myriads of flowers before her sacred altar as the beloved pastor dedicated their vacated bodies to God and commended their departed souls into His Holy keeping. They then have been brought down again and laid to rest in the Hallowed plot just east of the Sanctuary. In God's good time, we, each, who are here today will also pass down the aisle to our final resting place.

The people of Mt. Zion have never said "No" when a neighbor from another church wanted to place his loved one in our Sacred earth and may the time never come when we have to refuse due to lack of space. Always, when the need arose there was more land available and may it ever be so.

In the early years, the plantation owners usually established a family cemetery near their mansion houses and there are many of these old cemeteries within a few miles of Mt. Zion. There, awaiting God's summons on the final day, are resting many of our illustrious fore-fathers.

The first member to be laid to rest in the Mt. Zion Cemetery was William Westley Pate in 1896 and since then many others have been entombed there. They and their dates are as follows:

Mt. Zion and her people owe so very much to those who have led us spiritually that words are inadequate to express our gratitude. They, with God's help, and the aid of the lay leaders of Mt. Zion, have laid a foundation so deep and strong that the passing years and many changes have but proven their faith and God's power. We do honor them and ever love their memory. They have baptized us as infants and converts, taken us into the fellowship of the Church, administered the Lord's Supper to us, pronounced our marriage vows, comforted us when we were brokenhearted, visited us when we were sick and distressed, counseled us in spiritual truths, eulogized our loved ones and commended their souls into God's keeping, and have brought to us great sermons from God's Holy Word. They have truly been our earthly Shepherds and have led us "by the still waters and into the green pastures." Their greatness marches on through the years and inspires us on to more blessed labors.

As has been previously stated, the earliest preachers of Mt. Zion were the itinerant Circuit Riders and could not hold regular services at the Church. Some of the earliest ones for whom the exact date is unknown were William Anderson, William N. Crompton, J. Pervis, J. W. Floyd, W. H. Barnes, P. W. Archer, Daniel Culbreth, and J. W. Wilson. # OUR PRESIDING ELDERS AND DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS

During the early years of American Methodism, John Wesley realized that the young organization in America needed to be supervised more closely than he was able to do while steering the work in England; therefore, he sent several assistants to oversee the Lord's work here. One of these was Francis Asbury, who was later consecrated Bishop. While an assistant, he traveled in North Carolina and did much to strengthen the congregations already established by the itinerant preachers.

The first superintendent to be appointed soley to North Carolina as far as can be determined was Francis Poythress in 1785. (The term "presiding elder" was first used in 1789). Those who followed him after Mt. Zion was established and before 1828, were T. L. Douglas, L. Pierce, and John Burton.

# **OUR BISHOPS**



Bishop Francis Asbury

The Earthly Head of the Church is, of course, the Bishop. When the Church was first established in America, John Wesley remained the Leader of Methodism under God until after the Revolutionary War. In 1784, the Reverends Messrs. Thomas Coke and Francis Asbury were appointed the first Bishops of America. Mr. Asbury served in North Carolina as the first Bishop. He was called to his eternal rest in 1816. The North Carolina Conference was created in 1837, and prior to that date several of the Bishops of America had jurisdiction over the North Carolina churches. The exact dates which these first bishops served this area is not known, but it is certain that they served in North Carolina.

Francis Asbury - early 1800's;

William McKendree - after 1808 and again in 1829-1834.

Between the years that Mr. McKendree served, there were T. L. Douglas, L. Price, and John Burton. From 1835 to 1855, the bishops were Elija Heading, Robert R. Roberts, Joshua Soule, James O'Anderson, John Emory, Beverly Waugh, Thomas A. Morris, William Capers, and Henry Bascom.

Between 1855 and 1872 there were John Early (1862-1865), Calvin Kingsley, Enoc Marvin, Holland N. McTyeire, H. H. Kavanaugh, D. S. Doggett, and George Pierce.

Methodism has grown mightily under the guidance of these consecrated men and we ever honor them.

As far as can be affirmed, only six native North Carolinians have entered the Episcropacy. They were Robert Pain, a native of Person County, consecrated Bishop in 1846; Oscar Penn Fitzgerald, a native of Caswell County, consecrated Bishop in 1920; Robert Elijah Jones, a native of Greensboro, consecrated Bishop in 1920; William Walter Peele, a native of Scotland County, consecrated Bishop in 1938; Costen Jordan Harrell, a native of Gates County, consecrated Bishop in 1944; and Robert N. Brooks, a native of Hollis, consecrated Bishop in 1944. Bishops Robert Pain and William W. Peele served in this area. We are honored that these native sons of North Carolina were called into the highest order of the Church.

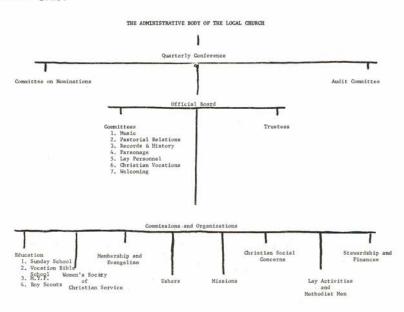
# THE ADMINISTRATIVE BODY

The visible Church of God is built not of stones and mortar, which make up only the House, but of the Christian people who are the members, and people need leaders who are filled with the Holy Spirit.

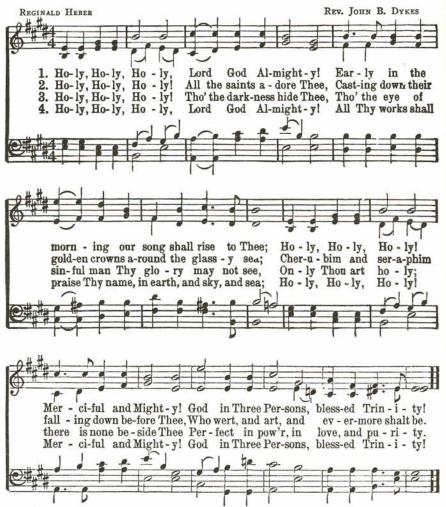

Mt. Zion was organized in the beginning according to this plan and has always revered her Godly leaders who were her Bishops, Presiding Elders, Superintendents, Pastors and local Lay Leaders.

There have been so many of our local Lay Leaders to participate in the leadership of Mt. Zion that to name them all would be to list much of the membership. ## **EPILOGUE**

Moses, in talking with God in prayer, speaks thus of His time: "For a thousand years in Thy sight are but as yesterday when it is past, and as a watch in the night". Psalm 90:4.

Our century and a half at Mt. Zion is only a few moments in the sight of God, but, we in our human minds, consider it a great span of years. It is good to keep in our minds the labors of our forefathers and to record their achievements.
