HISTORICAL STATEMENT

Some Characteristics of the Early Christian Church

Paul's conviction regarding the Early Christian Church was that the true descendants of Abraham -- the true Israel -- were not those who could trace their physical descent from Abraham, but those who had made the same venture of faith as Abraham had made. The true Israel, and the true Church, were not composed of any nation or race; it was composed of those who accepted Jesus Christ in faith. This constitutes the conception and membership of the Christian Church. One of the first things the Christian Church stressed was the idea that no man is useless--that every man is of use to God. The fact that each person was important and needed was stressed; in short, individuality was of prime importance. In the Early Christian Church there were no class distinctions, so to speak, each man was on the same "footing".

The Early Christian Church emphasized the fact that the Christian had a joy that no other man could express, and this belief has also been handed down to us through the years. The first question in the Catechism is, "What is man's chief end?", and the answer, of course, is "Man's chief end is to glorify God and enjoy Him forever".

The Early Church also demonstrated that no man was worhtless because Christ died for all men.

The Early Church was:

A Singing Church: In Paul's description of the meeting of the Church at Corinth, we find singing as an integral part of the Church fellowship. They were well-versed in the singing of David's Psalms. Since the Fall of Jersusalem in AD 70, in the Orthodox Jewish Synagogue there has been no music for when they worship, they remember a tragedy. But in the Christian Church, from the beginning until this date, there have been songs of praise; for the Christian remembers an infinite love.

A Healing Church: The Early Church had a code which laid down the law that each congregation must appoint at least one widow to take care of women and children who were sick. (A present day example of this is the importance which the Mormon Church places on such matters).

A Praying Church: They knew that the proper preparation of their thoughts and prayers, which were numerous, gave the proper emphasis to their actions.

An Unselfish Church: The Early Christian Church taught its members that to live selfishly was "to pierce Christ again", and that to cultivate selfish and evil desires was not only the downfall of the Christian himself, but was the downfall of the whole Church, as well.

Development in the Church has been based on an early established fact: without right relationships between man and man, righteousness cannot exist, and all man's striving for righteousness is rendered ineffective and without reward.

The Early Christians knew, as you and I know, that it is man who proposes, but it is God who disposes, for the future is in the hands of God. Knowing these things, the mission of the Early Christians was, as ours should be, to create a right relationship first with God and then with our fellowman.

MUSINGS OF MT. ZION

On one occasion when Jesus was relating a parable to His disciples, He said:

Now that we have reached almost two centuries of Mt. Zion's service to God and the community, we too can say as did Jesus, "This is the Lord's work and it is marvelous in our eyes". It is truly amazing to remember the blessings of the past which inspire us to build for today and for the future.

He brought her home to this "wilderness community" and to satisfy her longing for her little Methodist "Meeting House" in Virginia, he set aside two acres of his plantation and built a little Church to the Glory of God and for her worship center. John T. Leach and wife, Susan Parham Leach, with the inspiration from God and help of friends named the Church for God's Holy Mount, "Mt. Zion". Our Church has continued to prosper in the Lord's work for untold years. As in the past, may Her people continue to serve in the leadership of the community to the Glory of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ and to minister to those who need our love and encouragement.

There has been much joy and many blessings at Mt. Zion during the past years. We must follow Jesus' admonition to us, "To show what great things God has done for us". Luke 8:39

It is now time to begin again in recording the achievements of the people of Mt. Zion. These achievements are noted in the accomplishments of our organizations of which we have many; namely, the United Methodist Women, the United Methodist Men, the United Methodist Youth Fellowship, the Junior and Senior Choirs, the Boy Scouts, Sunday School, and, of course, the Administrative Body composed of the many committees which are drawn up by the North Carolina Conference.

We have been blest with the leadership of able pastors to inspire us on to success as well as that of our Sunday School Superintendents, Committee Chairmen, Sunday School Teachers, Choir Leaders, Musicians, and each working member of the Church.


We have planted many beautiful shrubs and flowers in God's Garden, which includes the entire Mt. Zion acreage, and hope to keep on with this beautifying of our Church grounds. "All things bright and beautiful, the Lord God made them all."

The Bicentennial of the Carolina Methodist Circuit was celebrated at Duke University in 1976 which brought much joy and thankfulness to those who could attend. "The best drivers keep a close watch in the rearview mirror", we are told; so, a true knowledge of the past helps us to plan better for the future.

Included in the 1977 Smithfield Bicentennial record of the Johnston County Churches as reported in the Smithfield Herald by Editor Tom J. Lassiter on April 26, 1977, we find this account of Mt. Zion:

"The oldest Methodist Church in the County - Mt. Zion in western Johnston, founded in 1809 - owes its origin to the Leaches of Leachburg Plantation."

We are thankful and proud that our Church has continued in the work of our Lord for so many years.

EARLY HISTORICAL ITEMS OF VALUE AND INTEREST

"Remove not the ancient landmark, Which Thy Fathers have set." Proverbs 22:28

Bits and pieces of very interesting references to Mt. Zion Church have been unearthed since Volume I was completed in 1966. So, again comes to mind the poem by G.H. Holland:

"Heaven is not reached by a single bound, But we build the ladder by which we rise From the lowly earth to the vaulted skies, And we mount to its summit, round by round."

One of these items is concerning a Masonic Lodge Meeting held near Mt. Zion in May 1873. The meeting was called to pay last tribute to Dr. John Sanders Leach who had died in January 1873. This meeting was held at the home of his father, Dr. James T. Leach. The forty members who were present were formed in "regular procession and marched to Mt. Zion Church, one-half mile away, where Rev. W.H. Bobbit of the Conference of North Carolina preached an able and interesting discourse". (The Rev. Mr. Bobbit was the Mt. Zion Pastor.)

The above recorded memorial service took place a hundred and six years ago and the account of this event was found in the Old Masonic Minute Book of 1870 - 1876. Mr. C.S. Coats reported this in a 1974 Smithfield Herald.

Another item of importance and interest was found in an 1887 copy of the Smithfield Herald concerning the "Johnston County S.S. Society". It is copied verbatim as follows:

"At the regular semi-annual meeting of the Johnston County Sunday School Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church South, held at Mt. Zion Church, October 29th and 30th, 1887, the following resolution was adopted: Resolved, 'that a copy of the minutes of this Conference be furnished to the Raleigh Christian Advocate and Smithfield Herald for publication.' In compliance with the above, I respectfully transmit the following:

"Conference called to order by Vice-President G.A. Turner. Music - 'Father While We Come To Thee'. Prayer by the President. C.E. McCullers appointed Secretary Pro Tem. The roll of delegates being called, it was found that there was not a quorum. On motion of J.M. Turner, the Brethern present resolved themselves into a Sunday School Conference. On motion, the Chair appointed Brothers J.M. Turner, B.W. Young, and C.E. McCullers a Committee on Programme. On motion, the Chair appointed Brothers A.D. Taylor and J.M. Turner to assign homes to delegates. On motion, Conference adjourned for one hour.

"Afternoon session opened with prayer by Brother A.D. Taylor, The Chair announced that there being only three schools represented owing to the inclemency of the weather that the receiving and reading of reports would be dispensed with, and the discussion of queries would be in order. On motion, the query, 'Is The True Spirit of Liberality Sufficiently Inculcated in Our

Sunday Schools? was taken up and discussed at some length by Brothers Young, J.M. Turner, and A.D. Taylor after which the Chair made some very interesting and instructive remarks. On motion of Brother Turner, the subject was laid over for further discussion. On motion, Conference adjourned to meet at ten o'clock Sunday morning, October 30th, 1887.


"Conference convened pursuant to adjournment; President, G.A. Turner, in the Chair. Music - 'O, Worship the Lord'. Prayer by Rev. E. Pope, of Newton Grove Mission. Roll of schools called. Eight officers and delegates responded. On motion, the Chair appointed a committee of three on credentials and to receive reports. Only three schools reported. Query, 'Does the Subject of Missions Receive Proper Attention in Our Sunday Schools?' being called, elicited real soul stirring speeches by Brethren B.W. Young, Rev. E. Pope and A.D. Taylor which resulted in the adoption of the following resolution:

"Resolved, that the importance of missions receive greater emphasis and the Secretary of this Conference be instructed to procure from our Publishing House in Nashville, Tenn., leaflets and pamphlets upon this subject to

supply this Conference.'

"Corinth, on the Clayton Circuit, was elected as the place for holding the next Conference; fifth Sunday and Saturday before in April 1888. On motion, the Secretary was instructed to transmit reports from schools to the President of the Conference and suggest the importance of calling a meeting of the Conference on the fifth Sunday in January to elect officers for the ensuing year. On motion of B.W. Young, Conference adjourned with Long Meter Doxology and prayer.


Charles Edward McCullers. 1844 - 1914

An article was found concerning the old Johnston Academy at Mt. Zion which was often called the "Mt. Zion Academy". This school was established prior to the Civil War and was built on land donated by Dr. James T. Leach just north of the Church. (This information was recorded in 1889 by Superintendent of Johnston County Schools, Mr. Mebane, in his "Historical Account

of the Academies in Johnston County Prior to the Civil War".) The newly found news article concerning the Academy was written by W.M. Sanders in 1924. Mr. Sanders states in the article that he, as a youth of sixteen years in 1875, lived in the home of Dr. James T. leach, whom he considered an "exampler" of all men, and attended the Mt. Zion Academy. He also states, "An old lady by the name of Johnson endowed the Academy". This fund evidently helped deserving students to attend the Academy as did the Susan Leach Parrish Scholarship Fund as recorded in Volume I.



JOHNSTON ACADEMY "Called Mt. Zion Academy"



The old "Mt. Zion Academy" was torn down and the Mt. Zion Free School was built on the same site in 1910.

Mr. W.M. Sanders also relates his joy in attending Mt. Zion Methodist Church as well as attending Elizabeth Methodist, Oakland Presbyterian, and Shiloh Baptist Churches. He states, "Mt. Zion held services on first Sunday, Shiloh held services on second Sunday, Elizabeth held services on third Sunday, and Oakland held hers on fourth Sunday"; and then he added, "So, if the people were not quite so good as they should have been, it was not for the lack of good preaching".

I will add to Mr. Sanders' record that the schedule for services at Mt. Zion and our neighboring churches, Shiloh, Elizabeth, and Oakland, was the same when I was a small child, seventy years ago. And to me it was also a joy to gather with our neighbors at their respective churches and to join them in praise and thanksgiving to Our Lord.

There was also a small one-room school house across the road, west of the Church, in which the younger children were taught the three R's-"Reading, Riting, and Rithmetic" (the Grammar Grades) before entering the Academy. There has recently been found the record of a deed for the land on

which this school was built. It was drawn by Miss Claudia Leach in the late 1800's, deeding the land on which the school was standing to Johnston County. (Record of Deeds Books W-10, Pg. 164, and X-7, Pg. 521) This small building was standing as late as the middle 1930's.

We, too, with God's help are privileged to "leave footprints on the sands of time" as penned by Longfellow.

For New Year's Eve we meet again at Mt. Zion to pray for God's guidance throughout the New Year and are bound together more closely with Him and His children through song and repast. As midnight nears, we gather at the altar for the closing prayer.

At Easter we raise our voices in praise for the Resurrection Morning and our Living Savior. The word of God tells us that "very early in the morning the first day of the week, they came unto the sepulchre at the rising of the sun" (St. Mark 16:2). So we at Mt. 





We at Mt. Zion have always been blessed with pastors who were true disciples of Christ. They have guided us in paths of righteousness and we honor them and cherish their memory.

These dedicated men have proven a great blessing to us.

Mr. Meadows and his wife (Nee, Jean Bullard) were the first to occupy our own Mt. Zion Parsonage and have returned to visit with us many times since they were called to another Church.

Mr. Meadows was a great help to us during the time we were building our parsonage and in guiding us into many programs as our first "station" pastor.

His daughter, Josephine M. Jones Rich, and her family are still members with us and are very active in all phases of our work, especially so in music and work with our young people. We count the Meadows family very dear to us.

Dr. McIntyre came to North Carolina Conference after his retirement from the Virginia Conference in 1965; having served forty-six years in the ministry. His first pastorate here was in Apex and then in June 1967 we were blest to have him come to us. Since Bishop Garber was Bishop of both the Virginia Conference and ours, he knew that we needed Dr. McIntyre and he, "Dr. Mack", was truly a help to us. He retired from our Conference and returned to Virginia in June 1969. He and his lovely wife, (Nee, Elsie Griffin), returned to worship with us several times before his death in 1973, at age 78. He preached our Homecoming Sermon in September 1971 to one of the largest congregations ever to assemble at Mt. Zion. What a blessing!

Dr. McIntyre was a great leader in the Virginia Conference. He was a member of the Bishop's Cabinet, was District Superintendent of two Virginia Districts, was co-founder of the Patrick Henry Hospital in Portsmouth, Virginia, and was trustee of the hospital at the time of his death. Also, he was President of the Pell Foundation of the United Methodist Church, was a former chairman of the World Service Board of Virginia, was a member of the United Methodist Conference and was a former co-chairman of the Tide Water Chapter of the American Cancer Society. He was truly a servant of the Lord and may we at Mt. Zion ever strive to reach his goals in Christian service.

We are blest that Mrs. McIntyre continues as a dear friend and supporter of our Church.

Mr. Morgan brought with him to our parsonage a lovely family of young people. Mrs. Morgan, (Nee, Seleta Tucker), and the children, as well as our

pastor, were a great joy to us and added much to the interest and enthusiasm to our Church life. They were a very musical family and thereby brought growth to our "singing Church", as Mt. Zion has been called down through the ages.

The young people needed more parsonage room, so we decided to enclose the "port-co-chere-- and thus add a "den" for the young ones to enjoy. Our pastor and Mrs. Morgan furnished the "den" themselves as a gift to our Church for which we will ever be grateful.

Mr. Morgan did much to help us grow and encouraged us in many ways. We are thankful that we were privileged to have them with us for four years.

Mr. and Mrs. Barber, (Nee, Jane Nelms), came to us as "Bride and Groom" just beginning a wonderful life together. They were both precious and he was filled with a young man's enthusiasm and love for the Lord's work. While he was with us, we renovated the Sunday School rooms on the east side of the sanctuary and in the north and south transepts. These five rooms were carpeted, the ceilings lowered and walls repainted, thus improving the 1840 section of the Lord's house.

A most precious, "Blessed Event", took place the second year they were with us: Heather Dawn Barber was born on November 15, 1974, and was baptized on March 16, 1975, at Mt. Zion's sacred altar by Bishop Robert M. Blackburn. Heather was our first Parsonage baby and she will ever remain a "first" with us.

Mr. and Mrs. Barber gladly took into their home, while they were with us, a precious "red headed" boy of five years who needed a home. They later legally adopted him, hence he is now Timmy Barber and is dear to us all.

Mr. Barber worked enthusiastically with the young people and we were blest during his tenure with us.

Our current pastor is our own capable "Bill" Jeffries and he is one of our most thoughtful and concerned pastors. He brought with him a wife, (Nee, JoAnne Lee), who abounds in enthusiam and love, and three precious boys.

Since Mr. Jeffries came to us, we have continued to grow and make improvements. A Boy Scout Troop has been transferred to us and the Methodist Men have raised money for pew cushions and other improvements for the sanctuary. Also, much has been done to beautify the Church grounds.

The family needed more parsonage room so we moved the Pastor's study from the Parsonage to the south transept of the Sanctuary instead of using that for a classroom.

Dr. Grant and his lovely wife, Ruth Henderson Grant were loyal helpers and leaders in the ongoing of Mount Zion and won the lasting friendship and admiration of its members and neighbors during the four-year period.

"Following Reverend Grant, The Reverend Leon Russell and his sweet wife, Alta Stone Russell came to the Raleigh District. They left their mark in Christian influence and leadership with Mount Zion and, following a distinguished career in God's ministry, with service as pastor to eight leading charges and superintendency at both Goldsboro and Raleigh, left us at Mount Zion and the Raleigh District to enter into a well-earned retirement in 1969.

"Jack Ward Page became Superintendent of our Raleigh District following Mr. Russell's retirement in 1969, and emulated well the splendid examples set by his predecessors. The Reverend Page and his lovely helpmate, Frances Foster Page, gave stimulating encouragement and consecrated direction to the work of his district in general and to Mount Zion Church in particular. The occasions that brought the Pages to our Church were memorable indeed and left us better prepared. He was the first of the list of five great superintendents to answer the call to Glory and we shall miss his presence and his unusually dedicated direction of administrative affairs. He served us for almost four years.



THE BICENTENNIAL OF THE CAROLINA CIRCUIT OF METHODISM

"Lord, Thou has been our dwelling place in all generations."

Psalms 90:1

We, as Carolina Methodists, have been blessed with two hundred years in which to serve our Lord and fellowman; and we know that God is still "our dwelling place". May we at Mt. Zion ever grow in service to Him and to those with whom we come into daily contact.

On April 3, 1976, the Bicentennial of the "Carolina Circuit" was celebrated at the Cameron Indoor Stadium at Duke University. Those of us from Mt. Zion, who attended, were thrilled with the history and the record of our achievements through the years and of our efforts to do God's bidding.

Almost eight thousand people from all over the State attended, many in colonial costumes and with their Church banners.

The Duke University Chapel Choir led the music and rendered several inspirational anthems during the Service.

The celebration began with an invitation to the "whole world to join in praising God". We then responded with, "We invite the sky to thunder His Word, the earth to rumble in His praise and the sea to swirl in song".

This was followed by numerous hymns of praise sung by the assembly and the choirs from many universities and colleges. Mingled with the music there were addresses by our Bishop, Robert M. Blackburn, and the Bishop of the Western North Carolina Conference, Earl G. Hunt. The President of Duke University, Terry Sanford, made the introductions and engineered the program through to a grand finale.

There were references to God's great Creation and the establishment and growth of Christianity with all races of people throughout the eons of time.

An American Indian prayer was quoted as follows:

"May the sun always be warm on your shoulders,

May the spirit of the wind blow gently across your face,

May the light of the moon and stars always guide your paths,

May the moisture of the dew always fill the thirst of your life,

From the rising of the sun to the setting of the moon,

From today until tomorrow, and from this moment to forever."

Dean Thomas Langford of Duke University led the assembly in the symbolism of the rock upon which Jesus established His Church through faith like Peter's when He said, "Thou are Peter and upon this rock I will build My Church". Matthew 16:18. Each person was presented a bit of stone taken from the quarry near the university. (Stones from this quarry were used in constructing Duke University and the beautiful Duke Chapel)

The Editor of the Christian Advocate, James C. Stokes, had this to say bout the continuation of our work for the Lord:

"We are gathering new strength for the tests of tomorrow.

We are not going to death under the burdens of these times!

Rather we are rising with Christ out of the tomb to a larger life,

A more meaningful servanthood, and a more glorious destiny."

CORRECTIONS FOR VOLUME I

The Ransom Bridgers and wife, Adeline Thompson, are not recorded in the Bridgers-Taylor family record.


