

REVEREND ROBERT E. BROWN

Mr. Brown was Pastor of Pine Forest Church from 1924-1928. He came to cur Church a young hard working man. He served as Pastor of four Churches on the Goldsboro Circuit. Mr. Brown had a great interest for the children and young people in his Churches. He started vacation Bible Schools, which included the Adults as well as Children.

When he came to our Church he saw a great need for expansion in both the education and building program of the Church. He and the membership together began an intensive program that made his vision come true. Er. Brown left us at the end of four years with a newly renovated Church that was a real pride to the congregation and the community.

We at Pine Forest loved Mr. Brown and we shall cherish his memory as long as we live. He gave us new insights to work for new and better things which we hope we will not loose in his memory.

PINE FOREST CHUPCH

Fine Forest Church was built in 1904 at a cost of Twelve
Hundred Dollars (\$1,200.00). The Contractor was a Mr. Manly and
he was assisted in the building by Leroy M. Bass and Edmund Hooks.
The Church was dedicated June 26, 1904 by Mev. H. E. Tripo.

LIGHTIMG: Lights for the Church were kerosene lamps. Later we bought a Delco Plant to furnish lights. Sometimes the motor would stop and we would be in the dark for awhile until someone could go out and get it started again.

HEAT: Heat for the Church was wood and coal heaters. These were later replaced with gas floor furnaces. We now have automatic oil and electric heat, and air conditioning.

"The Old One Foom Pine Forest School"

In 1876 a small number of people felt the need of a Sunday School in the Community, and with Mr. D. D. Carroll as Superintendent, they organized what became known as Pine Forest Sunday School and assembled for worship in a school building about half a mile from the present Church. The literature consisted of two Bibles, one blue-back spelling book, and a first and fourth reader. The children were taught to read and write along with the Bible Fruths.

Mrs. Lafayette Sasser had charge of the little folks. This being a Methodist Community, it was felt desirable to have a Superintendent of that faith, so Mr. Carroll who was a Missionary Baptist was replaced by Nestus Curley who served as long as he was physically able. During this time the old School Building was moved to a site just across the road from the present Church Building. H. T. Jones, Baptist, took up the work then, with Cecree Langston as Secretary and Treasurer. In 1904 the one-room Church was dedicated. Following Mr. Jones, the late J. M. Mitchell was elected as Superintendent, a man of great initiative, energy and vision. Today we see the fulfillment of many of his dreams. In 1909 two Bible Classes were organized and the whole Sunday School seemed to take on new life. The enrollment was about 75 at this time. Mr. Mitchell served until his death March 1922. During Mr. Mitchell's illness in 1912 B. H. Bass acted as Euperintendent. J. D. Hines the present Superintendent, followed Mr. Mitchell. In these last years the Sunday School has grown very rapidly until at present there are over 200 on the roll. There are five organized classes besides the Primary Department, and the graded lessons are used in all the work. About a year ago the little one-room Church was remodled entirely according to the "C" type plan for rural Churches, and now the Church is new with ample Sunday School room and double the seating capacity in the auditorium.

STANDARD TRAILING CEPTIFICATES: In March 1925 three members of the Sunday School received Standard Training School credit, and in March 1926 four members of the Sunday School won credit at the Goldsboro Training School.

A HISTORY OF THE PINE FOREST CHURCH

Pine For st Church was first organized Cotober 1, 1884 by Mr. J. E. Mann with twelve members. For a good many years they held services in the little one room school house. In 1903, during a Fevival in this same little school house, the people became aroused by the preaching of Mr. J. D. Sasser, a man of vision, and they decided to build a church. The contract was left to Mr. Menly of Goldsboro, Morth Carolina. The men and boys of the community started to work on the first Church, a one room rectangular building. The Church was not dedicated until 1905 during the ministry of Pev. H. E. Tripp. The Church and Sunday School grew until soon the one room Church was too small, however, ten years of crampled conditions existed before the class room idea was felt as a solution for the problem, and in 1921, it was decided to build class rooms and a larger auditorium. This time the contractor was Wr. Wilton Gurley, a member of the Church and Community. Again the men and boys came to the support of the Building Program and men went into the woods, cut logs and hauled them to the mill of Mr. P. S. Perkins, who though not a member of the Methodist Church, cut the logs free of cost. Every member of the Church and Community showed a splended spirit and a great willingness to help.

Crowing trees in a very few weeks were transformed into a house of worship. Surely these can be called "Trees of Pighteousness".

FIRST ORGAN

The first organ that the Church had was given by Mrs. Martha

Brown bass, and her five sons, Leroy M., Needham, John H., Asa G., and

BenjaminH. This family picked cotton to purchase the organ.

The organ presently used in the Churchwas purchased and donated to the Church by the Aldersgate Class.

Mrs. Minnie Mitchell donated a piano to the Church in the late 1920's.

FIRST EDDING

The first wedding to be performed in time Forest Church was that of Mr. Cyrus Johnson and Miss Cora Dixon.

The next one that re can remember, was that of Ir. Ezra Moore and Miss Mallie Edwards

FIRST FUNERAL

The first funeral that we can remember to be in the Church was that of John M. Nitchell and school was recessed in order that the children could march to the funeral in a body. This was in March of 1922.

The first Prayer Meetings were interdenominational and were first held in the home of Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Mitchell in 1918. When the attendance outgrew the home, it was roved to Rosewood School. There was always a good attendance, especially among the young people. Mr. Branson, a local Friends Preacher, was always very active in leading the group. Special emphasis was put on the Bible reading, each person was asked to tell the number of chapters they had read during the week. Each person was also asked to quote a verse of scripture from memory.

SUNBEAMS

The children of the Church were organized into a group we called "Sunbeams". There was a meeting once each month for a planned program and a social hour. Their group was sponsored by the Missionary Society and was started in the early 1930's. They usually met in someone's home and were led by Mrs. Paul Thompson and Miss Minnie Bass.

CEMETERY

The land for the cemetery was given to Pine Forest Church by Mr.

Robert Sasser. It as given with the understanding that it was to be used for that purpose only. The land was surveyed and lots laid off in 1934.

They were sold for \$10.00 each. The first person to be buried in the new Church Cemetery was Mrs. Helen J. Davis, wife of Charles B. Davis.

BIBLE

The Pulpit Bible in the Church was given by Mr. J. Dallie Hines in memory of his wife Mrs. Fannie Jones Hines.

LET'S GO TO EGYPT

Since October 1905, the trip to Egypt has always been a big day for the people of Pine Forest and any persons living in the Community who would like to go. The time for going to Egypt was always the first Saturday after school started at Rosewood in order that the people in the Community could meet the new school faculty. It also served as a home coming day for people who were raised here but were living elsewhere.

The day ususally began with the male population going on ahead to hunt for squirrels and rabbits. There were usually some good fishermen who went slong with poles and a big can of worms. By the time the older folks and the children arrived, there was plenty of fish and game ready to be cooked.

The cooking was done over hot coals. Logs were placed parallel to each other and hot coals filled inbetween them. Pots and frying pans were put over the logs for cooking the food. Fr. Poscoe Johnson usually carried a fifty-poung lard stand and made it full of coffee. The big pot full of chicken stew prepared by the ladies was a real delicacy.

For the first years, transportation was by mule and wagon or horse and buggy, if you were fortunate enough to have a buggy. The roads were usually bad, especially if there had been a big rain before had. The wagon bodies were usually taken off and turned upside down to make tables to put food on for dinner.

Since most of the entire trip was through woods, there was a plenty of winter huckleberries, locusts and haws to be gathered and eaten on the way going and coming back.

while the older folks prepared dinner, the young people and children hiked about a mile up the river to the moss trees and usually returned with all they could carry to take home to be hung on trees in the yard.

Due to the distance to Tony's Bend, as it was first known, the day usually began very early in the morning and you reached home very late in the afternoon. Then came the day of automation which lessened the time considerably.

After sixty five (65) years there have been a lot of changes, a lot of faces missing, and a new day - SUNDAY - has been adopted. We feel sure that if the founders of Egypt could return, and know the custom has lasted for these many years, they would feel a great deal of satisfaction for having a part in such a day of joy and pleasure for such a large number of people. We hold in our hearts a lot of thanks in their memory.

EDUCATIONAL PROGRAM OF THE CHUPCH

In the Educational field Pine Forest Church is doing semething for its members of all ages. It has a wide awake Sunday School, which benefits especially children and the young people. The children are also given special care by tehPastor in both printed matter and in preaching. A children's Sermon is made attractive by a well made pointed story, and is written and illustrated on the inside cover of the regular Church Bulletin. (See the story and illustration of the "Storm King Bagle" on a nother page of this booklet). Both children and adults of the Church are given Biblical instruction through the Pastor's "Little Printed Preachers", a one verse Bible Study Booklet issued each month.

VACATION BIBLE CCHOCL

With the help of a Duke University student to be supplied the Goldsboro Circuit during the summer menths by The Duke Commission, the Pastor intends to put on a chain of Vacation Bible Schools over the Circuit. The policy of these schools will be the study of the Bible itself and not a lot of books about the Bible, to the SCPIPT RES themselves. The Epworth League is doing a fine type of work in this great field of Peligious Education. The Pine Forest Chapter is following the League programs with a great deal of interest.

EVANGELISTIC FEATURES

A prayer meeting is held at the Rosewood School House every rednesday night; this prayer meeting is interdenominational and is run by the young people of the community. A two-weeks revival is conducted during the summer of early Fall of each year.

SOCIAL ACTIVITIES

The Eoworth League holds a social of some kind at least every two months, and special days are celebrated with social gatherings. Then the Wayne County League Union has socials every quarter, and the Pine Forest Kembers attend. Plays at the school house have been very attractive; the well set stage with adequate fixtures gives stimulus to all organizations to put on plays, and there have been very attractive plays given by the women of the Church, grades of the school, school faculty, and young people of the community.

AGEANTS

On Easter Sunday a very impressive pageant was given in the Church by the Sunday School Class of Mr. R. R. Johnson. The class of boys and girls put on the pageant called "HIS MI ISTERING ANGELS". The costuming and coaching of the play was well worked out and the audience was thrilled with the vivid and impressive manner in which the scenes of the resurrection of our Lord were brought to mind. The Primary Class also took part in the Easter Program and set before the adults the realness of Feligion as a little child sees and believes it to be.

The pageant idea is to be used more and more as the people see the value of teaching the child by giving him something he can do and will delight in doing. For, after all, child or adult, we are all actors on the stage of life.

SOMETHING WEN UNDER THE SUN

We have seen Country Churches with broken window-panes, leaky roofs, unswept floors with neglect written all over what looked more like a shelter for goats than a place for the worship of Almighty God. Who in by-gone-days had his people build a temple of tapestries and gold. But who has seen a country congregation supplied with bulletins which give the order of service and announcements just like a big city church?

Yet that very thing is being done on the Goldsboro Circuit where Rev. R. E. Brown is the Paster ------

THE BULLWIINS. (Quoting from the Advocate)

These Church Bulletins to give added interest and instructions are illustrated with pen sketches. For instance, the Bulletin for March 22, 1925, has a pen sketch of the old Fine Perest Church and under the picture of the little rectangular meeting house was written "Our strength in ages past." On another page of the same bulletin was a sketch of the new Fine Forest Church built this year (1925). This new Church with steeple, Sunday School rooms and up-to-date appearance has inscribed underneath "Our hope for years to come." Truly, the day of the country church is now at hand.

LET ODS USED TO PROMOTE BIBLE STUDY

300 copies of a home-made thirty page chapter study have been circulated. The chapter study was made with the idea of showing how to approch and study any chapter in the Bible. The first chapter of Mark was used as a sample, and the little book, well illustrated and called "Near-bout or Straightway" was, in style and make up, similar to this hand book. It was the purpose of the writer to stimulate a keener OBSERVATION, or truer INTERPRETATION and a personal APPLICATION among the Bible readers of the Goldsboro Circuit.

"In simple trust like theirs who heard,
Beside the Syrian Sea,
The gracious calling of the Lord,
Let us, like them, without a word
Pise up and follow thee". (Chittier)

THE ONE VERSE BIBLE STUDY

From the chapter study there has been a more detailed study known as the "One Perse Bible Study" used at the Frayer Meeting on the Fircuit. The verse is presented in a little twelve or sixteen page pamphlet with twenty-five or thirty questions on the one verse and dotted lines for the answers. Every Prayer Meeting attendant gets one of the little pamphlets, and with the pencil he has brought or provided by the Chu ch, the answers are written in as the questions are discussed. The questions are simple so the children will be able to take part. It is common for 25 or 30 girls and boys to attend the Prayer Feetings and keep up with the adults in the study. They take something away from the Prayer Meeting if it is nothing more than the little wible verse.

SPECIAL DAY LETTERS

Thanksgiving, Christmas, Easter, Fevivals, Cuarterly Conferences, Church Conferences, All-Day Meetings, Socials, Home-Comings, Vacation Letters, Personal, Special Claims, Missions, Or hanage, Puilding, Bible Study Letters, Charts and League Union Programs. Since March 10th, 1925, twenty-two thousand printed sheets have been circulated on the Circuit.

OVE FOR CLUB

One of the plans for raising money for the Church was the organization of a CNE RO' CLUB. Every member of the plub planted one row of field produce. A great variety of things were marketed, but the largest gift was from the sale of the one rows of cotton. Over a thousand pounds of lint cotton was sold. (Two big bales of fair and middlin cotton). Wr. A. H. Veazy, Agricultural Instructor at the Posewood High School was elected President of the ONE POW CLUB.

SIGN DOAPDS

Attractive sign boards are being placed at all important road crossings in the community directing people to Pine Forest Church. A large well-painted board has been placed on the Church grounds giving the name of the Church and the time of services.

ENUIPMENT NEEDED

The following equipment is lacking. A Delco Light Plant; two teachers tables with suitable charis for adult classes, two black boards, pulpit furniture, a NEW HIBLE for the pulpit, COMMUNION Set, Communion Table with suitable linen covers, two more class rooms, tables and chairs for Primary Room.

A Jodern Heating System is needed very much.

THINGS BEI'G DONE NOW

Inside painting, finishing off two class rooms, building choir platform, getting chairs for the little folks, new carpet and a great deal of outside work is being done to beautify the church grounds.

THE CHUTCH RULLDING

Pine Fore t Church has a main auditorium, two large Sunday School rooms, and two small Sunday School rooms yet to be completed. The auditorium is 32 % 7½ feet and has a seating capacity of 300. It is used for all general meetings, for Doworth League, and for part of the Sunday School Classes. The equipment of the auditorium consists of well constructed church benches, one large stove, a piano, chairs for the choir, the pulpit platform and desk.

The North and South wings of the Church Building form two large class rooms, each 21 % 32 feet, and each have a seating capacity of 100. These two rooms are built with rolling doors so that they can be used in connection with the auditorium, giving the Church a total seating capacity of 500. The equipment of these rooms consists of church benches, stoves, black-boards and an organ. They are used for Sunday School Classes and the meetings of the Gomen's Societies.

THE CHURCH LOT

The Church Lot cover one acre of land. It has suitable shrubbery and flowers planted in an artistic manner and the walks are well laid out. On one side of the thurch there is a long table to be used for picnic dinners. There is a pump on the lot. A low fence separates the thurch Lawn from the parking space. The lot is valued at \$200.00, the church building at \$7,000.00 and there is \$\alpha_000.00\$ insurance.

REMERBERING

hen most of the congregation walked to Sunday School and Church. A few, who lived a little far, came by horse and buggy.

Then we only had a Thurch Service once each month on Fourth Sundays.

Then there was no intermission between funday School and Church.

After Classes the Secretary read the surfay School Second for the Day. The
School closed with a song which served as the opening hymn for Church.

when at the beginning of each year twelve ladies from the Congregation volunteered to invite the reacher to their home for dinner after each fourth Sunday Service.

when there was no Church Service after -unday School the members were in no hurry to go home. They usually visited for awhile outside when the weather permitted.

when there was a home made fence around the Church Yard and benches to sit on. There was also a permanent picnic table.

then all the source of getting water was a pitcher oump.

hen there was a big beautiful agnolia Tree that stood in front of the Church door.

then we would have visiting preachers who would have a one night service at the Church.

hen our Epworth League group would meet with other Leagues on the ir-

Then a group of Epworth League members went on a hay-ride to Seven Springs and a thunder storm overtook them. They came home almost drowned.

Then we sang "To The Work" real often. This was a favorite of Uncle John Mitchell's, our Junuar School Superintendent.

PINE FOREST CHUPCH HAS DEDICATION CEPETONIES

October 23, 1927

Hundreds Present Fore Sermon by Sev. Wr. Jones Former Pastor

Fine Forest Church, one of the whurches of the progressive Goldsboro Wethodist Circuit, experienced the greatest days in its history when it had dedicated Sunday MORMENG: b. Pev. Charles A. Jones, now Pastor of the Eccking-ham Circuit, and former Pastor of Pine Forest. Bev. R. A. Brown, Pastor of the Church was in charge of the day's program, which was attended by more than 400 people from all Churches on the Goldsboro Circuit and from many points in the County.

A packed house was delighted with the message which Rev. Jones brought, and information pertinent to the day completed the Program.

Special music was arranged by P. R. Johnson and a History of the building was given by V. N. Bass.

Simeon Brown, age 74 and clost member of the hurch was read out for honors. The twins of Mr. and Mrs. V. N. Bass, Walton and Milton, were honored as the youngest members. They are seven.

In memory of John M. Mitchell, an early member of the Church who did much for it, a tablet was unveiled by Rev. R. E. Brown, the Pastor. Mrs. J. M. Mitchell, widow of the man whose memory was honored, was honorary hostess of Sunday's Program.

An elaborate dinner was served at noon and here was introduced a new style "picnic" lunch, Mr. Brown designing a "Cafeteria" style which saw hundreds served with piles of fried chicken and accessories in short order.

Pine Forest has won south-wide attention to itself for the up and doing fashion which it has carried out its functions.

The "Adult Student" of the Methodist Sunday School South has a long story of the Church and a picture of it and of Mr. Brown in its current issue. The story says in part:

In working in the rural field nothing seems to appeal to the farmer quite as much as "common sense", and there have been several good old commonsense principles applied to certain problems. The first we mention is that of using what you have. Pine Forest, North Carolina Built a new Church by using what she had in the way of trees and mills and horses and log trucks and time; for if a man did not have money, he had time, and was put to work on the building. To see trees, under one's very eyes, converted into a house in which to worehip has given great hope and inspiration to the Pastor of the Goldsboro Circuit. Truly these trees may be called "tress of righteousness" (Isa. 61:31). In a few weeks ! time trees were felled, logs were hauled and sawed into lumber. The building project was the finest example of community cooperation we have ever known. Trees, teams, men, sawmill, lumber, even bricks were all cheerfully given; then in addition on the same men gave their time to put up the building. By using what we had, we now boast of a home-grown, home sawed, home made wonderful new house dedicated entirely to His Name, that he may be glorified.

Aid from The Duke Fund. After we had reached the end of our own giving, we felt ready to ask for outside help, and with one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) already given by the Duke Commission, and the promise of half thousand more (\$500.00) we have cleared the Church from debt and are now in line to be chosen as one of the rural demonstration points in the North Carolina Conference.

Pine Forest has had two ordained Methodist Ministers. They are Walton Needham Bass, son of Mr. and Mrs. V. Needham Bass, and Graham Nickens, who is married to the former Inez Sasser of this Community.

WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

During the late 1930's the Missionary Society changed its name to read "Woman's Society of Christian Service". This title was kept until 1969 when it was changed to "United Methodist Women". Since 1925 the members of this Society have been most active in both home and foreign missions, as well as service in the Church. It has been an act of theirs to give life memberships to an adult, a youth and a baby since the early days of the Organization. They have sponsored many fund raising projects for use in the Church. It is a project that all ages in the Church can participate in. With good weather and good crowds, the sale usually passes the \$2,000.00 mark.

At the Official Board Meeting in September 1973, it was decided not to have a Harvest Sale and Supper. They voted to have a Harvest Sunday on September 16th at which time each person was asked to make a contribution to be used on the Building Fund. The contributions were taken to the alter as each one went to participate in the Communion Service. A total of \$4,407.22 was given on that Sunday or in a few days later by persons not present for the service.

JOHN DALLIE HINES

"Mr. Dallie", 95 years old at his death was a prominent farmer of the Rosewood Community. He was born April 4, 1873 and died November 1, 1968. Quoting Mr. Henry Belk, "J. Dallie Hines of Rosewood was a remarkable man in more ways than one. For one thing he was in his 95th year when he died, and his mind was as clear as a bell close to the end. His humor lightened his way and the way of those around him. Two main interests of Mr. Hines was education and the Church. He served for years on the Rosewood School Committee and on the Wayne County Board of Education. "Mr. Dallie" as he was known throughout Wayne County, had served as President of the non-denominational Sunday School Association".

CHILDREN'S DAY

Children's Day along with the trip to Egypt, was always a big day
for the folks at Pine Forest, especially the children. Every child in Sunday School had a part on the program. The day was usually around the first
Sunday in June. Preparations were started four or five weeks in advance,
with practices on every Saturday afternoon. We usually went out to the School
Building for these practices, as it was closer to reach for most of the
children.

The program usually lasted all day, with each child having a recitation to say and songs to sing as a group. One highlight of the program was a pantomine of one of our most beautiful hymns. The girls who did this were dressed in long white robes. They were trained by Mrs. Ada Coor Gurley.

After the morning session was finished, everyone gathered around big tubs of lemonade and a table full of good food. Those responsible for the lemonade were Ed Brown, Robert Brown, Leroy Bass, Asa Bass and Edward Langston.

We know we shall not remember everyone who should have credit for working with the children for this occasion, but we would like to name a few who should have recognition for working so faithfully. Some of them are John M. Mitchell, Mrs. Minnie Mitchell, Mrs. Ada Coor Gurley, Mrs. Mallie E. Thompson and Mrs. Fannie J. Hines.

SUNDAY SCHOOL CLASSES

During the early years of the Sunday School, the men's class was called the Philathea Class. The Ladies Class was known as the "Barraca's." The name of the Barraca Class was changed in 1934 to be called the Helen Davis Class, named in memory of the beloved teacher, Helen Jenks Davis. Mrs. Davis had been teacher of this Class for around seven years to her death on Sunday August 12, 1934. She died of a heart attack on her way home to visit her parents in Fairfield, Iowa. Mrs. Davis was not only a great asset and inspiration to her Sunday School and Church, but to the entire welfare of the School and Community. She was constantly reaching out to those people around her who had a need to help in any way she could. Her death was an untimely loss to both her Church and Community.

IN MEMORIUM

Mrs. Helen Jenks Davis, 34 years of age, wife of Charles B. Davis, Goldsboro, North Carolina, Route #1, on Sunday August 12, 1934, heard and responded to the invitation of her Lord and Master to come up higher. Since her marriage April 20th, 1926, she had been a loyal member of both the Sunday School and Missionary Society. She attended and supported faithfully her Church at Pine Forest. Through her services with the Welfare Department, she proved herself a true and loving friend to the poor and the unfortunate.

Through her years of service, she was held in highest esteem by her co-workers. She was a noble, consecrated Christian. Her deeds of kindness and her happy personality endeared her to all those around her. She was a devoted wife, a loving mother, faithful in every detail of her daily life. She will be missed by the whole of Wayne County.

Therefore, it is with feelings mingled with sadness and joy that we write this memorial. Sad because we shall miss her, but rejoicing in the hope of her eternal gain.

We pray that her spirit may ever abide with her friends and inspire them to live nobler lives in Christ. We commed her loved ones to His tender care.

THE PINE FOREST EPWORTH LEAGUE

The Epworth League is a great factor in keeping the doors of a rural Church open every Sunday evening. In a Community where there is only one preaching night per month, the young people drift to other places keeping open house unless the Church keeps her doors open every Sunday evening.

The Pine Forest League was orgainized about five years ago by the Leaguers from Daniel's Chapel, a very active League of the Gold-sboro Circuit. The Pine Forest League is doing a great work among the youth of the Community in a very unselfish manner, is giving song services and holding prayer meetings for the aged, the sick and shutins.

There are 19 active members of the League and 25 honorary members.

Ther isawell organized Epworth League Council doing everything to hold up the slogan of the League "All for Christ".

PARSONAGE

It was a vision of Rev. R. E. Brown as early as 1925 that Pine Forest have a full time Pastor. That vision did not come into reality until 1952 when the congregation of Pine Forest voted to leave the Methodist Charge and obtain a full time Pastor.

In order to have a Pastor full time, we had to build a Parsonage.

Mr. and Mrs. Resease Johnson donated a plot of land to build it on. Again as in the past, all the men and boys of the Church began to donate, both time and labor, for the building. With the labor donated, the Parsonage was built at a cost of \$15,000. The furnishing inside is valued at \$2,500.

In 1970 Mrs. Beulah Johnson gave an additional 8' of land to enlarge the lot, and a new fence was installed. Rev. Wade Goldston was the first full time Pastor for Pine Forest. He and his family moved into the new Parsonage at its completion in 1952.

FIRST: I will and desire that my body have a decent burial as per wishes of my loved ones, and that in due time a stone be erected in accordance to the wishes of my beloved wife to mark the resting place of my body. SECOND: That my executor hereinafter appointed shall pay my just debts. THIRD: I give, devise and bequeath unto my beloved wife Minnie O. Mit chell all of my estate consisting of land, personal property, bonds, stocks, and money on hand or in Bank at time of my death, to be used and enjoyed by her during her life time, and after her death the residue of my Estate, I will and devise and bequeath unto the Trustees and Stewards of Pine Forest Methodist Episcopal Church South and their successors in office, all of the residue of my estate consisting of my home place, in fee simple, and also give and bequeath to said Trustees and Stewards and their successors, all of the personal property that my beloved wife Minnie O. Mitchell shall leave or have at the time of her death, in trust that they shall use the net proceeds as follows: ten percent each year to go towards a building fund, said fund to be used for erecting, equiping or repairing of a Sunday School room or rooms, and the balance of said annual income to be used by the Trustees and Stewards of the Church to increase the size of the financial budget of Pine Forest Church, said budget to be used to pay Pastor's salary, church expenses and mission objects of the Church. It's my will and desire that this annual income derived from my estate is not to lessen the annual contributions of the membership of the Church and Sunday School, but rather to enlarge the

financial budget, in order that a larger, greater and more useful work may be accomplished by the Church and Sunday School.

FOURTH: If for any cause Pine Forest Church should ever cease to exist as a Methodist Episcopal Church, then it is my will and desire, and I so direct that the property then existing be sold by the then existing Trustees, and proceeds be turned over to the Methodist Episcopal Conference of Eastern North Carolina, in fee to their only use and behoof.

FIFTH: I do hereby nominate and appoint my trusted friend J. D. Hines the executor of this my Last Will and Testament, to execute the same to all intents and purposes.

In Testimony Whereof, I have this 24th day of February 1922 set my hand and seal.

PINE FOREST DEDICATED EDUCATION BUILDING

FEBRUARY 11, 1962 IN MEMORY OF JOHN M. MITCHELL

A man who gave his life - and his estate - to the Church he loved will be honored tomorrow at services dedicating the Educational Building of Pine Forest Methodist Church.

The two-story brick structure will be dedicated to the memory of John M. Mitchell in ceremonies beginning at 2:00 P. M. and featuring an address by Bishop Paul Garber of Richmond, Virginia.

Mr. Mitchell, farmer, churchman and legislator, who died in 1922, made possible the burning of the mortgage tomorrow for a building which was not even a dream during his lifetime.

He specified in his will that his 70 acre farm in Fork Township would, at the death of his wife, go to Pine Forest Methodist Church. They had no children.

In 1956 Mrs. Minnie Bass Mitchell died and Pine Forest Church, in the midst of a campaign to build the Educational Building, inherited the farm.

The building cost \$74,000. A finance committee was able to raise more than half that amount from among friends and membership of the Church.

With the question of what to do with the farm left to the church by Mr. Mitchell, members decided that he would have liked nothing better than to see it go for paying off the debt from the New Educational $^{\rm B}$ uilding.

A grand nephew who is following in Mr. Mitchell's footsteps in the Church and in the North Carolina General Assembly, Rep. Roland C. Braswell, is Chairman of the Finance Committee which tomorrow will present the new building to the Bishop for dedication.

During the afternoon ceremonies, a plaque will be unveiled. The inscription will read:

"The John M. Mitchell Building. This building is dedicated to the memory of John M. Mitchell whose life was a living witness to his Church, his Community and his Lord. Born 1869, died 1922".

Among the oldsters in the Rosewood Community, John Mitchell is remembered for many things:

The time, despite suffering from a stroke, he rode the train to Raliegh to plead for the sale of bonds to build what is now Rosewood School. The times he promoted the first community fairs. His leadership in his Church and Community. And perhaps the day the children of Resewood sat on the floor all around the Church and up near the alter and listened tearfully as they held funeral services for Mr. Mitchell, their Sunday School Superintendent.

And to all of Wayne County, the big brick structure to be known as the John M. Mitchell Memorial Building, will be a reminder through the years of a man who was still contributing greatly to his church - 40 years after he was buried in the family cemetery in Fork Township.

WHEREAS on March 8th, 1922 Almighty God in His infinite wisdom saw fit to call from among us our beloved uperintendent John M. Mitchell to that glorious, celéstial home about where mortality shall put on immorality.

BE IT RESOLVED:

First, that Pine Forest Sunday School bear testimony to our sense of loss in the death of our most noble and worthy superintendent,

Second, that we feel very keenly our loss and will miss him from our Sunday School, but realizing that he has been called from on high to a nobler service in "that house not made with hands eternal in the heavens", we bow in humble submission to the Divine will of Him who doeth all things well.

Third, that we extend to his bereaved widow and other relatives our sincere sympathy and commend them to Him who alone can comfort in sorrow and who is an ever-present blessing to all who believe in and serve Him.

Fourth, that a copy of these resolutions be sent to his widow, a copy to each of the Goldsboro Papers, and the North Carolina Christian Advocate for publication, and a copy be entered on the Sunday School record.

After many months of study and planning, hundreds of miles of travel throughout the country and adjoining counties inspecting all the Churches around for ideas and information, the Pine Forest Church family met on Sunday Night January 8, 1967 and voted to begin the renovation of our Sanctuary.

On Tuesday Night January 10, 1967, a group of our men and women met at the Church, and under the direction of Mr. Lewis Dillman our Pastor, moved the furniture from the old Sanctuary into the Educational Building and a temporary worship center was set up.

Mr. Conrad Wessell was employed by the $^{\rm C}$ hurch to draw up the plans for the renovation program and was retained as Architect Inspector to see that all was right and up to standard procedure.

The Trustees of the Church were appointed to act as the Building Committee, with Merl McClenny as Chairman, P. M. Gurley, Jimmy Thompson, Mrs. Mallie hompson, Mr. Leslie Jordan, Stanton Perkins, Brinkley Taylor serving on this Committee. Bids for the overall construction were left to Borden Howell Construction Company, Wayne Electric Company and J. H. Askins, Plumbing and Heating. The overall cost of the building, and furnishings would be around \$70,000.

The basic Church foundation was good and we wanted to keep our Old Engrish Style construction, so we started from that with the new construction. The old hurch had a balcony, that was removed and the two small Sunday School rooms under the balcony were taken out to make it all in one big room. The Choir loft at the back of the chancel area was removed and the two little windows on each side taken out, and was replaced by a large Memorial Window about 12 feet wide and 14 feet high. There was about 48 square feet added in this area to give a bay window effect. The old rolling doors which separated the Sunday School Class Rooms on each side from the Sanctuary were removed and permanent walls installed. The chancel area in the old Church was cased off with a decorative picket casing with a hand cut star in the center. This casing was put in the old Church by a former deceased member W. R. Gurley.and it was carefully removed and cut in small pieces and given to the members as souvenirs by the Trustees. The star was given to his Sister Mrs. Louise Gurley Sutton. The altar rail and post were done likewise.

The front of the old Church was removed and the new Northex added with an upstairs to provide a place for the heating and air conditioning utilities. The new steeple rests on this addition.

The high ceiling in our old Sanctuary was solid and in good condition and gave a good acoustic so it was left as it was. We also decided to keep the wainscoating along the walls for a touch of the old hurch, along with the new look. The old plastered walls were removed so that the walls could be insulated and were replaced with sheet-rock walls.

The floors were leveled and reinforced to prepare a smooth surface for the finished floor. The long, narrow windows were also retained to keep the original Old English structural design with shutters on the outside to enhance their depth. Our first plans were to replace the old window units with a frosted glass or a light tinted glass with screens. As the building progressed, some of our members expressed a desire to purchase memorial windows for the new Sanctuary instead of following the original plans. This we did, and in so doing, we saved enough from the cost of scree-

ning to have the sound boxes for the organ recessed in the walls on each side of the Choir Lofts to give a better tone to our music.

The outside of the Church was brick veneered, a small porch on the north east corner was removed and the door opening sealed off. The old Sunday School room on the north west corner of the hurch was turned into the Pastor's Study with an outside entrance at the back. The adjoining room at the front is still being used as a Sunday School Room for the older adults. Both of these rooms wer redecorated in a light Sandalwood with Fiberglass Drapes and cornices at the windows.

While the outside construction was going on, we began to think about the inside work, and so a "ug "ommittee was appointed and a Furnishing Committee. Those on the Rug Committee were Mrs. Helen Gurley, Chairman, Mrs. Mary Neal Becton, Mrs. Billy Smith, Mrs. Lehman Smith, Mrs. Raymond Mitchell, and Mrs. W. W. Sutton. The duties of this Committee was to select a suitable color for the carpet with the tinyl tile to coordinate. They also had to have a clolor that would blend in tastefully with the furnishings. Our ladies selected a soft aqua green carpet with a flocked vinyl tile to match.

The cost of the carpet for the Sanctuary was \$1800.00 and was paid for by the Woman's Society of Thristian Service members. These ladies, over a short period of time, earned the money for the carpet by serving suppers to numerous Civic and Church groups, and preparing drired tobacco for the market for a number of farmers in our area.

The Furnishings Committee appointed was Mrs. Ralph Gurley, Chairman, P. M. Gurley, Mrs. Ernest Grantham, Mrs. Roland Braswell, Mrs. Lyda Grantham, Mrs. Jason Pate, and Mrs. P. M. Thompson. They selected a light pecan finish for the furnishing and decided that they could get the better selections in the furnishings and the best prices by placing their order with Mr. Ed Worley, who represented Page Church Furniture Company. The overall cost of the Furnishings was \$7,363.37.

The interior of the Sanctuary was painted, ceilings and woodwork white, walls a sea mist green. The kneeling pads around the altar are made of aqua velvet and the repository in the Northex is lined 'with same shade of velvet.

The electrical work was done by Wayne Electric Company with our own Jason Pate as owner. The fixtures in the Sanctuary are lamps of antique gold on steel with eleven small lamps and one large lamp in each globe. There are six of these in the ceiling with three smaller ones in the Northex. Over the Choir Lofts are three Presco-Lites recessed to give a diffused light for the choirs and over the altar and in front of the Memorial Window are three recessed lights to illuminate the cross in the window. There are two Airtholier-Lites at the front entrance. The approximate cost of these fixtures was \$2,664.30. The Sanctuary is electrically heated and air-conditoned.

The drapes for the windows in the Pastor's Study and the Northex, also the cornices, were made and given to the Church by several of our members. The renovation was completed and the building accepted by June 24, 1967. On this day Joyce Williams, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Leslie Williams was married in our beautiful new Sanctuary. Church services were conducted in the new Sanctuary on Lunday June 25, 1967. Sub. by Mrs. P.M. Gurley

PINE FOREST METHODIST MEN'S CLUB

The Pine Forest Methodist Men's Club began at Pine Forest about 1955. Roland Braswell was elected President. The Charter was requested and 18 men became members. Rev. Alton Lancaster was Pastor at the time.

The Club functioned and among highly noteworthy projects was the accomplishment of planting shrubbery around the Educational Building and installation of a Gas Pange in the Kitchen. Mr. W. W. Sutton donated this Range.

Dues were paid in a regular fashion and the men found ways to turn all receints back into the Church.

In 1966 attendance dropped to a point low enough that the Club became disorganized and was discontinued.

The fellowship of a Methodist Men's Group was reorganized in January of 1968 with Charlie Neal as President and David Smith as Secretary-Treasurer.

Surrounding Community Methoidst Churches which had active Methodist Men's Clubs sent delegates to advise and assist in reorganization. The group now benefitting from the mistakes of many became very active and very well organized.

About 1969-1970 when the whole hurch structure was reorganized, the group became the United Methodist Men.

The group agreed that financing need reconstructing so a \$20.00 a year membership was established.

From the beginning Methodist Men's Club to the present, the group always begins each meeting with a hearty fellowship supper. It is sometimes catered; such times as on Ladies Night when wives and girl friends come with the man, and on family night when the program can benefit the whole family.

One of the most outstanding family night meetings was held in 1970. A growing and close-to-home problem of illicit drug usage prompted the men to have an expert come and talk to the family night meeting. Attemdance was the largest in Pine Forest Methodist Men's Meeting History. The response was wonderful. The meeting proved to be of benefit throughout the year and continues to have been helpful even unto the writing of this resume.

This year 1971, sees the Methodist Men at Pine Forest not so great in number (22) but strongly knit and very active. We are considering building a shelter on to the back of the John Mitchell Memorial Educational Building. We actively support a building fund boosters fellowship. We have installed yard lights on the south west corner of the Educational Building to try to inspire more usage of Church Property at night.

Lay workers, also Methodist Men, and members of the Administrative Board are leading the entire township in a township wide revival to be sponsored and housed at Pine Forest. It is the goal of the men and the

Church to draw the whole community into a united body of Christs' disciples, no matter what their Protestant Faith.
