

Vignette

In the passage of a hundred years a few men stand tall because they stepped forth to meet the needs of their time. Shiloh has her list and in our day we especially remember a beloved superintendent, Mr. Jimmy Grant. This courtly gentleman arrived at the church early to make the fire so the sanctuary would be comfortable when the small congregation met to worship. Then he swept the floor, although this might have been considered "a woman's" work in his time. During the depression years when the members could not meet their conference obligations, Mr. Jimmy paid the difference from his own pocket. In our hearts we pay homage to him and the service he rendered.

Not only did Mr. William Grant furnish the land for the Shiloh Church at a give-away price, it fell his lot to provide hospitality for visiting ministers. Often the cooking was done out of doors. So it was on a particular morning. The breakfast was prepared and waiting for the family and ministers to arise from their knees after prayer. Alas, disaster! While all eyes were closed, a chicken had eaten the hoe cake.

The serpent brought temptation into the Garden of Eden; and likewise into the sanctuary of the Shiloh Church during the rendering of the Easter Cantata. The lights were i cused on the choir arranged across the pulpit, their voices raised in song. Mrs. Brown, the pastor's wife and pianist, was giving full attention to her performance on the inatrument. But top billing must go to the snake which entered a window in the back of the pulpit and shilthered along the floor. The eyes of the spectators were focused on this villain. Mr. Grady Roughton arose from the audience, grasped the snake by the head with his bare hand and returned him into the night. Many cantatas have been a part of Shiloh's history but only one had a snake to participate.

It is to some beginnings and to some of those men-sent from God who strengthened and continued the beginnings-that we turn our thoughts today.

Song No. 1 - Page A of Songs

Of major importance is William Grant. Let us pause to honor his memory. In 1880, from his land holdings, he presented the site for Shiloh Church. This deed was recorded May 3, 1880 in the names of J.A. Squire, J.W. Grant, and N. Grant. The trustees paid him one dollar for this transaction.

Song No. 2 - Page A

It was this same Rev. William Grant who delivered the first sermon in the church.

Song No. 3 - Page A

Let us bear in mind on this day of memories that a church is not a building but a community of faith with the commission from Christ to go into all the world to preach the gospel and to baptize in his name. Sometimes we set our sights too far. We fail to see the need that is close at hand. In 1893, when Shiloh had just become a teenager, her pastor, the Rev. J.R. Tillery began preaching services in a tobacco barn in what is now Roanoke Rapids. God blessed his efforts and today First Methodist on Ronoke Avenue is the result.

Song No. 4 - Page B

Growth requires organization and labor. From the beginning, the Sunday School has been a co-labor with the church. We honor her superintendents and her teachers. On March 6, 1945 cards went out from Re. J.E. Garlington to the women inviting them to attend an organizational meeting of the Woman's Society of Christian Service on March 13 at 7:30. Under Rev. Stephenson the Junior Youth Fellowship was organized. No doubt there were earlier organizations but the work has been continuous since those times with maybe a small lapse. The youth have made many contributions to the church including the Bible on the pulpit and hearing aids on the back of the first pews for the use of those with impaired hearing. Visits to shutins and caroling have made their ministry very meaningful, both to themselves and the history of our church.

Song No. 5 - Page B

We hallow the memory of all who have passed this way and whose services to this church have ended in order to assume their place in Heaven. We make special mention of Ralph Baird, a layman, and Rev. Stephenson who sent to their reward within the year 1963-64 while serving Shiloh Church. Song No. 6 - Page C

In 1925 the original Shiloh was remodeled. In 1950 a parsonage was built and in 1953 a fellowship Hall. These last two are still in use today. Plans were being made for a new sanctuary when a fire in December 1971 necessitated a new building. Volunteers from the membership moved the old building to the side to make room for the new structure. The old church continued to be used. To say the least, ventilation was adequate for the worshipers during the months of construction. Insurance, Duke Endowment, The United Methodist Conference, The Ten Dollar Club and friends of the church made it possible for the new work to go speedily forward.

Dr. Nicholar Grant, the great grandson of the founder of the original Shiloh, preached the first sermon in our new sanctuary on December 2, 1973. In 1976 the church was dedicated and the mortgage was burned.

Song No. 7

In 1967 a new approach was engendered for the youth of the church: Bobby Colston and Danny Copeland initiated Shiloh unto the Chruch Softball League. The team first played in yellow jerseys, then in blue jerseys with <u>Shiloh</u> printed across the front. New, complete uniforms contributed by friends created a problem at first: the players were afraid they would soil them. Many trophies testify to their good performance in the league but there is no measuring stick by which to judge the value of being a part of the team in Christian athletics.

Song No. 8 - Page D

Today, we too join the team of Christians who have lived the history of Shiloh Church. Through her doors walked Dr. Nicholas Grant, Danny Allen, John Wood and Saunders Claiborne to be ministers of the gospel. In our hands is the responsibility to carry on the mission of our church as coworkers with God.
