

## History of The Vanceboro United Methodist Church

Located on Farm Life Avenue in the Town of Vanceboro; Founded in 1878 according to local church records; Earliest deed November 11, 1886, Book, 94, Page 575. In the middle of the nineteenth century, there stood on the west side of what is now the Greenville Highway, a meeting house known as the Post Oak Church. Ministers of all denominations traveling on horseback, and sometimes on foot, would stop and preach there. Here the seeds of Methodism were planted. These seeds were cultivated and nourished by the many Methodist Camp meetings held in this area in the 1880's.

The Vanceboro Church must have been started by an itinerant preacher, as few records can be found dating back to this time. There is record of a William Wine serving Swift Creek on the Lenior Circuit in 1878 and Daniel Reid serving the Vanceboro Circuit, Washington District in 1888. In 1886 a deed was given for a described plot of land, situated on the west side of the Greenville Highway. On this plot was built a church, and later a parsonage was built just back of the church.

Instrumental in the beginning of the church school and it's growth was Mrs. Sallie Lane Smith, who is remembered as teacher, song leader and Superintendent.

In the beginning there was no musical instrument in the church so she raised the tunes for the hymns. One resident recalls that once on a Sunday morning when the minister announced what the closing hymn would be, she could not remember the tune. Taking her baby on her arm, she left the church, walked to the home of Mr. Web Smith (1/4 mile away) played the hymn on the organ, walked back to the church, ready to raise the tune when the sermon was over.

About 1906, on a plot of land opposite the Elementary School, and given by W. C. White, a parsonage was built. This served until 1958, when a new eight room parsonage, complete with central heat, was built on the same site.

Both the church school and church services were moved to the Elementary School Building in 1912, out of respect for the age of the minister, Rev. T. E. Wyche. In 1916 the church was torn down, moved and rebuilt on the present site. The church school continued to meet at the school because of lack of class rooms at the church. Members of many denominations attended this thriving Community Church School.

On Sunday, October 6th, 1935, with 56 present, the Methodists organized their own church school and elected Paul Dixon, superintendent. The need for classrooms was felt so keenly, that on the next Sunday the first money was collected toward a building fund. Rev. William Crowder made plans for a building fund drive. In the spring of 1951 under the leadership of Rev. A. P. Hill, Jr. committees were elected and instucted to study the needs of the church and present plans for construction. The plan that was approved provided for an Educational Building with Fellowship Hall, stage, dressing rooms, six classrooms, kitchen, vestibule, storage closets, and complete remodeling of the old church building for the nave. Actual construction was begun on Monday, September 11th, 1951. Much interest was shown by adult and youth groups, and many will be remembered for their generous contributions of time, money, prayers and faithful service.

The church was dedicated Sunday, November 24, 1957. For our dedicatory service we welcomed to our church Biship Paul Neff Garber, Rev. A. J. Hobbs, District Superintendent and Mrs. Hobbs, Rev. Alton P. Hill and wife, Rev. William R. Crowder and family and a host of interested friends.

For many years the Vanceboro Church was on a five point charge, having only two services each month. At the general session of the North Carolina Conference in Burlington, October 31st, 1952, the church became a station.

Through the years the progress of the chruch has been measured and strengthened by the work of its related organizations. In the early life of the church the Ladies Aid helped take care of the local needs. In 1940 a complete change in organization took place. Under the new name, Woman's Society of Christian Service, the work was broadened through study and support of missions at home and abroad. Other changes have brought the women together as United Methodist Women. Through all the years, with the many changes, the devotion and dedication of Mrs. Ada Smith remained constant. She was an inspiration to all and will continue to live in the hearts of those who knew her. The United Methodist Women began holding a Bazaar every other year in 1972 and this has blessed the church with a day of fellowship and the funds for many needs of the church and the parsonage.

The Youth Work had its beginning during the pastorate of Rev. E. C. Durham. Under his leadership the Epworth League was organized in 1921. After many years of ups and downs, it was reorganized as the Methodist Youth Fellowship, and has continued to be a vital force in the church—accepting responsibility in the local church and participating in Sub-District and District Activities. Many of the Youth have grown through their attendance at summer camps and Conference Summer Opportunities, Workshops, and the Annual Conference Session for Youth. For many years a Junior MYF met weekly for study and recreation.

A group of Young Adults met at the church September 11, 1956 and organized a Young Adult Fellowship. This group of energentic, dedicated Young Adults have filled and are now filling important places of leadership. One of the group (R. L. Cannon, Jr.) served a term as Conference President of Young Adults and two (Rev. C. T. Wilson, Rev. Bobby Smith) are now serving as ministers in the North Carolina Conference.

Rev. J. L. Peterson, Jr., who has served in the N. C. Conference as pastor, spent three years in the Congo and now teaches at Georgia State University, is a product of our congregation.

The Methodist men were organized during ministry of Rev. H. B. Jones. Among their projects was payment of our church's part of the Lake Junaluska fund.

Many additions in the way of physical improvements have been made. In 1966, an organ was added. New pews and hymnals were placed in the church in 1968. The installation of an air conditioning system in 1968 has added to the comfort. Pew Bibles were given to the church by the family and friends of Mrs. Maggie H. Good, as a memorial to her years of service. On July 4, 1971 an American Flag was given by the M.Y.F. and a Christian Flag given in memory of J. Wilfred Buck. Drapes for the Fellowship Hall and a new lighted sign in front of the church were given by the United Methodist Women. In early 1971 the Church Library was opened. The first planning session for this new facility was held in August 1970. The library now contains several hundred books and also some filmstrips.
