Co-Creation

in the beginning, God

BEGAN TO CREATE

In many translations of Genesis 1:1, the text reads something like, "In the beginning, when God created[a] the heavens and the earth." However, the first verse of the English Bible also gives us our first footnote. The word "created" is likely more accurately translated as "began to create." English majors and Hebrew scholars can let us know the verb tenses which lead to that foot-noted translation. However, the implication for changing the verb tense is that we are reminded that God's creative engagement with the heavens and the earth is not simply a past event. God is an active creator who began to create in the beginning AND continues to engage in acts of creativity in the heavens and on the earth today. The good news is that God also invites God's people to participate alongside God in these ongoing acts of creation. On our team, we name creatively participating alongside God as, "co-creation."

Many of our congregations, including our new faith communities, are actively engaged in acts of co-creation. At our best, we are able to see the world as it is, long for a world which more fully reflects God's kingdom, and then we creatively generate solutions

which might help to close the gap between these two realities ("on earth, as it is in heaven").

One way this is happening is through investment in creative communities and leaders who are striving to cocreate new places for new people to gather in communion with Jesus Christ. Sometimes this happens with the co-creation of a brand new church. Other times this happens when existing churches extend their ministries to open new doors and new access points for people to gather to experience the love of God and the love of God's people.

In this newsletter, we will be sharing two stories of passionate leaders who saw a need in their community, prayerfully sought God's wisdom and vision, and who are now experimenting with new ways to co-create new places for new people to gather in communion with Jesus Christ

Airo community

Waking up in "The City of Medicine", casual conversations with strangers in the grocery store, at school pick-up, on the bus, and while getting my oil changed often turn to "The Medical System." Listening to my neighbors illuminates the daily challenges healthcare workers face; the cost that the training & practice of medicine takes financial and personally; the barriers and challenges that everyday people face receiving timely, appropriate, and inexpensive care. I hear the exhaustion of navigating life in a body in constant search of "health" alongside a deep, often whispered question: how can we faithfully care for one another?

Centering this community is a story of healing from Mark's gospel. The Greek verb "Airo" (pronounced: "eye-Row") means "to bring, to carry." Airo is what friends do; they carry their loved-one to Jesus. Guided by the example of these friends, Airo Community gathers to carry one another in seasons of lament, hope, and healing. We intentionally

engage people doing the vocational work of healing, as well as people seeking mental and physical well-being in communion with a faithful community through Christ.

Currently, we gather in three ways: weekly gatherings of students, parishioners, and retirees in healthcare professions actively seeking repair and restoration for patient care providers; monthly & seasonal contemplative prayer services; and monthly in-person and online book discussions on faith & health.

Reimagining what health looks like both individually & communally is not unique to Durham. I invite you to experience this community. Can't make it to Durham? Come to a faith and health book club online; no reading required – just your lived experience!

The Well

One of the lessons God is continually pointing me back to is that the best things in life are always born out of friendship... friendship with God, friendship with our truest selves, and of course friendship with those we love.

That lesson has taken shape for me in a new way over the last several years. In the spring of 2021, I'd had countless conversations with church folks and

friends in which it had become clear that mental and spiritual care was a growing need with an incredibly limited number of accessible resources available. One late night that spring, I suddenly had incredible clarity around a vision for creating a practice of spiritual direction and therapy in Raleigh. Being neither a therapist nor a spiritual director at the time, I knew I would need help if this vision was meant to become a reality.

Naturally, I called my best friend - a trained therapist - and explained the vision. Elizabeth was immediately "in", and the vision for The Well Mental and Spiritual Care was born that night. Two and a half years later, this vision is taking shape in new and exciting ways in the context of the local church. In May, I graduated from the North Carolina Institute for Spiritual Direction and Formation as a trained spiritual director. And as of July, through the generous partnership of Edenton Street UMC and New Faith Communities, The Well is on its way to launching as a nonprofit practice in downtown Raleigh.

The mission of The Well is to create pathways toward healing and wholeness in the community by offering accessible and affordable mental and spiritual care. Our team of practitioners is working hard ahead of the official launch of The Well at the beginning of 2024. We hope you'll join us in praying for The Well as we seek to faithfully live out this mission in partnership with the community and with the church.
