
JULY BUILDING TEAM ARRIVAL

The only Building team of 2019 arrived from North Carolina on July 13th. The team was from WNCC, but it could be called a joint team of WNCC & NCC, as one of the team members was from NCC. After a day of rest in Yerevan accompanied with visits to the Art park

and some sightseeing in Yerevan the team left for Artsakh.

The July team was the first one to take the new road going to Artsakh through the north-eastern areas of Armenia. It was a smooth and nice ride on the newly paved road with the nice view of Lake Sevan - the largest body of water in Armenia and the Caucasus region. It is one of the larg-

in the world. The lake is situated in Gegharkunik Province, at an altitude of 1,900 m (6,234 ft) above sea level. The total surface area of its basin is about 5,000 km² (1,900 sq mi), which makes up 1/6 of Armenia's territory. The beautiful nature and the nice restaurant at Lake Sevan for having lunch made the ride enjoyable regardless of the extra 50 km (31 miles) added to the regular trip.



out of the teams' itineraries to have sightseeing while in Armenia and Artsakh, because there are many early Christian period and medieval churches and monasteries along the highway, taking just a couple of miles to visit and see. And this trip was not an exception. The team visited IV-XVII century Dadivank monastery on the way to Artsakh. one of Artsakh's greatest gems, with many buildings, rooms, passages and two levels. The monastery was founded by St. Dadi, a disciple of Thaddeus one of the twelve Apostles of Jesus who spread Christianity in Eastern Armenia during the first century AD. However, the monastery was first mentioned in the 9th century. Unfortunately, during the soviet era the local Muslim population regarded the monastery as remnant of the Armenian Christian religion and ruined the monastery as it could. In 1994 following the end of the Nagorno-Karabakh war, the monastery was reopened and in 2004, a renovation process

began. The restoration efforts restored the Cathedral, along with a chapel. In July, 2007, the grave of St. Dadi was discovered under the holy altar of the main church.

Some nice stops along with visiting the



monastery made the iourney interesting and, hopefully, enjoyable and memorable for the team members.

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RENOVATION OF THE CHILDREN'S HOME





After an orientation day the team started the renovation of the Children's Home. The excitement of the children was indescribable...

Since 1995 when the Children's Home had been launched by Project AGAPE in partnership with the local government there were some minor renovations done by different teams arrived in different years, like renovation of the kitchen, the playing room, the separate laundry house, but the Children's Home building needed a capital renovation and the building team from

North Carolina started it in July of 2019. The AGAPE staff, local plasterer-painter hired to do the work requiring special skills and the volunteers from community, most of whom were the members of those families whose houses had been renovated by Project AGAPE in different years, helped the team as much as possible. All the windows and doors were changed. The floor was replaced by a new laminate flooring. The walls were painted in order to look fresh and nice! The children at the Children's Home were excited to help the team members to accomplish their work! All the slides, swing sets were repainted at the playground. The iron fences of the balconies were painted, too. It was really a great celebration for the kids to have

a wholly renovated place to live! Their excitement was so big that it was difficult for the AGAPE staff and the volunteers not to let them move the heavy frames of old and new windows and doors. They helped as much as they could.

The Children's Home is a three-story building: the kitchen, the dining room, the playing room and the big storage area are on the first floor. The classrooms where the children do their homeworks, are on the right side of the second floor and the administrative rooms are on the left side. The bedrooms are on the third floor - boys' bedrooms are on one side and the girls' bedrooms are on the other side. The biggest challenge of the renovation work was to organize and plan it so that not to jeopardize the daily routine

of the Children's Home. The task was fulfilled well, even when the school year started in September and the renovation continued.

The team did a great work and left enough funds for not only completing the renovation of all the rooms, but also for buying mattresses for all the beds, as the old mattresses were worn out, and also for replacing the old water heaters-boilers, which also provide heating in the

winter time through heating system. With good assessment the AGAPE staff was able to buy 15 brand new bunk beds with new mattresses for the children instead of buying only new mattresses.

The atmosphere in the Children's Home was joyful and amazing: the Holy Spirit was present there, because the Holy Spirit is God's power in action. Is there an action more Godly than helping

orphaned children? The answer is up there - in the HEAVEN...

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

dance with them. It was a great day both for the team and for the kids.








was a year of great changes for the children of the Children's Home: the first change was related to the appointment of the new director Lilit Alaverdyan in February who



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AUGUST - DISTRIBUTION OF HUMANITARIAN AID









In the first half of 2019 Project AGAPE received two containers - one from North Carolina Conference in April full of 3920 Christmas Boxes which arrived just in time to continue the distribution of the Christmas Boxes in the rest of the communities of Kashatagh region., and the other from Western North Carolina Conference received in May, which contained different first necessity goods for the socially vulnerable families. Besides the Christmas Boxes there were bedding, clothing and accessories, household supplies, health and hygiene supplies, school kits, sewing supplies in the containers. The third container of 2019 was received in August and it had 2472 Christmas boxes and the rest were mainly first necessity goods that together with the similar items of the second container of 2019 were delivered to all the families of 44 northern villages of Kashatagh region. New and used clothing and accessories, bedding, new shoes, hygiene supplies, household and kitchen supplies, school supplies,, suitcases were delivered to the families.

A young lady got married (her brother was killed by an azeri sniper when serving in the army and their family was in such a condition, that everyone thought something would happen to their psychic, her mother hasn't left her house since that time...). The

AGAPE staff packed an entire dowry for her in a couple of suitcases that were in good condition - new bedding, pillows, blankets, towels, household & kitchen supplies - all new things, she told that her parents would never be able to provide her newly created family with all those things...

The sewing supplies were mostly for the kids of the Christian Education Center, but some families who earlier had applied with request to get yarn received it, and one of them later

came to AGAPE office to show the amazing, nice shoes she had knitted and crochet for newborns and toddlers: she made such beautiful shoes and bows, and she gives them as gift to other people. "A gift turned into another gift" - this is how her action can be de-

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SEPTEMBER - CHRISTIAN EDUCATION CENTER













The Christian/Children's Education Center (CEC), which was one of the important projects of 1998 continues to actively function in Berdzor. From 1998 up to now the CEC has provided opportunities for enriching the religious, cultural and educational life of the community playing a huge role in its development, providing classrooms for Christian Education and Bible teaching with accommodations for Sunday School, VBS, Music, Art, Dancing, Sport, Computer, Chess and other afterschool educational and vocational activities. For these 21 years the CEC proved to be the most efficient place for the children's, teenagers', young adults' after-school provision, and even for adults, as many of them received sustainable knowledge and skills that helped them to adapt to the constantly changing social-economic factors faster and easier. Different kind of trainings, especially the Computer and TEFL classes helped them to become more sociable, to find jobs based on skills and knowledge from the CEC. Most of the trainees were able to get jobs after those trainings. Most of the children of Berdzor and even adults learned their first computer skills at the CEC. The classes continued until the cold weather forced to stop those till the next summer. But the installment of the centralized heating system in spring of 2019 will make it possible to continue the classes in the cold weather as well. The AGAPE Board has made a decision to operate the CEC all year round starting from 2019 providing sufficient funds for that purpose. During those years the two-story building hadn't had any capital renovation, so it took a long time to complete the renovation of the building started at the end of 2017. The renovation was completed by May of 2018, after the building also received a natural gas line and a centralized heating system was built to make it possible having classes during the cold season. This

was an incentive for the Board of Directors of Project AGAPE to support the CEC with funding for having classes all year round instead of only 4-6 months in a year, when the weather was warm.



















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OCTOBER: TRIP TO NORTH CAROLINA - WNCC







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DECEMBER - PROJECTS CONTINUE



December was the month of continuing some projects, completing others and starting new ones.

One of the started and completed projects in December was the reinforcement of the Staff house balcony wall which overlooks the stairs going down to the Christian Education Center. Every day tens of children use those stairs to go to the Christian Education Center to attend different groups there. It was becoming more and more dangerous, so reinforcing it could not wait any more. It took the AGAPE staff several days in December to make concrete and using reinforcement bars make a strong wall to keep the balcony from further damage. The weather was still warm and perfect for such project, so the AGAPE staff used the favorable weather to complete this project.

Another project was providing funds to renovate the roof of the Sonasar kindergarten. The condition of the roof was awful: the wooden skeleton was in better shape, but the old asbestos cover was almost gone, so the funds provided by one of the Board members – Wanda Watts - helped to buy the metal tin and renovate the roof of the building.

We need to recall a fragment from November newsletter of 2018 for the next project, citing Allan Van Meter's words: «After lunch, we proceeded to tour the school. You will notice the wood stoves that have been placed in the classrooms now that winter is approaching. Also, there are pictures from the school children and Armenian Grammar Chart. Please look at the rooms as well. The mayor and principle asked if Project AGAPE could fund the placing of draperies in the windows, a few pieces of school furniture, a new computer, and the supplies to repair two or three the classrooms. Archdale UMC, you graciously took up an offering to help with my expenses while in Armenia. I sincerely THANK YOU from the bottom

of my heart for your generosity. I mentioned before I felt that any funds left over would be turned over to the Project to help the people in Kashatagh. I believe the funds you collected will be more than enough and I am thinking about making a donation with the unused funds for the school in Sonasar." The funds provided by Allan Van Meter and donations

from Archdale UMC added later helped to put laminate flooring in five classrooms, paint the walls, buy chairs for teachers, purchase a new set of computer and processor for the school. In December the school was provided with 4 new wood stoves bought and brought from Yerevan to heat the school in winter time.

The agricultural development project continues providing more families with cows, chickens and agricultural tools and seeds.

And, the last task in December was to get ready for distribution of the

Christmas boxes in January and the following months.


















