Janette Saavedra from Memorial UMC in Clovis, California visited Liberia, we discussed the need for high school textbooks that would prepare students for the math and science exams on the West African Senior School Certificate Examinations. Memorial UMC sent funds to buy books, but we were waiting to purchase them at a lower price. The desired *A*+ *Series* and *Aki-Ola* textbooks are on the market in Liberia for US\$35.00. We waited for a shipment from Ghana and purchased 81 books for \$10.00 to \$15.00 each. We are so thankful that United Methodist high schools that do not have any high school math and science books will receive copies of the desired books for the new school year!

In past updates, I shared about the *Liberia Reads!* project at Ganta UMS. In October, J. J. Roberts UMS teachers were trained and are now part of *Liberia Reads!* The training was a wonderful opportunity for the teachers (and me) to review the components of reading and to practice using this phonics-based, student-engaging approach for promoting literacy in Kindergarten through 3rd grade.
