



ANALYSIS

In 2023, 498 more individuals from across the North Carolina Conference were reported to engage in short-term missional service than the individuals reported in 2022 This represents a 237% increase. This is exciting news as we once again continue reaching out following the decrease in UMVIM teams and shortterm missionaries during the COVID-19 pandemic.

The 2023 short-term missionary service data was collected from UMVIM, SEJ, who receives data reports from teams who register with the Jurisdictional Office, as well as from missional partners across the globe. The 708 individuals reported here composed 45 UMVIM teams. This represents three (3) more teams than in 2022, or just over a 7% increase. While we celebrate this increase in missional service from 2022, missional service in the 2020 quadrennium was still lower than during the 2016 quadrennium. This is to be expected, giving the COVID-19 pandemic beginning in 2020 and its lasting effects on travel. Regardless, this positive increase from 2022 to 2023 is welcome news as we bolster our efforts to continue showing Christian love in action across God's world!

MAY 2023 | NC CONFERENCE MISSION TEAM TO LIBERIA

In her itineration in August 2022, the Revd. Priscilla Jaiah Legay-Gilayeneh, missionary in charge of the Ganta United Methodist Mission, shared to various churches across the NC Conference that she had a dream of building an abattoir on the Mission Farm so local pig farmers who receive their piglets from the Mission Farm can have a viable market. A part of that abattoir will be a cool room which will be constructed by the mission team. The pig farmers are purchasing materials to build the walls needed out of concrete block. The Liberians are completely in charge of the process from start to finish as they had the vision for the abattoir and are incorporating their cultural techniques throughout the building.

AUGUST 2023 | NC CONFERENCE MISSION TEAM TO LIBERIA

A secondary grant was made to a Conference mission team for their return missional journey to Liberia in August of 2023 to follow up on the work which was first started in May 2023. The team remained in close contact with the Revd. Priscilla Jaiah Legay-Gilayeneh and a co-op group of local pig farmers. While much work had taken place since the team left in May, the team returned to offer more training to create a more sanitary place for the animals to be slaughtered and for the meat to be subsequently sold to the local community.



Spotlight on Mission: Liberia

"I am not an agriculturalist, but my passion is agriculture," said Bishop Samuel J. Quire Jr. "I think the only way that this church can be empowered financially is through agriculture."

In May, Quire, the episcopal leader of the Liberia Area, dedicated a butchery plant for pig farmers in Ganta City, Nimba County. He noted that the butchery plant would empower United Methodist pig farmers in the county, as well as the entire central area of Liberia. "This butchery plant is for all Liberians in this part of our country," Quire said.

The initiative between two annual conferences — North Carolina in the United States and Liberia — allows the church in Liberia to contribute to the Liberian government's infrastructural development plans."

"While partnering with our brothers and sisters across the globe," Quire said, "empowering Liberians who are members of The United Methodist Church is the best way we can enhance the government's self-sustainability programs for its people."

Quire asserted that the church needs to use its land to empower its members financially through agriculture. He thanked the North Carolina Conference for contributing to his agricultural dream for the Liberia Episcopal Area.

"One of the things that will keep us together as United Methodists," he said, "is mission." He added that the debate about disaffiliation is not helpful for the church's growth and development.

The Rev. Bill Haddock, leader of the North Carolina Conference mission team to Liberia, expressed hope that the butchery plant would be a viable place where pig farmers bring their products for good business transactions.

He indicated that the butchery plant construction helped to fulfill his annual conference's desire to empower Liberians through pia farming.

Carolina Conference." "The North Haddock said, "wants to give United Methodists in Liberia a hand that will pull them out of poverty, not a handout that will keep them in a position of povertu." He said the butchery plant has cost \$20,000 so far and more money is needed to get it to a perfectly functioning and operating stage. He thanked United Methodists contributed and are still expected to support the project.

Priscilla Legay Jaiah-Gilayeneh, director of the Ganta Mission Station, said the butchery plant was a dream come true for both United Methodists and the people of Nimba County. She said the mission station is involved with other agriculture initiatives, based on Quire's rallying call for agriculture in 2017.



The mission station, Jaiah-Gilayeneh said, is now funding operational activities from resources generated from agricultural products. She named beekeeping, as well as palm, rubber and cattle farming, as activities from which the Ganta Mission Station and United Methodists in that part of Liberia are benefiting.

JULY 2023 | FAIRMONT UMC TO PROJECT CROSSROADS

Fairmont UMC (Raleigh) took a team of 18 missioners to Project Crossroads in Marion, Virginia. Project Crossroads serves low-income, elderly, and handicap families through their Home Rehab ministry. In 2022, Fairmont UMC participated at Project Crossroads to assist in building a deck for a family with a teenage daughter in the early stages of Multiple Sclerosis. Fairmont continued in this ministry at Project Crossroads by making repairs to ensure local homes are safe, healthy, secure, and accessible. Such rehabilitation ministries ranged from minor repairs to exterior or interior to major repairs on the home. This can be replacing a porch, roof or bathroom; or may be the building of a handicap ramp or rehabbing a bathroom for accessibility.

MAY 2023 | RALEIGH WESLEY FOUNDATION TO CENTRAL APPALACHIAN MISSIONARY CONFERENCE

The Raleigh Wesley Foundation took a team of 8 missioners to serve with Red Bird Mission in the Central Appalachian Missionary Conference in Beverly, Kentucky. The team was able to form relationships with the family they were serving as well as a Presbyterian work team from Virginia. In addition to relationship building, the team was tasked with re-shingling a portion of a roof belonging to a local family. They completed the project early and spent the remainder of their time making repairs at the Red Bird campus by staining a deck and repairing a staircase.

JULY 2023 | PLEASANT GREEN UMC TO EL SALVADOR

Pleasant Green UMC took a team of 5 missioners to Ahuachapán, El Salvador, continuing in their 15+ year partnership with Salvadoran Mission Projects (SMP). During their time serving in El Salvador, Pleasant Green served alongside local Salvadorans on various construction projects on behalf of the Evangelical Methodist Church of El Salvador. In addition to their construction outreach, Pleasant Green was able to take food parcels to families identified by the Methodist Church in the communities in which they served.

JULY 2023 | PINEHURST UMC TO EL SALVADOR

In a similar missional scope to Pleasant Green UMC, Pinehurst UMC took a team of 10 missioners, five of whom were youth, to Ahuachapán, El Salvador, strengthening their partnership with Salvadoran Mission Projects (SMP). During their time serving in El Salvador, Pinehurst served alongside local Salvadorans on various construction projects on behalf of the Evangelical Methodist Church of El Salvador. In addition to their construction outreach, Pinehurst was able to take food parcels to families identified by the Methodist Church in the communities in which they served.

APRIL 2023 | WRIGHTSVILLE UMC TO EL SALVADOR

In April 2023, Wrightsville UMC took their first mission team to El Salvador. The team consisted of 11 missioners, four of whom were youth. During this missional journey, the Wrightsville UMC team served by assisting in the painting of the El Shaddai Church exterior, constructing a water drain system for the roof of the church, and distributed food parcels within the local community. Not only did Wrightsville UMC serve with their gifts and talents, but also by forging relationships by visiting with other local Methodist churches and building relationships with Salvadoran Methodists.

JULY 2023 | WRIGHTSVILLE UMC TO EL SALVADOR

July 2023 brought about the second mission team to El Salvador from Wrightsville UMC. This team was the High School Mission Team, composed of 11 missioners, nine of whom were youth. This is the High school Summer Mission Team from Wrightsville UMC. Over the course of their time in El Salvador, the team served in three different project areas, including the construction and expansion of the Methodist School, relationship formation with the students at the Methodist School both in the classroom and in areas of recreation, and in the distribution of food parcels to families in need within the local community as identified by the Methodist Church.



SPOTLIGHT ON MISSION: EL SALVADOR

The Revd. David Haley, Associate Pastor for Visitation at Wrightsville United Methodist Church, has led 43 teams to El Salvador. What follows are several excerpts from his missional report he submitted to NCC UMVIM upon his return.

I will never forget the looks on the faces of some of our students when, during a pre-trip meeting, I let them know they would have to be at the airport no later than 3:45 AM on the morning of our departure. The good news is that flying out at 5:00 AM meant that we would be in El Salvador by midday... To their credit they all made it on time...The students ranged in age from 14-17. Our flight leaves on time, connects through Charlotte and Miami, and arrives midday in El Salvador.

Thursday, July 13

Thursday morning, I left with Bishop Juan de Dios early. We drove to the city of Metapan where the event was taking place. It turns out that a coalition of churches and organizations is embarking on a campaign to respond to the threat of deforestation by planting 400,000 trees. A couple of hundred people had gathered for the event and Vice President Felix Félix Ulloa was the honored guest at the kickoff ceremony. Following the ceremony, we met the Vice President. Then about 100 of us went out on a hillside with him and planted the first trees. I also met and had very nice conversations with the Mayor of Metapan and the Ambassador from the Dominican Republic to El Salvador.

Friday, July 14

Following breakfast, our team devotionals were led by [two of the youth]. Then we headed off to the worksite. This morning the 4 guys will go with me to deliver food while the girls will work on the worksite. We go to the La Gloria community at the bottom of a steep hill. At the La Gloria Methodist Church, Pastor Gloria and Steven, the translator, are waiting for us.

Several youth from the Wrightsville UMC 2023 team to El Salvador assist in digging the foundational pit for next phase of expansion of the Methodist School. This multi-story building is in the process of expanding to accommodate students through high school. The school is one of many ministries directed by the Iglesia Evangélica Metodista en El Salvador under the leadership of Bishop Juan de Dios Pena.

Before going out to deliver the food, Pastor Gloria shares with us about how the community was a forgotten community with no paved road access, no water, and no electricity. As the church ministry grew, more attention was given by the town to the community. And today there is paved road access, water and electricity. The little shack where the church began was replaced about 5 years ago with the nice present church building which I and a previous mission team actually helped to build.

Monday, July 17

Our last full day in El Salvador begins with breakfast and team devotions. God has called us to be on this team and has blessed us to be a blessing to others. Instead of going to the worksite this morning or going to deliver food, the team heads over to the Methodist School. Bishop Juan de Dios met with us and shared how the school was developed from an after-school program to deter kids from gang involvement. Today it is a school of approximately 550 students. He also shared the plans for future expansion.



We have been working on the foundation for the next building. He also shared the dream of starting a Methodist University on the site as well. Next, we went to the main courtyard where our students enjoyed playing games with some Salvadoran 3rd graders during their recess. The kids loved having the American teens playing with them!

The team had a variety of experiences and adventures. We certainly learned a lot about the history and culture of El Salvador. Through team devotions, a church service, and sharing Holy Communion we were challenged to grow spiritually. Through our food project we ministered to human need. Through our interaction with the school kids the team was building bridges of understanding that crossed cultural barriers. Through the construction project the team helped the Methodist Church of El Salvador build for the future.




NOVEMBER 2023 | UMVIM, SEJ

The North Carolina Conference UMVIM Office, along with other conferences within our Jurisdiction, relate to the Southeastern Jurisdictional UMVIM Office (UMVIM, SEJ). The Jurisdictional Office provides numerous resources to the local church and Annual Conferences as they work to be God's hands and feet in the world. Additionally, the Jurisdictional Office provides insurance to local teams as they engage in mission, both domestically and internationally. UMVIM, SEJ does all this work without any guaranteed funding from the denomination or other agencies. As such, they rely heavily on individual, local church, and Annual Conference donations.

NOVEMBER 2023 | VIETNAM MISSION INITIATIVE

Another initiative with whom the North Carolina Annual Conference partners is the Vietnam Mission Initiative. This initiative serves in preparing Vietnamese individuals for ordination, training pastors and laity including youth and women, developing teaching materials in Vietnamese language, and renovating of places of worship. Through the Advance project, Vietnam Mission Initiative addresses the following goals: 1) Provide leadership training for pastors and lay leaders 2) plant new faith communities 3) support community development 4) support one annual meeting per year.

AREAS OF MISSIONAL SERVICE



GLOBAL MISSION FELLOWS


Global Mission Fellows are young adults, ages 20–30, who are committed to serve in social justice ministries for two years. They enter into new communities, understanding their challenges and assets through relationships and with the long-term goal to overcome systemic oppression. Fellows partner with community organizations to address a variety of issues, including migration/immigration, education, public health and poverty.

Global Mission Fellow - International Track

Fellows serving in the International Track are assigned to a placement outside their home country. Fellows may indicate areas of interest in their application, but the final determination on where a fellow is placed is based on the needs of the placement site and how these needs match the skills of a fellow. Fellows are invited to serve in placements with our partnering organizations in Central and South America, Europe, Africa and Asia. Fellows have specialized job descriptions based on the needs of their host community and placement site. Fellows seek to combat systematic injustice by working with partners who address issues such as: Migration, Food sustainability/agriculture, Education, Worker's rights, Health access, Housing security, and Children/youth engagement

Global Mission Fellow - US-2 Track

Fellows in this track are called to serve in the United States. They work at partner organizations who serve as the local hosts for the fellows, providing contextual accompaniment and a support system beyond the day-to-day job description. Fellows have specialized job descriptions based on the needs of their host community and placement site. Placement could include opportunities such as case management, campus ministry, immigration rights, or youth and young adult ministries.



MISSION VOLUNTEERS

Mission Volunteers are individuals or couples (ages 18 and up) who seek long-term partnerships with communities around the world and fund themselves. Mission Volunteer opportunities are diverse and range from working with refugees, children and youth to serving as a teacher, pastor, camp director, or health care professional. The length of service ranges from two months to more than two years. Applications to the Mission Volunteer program can be submitted at any point during the year. Applications are reviewed by a panel and chosen applicants attend a virtual interview. Selected volunteers must commit to a three-day training before leaving for their placement site. Applications are due two months before trainings commence.

An Example Placement:

Czech Republic | Horní Počernice UMC | Position: Asst. English Teacher and Gardener Duration: 2 to 3 months Estimated monthly living expenses: \$750, including private accommodations, meals and ground transportation. Work description: Small church located on the outskirts of Prague. The Mission Volunteer will lead English-conversation classes for church and community members of all ages; help to clear and renovate the churchyard; assist with gardening work, including fence repair and tree removal; and attend Sunday service.
